Administrative Council Update

The Administrative Council met Monday, March 24 at 6:30 pm. Several business items were addressed. We have 10 confirmands in our 2025 confirmation class. Pastor Allynn is looking for prayer partners and mentors for these students. If you wish to be a partner/mentor, please contact Pastor Allynn. Significant maintenance work is going on or has been completed around the building (fixed the boiler, will replace the roof, repair of the step on the west end of the church) and we are in relatively good shape financially. The Administrative Council approved the request of SPRC to increase Angela Rawson's hours from 20-30 hours a week to accommodate her new responsibilities on the communications committee. The council approved Mark Tiemann as Chair of the Administrative Council effective June 1 and Thel Lemons as Recording Secretary effective March 24. For additional details, see the meeting minutes.

Dollars and Sense News (part 2)

This is part 2 of our series detailing how the financial management system works at Union UMC. In part 1 we discussed how the annual budget is built for Union. This month we will tackle how actual spending is executed.

How is the budget administered as the year progresses? Just as in any business or family budget an ongoing process is used to pay bills and update the budget accounts as the year progresses. Each function spending money submits their requests/bills to the Comptroller for disbursement. She checks the balances in the individual accounts, pays the bills, and documents each expenditure. She then provides a monthly report to the Finance Committee for all Union and Journey accounts. The Finance Committee reviews all revenue and expenditures to determine if the budget remains balanced and bills are paid. The Finance Committee then reports the financial status with recommendations for any changes to the Administrative Council for final approval.

What happens if expenditures are greater than the revenue? Just as in any business or home financial review, the Comptroller highlights any issues to the Treasurer as they occur. The Treasurer decides if the expenditure can be covered given the annual budget line for an item. Since we carry some cash reserves an over-expenditure in a given month may not be a problem. Just as a family might spend all of their vacation money in one month, a function might spend a large portion of their budget in a month as long as they do not exceed the annual amount. The Treasurer then advises the Finance Committee of these discrepancies at the monthly meeting and they review and report to the Administrative Council discrepancies with a recommended solution for their action. The council then makes a final decision on spending adjustments.

What happens if there is a serious revenue decline? As has been the case in some previous years when revenue dropped significantly, the Finance Committee may make a recommendation to the Administrative Council to freeze some or all spending in discretionary accounts. Nondiscretionary bills such as the mortgage, utilities and insurance must be paid. Other areas' spending authority might have to be reduced. If the mismatch between revenue and expenditures appears to be a trend, then more drastic action must be taken.

How does the financial picture look for 2025? The short answer is good, but too early to tell. As you know Union has significantly reduced our budget since 2016 and a large piece of that reduction has been in paid staff expenditures. Many members have stepped up to volunteer their time to help in this effort. Therefore, we have a very good chance to have a solid financial year if the revenue comes in as projected from the pledge drive.

How is money held as it is comes to Union? Good question. In the next addition we will provide a full look at where all of the Union and Journey funds are held as they come in.


