Getting to Know You

- 1. Without saying them out loud, how many Christmas movies could you name?
 - a. Once each person has given their number, start naming them.
- 2. Again, without saying them out loud, how many Books of the Bible can you name?
 - a. Once each person has given their number, without looking at your bible (or anywhere else for that matter!), start naming them in order, from Genesis to Revelation. (There are 66.)

- 5. There are all sorts of Study Bibles available. If you own one, what kind is it? Was there a reason you chose that particular one?
 - a. Why was a good Study Bible so highly recommended in the Sunday message?
- 6. Cross-referencing is reading a verse and using the attached notation to reference another verse in the Bible with a similar word or topic. How can this be a helpful tool when studying the Bible?
- 7. Toward the back of a Study Bible there is an index of subjects, dictionary and/or concordance. What are these and how are they helpful?
- 8. What is the value of looking at a map—either on a page in a book of the Bible you're reading, or stopping to look at a map in the back of the Bible?

Making It Personal

- If you don't own a Study Bible, would you consider buying one? There are many options but a great, basic one would be *The Life Application Study Bible* published by Zondervan. Translations can vary. We recommend the New Living Translation (NLT) or the New International Version (NIV). It's available in hardcover, softcover, leather, etc.
- Following up from last week, were you able to go deeper and study the Bible last week?
 If so, was there anything new you learned?
- Have someone pray for your group, for God's Spirit to stir a hunger in each of you for studying the Bible and applying it to your lives.
