What Matters?

In life, we must make choices about what matters the most to us:

- Do I attend a music concert or save up for a new house?
- Do I hang out with my friends or give my mom a call on the phone?
- Do I hold in confidence the information my friend shared with me or do I tell someone else because I worry their life is in danger?

Decision after decision, we reveal to ourselves and the world what matters to us: not only things, but which people and which values matter to us.

This fall we will reflect together on what matters. To guide our reflections, we will of course, look at the teachings and life of Jesus. This year though, we will use another "tool" to guide our reflections – the Augsburg Confession.

The Augsburg Confession was confessed in 1526 by the first "Lutherans." A group of church leaders presented their teaching to Emperor Charles V. They hoped by focusing on what matters, truly the core, they could convince the Emperor that they were not heretics and that the church could remain united.

...that unfortunately didn't happen...

That said, the Augsburg Confession, which celebrates its 500th anniversary next June, continues to offer enduring reflection on what matters. My hope this fall is to introduce many of you to the Augsburg Confession and the way in which it still provides insight into our daily lives. A little preview – we will start where the Augsburg Confession begins, with the affirmation that God matters!



Besides listening to the sermons on Sundays, a few other ways to delve deeper into this theme:

- Pastor's Bible studies on Thursdays will address this theme.
- A number of the common ground classes and groups that meet on Sunday mornings will discuss the Gospel passages with questions that revolve around this theme.
- Pastor Randy Chrissis will teach an Introduction to Lutheran Theology, aka, Let's Talk, this fall. People really enjoyed his teaching last year and he kindly agreed to come back and continue to teach.

The Augsburg Confession focuses on what matters, not only to us as humans, but also what matters to God. Ultimately what matters to God is your salvation and the renewal of all things in Jesus Christ. We will get there on All Saint's Sunday. But in the meantime, join us as we reflect together on what matters.

YOUTH MINISTRY

As I write this, it does not seem possible that the summer has passed quickly and the school year has begun again. I attended the Twilight Tuneup at Warwick HS last weekend and the energy was palpable. The crowds, the music, the food trucks, and of course the runners! As the seasons change, so does the work at the church as we continue to become rooted in the gospel of Christ and this community at St. Paul, and grow as we share our space, fellowship, and faith with each other and those in the community.

Here are some of the highlights from the last few months.

In June we hosted an evening for youth and their families to gather. It was a great opportunity to get to know each other and celebrate the completion of another school year.

From there, we prepared for a service trip to Martin, Kentucky in July to work with the Christian Appalachian Project. Bobbi Jo Curty and I led a team of 7 youth and had such a tremendous experience. We partnered with youth and leaders from other churches in the Synod to help improve the homes of people impacted by severe flooding, or unable to make necessary improvements or repairs. This shared experience of serving together formed a great bond and built momentum among the group as we head into the fall. The youth were such great representatives of St. Paul and more importantly as ambassadors of Christ.

Shortly after returning from Kentucky, Johnna McCormick and I led 9 youth during Diaconos week at Camp Kirchenwald. Diaconos is a week where we partner with various organizations in the community to support the good work they are doing.



This was our first year participating in the Diaconos program and it was such a positive experience. We facilitated activity time with residents at a long term healthcare facility, pitchforked a ton of manure and cleaned the pens of horses at an equine therapy center, and prepared a week's worth of meals for mothers and their kids experiencing or at risk of homelessness. After completing service projects, we returned to camp for activities such as pool time, soccer tournaments, ropes course, climbing tower and the zip line. It was an amazing time of being able to live out the gospel and have fun while doing it!



CULTIVATING FAITH



I am excited as the Sunday School year is about to begin to have the opportunity to continue to get to know the youth of St. Paul and their families. The theme of this fall for grades 9-12 is **Cultivating Faith**. We will be using a new curriculum published by Storymakers NYC, The volume we will use this fall is Faith. It works through the Apostle's Creed while giving teens the space to creatively process through their faith and questions as they navigate the journey of being Christ followers.

For grades 7-8, students will be participating in Confirmation, led by Pastor Robert Wallace assisted by Confirmation mentors. This year they will be focusing on the story of Scripture as students explore who Christ is as revealed throughout the Bible, and grounding our identity as image bearers of the triune God to better understand our story in light of the divine story.

(*The Why*) We believe that Jesus Christ invites us to walk in his way. On this path, we find forgiveness, restoration, wholeness, peace, and community. Christ our Good Shepherd who cares for us,, the cosmic Gardener who cultivates our hearts, continually calls us as individuals and a community, guides us, nourishes us and renews us by his Spirit to the glory of the Father.



(The How) To that end, we aim to provide space for the youth of St. Paul and the broader community to regularly gather. Through Sunday mornings, service projects, and other events, we seek to create places where the youth can breathe, reset, cultivate community, and be equipped to navigate life and to carry the fire that pushes back the darkness.



(The What) We provide the opportunity for youth to find refuge, community, and a safe space to ask questions and grow in their faith while seeking understanding. A place where youth would be encountered and transformed by the good news of Christ, and to see them rooted and growing in the love of God and love for the other, for the life of the world.

To that end, we will gather on Sunday mornings, participate in worship, and have other opportunities to gather to build relationships and serve throughout the community.







Rejoice! in God's Creation



Changes are coming to the Prayer Labyrinth! This fall we will be lovingly amending the prayer labyrinth walkway to smooth the path, making it easier for all to journey in prayer and reflection. Just as God guides us along life's uneven roads, these improvements will help create a gentle, welcoming way for each step taken in quiet conversation with Him.

A "Prayer Library" will be added to the Sacred Grounds, offering guidance on how to use the Prayer Labyrinth along with a curated collection of written These prayers can serve as words to share with God during times of joy, gratitude, sorrow, worry or hardship. This resource provides a space to discover words when you're unsure of what to express, or to unite your heart with the prayers of others who have experienced similar feelings.

In October, we are excited to partner with Mr. McClain's classes at Warwick High School to plant 210 native flower plugs across the Sacred Grounds and Prayer Labyrinth. The selected plants will feature:

- Asclepias tuberosa Butterfly Weed
- Baptisia australis Blue False Indigo
- Echinacea purpurea Purple Coneflower
- Physostegia virginiana Obedient Plant

Congregational Care & Prayer



As devoted followers of Jesus Christ we want to live into the "great commandment" through loving God with our entire being and loving our neighbor. A way this gets manifested is providing care — a listening year, an encouraging note, a helping hand, a compassionate presence. Doing this are the volunteers serving on one of the five groups of the ministry branch called Congregational Care. Each of these groups is overseen by Associate Pastor Robert Wallace and provides support and encouragement to congregants, especially those in need.

Caring Connections

Caring Connections Ministry reaches out to congregation members during significant moments in their lives by sending cards and notes that offer encouragement, sympathy, celebration, and gratitude. Furthermore, the group also maintains connections with St. Paul students who are currently attending college. Caring Connections meets the second Monday of each month at 1:00 pm.

Communion Ministers

Communion Ministers bring the sacrament of the Lord's Supper to members who cannot attend worship in the sanctuary. Once a month, the minister brings the sacrament and holds a brief worship service. Pastor Robert provides training for new ministers. As a group, communion ministers meet three or four times a year.

Companion Ministers

Grief, trauma, and illness can lead to isolation. Companion ministers offer friendship and regular connections. They arrange visits and occasionally go on outings. If further assistance is needed, Pastor Robert is notified. Companions gather monthly on the third Monday at 7 PM.

Dementia Support

Many St. Paul families are caregivers for relatives with dementia and frequently experience feelings of being overwhelmed. To provide assistance, a monthly support group gathers at St. Paul on the fourth Monday at 7 PM. Participants share their stories, offer mutual encouragement, learn connection strategies, and pray for one another.

Prayer Group

God gave humans both the desire and the ability to remain in constant dialogue with the Triune God (I Thes.5:16-18). Yet, many struggle with being still and open in His presence. Simply put, prayer is conversation (both speaking and listening) from the heart with God. Prayer is also a life routine to cultivate and learn. On the first Thursday of the month Pastor Robert meets with those interested in learning and practicing prayer. This ministry has helped write Advent and Lenten devotion books and assisted with prayer services.

St. Paul also provides Congregational Care through pastoral visits and counseling. Please call the church office and let the pastors know if there is the desire to connect or if you or family members face hospitalization or other crossroads moments.


