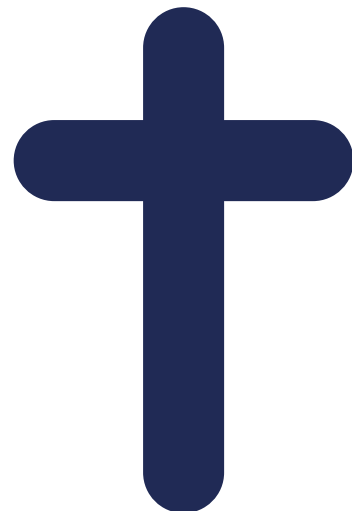

PRIEST'S REPORT REV'D ZOË BROWNE



*I lift up my eyes to the mountains—
where does my help come from?
My help comes from the Lord,
the Maker of heaven and earth.*

(Psalm 121:1–2)

What an incredible journey we, as a family and a church, have been on over the last twelve months. We are deeply thankful to God for his faithfulness, for the call to serve his kingdom in Gladstone, and for our church community alongside whom we serve.

The main goals for 2025 were to provide stability and direction as we seek to know Christ and make him known. This has taken shape across worship, teaching, pastoral care, mission and outreach, stewardship, and parish sustainability.

Rev'd David and I both serve as Priest-in-Charge, using our different gifts in complementary ways. What follows is a snapshot of the past year.

Services

Faithful Sunday worship remains the bread and butter of growing disciples and strengthening our community. Rev'd David has overseen worship at St Saviour's, while I have been based at St Peter's, with a shared focus on consistency in preaching, worship, and pastoral care across both centres.

Stepping into worship at St Peter's has been a great joy. We give thanks for our faithful LAs and LLMs, who have led worship and preached with conviction and humility. I am also grateful for the many volunteers—sacristans, readers, musicians, cake makers, data clickers and more—whose quiet service makes worship possible each week.

Kids' Church was re-established at St Peter's, and in God's goodness we now regularly welcome up to ten children on Sundays. My sincere thanks to our Kids' Church leaders, who serve generously in many other areas as well, for making this ministry possible.

This year we farewelled over ten faithful parishioners from St Peter's due to health or family circumstances. Their absence is keenly felt. At the same time, we have welcomed a steady stream of newcomers, many of whom have stayed and become valued members of our community. The gentle growth and renewed enthusiasm on Sundays are a source of great joy as we live out Jesus' call to make disciples and bear Gospel witness in daily life.

Combined services have continued to offer a valuable opportunity to worship as one parish. While changing locations and times can be challenging, gathering is always a joy. As one wise parishioner put it, "Let's pray that one day we're too big for combined services!"

Lent, Easter, and Christmas remain key opportunities to welcome visitors and enquirers and share the good news of Jesus. This year we held services across both St Saviour's and St Peter's for Ash Wednesday, Easter, and Christmas. We also saw the return of the St Peter's Family Carols and the introduction of the Calliope Carols. We continue to pray that God will use these moments for faithful witness in Gladstone and beyond.

Late in the year, online sermon recordings were revived. These Happy Rock Homilies, shared via YouTube and Facebook, have been warmly received and provide an accessible way for people to engage with God's word, particularly when they are unable to attend church in person.



PRIEST'S REPORT

Discipleship

Rev'd David and I have invested deeply in relationships across the parish through hospital and home visits, shared meals, coffees, and even kayaking and tubing on Awoonga Dam. These moments of care, conversation, and shared life are a reminder that we walk together as a Christian family throughout the week. Thank you to all who have shared their time, stories, and hospitality.

To support growth in discipleship, we have developed Bible study resources that align with our sermon series. While intended for use in groups, they have also served those unable to attend regularly and have been well received. This is part of a longer-term collaboration with other Anglican parishes in southeast Queensland. Bible study groups have grown from one to three, including new men's and women's groups, and it has been wonderful to see both faith and fellowship deepen.

Mission and Outreach

Our church continues to play a vital role in the wider community. Core ministries include the This N That Op Shop, Soup Kitchen, Playgroup, Coffee and Craft Group, Shed Sale, and Men's Breakfast. These ministries provide practical care, opportunities to build relationships, and faithful Christian witness. The This N That Shop and Shed Sale also contribute significantly to parish finances.

My particular focus has been supporting mission activities at St Peter's and the This N That Shop. As several long-standing volunteers stepped down or retired, Rev'd David and I spent considerable time filling roster gaps. This not only provided consistency in opening hours but also allowed us to better understand the operation of the Shop and build stronger relationships with volunteers.

This year also marked the re-establishment of services at New Auckland Place, which had been in abeyance since the COVID lockdowns of 2020. Many thanks to Rev'd Dianne, Jackie, and Liz for their faithful ministry in this space.



PRIEST'S REPORT

Diocese

We belong not only to our local church but to the wider body of Christ within the Anglican Church of Central Queensland. The past year has seen an encouraging influx of new clergy across the Diocese, strengthening congregations and the clergy team alike.

Lay Development Days, facilitated by Bishop Peter and hosted by various parishes, have continued to support LAs and LLMs in their faith and service. In May, we attended the Clergy Conference in Blackall, and in October the annual Synod gathered parishes and Special Ministry Districts for prayer, reflection, and governance. While the Diocese continues to face areas of risk, there is a growing sense of hope and optimism as we serve together. Clergy Retreat in Yeppoon, led by Rev'd John Forsyth on Psalm 121, followed Synod and was a gift of rest and renewal.

BCA

Our ministry is currently supported by Bush Church Aid (BCA), whose generosity extends far beyond finances. I have been deeply encouraged by the prayers, correspondence, visits, and shared kingdom vision of BCA and our partner churches.

We maintain regular contact with our BCA supporters through quarterly Prayer Notes and our Happy Rock Homilies newsletter, and we have enjoyed visiting several partner churches throughout the year. Meeting prayer partners at Synod and CMS Summer School is always a joy. We prayerfully look forward to the day when we can become not only self-sufficient as a parish, but also financial supporters of BCA.

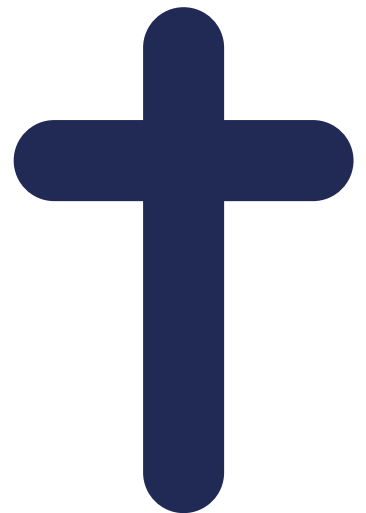
Thank You

PRIEST'S REPORT

REV'D DAVID BROWNE



*Now faith is confidence in what we hope for
and assurance about what we do not see.*

(Hebrews 11:1)

Our first year in Gladstone has been a whirlwind, but thankfully through God's goodness and our wonderful church family, we've seen our church grow in faith and number. The Brownes arrived in Gladstone on 14th January and we started serving on 20th January. At our commissioning service at St Saviour's on Tuesday 28th January, BCA National Director, Rev. Greg Harris, encouraged us all to put Jesus first with a simple phrase "Not me, Him".

Rev'd Zoë and I were eager to get stuck into serving by getting to know our community and experiencing Soup Kitchen, This N That Shop, and other activities of our church. Connie Fredericks was wonderful in sharing her knowledge and helped us understand the history and activities of the parish. Likewise, it was great to have Rev'd Dianne Milligan leading services, Soup Kitchen devotions, and lots of pastoral care sessions, as we learned the ropes from her. Rob Farnsworth our warden was another important guide for us as we set a budget for the coming year.

We began our Sunday preaching, with a series in the Gospel of Luke: 'Generous Hearts, giving as God gives.' Then during Lent we went from 'Eden to Eternity' looking at how God's presence is restored through Jesus in the grand ark of the Bible. From Easter to Pentecost, we participated in the 'Hope 25' series with Anglicans across Australia revelling in the hope found in Jesus, and we followed this up by exploring the book of Daniel in 'Beyond the Beast'. In the latter half of the year, we studied Bishop Peter Grice's series on prayer, spent some more time in Luke, then Hebrews looking at the supremacy of Christ in all things, and our Advent series 'Waiting for the King' explored the lead up to Jesus' birth.

During the year our Wednesday Bible studies began using the sermon series resources and welcomed new members. Another Bible study began at East Shores on Friday during Lent and has grown steadily. Later in the year Rev'd Zoë began a Thursday morning Bible Study which brings the number of Bible study groups to three.

We also began meeting for prayer on Monday mornings at 9:00AM with staff and the Ray's Soup Kitchen team. Wednesday morning services at St Saviour's recommenced in January with a rhythm of Morning Prayer services and Holy Communion on the first Wednesday of the month.

After Easter we launched new branding and a new website for the church: gladstoneanglican.org.au. Through the generosity of our church family, we renewed our church signs at St Peter's and St Saviour's. Our Facebook page has also been very active with lots of community members engaging with our posts and a new This N That Shop Facebook page has brought fresh awareness of our shop. Toward the end of the year, we launched 'Happy Rock Homilies', a weekly video sermon to help engage those who cannot physically make it to church and members of the community exploring Christianity.

One of my great joys as a minister is sharing the gospel with young people, and in 2025 I got to do this through Kids' Church and RI. Kids' Church resumed in February with faithful servants leading exciting Bible studies, complemented by games and craft activities. I had the privilege of leading Kids' talks at St Peter's, sitting in on lessons, and leading Kids' Church a few times. In March I joined the RI team at Gladstone Central State School teaching Years 2 and 3 and then added two Year 5 classes at Clinton State School. On Tuesday 4th March we held a 'Pancake Day' outreach outside St Saviour's, sharing pancakes with families on their way to school.

Pastoral Care is the heartbeat of any church, and I got to serve through pastoral visiting and resuming monthly services at New Auckland Place Aged Care Residence. Home visits, coffee catch ups, hospital visits, and prayer visits were all opportunities to share God's love with the community. During the year I took five baptisms, five weddings, and seven funerals, including the service for long time parishioner Noel Bowley; may he rest in peace and rise in glory. Aged Care services grew to over 10 people attending, with Jackie Thompson, Liz Unwin, and Rev'd Dianne forming a valuable ministry team.

Seasonal services were a wonderful opportunity to share the good news of Jesus' sacrificial death and glorious resurrection. Ash Wednesday services at St Saviour's and St Peter's were a reminder of our call to repent. Maundy Thursday at St Saviour's included foot washing, and our Good Friday and Resurrection Sunday services at both centres were a wonderful opportunity to celebrate Jesus and share the gospel with the many visitors who joined us. Christmas was also a wonderful opportunity for outreach with a Calliope Carols on the lawn, a St Peter's Carols, a midnight service on Christmas Eve, and a joyful service on Christmas day at both centres, before a Soup Kitchen Christmas lunch..

The invitational culture of our church family has led to many encouraging shoots of growth. Services at St Peter's and St Saviour's grew through the year and on average we are welcoming 11 more people to church than 2024. At the same time, we farewelled and prayed for several people who left Gladstone through the year. We've also seen new volunteers start at Soup Kitchen and the This N That Shop, and Brad Krebs, our Safe Ministry Officer, has done a wonderful job of welcoming new people and getting them ready to serve.

Sadly, at the end of the year Connie Fredericks resigned from her role as Parish Administration Officer. Connie has filled several different roles over the years, and we pray that God continues to use her powerfully to build his Kingdom on earth as in heaven. We gave thanks for Connie's faithful service at a combined service on 28th December and prayed into her future ministries among us.

Gladstone Anglican Church is part of the wider Central Queensland Diocese, and our people do an amazing job of supporting the wider church body. In May, Zoë and I attended the CQ Clergy Conference in Blackall. In October Jenny Hinde, Rob and Rosemary Farnsworth, David Kingston, and the Brownes participated in the CQ Synod in Rockhampton where David Kingston led the music. Our Lay Ministers and Liturgical Assistants also supported lay development days across the diocese during the year, bringing us all closer together.

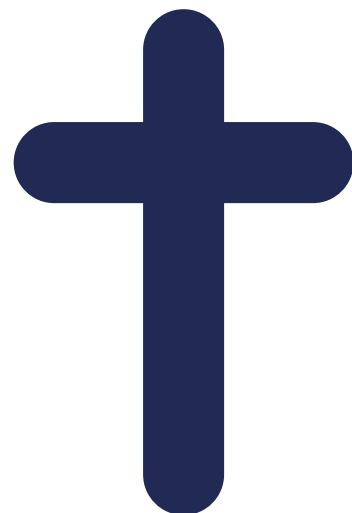

WARDEN'S REPORT

MR. ROB FARNSWORTH

In 2025 we welcomed Rev'd David and Rev'd Zoë Browne and their children, Micah and Jude, who relocated to Gladstone from their previous ministries in Dalby. David and Zoë have launched into Gladstone Parish life with prayerful energy and enthusiasm, maintaining existing programmes and commencing new ones.

We give thanks for the Browne family and recognise the sacrifices they made in moving to Gladstone and leaving behind friends and family. We also give thanks to Bush Church Aid (BCA), and all who support it, for the generous funding package that has enabled us to employ the Brownes.

David and Zoë are each engaged for a 75% of a full-time role each. The BCA funding is equivalent to one full-time priest, and the balance (50% full time role) is funded by the Parish. As the BCA funding is for a limited duration, we need to plan for a future in which our priests are fully funded by the Parish. Planned giving has increased in 2025, and we give thanks for everyone who contributes to the Parish income, in whatever way.

With the arrival of the Brownes, our Parish Operations Manager from 2023 and 2024, Connie Fredericks, transitioned into a role as an Administration Officer, which she continued until the end of December 2025, when she decided it was time for a change. Parish Council thanked Connie for all of her services to the Parish, in both roles, and for helping make the Brownes' transition to Gladstone as easy as possible.

Only one Warden candidate was identified in 2025, and I was honoured to be asked to continue in the role. It has been a pleasure working with Rev'd David, Rev'd Zoë and Parish Council. I also thank Rev'd Dianne Milligan who, whilst enjoying a well-earned break from ministry to the Parish, has continued to be my mentor and prayer warrior.

Thanks go to all our volunteers, who have worked tirelessly to serve the parish, maintain our services, and keep our outlets running smoothly.

WARDENS' REPORT

The role of our LAs in worship continues to be spirit filled. Their leadership is appreciated as we come together to bring praise and glory to our God. To Julie and David at St Saviour's and to David, Yvonne, and Ken at St Peter's we express our appreciation. St Peter's was sad to farewell its LAs Wendy and June in 2025, when they relocated from Gladstone. We keep them and their families in our prayers as they settle into new Parishes.

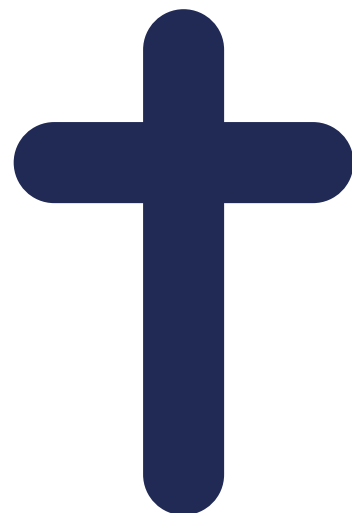

PARISH PROPERTIES

St Saviour's Church Building

This building remains in a reasonable condition with only minor maintenance occurring this year. New signage was installed at St Saviour's this year. The signage features a QR code, which provides a link to the Parish's new website.

St Saviour's Hall

The Commercial Office Space on the lower level of the hall building, accessed via Rosebery Street, is currently leased to ATSILS. The lease was renewed from 1 July 2025 for a period of 5 years. Unfortunately, these premises suffered two flooding events in 2025, one requiring a carpet to be replaced. A review of the causes of these events is continuing.

There is the need for significant maintenance works to be undertaken to the Parish Hall front veranda. Parish Council has investigated this and has an outline plan for the scope of repair works. The Hall roof has also been identified as needing repair / recoating. This will be investigated further this year.

Parish Council has preliminary plans for upgrades to the St Saviour's Hall kitchen. Parish Council is still seeking to refine these plans to suit our needs and is investigating the cost of completing this work. Please continue to pray for funding opportunities for these important works.

The Rectory / St Saviour's House

The Rectory is currently empty, pending refurbishment in 2026. Preliminary quotes for the works have been received, and Parish Council is seeking to refine the scope and pricing before entering a contract. It is expected the following works will be undertaken: works to address water ingress issues at the rear of the building, refit of bathrooms, refit of kitchen, new carpets and painting throughout, upgrade to power, lighting and air conditioning, limited restumping, and structural works to rectify substandard historical modifications to the floor framing.

PROPERTY REPORT

St Peter's Church

St Peter's Church is in good condition, and the carpets are cleaned every year. Parish Council will investigate cleaning St Peter's roof in 2026. New signage was installed at St Peter's in 2025.

St Peter's House, Clinton

St Peter's House is currently the residence of the Brownes. The building is in reasonable condition, having been refurbished in December 2024.

Some roof / ceiling maintenance has been identified and will be investigated further in 2026. Also, the grassy area between the house and the shed floods and drains slowly. A partial regrading of this area may be required and will be investigated.

Union Church, Calliope

This property, which is held jointly by the Anglican Church and the Presbyterian Church as trustees, is no longer used by the Anglican Church for regular church services. However, the future development of worship in the Calliope area is still a priority for the Parish. Regular meetings are held with the Presbyterian Church regarding this property.

Lifestyle Church Calliope uses the premises on two days a week and contributes to the maintenance and upkeep of the facility. This has included installation of a small kitchenette and a TV screen.

The Parish is now using the buildings on Sunday evenings as we start to run an Alpha Course in Calliope.

Gladstone Regional Council (GRC) has expressed interest in constructing a public footpath on an existing easement, which runs along the northern side of the property. This is of value to the community as it would provide improved pedestrian access to Calliope State School. Discussions with GRC are in progress. Parish Council is seeking to fully understand the nature of the path and risk and financial obligations that make come with this.

St Luke's Church, Ubobo

There have been no services at Ubobo during the past year. Parish Council had previously requested the Diocese to investigate the sale of this property. Some preliminary interest had been shown but no formal offers were made. This property is not being actively marketed. The possibility of re-starting occasional services in Ubobo will be considered in 2026.

25 Tank Street

This property houses the This N That Shop, Vision Surveys, One Percent Real Estate, and the Way Out, an escape room, on the first floor. During 2025 the building became fully tenanted. Early in 2025 the parish received an expression of interest in the purchase of this property. Negotiations were entered into and a price that considerably exceeded a recent valuation was agreed upon. Settlement occurred in November 2025.

Whilst the sale of this property had not been pursued by Parish Council, it had the following advantages:

- It avoided the Parish needing to borrow significant additional funds to address imminent maintenance projects, including air conditioning replacement and roof replacement
- It makes funds available to address other critical projects, including St Saviour's House refurbishment and St Saviour's Hall Roof and Awning repairs

The This N That Shop now has a 3-year lease with the current building owner, with options for further 3-year terms.

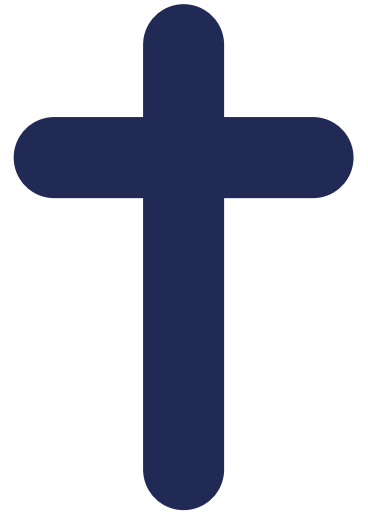
Parish Vehicles

Parish Council elected to dispose of the Parish ute in 2025. With the closing of the Food Centre, this vehicle was no longer needed. Thanks go Bob Trask who prepared this vehicle for sale, which included replacement of the front bumper plastics, servicing and detailing.

The Parish RAV4 struck a kangaroo on the Bruce Highway in September and was declared by the assessor to be an insurance write off. The Parish now has a new hybrid RAV4, which was delivered in December 2025. We give thanks to the Diocese and the Parish of Longreach, who provided a loan car, whilst we waited for our new vehicle to be delivered.

We are grateful for the support of the members of the parish during this past year and look forward to God's continued blessing in 2026 as we continue to worship our God and proclaim salvation through the finished work of Jesus Christ and the ongoing blessings of the Holy Spirit.

Ray's Soup Kitchen

'Then the King will say to those on his right, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in"'

(Matthew 25:34-35)

During 2025 Ray's Soup Kitchen was well attended. It runs from 6:00-7:00PM every Monday night. The attendees of the kitchen are those finding themselves struggling in our community and in need of food, housing, fellowship counsel and faith. On average we have 55 attendees: 40 on a quiet night, and our busiest night was over 80. Of the people who attend, approximately 90% are there to be served and 10% are serving; either in the kitchen or having fellowship at the tables.

We are very fortunate to be sponsored by several people in our community who are passionate about giving and supporting the soup kitchen. The main meal is supplied from the generosity of Wendy Marks, the desserts by Caroline Ferris from Boyne Island Bakery, along with any pantry items we may need. These donations are supplemented by the generosity of Woolworths Kirkwood with a weekly box of mixed vegetables for our soup staples.

Domino's Pizza provides us with 25 pizzas every month and when available we have three or four of their team serving with us. This is organised by a gentleman named Ci Ci.

We are also grateful for the donation of \$2000 in toys and school supplies annually by a generous family who wish to remain anonymous. Locations Real Estate made donations of \$1500 and Calliope Bowls Club gave \$500 for our work. Boluda Towage Gladstone donated dry goods and groceries which were passed onto diners. McCosker Contracting also provided \$1000 in vouchers for our Christmas Day lunch. There are generous members of the community who regularly give cash donations in person on Monday nights. Bunnings supplied BBQs twice during the year.

On 29th July, Glenn and Theresa Butcher and their team joined us to serve dinner and make a donation. Commbank also come once a month to serve. Our outreach program is also supported by volunteers who help cook and serve meals and by faithful members of our parish who are present and provide a presence and listening ear to those who may need it. Servants among us include people from outside of our congregation and in the community not yet of faith.

Songs of faith are sung during the night. We open the night by saying grace and a short scripture and devotional message is shared and with prayer. During the year we were able to give away 50 Bibles. Some diners from Soup Kitchen began joining us for Sunday worship, and others for Wednesday services and Bible studies.

A big highlight this year was the reintroduction of Christmas lunch which was generously supported by business members in our community. The day was enjoyed by 70 people, including 15 volunteers who really experienced Jesus' words in Acts that 'it is better to give than to receive'.

We ask you as our congregation to keep this ministry in your prayers and thank you for how you as our church enables and supports us in this ministry that serves those whom God draws to us in their hour of need and lifts up Christ for the glory of God.

This N That Shop

The This N That Shop has now been a part of the Gladstone community for 48 years since its opening in 1977. 2025 has been a year of both encouragement and challenges for the Shop.

Our volunteers work tirelessly to serve our community, Monday to Friday. The main goals for the Shop this year have been to improve the consistency of opening hours, increase volunteer base, and improve community exposure and revenue. While volunteer levels are not as abundant as in decades past, we have seen a steady improvement throughout the year. We are so thankful for our volunteers – their energy, friendliness and tireless efforts are the core of what makes the Shop a great place to be. Rev'd David and Rev'd Zoë have focused a lot of time on supporting the roster 'gaps' to help with opening hours. This has helped develop community relationships, and care for our volunteers. By the end of 2025, we were able to open for 48 weeks (with four weeks scheduled closure) and have three people volunteering at any given time, averaging approx. 6 hours trade per day.

We re-established monthly staff meetings at the Shop. With the support of our Safe Ministry Officer, Brad Krebs, we were able to focus on day to day issues, sales, stock, safety or any other concerns. Our volunteers were able to share their wisdom and opinions to help improve the overall Shop function. In April, we also re-established a 'Gladstone Anglican This N That Shop' Facebook page. This increased presence had an immediately positive impact on community engagement and sales. We use it regularly to highlight items for sale, share community reminders, and promote different monthly sales.

Challenges continue to be recruiting and training volunteers. Dumping of donations and security issues were ongoing throughout the year. The Shop has benefitted from some much needed safety and signage upgrades.

The This N That Shop is a vital part of our community and our church. We are fortunate to maintain a central presence in town, and we are committed to being the most affordable of the community op shops.

With thanks to God from whom all blessings flow, this year has seen a positive trend in sales. Sales are up over 21% from 2024. The This N That Shop is a valuable resource for our community, and a vital source of income for our church. The value of this lies in serving God's kingdom, helping people in Gladstone to know Christ and make Him known. We pray that the This N That Shop will continue to be a positive place of mission outreach to our community for decades to come.

MISSIONS REPORT

Monday Playgroup

Thursday Playgroup

The Thursday Playgroup has operated out of St Peter's for the last few years but has been in a 'grey area' in terms of church ministry. During 2025, Rev'd Zoë focused on outreach and pastoral care for the Thursday Playgroup, meeting and connecting with parents and their children.

My role was like 'the aunty' – chatting to parents, holding babies while toddlers demanded attention, and helping tidy up. Through this, positive relationships developed, and even the chance to share Easter stories and invitations to church activities.

Clarity was also sought in terms of the relationship between the Playgroup and the church. It was deemed beneficial to fall under the banner of a church ministry activity, while maintaining autonomy in planning and preparation. The Playgroup leaders were happy to give termly updates to Parish Council, make a peppercorn contribution to running costs, and meet all Safe Ministry requirements.

Sadly, Term 4 saw the end of the Thursday Playgroup due to a lack of willing group participants to be facilitators. Opportunities for pastoral care and community outreach had been plentiful. At its closing, the Playgroup made donations of various toys and craft supplies back to the church, as well as a vacuum cleaner and speaker. There was also a cash donation as a token of thanks.

While this opportunity for pastoral care and community outreach has closed, it has sown seeds of relationship and the good news of the Gospel with many who may not have otherwise heard it. We continue to pray for the children and families who took part in the year ahead.

St Peter's Coffee and Craft Group

Each week we have 20 or more members getting together and enjoying each other's company as they work on their projects. Our morning tea roster continues to work well and many of our members have great baking skills! Generosity, friendship and care are what our group is all about.

Many members work on items for our Christmas in July Sale and Christmas Child Boxes. This year we were able to donate \$500 to The Royal Flying Doctor Service as well as \$1000 toward the postage on Christmas Child Boxes. Several members participated and all the gifts were greatly appreciated.

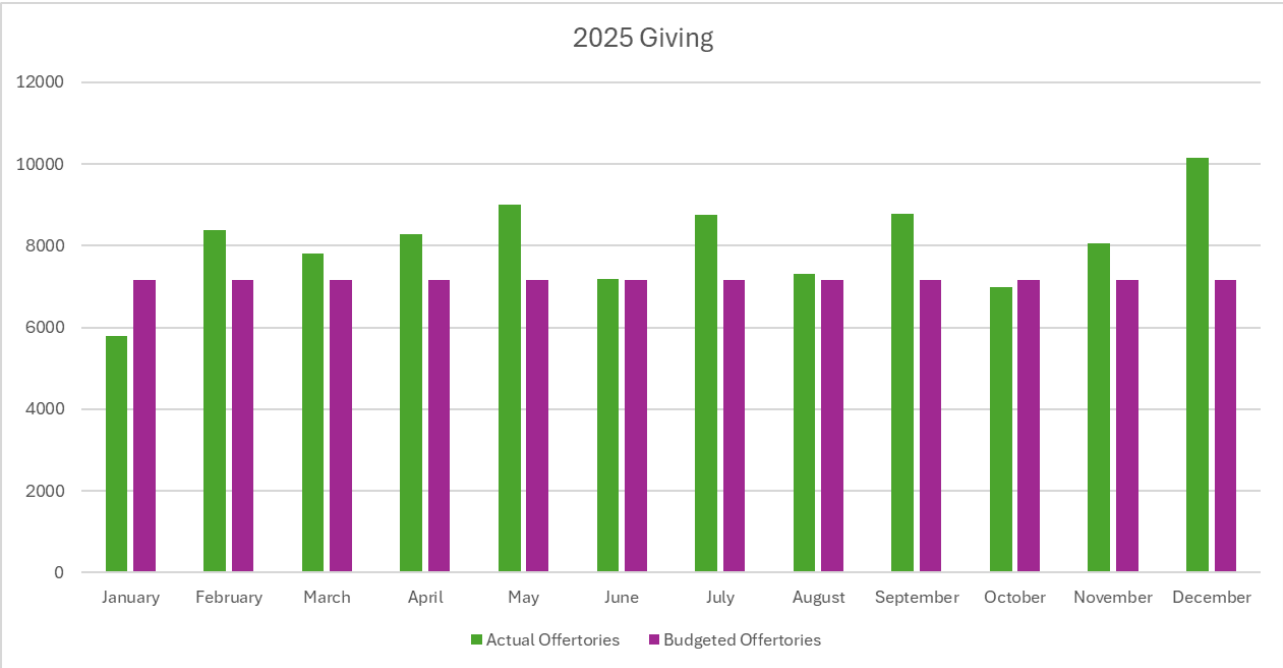
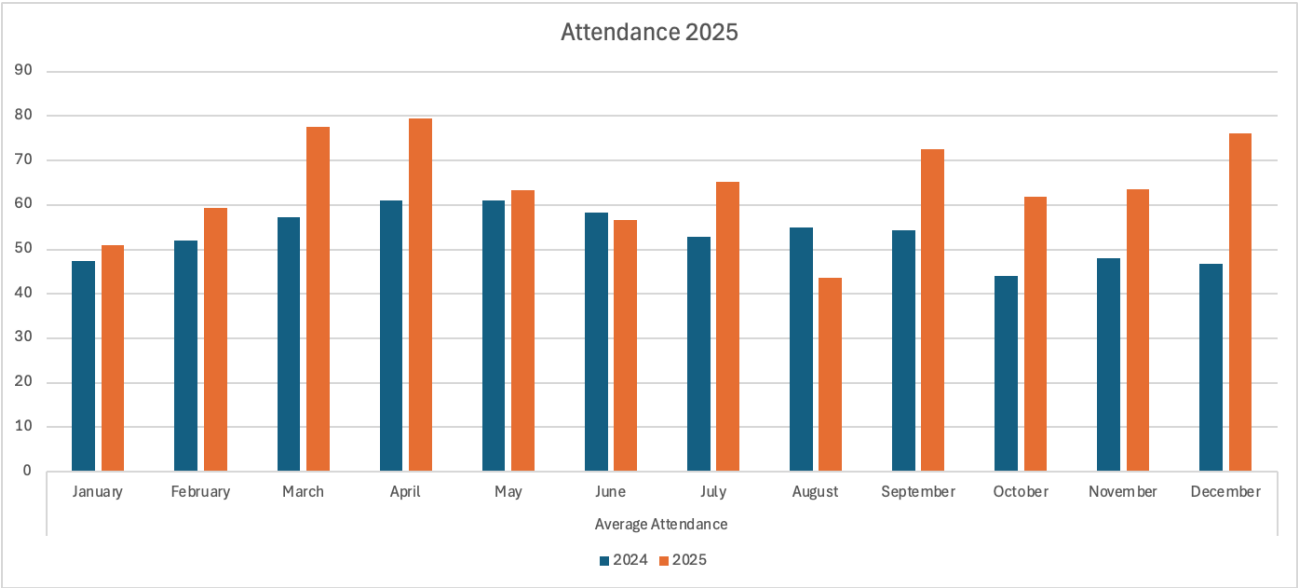
