From Pastor Logid

It is fitting that we Lutherans highlight the work of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther in the month of October. It was on *All Hallows Eve*, October 31, 1517, that he nailed the famous "95 Theses" to the church door to facilitate debate about the sale of Indulgences to pay for the forgiveness of sins. He argued that salvation is a free gift of God in Christ and received by faith and not purchased by money.

He had learned from the study of Holy Scripture that salvation, eternal life, the forgiveness of sins, and the gift of righteousness received by faith was God's plan to save human beings.

Luther writes in 1519 about his evangelical experience. "I had conceived a burning desire to understand what Paul meant in his Letter to the Romans, but thus far there had stood in my way, not the cold blood around my heart, but that one word which is in chapter one: "The justice of God is revealed in it." I hated that word, "justice of God," which, by the use and custom of all my teachers, ...that justice by which God is just and by which he punishes sinners and the unjust."

He continues, "I meditated night and day on those words until at last, by the mercy of God, I paid attention to their context: "The justice of God is revealed in it, as it is written: "The just person lives by faith.' I began to understand that in this verse the justice of God is that by which the just person lives by a gift of God, that is by faith." By meditating on Scripture, he came to be enlightened by the Holy Spirit to see that the righteousness of God is given as a gift to those who have faith in Jesus Christ. The believer in a life of walking with Jesus then strives to live out the righteousness that they are given by faith. It is by faith "alone," but faith is never alone. It is manifested in loving God and loving our neighbor.

Take a look at Philippians 3:8 and 9, "For his sake [Christ] I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith..." What a sweet gospel it is for believers. The heavens are open to us. We have access by faith to the Father. We have Christ, who promises to answer our prayers, not because we deserve it, but because of his grace and mercy.

How could a simple and unimportant monk have the strength and boldness to stand up to the Medieval powers of the church and the Holy Roman Empire?

In and through his relationship to Jesus Christ! We, too, have Christ to come along side and help us. He invited us to daily trust him. He gives the power to boldly confess him before others and face our life's hurt and pains, struggles and disappointments.

No one knows the future. But we are assured that we journey into the future with the love of Christ in our hearts and the power of the Holy Spirit. He leads and empowers us to take on whatever comes our way.

We now have a draft Strategic Plan produced by the hard work of our Strategic Planning workshop volunteers and led by our consultant, Dr. Ross Stueber. We thank God for their efforts. The congregation will review the Plan in October. We ask God to lead and guide us as we move to call a new senior pastor to lead us into God's future.

The committee then developed a "Critical Targets and Goals" document that will become part of the working document – the Strategic Plan - that will serve as a guide for COL as we move forward over the next few years. The Strategic Plan, as part of the final consultant's report, will be given to the congregation ahead of a specially scheduled voters' meeting to be held on Sunday, October 19 after the 9:00 AM service. The voters will be asked to approve that plan to collectively move us forward over the next few years. All of that hard work, to set the direction for COL over the next few years, will also guide the call committee through that call process.

Speaking of the call committee – the call committee will consist of the following members: Mark Budensiek (Chairman of the and Call Committee Chair), Kathy Beilstein, Jeff Holmes, Pastor Mark Logid (ex-officio), Tom Mertins, Bettie Ore, Kathy Shearer, and Ralph Wenstone. The committee will meet (may have already met by the time you read this) to begin its work. Names for nomination will be solicited from COL members within a specific time frame and using a specific nomination form (more information on that will be forthcoming). Names will be solicited from District as well. The process will proceed following Pacific Southwest District guidelines and procedures and the congregation will be kept informed of progress.

The pieces of the puzzle are coming together as quickly as leadership is able to do so – but it is still a slow and ongoing process. Your collective patience and prayers are required. Now if you will excuse me, I have to take 2 mosquito-sized Tylenol for my subtle headache!

Navigating the Holiday Season, When Grieving the Loss of a Loved One

This is the time of year when people start planning events for the holiday season. If you are grieving the death of a spouse, family member, or friend, this may be an incredibly challenging time. Thoughts of social gatherings, family traditions, and obligations may leave you feeling anxious and overwhelmed. You may wish you could skip this holiday season and go straight to the routine of the following year—but you can't. What *can* you do to lessen your stress and loneliness?

You can start by learning what emotions to expect as you face the holidays without your loved one. Know that you *can* get through these holidays, and even find moments of joy and healing. So, where can you find out what emotions to expect over the holidays, how to create a healthy plan, and how to communicate with family and friends these coming weeks?

Attend our "Surviving the Holidays" seminar on November 4, 2025, to hear practical and actionable strategies for navigating the holiday season.

We will host our GriefShare "Surviving the Holidays" event on **Tuesday, November 4, 2025, at Crown of Life Lutheran Church, from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.** At this two-hour seminar, you will view a video featuring helpful suggestions from grieving people who have faced the holidays after their loss. You will hear insights from respected Christian counselors, pastors, and psychologists. You will also receive a *Holiday Survival Guide* with practical strategies, encouraging words, helpful exercises, and journaling ideas for daily survival through the holiday season.

At our GriefShare Surviving the Holidays seminar, you will meet with other grieving people who understand what you're going through. They won't judge you. They will accept you where you are and offer comfort and support. There is no requirement to share. We learn a lot from listening to others.

Your holiday season won't be easy. Your emotions may ambush you and suck you under at times. But you can walk through this season in a way that honors God and your loved one and keeps you on the path of health and healing.

But you, God, see the trouble of the afflicted; you consider their grief and take it in hand. ... You are the helper of the fatherless (Psalm 10:14).

For the Lord has comforted his people and will have compassion on his afflicted (Isaiah 49:13).

Behold, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands; your walls are continually before me (Isaiah 49:16).

The first full weekend of the month is Mite Weekend. Please stop at the Information Desk and Pick up a small box where coins and dollars may be kept during the month and then brought to church and put in the Large Mite Box. Mite Boxes have changed in color and design over the years, but what has never changed is the dedication of freely given offerings for the purpose of reaching out to others with the **Good News of Jesus Christ.** Districts still retain 75% of mite offerings for the work of the LWML at that level. The 2025–2027 National Mission Grant Goal of \$2,622,270 was

adopted by delegates at the 2025 Convention. See https://www.lwml.org/mission-grants for the current grant recipients and payments. Each month we will highlight one of the current grants. Grant #2 - **Orphan** *Grain Train (OGT)* has been involved in humanitarian aid to Ukraine since the war began. In the past year, seventeen shipments of donated food, clothing, and medical supplies were sent to various locations in the Ukraine. OGT is assisting twelve orphanages in the Kherson area and three orphanages in the Kyiv area. OGT is working with the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine and other Christian churches as it distributes the aid. —This grant is for \$100,000. (You can read more about this grant on the lwml.org website).




