

Bible Reading Plan

Day 1

Romans 12

Romans 12:1 begins with a powerful call: "In view of God's mercy, offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship." Worship isn't just a song we sing; it's the life we live. Believers may express praise on Sundays, but followers go all in by giving God their worth every day—in their choices, their service, their relationships, and their obedience. Paul reminds us that true worship begins when we see God's mercy clearly and respond with surrender. The world will always try to define what deserves our time, our affection, and our devotion—but only God is truly worthy. When we fix our eyes on Him, our lives become an offering that reflects His goodness. Worship isn't about what we get from God; it's about giving Him what He's worth—everything.

- What areas of my life am I still holding back from offering to God as an act of worship?
- How does remembering God's mercy help me see that He alone is worthy of my full devotion?
- In what ways can I turn my daily routines work, relationships, service into expressions of worship?
- Ask God to help you see His mercy more clearly and to live each day as an act of worship —
 giving Him your full worth through surrender, obedience, and love.

Day 2

Amos 5:18-27

In Amos 5:18–27, God confronts Israel for going through the motions of worship while their hearts were far from Him. They offered sacrifices, sang songs, and held festivals, but God said He wanted none of it. Why? Because worship without obedience isn't worship at all. The people gave God their rituals but not their lives. They were giving worth to idols—comfort, prosperity, self—while pretending to honor Him. Believers can know how to "do worship," but followers give God their true worth through justice, righteousness, and surrender. God says, "Let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" Real worship shows up in how we live, not just what we sing. When God gets our worth, our lives—not just our services—declare His greatness.

- Where in my life might I be giving God words or rituals without giving Him my obedience?
- What "idols" or competing loves might be stealing the worth that belongs to God alone?
- How can I live out justice, righteousness, and integrity as acts of worship this week?
- Ask God to reveal any area where you've been offering Him worship without surrender, and pray for the courage to give Him your whole life — because He alone is worthy.

Day 3

John 4:1-26

When Jesus meets the Samaritan woman at the well, He confronts not only her broken past but her broken understanding of worship. She thought worship was about *where*—on this mountain or in Jerusalem. Jesus shows her it's about *who*. True worshipers worship the Father in spirit and truth because God is seeking people whose hearts truly belong to Him. The woman had given worth to relationships that left her empty, but Jesus offered her "living water"—a new source of identity, purpose, and worship. Believers may know the right words about God, but followers give Him their full worth by letting Him redefine their lives from the inside out. Jesus exposes her wounds not to shame her but to free her, inviting her into a kind of worship that satisfies. Real worship is not about location, traditions, or forms—it's about a heart fully aligned with the One who deserves everything.

- What wells habits, relationships, pursuits am I tempted to draw worth from instead of from Jesus?
- How is Jesus inviting me to worship Him in spirit and truth rather than relying on outward forms?
- What would it look like for me to give Him my full worth in this season of my life?
- Ask Jesus to reveal anything you've been depending on for worth other than Him, and pray for a heart that worships in spirit and truth giving Him all He deserves.

Day 4

Psalm 71

Psalm 71 is the song of someone who has learned, over a lifetime, that God alone is worthy of trust and praise. The psalmist cries out for help, but his worship isn't rooted in present feelings—it's rooted in God's faithfulness through every season of his life. He says, "My mouth is filled with your praise... all day long," not because everything is easy, but because God has always been his refuge. Believers may worship when they feel strong, but followers give God their worth even in weakness, fear, or uncertainty. This psalm shows us that worship isn't driven by emotion but by remembrance —looking back at how God carried us so we can trust Him again today. When we choose to praise God in the midst of trouble, we declare that He—not our circumstances—defines our worth and hope.

- How has God been faithful to me in past seasons, and how can that fuel my worship today?
- What circumstances am I tempted to let define my joy or hope instead of God's character?
- What would it look like for me to worship God "all day long," even when I don't feel strong?
- Ask God to help you remember His faithfulness, trust Him in your present struggles, and worship Him as the One who alone is worthy of your hope and devotion.

Day 5

Matthew 4:1-11

In the wilderness, Jesus is tempted with three powerful offers—provision, protection, and power. Each one subtly invites Him to give worth to something other than His Father. Satan's final temptation is the clearest: "All this I will give you... if you will bow down and worship me." But Jesus refuses every shortcut, every counterfeit, every rival source of worth. He answers with Scripture: "Worship the Lord your God and serve Him only." Believers may say God is worthy, but followers prove it by resisting the voices and desires that compete for their devotion. Jesus shows us that true worship is not just a song—it's a choice, especially when the wilderness is long and the temptation is strong. Worship is giving God what He alone deserves: our full allegiance, our deepest trust, and our undivided heart.

- What temptations right now are trying to convince me to give worth to something other than God?
- How can I use Scripture, like Jesus did, to strengthen my worship and refocus my heart?
- Where might God be inviting me to choose obedience over convenience as an act of worship?
- Ask God to help you recognize the voices that compete for your worship and to give you strength to serve Him only offering Him your full worth in every choice you make.
