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## Introduction: Why Even Bother With Church?

### | “Can’t I just follow Jesus on my own?”

It’s a fair question, especially in a time when being “spiritual but not religious” feels appealing. Many have experienced church hurt, been let down, or simply wonder if following Jesus requires church attendance.

At **Love Church**, we believe the Church is not just a destination—it’s a family you belong to, the visible movement God chose to shape people and reach the world. As Jesus said in Matthew 16:18:

### | “I will build My church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.”

### | Why Church Matters Personally

- **Got hurt?** You’re not alone, and separation won’t get you closer to Jesus.
- **So you can follow Jesus solo?** A personal relationship grows in loving community.
- **The difference between attending and being?** Attending: passive. Being: fully invested—sharing life, care, hope, and mission together.

### | Our Heartbeat

The Church isn’t meant to be a safe religious club. It’s God’s chosen people—called, transformed, equipped, and sent. We worship. We serve. We grow—and yes, we build together. This church we join, though imperfect, is His blueprint for change.

## Section 2: What Is the Church?

Understanding the church means grasping two powerful truths wrapped in one Greek word: *ekklesia*. It's both who we are and why we're here.

### A. Ekklesia: “Called-Out Assembly”, Universal + Local

The word translated “church” is rooted in the idea of being **called out**.

- Literally, **ekklesia means “a called-out assembly”** — a gathering of people God summons from the world into His family.
- In ancient Greece, it referred to a civic gathering called for decisions. In the New Testament, it refers to **God’s spiritual gatherings** — people called out by grace to belong to Him.

The church isn’t a building—it’s a people summoned by Jesus to live as His family on mission together.

#### 1. Universal Church

This is **all believers everywhere, past, present, and future**, spiritually united in Christ.

- **It’s a heavenly assembly**, described in Hebrews 12 and Revelation 7.
- **It’s our eternal identity**—a relationship that transcends time, space, and denomination.

#### 2. Local Church

**This is the** gathering of believers in a specific place, meeting regularly.

- **It’s visible and relational**, built on preaching, sacraments (like baptism and Communion), and shared mission.
- It’s where **we carry each other’s burdens, sharpen faith, and serve together**.

**Paul: you belong to the universal body, and you live it out in a local assembly daily.**

#### Why Both Matter

- **The universal church is your spiritual family**—connected to every believer since Acts 2.
- **The local church is your spiritual home**—a place you gather, serve, and grow in real ways.

You can’t be part of one without the other. To say you follow Jesus outside of church is like saying you’re a citizen but refuse to show your passport: you belong, but you won’t engage.

#### Ekklesia: Called to Belong, Called to Be

When we gather in Jesus’ name, we’re living out the universal church in local reality—praying together, loving boldly, serving faithfully. We aren’t just Christians; **we’re the church**—Christ’s visible presence in the world.

# Section 3: Why the Church Matters to God

The Church isn't just humanity's idea—it's God's heart. He never created us to live out faith alone. Here's why the church holds such value in God's plan:

## 1. Jesus Gave His Life for the Church

In Ephesians 5:25–27, Paul sets the tone:

**“Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her”**

Jesus died sacrificially so the Church could be made holy and radiant. That's how precious the Church is to Him.

## 2. The Church Is Christ's Bride

God doesn't have a “plan B.” The Church is His chosen design—His bride, His family, His co-heirs (Romans 8:17). Revelation 19 and Ephesians 5 show Jesus' commitment to her is eternal, intentional, and inseparable.

## 3. The Church Is God's Strategy for the World

The Church isn't optional—it's the vehicle Jesus entrusted with reaching the nations. Acts 1:8 makes it clear:

**“You will receive power... and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.”**

The Church receives the Spirit's power and carries the Gospel from our neighborhoods to the ends of the earth.

## 4. We're Connected to a Living, Global Family

Ephesians portrays the Church as a body—diverse, connected, unified under Christ (the head). Every believer worldwide, across every era and denomination, belongs to this living organism.

### Summary:

- **Jesus died for the Church**, setting the stage for her holiness.
- **She's His bride**, the closest relationship He has with humanity.
- **She's God's plan**, not a backup; no missions apart from the Church.
- **She's alive and global**, not just local or temporary.

# Section 4: What the Church Is Called to Do

- Dietrich Bonhoeffer said **the church is simply "Christ existing as community."** When we forgive, love, and serve as one, Jesus shows up.
