SEPTEMBER 1-DECEMBER 7, 2025

Paul opens his heart like never before in this rich and deeply personal letter. Written to a church struggling with division, doubt, and competing voices, Paul makes himself vulnerable, revealing his deep love for the church, and his unwavering confidence in God's power made perfect in weakness. While the Corinthian church largely dismisses Paul's authority, he defends his ministry with humility and a bold trust in God's Spirit. And while our world often defines 'success' through strength and achievement, wealth and influence, Paul emphasizes the humility of King Jesus, and particularly His Cross.

The paradox of the Gospel is that true strength comes through surrender; it comes through self-emptying love, not self-promoting arrogance. Do you not feel the world's tempting lure to achieve, and then to boast about who you are and what you can do? I think we all, at some level, wrestle with inadequacy, disappointment, and the pressure to prove ourselves. Sometimes it seems to work. But eventually, inevitably, we come up short. And then what? We wonder: can God really use my brokenness for His glory? Paul's answer is an emphatic 'Yes!' If we are willing to be broken vessels displaying God's glory from within, and not 'all-put-together' facades of our own glory. Welcome to Jars of Clay. Welcome to 2 Corinthians.

HOW TO USE YOUR JOURNAL

- 1. Weekly Format: Mondays in this journal are intended to be "Overview" days and Fridays are "Wrap-Up" days. If you only have time to do the journal once a week, do the Monday overview. If you can only do two days, do the questions for Monday and Friday. This will give you the most helpful big picture for the week.
- **2. Questions:** Each day, read the assigned passage slowly, then reflect thoughtfully on the questions. In addition to the questions that help you think about the passage itself, we have included additional ways to pause and study the day's passage:
 - Reflect questions ask you to think about how the passage applies to your life - past, present, and future.
 - **Dig Deeper** questions have you look at a related passage somewhere else in Scripture.
 - Practice questions ask you to apply the passage by doing some action.
 - **Listen** to the "Song of the Week" in the Tuesday *Life at Hope* email that relates to the Scripture theme for the week. We recommend listening to that song on Wednesday as part of your time with God.
- **3. Group Discussion Questions**: If you're not already in a Community Group that discusses the weekly themes and sermons, we encourage you to join one or form your own. (Reach out to Pastor Bill at bcraig@hopemason.org for ideas.)

REFIECT

2 CORINTHIANS 1

OVERVIEW

Read the entire passage slowly. Write down any key thoughts and highlights.

What are the main questions you have from the passage? Put a star by the most important ones.

What thoughts, feelings, or desires are stirred in you by this passage? Write a brief prayer about that.

Over the course of the week, read or listen to the entire book of 2 Corinthians. (It will take about 40 minutes.)

2 CORINTHIANS 1:1-11

What are the elements of the Christian life Paul mentions in verses 3-7? How have you been experiencing some of these things recently?

What does Paul say about God in these verses? How have you experienced this in your own life?

REFLECT

What is one way God has brought comfort to you recently? Write it below, then ask God if there's someone He'd like you to share that comfort with, and if so, share it.

2 CORINTHIANS 1:1-11

What does Paul say about his affliction in verses 7-11? What is meaningful to you about that? What questions do you have?

What does Paul say about prayer in verse 11? If these things are true, why do you ask for prayer so infrequently? Ask God to speak to you about this and write any thoughts that come.

REFLECT

Imagine that someone said to you, "God never gives us more than we can handle." Write a brief response to them, based in part on these verses.

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's $\it Life$ $\it at Hope email.$

2 CORINTHIANS 1:12-24

What did Paul say about his behavior and heart toward them? What strikes you about that?

What does Paul say is his desire for them in these verses? Do you share those desires for your Hope family? Write any thoughts that come.

RELFECT

Verse 20 feels monumental. Put what Paul is saying here in your own words. Write a brief prayer of response.

WRAP-UP

What do we learn about God in this chapter? Which of these is most meaningful to you? Write a brief prayer about that.

What is one thing you most sense God wanting to say to you through this passage today? Ask Him and write any thoughts that come.

FIFCT

What does Paul say about his pain and the Corinthians' pain in these verses? Who seems to be causing the pain? Who is on the receiving end?

What does Paul say about his motive in causing them pain? How have you been on the receiving end of something like this? How have you been on the giving end? Ask God and write any thoughts that come.

Read verse 4 again. Picture this. What does it teach us about Paul? Is there anything here you want to be more true of your own heart and life? Write a brief prayer about that.

2 CORINTHIANS 2:1-11

List all the ways Paul says the Corinthians responded and should respond to this "offender" who caused pain. What do we learn here about how we should relate to one another in the Church today?

What does Paul say about Satan in these verses? How might that apply to what he's been talking about in this passage?

REFLECT

Is there someone in your life you need to forgive? Ask God to show you, and write a brief prayer of response. What is a next step here?

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's *Life* at Hope email.

2 CORINTHIANS 2:12-17

Paul says we are the aroma of Christ to three "parties": God, those who are being saved, and those who are perishing. What does he say about each? How do you feel about that?

What does Paul say about his ministry and his opponents' ministry in verse 17? What thoughts or desires are stirred in you by this? Write a brief prayer of response.

REFLECT

How would you characterize the "aroma" of your life to God? To other Christians? To those outside the faith? Ask God to speak to you about this and write any thoughts that come.

WRAP-UP

What do we learn about God in this chapter? Which of these is most meaningful to you? Write a brief prayer about that.

What is one thing you most sense God wanting to say to you through this passage today? Ask Him and write any thoughts that come.

2 CORINTHIANS 3:1-11

What does Paul say in verses 1-11 about the Old and New Covenants? List below:

How do verses 7-11 build on what Paul has been saying in verses 1-6?

DIG DEEPER

Paul references how the Old Covenant came with glory. Read Exodus 34:29-35. Summarize what happened. What strikes you?

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's $\it Life at Hope email.$

2 CORINTHIANS 3:12-18

What does Paul say about the veil in these verses? Why is the veil there? What is its impact? How is it removed, and what is the effect of its removal?

Read verse 18 slowly and visualize it as you read. What thoughts and feelings come to mind? How might you grow in "beholding the glory of the Lord" more?

REFLECT

How have you seen the transforming work of God in yourself over the years, changing you to reflect His likeness more and more? In which areas of your life and heart do you long to see more transformation? Write a brief prayer about that.

Paul references Genesis 1 in these verses. Read Genesis 1:1-5. If you have received Jesus as Lord, God has done that in your heart! Thank Him! Picture God doing this in the heart of someone who is "outside the faith but inside your reach." Write a brief prayer about that.

2 CORINTHIANS 4:1-15

In verse 7, what is Paul referring to when he says "treasure" and "jars of clay?" Picture that being the case with you. What is meaningful to you about that, and what questions do you have?

In which ways, if any, can you relate to Paul's descriptions of himself in verses 8-12? In which ways do you not relate? How do you feel about that?

DIG DEEPER

Read just one experience Paul had with these things in Acts 14:19-22. Many brothers and sisters in Christ around the world are facing things like this today. Write a brief prayer for them.

LISTEN

What do you think Paul means in verses 10-12? What is meaningful to you about that, and what questions do you have?

PRACTICE

Write out these three verses in your own words. How does this encourage you? Ask God whom He might have you share that with today, then follow through.

2 CORINTHIANS 5:1-5

Paul seems to be talking about three states of being in these verses: the "tent" of our earthly bodies, being "unclothed" or without a body in heaven, then being "clothed" in our eternal body after Jesus' return. What does he say about each?

What are your biggest questions about what life will be like in heaven? In New Creation after Jesus returns? Put stars by the most important ones.

REFLECT

List the messages in these verses that could help those who are grieving the death of a loved one who loved Jesus. Ask God if He would have you share with them, then do what's on your heart.

ISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's $\it Life$ $\it at Hope\ email.$

2 CORINTHIANS 5:1-10

How might the truths in this passage give Paul courage (verse 6)? In what ways do you need courage right now, and how might these truths help you?

How could Paul say what he says in verse 8? Do you feel the same? Write an honest prayer about that.

Think through your day yesterday. How did the hope of heaven and living eternally in God's New Creation impact your day? How would you like it to impact today or tomorrow? Write a brief prayer of response.

What accusations were people making about Paul that he addresses in these verses? How does he respond to each?

The word "flesh" in Scripture can mean simply the physical body, or it can refer to the sinful nature that is opposed to God. How is Paul using the word in these verses, and what is he saying about it?

Paul talks about waging spiritual warfare. How often do you view yourself as fighting in a spiritual war? Is there a step Jesus is calling you to take here? Ask Him and write any thoughts that come.

2 CORINTHIANS 10:7-12
