Overview of the Book of Ruth

Setting:

 Ruth, a Moabite widow, follows her mother-in-law Naomi back to Bethlehem after the death of her husband and sons. She eventually marries Boaz, a relative of Naomi, and becomes part of the lineage of King David.

Key Events:

- Ruth's Loyalty (Ruth 1): Ruth decides to stay with Naomi despite Naomi's urging to return to her family. This decision highlights her loyalty and faith.
- Gleaning in the Fields (Ruth 2): Ruth works in Boaz's fields, showing God's provision for the poor and the widow.
