

# Mission Trip to Cuba By Dinah McDougall

On November 13-18, I will travel to Cuba with members of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church of San Antonio, a member of the Cuba Partnership Network which has led several church missions to Cuba in recent years. We will be visiting Presbyterian facilities for children and senior citizens just outside the colonial town of Placetas (pop. 65,000). Each of the five members travelling to Cuba will bring suitcases filled to the weight limit of donated necessities to be left behind, as well as the per-person limit of U.S. dollars. Travelers will also bring their own food and necessities, so as not to burden our hosts in an economy where food resources, electricity, and commodities are scarce.

This year, the Cuban church hosting our group asked us to focus on items for children and youth ministry. While this certainly includes basic necessities, they expressed a special need for items that would bring holiday cheer – such as Christmas decorations and crafting items that could be used in Sunday school classes where children learn about teachings of the Bible and the Life of Jesus Christ. The reality is that even if Cubans had money, they would have no place to buy these items, with the only possible exception being black markets that charge exorbitant prices. While they appreciate receiving suitcases of food and medical products throughout the year, the "stuff" doesn't help feed the souls of youth that hunger for hopes and dreams, creative outlets, and friendships. Help us bring the spirit of Christmas Joy to the children this year!

Additionally, the church in Cuba also has their National Retreat Center (CANIP), which strives to stay open and provide programs for children, youth and adults. In the summer of 2024, the Synod of Cuba asked for Cuba Partnership Network's help, as the Cuban denomination faces remarkable challenges. Particularly they wanted assistance in reopening the summer camp, CANIP, in the central part of the country, so youth could see a glimmer of hope. So far, the Network has sent about \$40K in relief funds, and St. Mark participated by contributing \$4,500 at the end of last year. The camps were a smashing success, though everyday needs persist.

#### Why Cuba?

After years of political oppression and sanctions, Cuba's economy is currently going from bad to worse. In 2023, Cuba was ranked as the poorest country in Latin America, with 89% of the population living in extreme poverty, defined as having total household daily income of \$1.90 or less. While this may seem shocking in an American context of high inflation, the Cuban cost of living is low due to food and medical rations, public transportation, energy being highly subsidized. Nevertheless, informal surveys report that households are increasingly skipping meals due to a lack of money or resources to obtain food, and only 6% of those who manage to get medications acquired them from the pharmacies of the Cuban healthcare system. The rest obtained them through churches or charitable organizations, from relatives abroad, or through other means.

In a country where people struggle with enough to eat, the hunger for the Bread of Life is even stronger. Seventy years ago, when Fidel Castro upended Protestant Christianity with his declaration of "Marxist Communism", 70 percent of Presbyterian ministers and 50 percent of the church membership fled the country. Woody Paul's father described the situation: "Church-sponsored schools were forbidden. Education was conducted by the government. Church clinics were forbidden also since healthcare was provided by the state. In order to be considered for employment in any government entity one was required to sign an affidavit that you were not a practitioner of any religion. This requirement seriously affected the earning capabilities of faithful people."

Thankfully, the Cuban government eventually walked back the outright prohibitions and developed a more neutral position on religion – it tolerates religious activity as long as it tends toward similar societal goals of communism. Today, Presbyterian churches offer services to senior citizens, including free laundry, food supplements, meals in church facilities, over the counter medicines, exercise classes, adult education classes, psychological counseling (suicide prevention) - all formerly restricted. However, it seems religious activity is tolerated so long as it conducts itself peacefully and quietly and administers help to those in need. Human rights groups report that religious protesters still run the risk of arbitrary detentions.

#### **The Cuba Partnership Network**

Founded over thirty years ago by member congregations, the Cuba Partnership Network has a long and rich history of encouraging and supporting vital partnerships between the Presbyterian Church USA (PCUSA) and the Presbyterian-Reformed Church of Cuba (IPRC). The Cuba Partnership Network is committed to developing relationships which are grounded in companionship, cultural humility, and codevelopment – whether between congregations, presbyteries, the IPRC Synod, or the Ecumenical Seminary in Cuba. Companionship is visible in regular WhatsApp calls and chats between Cuban and U.S. church members who pray for one another. Cultural humility is listening first and speaking last, taking time to learn about one another's reality instead of making assumptions. Co-development is operating in partnership with each partner bringing their own gifts to the table, planning together, and doing together.

Due to the long-time strained relationship between the governments of the United States and Cuba, the Cuba Partnership Network understands part of Christ's call to us is to walk with our brothers and sisters in the churches in Cuba, visiting one another as we are able, praying for one another, and communicating as often as possible.

In closing, we are asking for your help to make this trip a success by considering a donation of items as described above. Cash is needed for the partner churches in Placetas and is used for feeding/nutrition programs with seniors, youth programs, and help for the shut-ins.

# Suggested Donations for Cuba

#### **School/Crafting Supplies:**

- Construction paper / colored paper / Sheets of colored foam or felt
- Washable markers / glitter paint / crayons
- Christmas crafts / jumbo wooden popsicle sticks
- Adhesive stickers or decorations
- Christmas decorations for classrooms
- Christmas craft kits

#### New children's clothing, especially:

- Socks especially white for school uniforms
- Underwear / training bras
- Thinx Teens Period Underwear, Brief-Style Period Panties for Teens, Reusable (Amazon, Walmart)
- Warm items, like thick hoodies many places don't have
- windows or heat, so it can get cold at night

#### Mosquito towelette wipes;

Individually wrapped insect repellent (DEET or organic essential oils)
– just no liquids or sprays, please. (Amazon, Walmart)

# While the Cuban government provides basic food, some items are hard to come by and considered "treats":

- Coffee (ground beans or instant)
- Instant oatmeal (especially in kid-friendly flavors)
- Swiss Miss hot cocoa packets
- Jello (helps with dehydration caused by dengue or diarrhea)
- Nutella / peanut butter

#### Medications / Personal Hygiene Items:

- Rehydration packets (these help with dehydration caused by dengue or diarrhea)
- Antibiotic ointments, band-aids, bandages
- Children's Over-the-counter medication (Tylenol, Advil, Motrin, etc.)
- Children's vitamins
