| But Isn’t the Bible Written by Humans?

Yes—**and also by God**. This is what makes the Bible unique. Christians believe it’s **inspired**—meaning God worked through human authors, guiding their words by the Holy Spirit without overriding their personality or style. Paul puts it like this:

Can We Trust the Bible?

If you've ever wondered, "How do I know the Bible is reliable? Didn't it get changed over time?" — you're not alone. These are honest, important questions. At **Love Church**, we believe faith isn't blind — it's built on truth. And the Bible, while written by human hands, bears the fingerprints of God.

Let's walk through why we believe the Bible is trustworthy—and how we respond to some of the most common doubts.

1. It Has Unmatched Historical Evidence

Objection: "Hasn't the Bible been changed over time through copying and translation?"

Response: Actually, the Bible has more manuscript support than any ancient text in history—by far.

- The **New Testament has over 5,800 Greek manuscripts**, plus 20,000+ in Latin and other languages.
- Some fragments date back to **within 25–50 years** of the originals (like the Rylands fragment, ~125 AD).
- For comparison, Homer's Iliad has 643 copies (earliest: 500 years after), and nobody questions its reliability.

So why does this matter? The sheer volume of early manuscripts allows scholars to cross-check and reconstruct the original writings with **99.5% accuracy**. No other ancient document even comes close. The Bible hasn't been corrupted—it's been preserved.

2. It's Consistent Across Centuries

Objection: "The Bible was written by a bunch of different people—how can we trust that it tells one true story?"

Response: The Bible was written over 1,500 years, by 40+ authors, in 3 different languages, from different continents, in different genres—yet tells one unified story: God's redemption of humanity through Jesus.

Despite cultural, geographic, and linguistic differences, the storyline holds. Prophecies in the Old Testament point to realities fulfilled in the New. From Genesis to Revelation, there is no contradiction in God's nature, character, or mission. That kind of narrative unity doesn't happen by accident. It's evidence of divine authorship.

3. It Wasn't a Political Conspiracy

Objection: "Didn't Constantine or the church decide what books to include hundreds of years later?"

Response: The early church didn't invent Scripture—they **recognized** it.

- The four Gospels and most of Paul's letters were widely circulated and accepted **within the first century**.
- Church councils (like Carthage in 397 AD) didn't choose the canon—they affirmed what the Church had already treated as authoritative for generations.

Books were included based on clear criteria:

1. **Apostolic origin (written by or connected to eyewitnesses)**
2. **Widespread use in worship**
3. **Consistency with the Gospel message**

The Bible wasn't politically manufactured. It was spiritually discerned and preserved by the early Church.

| 4. It Contains Fulfilled Prophecy

Objection: "Maybe Jesus just made sure He fulfilled the prophecies."

Response: Some prophecies could not be self-fulfilled:

- Born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2)
- Born into a specific lineage (David's)
- Betrayed for 30 pieces of silver (Zechariah 11:12–13)
- Hands and feet pierced (Psalm 22:16) — written 1,000 years before Jesus, before crucifixion existed

Jesus fulfilled over 300 prophecies—many of which would've been impossible to engineer. Statisticians say the odds of one person fulfilling just 8 is 1 in 100,000,000,000,000,000 (one quadrillion). Fulfilled prophecy is not coincidence—it's confirmation.

| 5. It's Supported by Archaeology

Objection: "But the Bible talks about things we've never found."

Response: Many once-disputed biblical claims have been confirmed by archaeology:

- **The Hittites** (Genesis 15:20) – once thought fictional, confirmed in 1906
- **The Pool of Bethesda** (John 5) – discovered with five porticoes
- **Pontius Pilate's inscription** – found in 1961, confirming his historical role

Archaeology hasn't proven every detail (nor could it), but it has consistently supported the historical reliability of the Bible's people, places, and timelines.

| 6. Jesus Trusted the Scriptures

Objection: "But wasn't Jesus just quoting Jewish tradition?"

Response: Jesus didn't just reference Scripture—**He built His life and teachings on it.**

- **He quoted the Old Testament in moments of temptation, confrontation, and prayer.**
- **He affirmed even controversial stories—like Jonah and Noah—as real history.**
- **He said, "Not the smallest letter... will disappear from the Law until everything is accomplished" (Matthew 5:18).**

If you trust Jesus, you can trust the Bible—because **Jesus trusted the Bible.**

7. It Still Works

Objection: “Even if it’s preserved... is it relevant?”

Response: Yes. The Bible has shaped **laws, cultures, families, and hearts** for thousands of years—and still does.

It’s not just about history. It’s about **hope**.

- **It reads you.**
- **It comforts you.**
- **It convicts you.**

James 1:22 says:

“Do not merely listen to the word... do what it says.”

The goal isn't Bible knowledge. It's transformation. When you read about forgiveness—go forgive. When you read about generosity—give. When you read about hope—share it. The Bible doesn't just inform us. It **forms** us.
