LESSON AT A GLANCE

WONDER TRUTH: God Leads Us

SCRIPTURE: [Joshua 5–6](#)

WORD OF WONDER: [From 1 Chronicles 16:15](#)

When life gets crazy, sometimes I just want to be told what to do. I long for someone to enlighten me on the “right” way to proceed. But when I ask for a friend’s advice, I don’t always take it. Why? Because deep down, I believe my own ways of solving life’s problems are better.

After God faithfully led the Israelites across the Jordan River on dry ground and gave them assurance that they would defeat Jericho, He gave Joshua an unusual battle plan: Walk around the city, blow trumpets, and shout. Although God’s ways are mysterious, the Israelites were learning that His leadership can always be trusted.

Read [Joshua 6:1–7, 20–21](#). Joshua had the Lord’s assurance of success if he followed each instruction. The people followed Joshua’s lead, and the result was a crumbling wall and an overwhelming victory.

- When have you followed God’s lead? What happened?
- When have you failed to follow God’s lead? What happened?
- What is an area in your life you can yield to the Lord’s leadership today?

In good times and bad, we can trust God to lead us. He is a good shepherd with a perfect plan. God led the Israelites, and God leads us too! Thank Him for providing divine guidance in every situation.

DID YOU KNOW?**FOUNDATION BUILDING BLOCKS****WHO?**

This story revolves around God and how He delivered Jericho into Israel's hands. Jericho was famous as a walled city, but God showed that He is stronger than the thickest walls.

WHAT?

[Joshua 5–6](#) shows how God led the Israelites to defeat the army of Jericho. God laid out a plan and the Israelites followed it, marching around the city for seven days. On the seventh day, God brought the walls of Jericho crashing down.

WHERE?

The story takes place at Jericho, which is one of the oldest cities in the world. The city was located on particularly fertile land in Canaan, which made it strategically valuable to the Israelites.

WHEN?

This story takes place immediately after God piled up the water of the Jordan River so that the Israelites could cross on foot ([Joshua 3–4](#)).

CONNECTING TO GOD'S BIG STORY

This story shows the central role that God played in defeating Israel's enemies. The Israelites didn't have to tear down the walls themselves. Instead, God brought the walls down for them. Likewise, salvation isn't something we can earn through what we do: It's a gift from God through Jesus!



Curiosity

Spark curiosity and get kids thinking about the wonder of God.

Play Stations

SUPPLIES: toy musical instruments, blocks or boxes (several), large ball, coloring utensils

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: [Joshua and Jericho Coloring Sheet](#) (1 per kid)

Greet the kids warmly and briefly explain the play stations to them. Invite them to play at any of the stations.

Welcome to church! While we're getting ready to start, you can play at any of these stations to help you get ready for our lesson today. Do you have any ideas about what we'll be learning today?

Play Station: Make Some Noise

Set up: Set out a variety of toy musical instruments.

Play: Encourage the kids to play the instruments (watch to make sure they don't share germs by putting their mouths on anything). Invite the kids to share what their favorite instrument is and what sound they think is the loudest or the prettiest.

Play Station: Falling Walls

Set up: Set out blocks (or boxes) and a large ball.

Play: Invite the kids to work together to build a wall with the blocks or boxes. Then let them take turns rolling the ball to knock down the wall. Let the kids continue rebuilding and knocking it down.

Play Station: Joshua and Jericho Coloring Sheet

Set up: Ahead of time, print one copy per kid of the [coloring sheet](#) and set out coloring utensils.

Play: Let the kids color. The kids can also turn the sheet over and draw a picture of a big wall.

Curiosity Activity: Marching

SUPPLIES: cone or chair, painter's tape or floor tape (optional)

Set out a cone or chair in the middle of the room and have the kids form a circle around it. If the kids need help staying in the circle, you can use painter's tape or floor tape to make a large circle around the object in the middle. Show the kids where the perimeter of the circle is.

We're going to do an activity where I'll be your leader, and I'll tell you some silly ways to march around the circle. You'll have to listen closely to directions as I call them out.

Call out instructions and encourage the kids to do the different movements as they're walking around the circle.

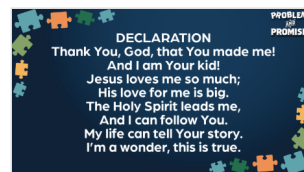
- March like a soldier
- March and cheer loudly
- March and be as quiet as you can
- Skip
- Walk in slow motion
- March as fast as you can
- Crawl
- Tiptoe
- Walk sideways facing the middle of the circle
- Take really big steps
- Do a hopscotch pattern
- Walk upside down (The kids might not understand this one ... Have fun with it!)

That last instruction was hard to understand, wasn't it?! Is it always easy to understand instructions from leaders? Allow the kids to respond. **In our story today, we're going to hear about people who were given instructions from God that didn't seem to make sense at first! The story had to do with people marching around and around. We're going to hear how God led His people and how God leads us too! We can always trust God as our leader.**

Declaring God's Wonder

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: Early Childhood Declaration [Video](#) or [Slide](#) (optional)

Show the Early Childhood Declaration [Video](#) or [Slide](#) and encourage the kids to say the statements and do the motions with you.



Thank You, God, that You made me! *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Make prayer hands, then point up to God and to yourself.

And I am Your kid! *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Put your hands on your hips.

Jesus loves me so much; *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Spread your arms out wide to your side one at a time, then pull them in for a hug around your chest.

His love for me is big. *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Hold your arms up high and wide above your head.

The Holy Spirit leads me, *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Bring your arms down from above, making a path in front of you.

And I can follow You. *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

March in place like you're following the leader.

My life can tell Your story, *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Hold your hands in front of you like an open book.

I'm a wonder; this is true. *(Kids repeat words and motions.)*

Put your hands up, shake your fingers, and celebrate ("praise hands").



Belief

Guide kids into knowing God, exploring His big story, and marveling at His wonder.

Prayer of Invitation

Before entering into God's big story, lead kids in a prayer of invitation. Use the prayer here or your own words: **God, thank You for leading us. Help us hear from You today. Help us follow You and trust You to lead us every day. In Jesus' name, Amen.**

Bible Time Rhyme

Say the Bible time rhyme (with motions) each week with the kids before the Bible story, to remind kids that what they're about to hear is part of God's big story.

I open my Bible and what do I see? *Hold your hands together, then open your palms, as if opening a book.*

God's big story, waiting for me! *Point to yourself.*

Let's start by reading part of God's big story from the Bible. We're going to read from the Old Testament.

Read the God's Big Story Script provided or read [Joshua 6:1–20](#) from the Bible. You can also show the [Bible Story Picture](#) to give kids a visual depiction as you tell the story.

GOD'S BIG STORY SCRIPT

SUPPLIES: boxes (lots!), gold paint or wrapping paper (optional), kazoos or toy trumpets (optional)

Leader Tip: You could have a couple kids come up to the front and help you do the sounds and actions throughout the story to make this feel more interactive.

Ahead of time, set up a stack of boxes to make a wall in the middle of the room. Keep one box set aside to be the ark of the covenant. You could also paint it gold (or cover it in gold wrapping paper) to make it even more special. If you have kazoos or toy trumpets, you can set them out.

You're going to get to help tell the story today. Don't mess with the boxes that are stacked here until I tell you it's time. Gather the kids around the boxes that are stacked as a wall and remind them not to touch the stacked boxes yet.

A long time ago, God promised His people—the Israelites—that they would one day live in a special place called Canaan. The book of Joshua tells how God took care of them, helped them, and brought them all the way to a big river called the Jordan River. God made the water stop, so they could walk across on dry ground!

But once they crossed the river, the Israelites saw another problem. There was a city called Jericho, and it had huge walls—too tall to climb and too strong to break. Point to the wall of boxes and invite the kids to point to it too. **The Israelites needed God's help.**

So God sent an angel to Joshua, the leader of the people. The angel told Joshua that God had a special plan. It wasn't a plan about fighting or climbing walls. It was a very different kind of plan.

God said to have the priests carry the ark of the covenant—the beautiful gold box that showed God was with them—and march around the whole city. The army was supposed to follow the priests, but they had to stay quiet while the priests blew trumpets made from rams' horns.

God said to march around the whole city one time every day for six days. When the Israelite army followed the priests carrying the ark, they trusted in God instead of trying to defeat Jericho on their own. Then on the seventh day, they were to walk around seven times. After the seventh time, the priests would blow their trumpets, and all the people would shout. Then God would make the walls fall down!

The Israelites did exactly what God said. Let's all get up and march around the walls together. Invite the kids to follow you as you lead them marching around the stack of boxes.

On day one, they marched around the city one time. On day two, they marched again. Let's keep marching! If you have enough time (and it's keeping their attention!), continue to march around and around the boxes as you tell the rest of the story. You can do all seven days if the kids are interested. **On days three, four, five, and six ... They marched around the city one time, just like God told them.**

Then it was day seven. The people got up very early and marched around the city seven times. Invite the kids to march around the boxes with you again. **On the last lap, the priests blew their trumpets. Do you want to blow pretend trumpets? Let's do it!** Invite the kids to blow pretend trumpets (or use toy trumpets or kazoos, if you have them). **Joshua shouted, "Shout! The Lord has given you the city!" (Joshua 6:16). The people shouted as loud as they could—and right then, the strong walls of Jericho fell down!** If you have a large group, invite a few kids to knock down the boxes. If your group is smaller, let all the kids knock the boxes down. **God helped the Israelites win, just like He promised.**

When the Israelites saw the walls of Jericho, they didn't give up hope for the land God promised. They could not do it with their own strength. Instead, they trusted God to lead them. He gave them a plan, and they followed it—around and around they marched. And

God kept His promise, bringing the walls of the city tumbling down. God showed the Israelites that His way is always the best way. This story reminds us that God leads us too, and He can help us do things that seem big or hard! God led the Israelites in His way, and God leads us too!

Connecting the Wonder Truth

Ask the following question to help kids connect the Wonder Truth to God's big story:

Our Wonder Truth today is **GOD LEADS US. Where did you see our Wonder Truth happen in the story?** Allow kids to answer freely.

The Israelites didn't have to knock down the walls of Jericho themselves. God did it for them. Our sins—the wrong things we say and do—build a wall between us and God. But we don't have to deal with sin by ourselves. God helps us and leads us! He sent Jesus to live, die, and rise again so we can be with Him forever—no more walls!

Word of Wonder

SUPPLIES: Bible

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: Problems and Promises Word of Wonder [Slide](#) or [Video](#) (optional)

WORD OF WONDER

**He remembers his covenant forever,
the promise he made, for a thousand
generations.**

—1 Chronicles 16:15 (NIV)

Display the Word of Wonder [Slide](#). **Our Word of Wonder for the Problems and Promises series is **1 Chronicles 16:15**: “He remembers his covenant forever, the promise he made, for a thousand generations.”** Encourage the kids to say the verse with you. Today we learned how God led the Israelites to the land He promised them long ago. Our Word of Wonder reminds us that God keeps His promises forever!

Encourage the kids to do the motions and say the verse with you.

- **HE**—*Point up.*
- **REMEMBERS**—*Touch your head*
- **HIS COVENANT**—*Lace your fingers together.*
- **FOREVER**, —*Draw large circles in the air with your index finger.*
- **THE PROMISE**—*Place your index fingers on on the corner of your mouth and move your hands downward.*
- **HE MADE**—*Point up.*

- **FOR A THOUSAND GENERATIONS.**—*Move your right hand from left to right.*
- **1 CHRONICLES 16:15**—*Open your hands in front of you, like opening a book.*

Encourage the kids to do the motions and say the verse with you three more times, each time doing a different movement along with it.

- The first time, they should march in a large circle while saying the verse.
- The second time, they should hop in place while reciting the verse.
- The third time, they should pretend to blow trumpets while saying the verse.

You did a good job following instructions! The Israelites followed God, and He helped them defeat Jericho so they could get to the promised land. God kept His promise and led His people. God keeps His promises to us too.

Gather the kids to discuss these questions:

- **What promises did God make to His people?** *(Possible answers: to lead them to the promised land; to be with them; to take care of them.)*
- **How do you know that God keeps His promises?** *(Possible answers: The Bible says God keeps His promises; God is trustworthy; God is faithful.)*



Faith

Help kids see the wonder of God's story and how it connects to their own story.

Circle Time: Knock 'Em Down

SUPPLIES: scissors (prep only), boxes (8), tape, large ball

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: [Discussion Questions Sheet](#)

Ahead of time, print the [Discussion Questions Sheet](#) and cut the questions apart. Tape one question on each of the boxes. Stack the boxes into a tower.

Gather the kids in a circle around the stack of boxes. **A long time ago, God promised His people—the Israelites—that they would one day live in a special place called Canaan. When the Israelites saw the walls of Jericho, they didn't give up hope for the land God promised. They trusted God to lead them. He gave them a plan, and they followed it—around and around they marched. And God kept His promise, bringing the walls of the city tumbling down. God showed the Israelites that His way is always the best way. Let's knock down the wall and discuss the story.**

Allow kids to take turns knocking over the boxes by throwing or rolling a ball at the boxes. Each time the boxes are knocked down, have the kids answer the question from the box on the bottom of the stack. Rebuild the stack without the previous bottom box until the entire tower is gone.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- **What problem did Israel have after they crossed the Jordan River?** *(The city of Jericho was in their way; Jericho had a big wall around it.)*
- **What was around the city of Jericho?** *(a big wall)*
- **What did God's messenger tell Joshua to do?** *(March around the wall each day for seven days; blow trumpets and shout on the seventh day.)*
- **What happened when the Israelites blew their trumpets and shouted?** *(The walls of Jericho fell down.)*
- **What did God promise to the Israelites in today's story?** *(to help them take over Jericho; that they would get to the promised land)*
- **How do you know God keeps His promises?**
- **How does God still lead us today?**
- **What is one way God had led you this past week?**

God led the Israelites all those years ago, and He will lead you too. It can be hard to follow God's instructions sometimes, but He will help us follow His way! God knows what's best for us, and He loves us so much. Let's talk to God now in prayer!

Invite kids to share prayer requests and praises and to pray for each other. Some kids may not be comfortable praying out loud. That's OK! Encourage them to pray silently and thank God for leading us. God hears all our prayers!



Identity

Create space for God to remind kids that they are known, loved, led, and their lives can tell of God's wonder.

Responding in Worship: Brick by Brick

SUPPLIES: construction paper (1 sheet per 2 kids), scissors (prep only), butcher paper, tape, coloring utensils

Wonder Ink RESOURCES: music from the [Problems and Promises Early Childhood Spotify playlist](#)

Ahead of time, cut a sheet of construction paper in half for every two kids, symbolizing a brick. Tape a large piece of butcher paper to a wall in the room.

Set out coloring utensils and give a paper brick to each kid. Gather the kids together. **Today we heard how God led the Israelites to win their battle over the city of Jericho. God is a good leader! He's the best leader there is, and we can trust Him to lead us too.**

Each of you has a sheet of paper shaped like a brick—kind of like the bricks that built the wall of Jericho. You can write your name on your brick (or draw a picture of yourself) with coloring utensils as a way to tell God you trust Him to lead you too. You can also draw a picture of something you need God to help you with. The walls around Jericho seemed big and impossible to get through. But God can do the impossible! He can help us with anything we face. Sometimes we need help getting along with our brother or sister. Or we can also ask God for help when we're scared. God will always be with us!

After you write your name or draw a picture, you can add your brick to the wall with tape. Show the kids the butcher paper and tape.

Play music from the [Problems and Promises Early Childhood Spotify playlist](#) as kids reflect and draw. Help the kids tape their bricks to the butcher paper when they're done coloring. **We can thank God for leading us and helping us.**

Prayer and Blessing

After the kids finish their activity, pray with them to thank God for leading us and for always going ahead of us and keeping His promises.

God, thank You for Your faithfulness to us. You are always with us and lead us through hard times. Thank You for leading us with Your Holy Spirit. Thank You for Your plan and promise to save us. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Encourage the kids to hold their hands out in front of them, with palms up, as if their hands are open to receive something. Tell them to listen and receive the blessing as you speak it over them.

Blessing: May you go today knowing that God leads you and gives you courage. God keeps His promises, and He promises to always be with you, no matter what you face.

Closing Game: March Around

SUPPLIES: cone or chair, boxes (optional)

Set out a cone or chair in the middle of the room and have the kids form a circle around it. March around the cone or chair with the kids following you. You can march in a variety of ways, such as slowly, quickly, backward, or on your tiptoes. You can also stack boxes into a tower and tell the kids to march around the cone or chair (or boxes) seven times, then let them knock down the tower of boxes. The kids will love taking turns knocking down the stack of boxes!

When the Israelites saw the walls of Jericho, they didn't give up hope for the land God promised. They did not try to do it with their own strength. Instead, they trusted God to lead them.
