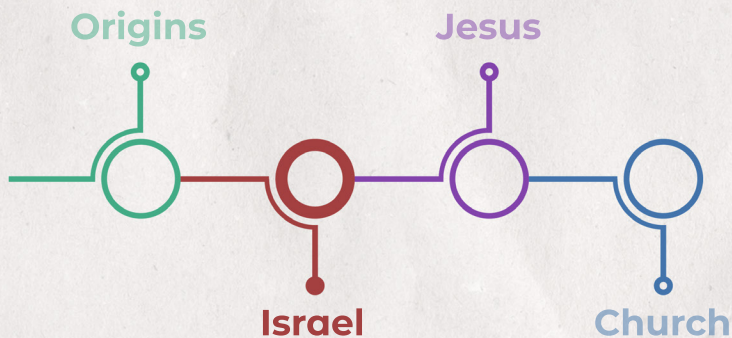

HOW TO USE YOUR JOURNAL

- **Accessing Digital Journal & Resources:** The Unfolding Israel journal questions, group discussion questions, and video links are available via Church Center.
 1. Search ‘Church Center App’ in the App Store (Apple devices) or Google Play Store (Android devices) to download on your phone.
 2. Open the app and select your church by searching ‘Hope Church.’ Look for our logo!
 3. When prompted, enter your mobile phone number or email address. Check your texts or emails for a six-digit code. If you already have a Church Center account, you’ll be prompted to input the code and log in. If you don’t have a Church Center account, follow the prompts to create an account.
 4. Click the Unfolding button right under our logo, then click the button for the current week. You’ll see the journal questions and video links. The button taking you to the group discussion questions is at the bottom of the page.

- **Weekly Format:** Mondays are generally “Overview” days and Fridays are “Wrap-Up” days. Only have time for the journal once a week? Do Monday’s questions. Time for two days? Do Monday’s and Friday’s questions to get the big picture for the week.



- **Questions:** Each day, read the assigned passage slowly, then reflect on the questions. You'll also see these additional ways to interact sprinkled throughout:
 - **Dig Deeper** questions point you to a related passage somewhere else in Scripture. For the Unfolding series, we are tracing Scriptural themes through the whole Bible so we can see how it all ties together.
 - **Reflect** questions ask you to think about how the passage applies to your life - past, present, and future.
 - **Psalm of the Week** questions will feature one Psalm every Friday that reinforces that week's theme.
 - **Listen** to the "Song of the Week" included in Tuesday's *Life at Hope* email. These songs relate to the week's theme and are part of Wednesday's questions.
 - **Challenge** questions offer resources each week for additional context and different ways to engage in the scriptures.
- **Group Discussion Questions:** Many Communities use these questions to guide their group discussions. Reach out to Pastor Bill Craig (bcraig@hopemason.org) if you are not plugged into a Community. Or grab a couple of people and meet on your own time for these weeks to discuss them.

GOD DIVIDES THE KINGDOM

1 KINGS 11:1-13

OVERVIEW

Solomon, King David's son, had started out well, building God a glorious temple and asking Him for wisdom to lead. How did his heart go astray in this passage, and why?

What does God say the consequence would be, and what do we learn about God through this?

REFLECT

How is your heart most tempted to go astray from God? Ask God to show you and write a brief prayer of response.

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *Books of 1 and 2 Kings Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

1 KINGS 11:14-43

What does God do in verses 14-25, and why? What do we learn about God from this?

What promise does God make to Jeroboam in verses 26-43? What more do we learn about God here?

DIG DEEPER

Read 2 Samuel 7:12-16. How do we see God's promise to David in that passage fulfilled in these verses in 1 Kings? What strikes you about that, and what questions do you have?

1 KINGS 12:1-15

List the key events of these verses. What do we learn about Solomon's son, Rehoboam, from these events?

What do we learn about those events from verse 15? What do we learn about God from this, and what questions do you have?

DIG DEEPER

Whose counsel or guidance are you listening to most frequently these days (people you know, books, news sources, podcasts, etc.)? What would you say is the overall impact of that counsel in your life? Is there something God would call you to here?

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's *Life at Hope* email.

1 KINGS 12:16-33

List the events of verses 16-24. What do we learn about Rehoboam from this? About God?

What does Jeroboam do in verses 25-33, and why? How do these events relate to Exodus 32:1-5, and what do we learn from this?

DIG DEEPER

What do people outside the faith point to as the source of the good things in their lives? What, other than the true God, are you tempted to point to? Write a brief prayer for them and for you.

1 KINGS 11-12

WRAP-UP

Look back at your notes from the week. What is one thing you sense the Lord most wants to tell you? Ask Him and write any thoughts that come. Share it with someone at Hope to encourage them.

DIG DEEPER

To see how Jeroboam's story ends, read 1 Kings 14:7-16. What do we learn about God from this, and what questions do you have?

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 24:12-26 – What does this teach us about idolatry? About God? What else strikes you?

MESSAGE NOTES

ISAIAH 6:1-8

OVERVIEW

Read through verses 1-4 slowly, phrase by phrase, taking a moment to picture each part as you read. What thoughts come?

How does Isaiah respond to this vision, and why? What thoughts, feelings and questions are stirred in you by his response?

PRACTICE

Write out three times the words of the seraphim in verse 7. If you have received Jesus as King, these words are true of you as well! Write a brief prayer of response.

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *Book of Isaiah Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

ISAIAH 6:9-13

What message does God tell Isaiah to share with the people? What questions do you have about that?

What does God say the impact of Isaiah's message will be? How do you imagine Isaiah felt about that? How would you feel?

DIG DEEPER

What does Jesus say about this passage in Matthew 13:10-17? What is encouraging about that passage, and what questions do you have?

JEREMIAH 1:1-10

List below the things God says to Jeremiah about his calling. How did Jeremiah respond? How do you imagine you would respond if God said those words to you?

What do we learn about God from this encounter?

REFLECT

How do you believe God would finish this sentence if He were speaking to you: “I have called you and set you apart to...”? Ask Him to show you and write any thoughts that come.

LISTEN

Listen to the “Song of the Week” from yesterday’s *Life at Hope* email.

JEREMIAH 1:11-19

What is God's message and how does He convey it in these verses? What do we learn about God from this?

In what ways would God's words have been encouraging to Jeremiah? In what ways would they have been scary?

REFLECT

Is there anything you sense He's been leading or nudging you to do lately that's scary or uncomfortable? Sometimes it's easy to ignore these nudges, so ask God to open your heart to where He is leading and give you courage to follow Him.

JEREMIAH 2:1-13

WRAP-UP

List below the sins of Jerusalem that God is confronting in these verses. Which of these could be said of you as well (past or present)? Thank God for His grace and ask for His help to walk in His ways.

How would you describe God's tone in this passage?
What do we learn about Him from this?

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 99:1-9 – How did we see these themes in our passages this week? What else strikes you?

MESSAGE NOTES

1 KINGS 18:17-40

OVERVIEW

Checking context (1 Kings 16:29-33), who are Ahab and Jezebel? What else do we learn about them?

List the events of today's passage. What would you say is the primary message, and what is one thing you sense the Lord most wanting to say to you through it?

REFLECT

Think of people you love who don't know Jesus. Who or what would you say is their "god"? Write a brief prayer for them, that they would know the true God!

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *How To Read the Prophets* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

AMOS 5:6-27

How would you summarize the things that God is confronting in Israel? What does God say will be the consequences of those sins?

What does God think of their religious ceremonies, and why? What do we learn from this?

REFLECT

Imagine someone said to you, “I’m good with God. I mean, I go to church regularly, give offerings, and more.” What might you say to them, based in part on these verses?

JONAH 1-2

List the key events of chapter 1. What most strikes you?

What are the main themes of Jonah's prayer in chapter 2? What is surprising about it? What is most meaningful?

REFLECT

Who are the people you would most struggle to go share the gospel with, and why? Write a brief prayer for them below.

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's *Life at Hope* email.

JONAH 3-4

What do we learn about Jonah in these chapters?
Where do you see yourself in him?

What do we learn about the heart of God in the book of Jonah? Which of these insights is most meaningful to you today?

REFLECT

God has also called us to go and be witnesses in the world (Matthew 28:16-20). How have you been living out that call (or not) recently? Write a brief prayer about that.

1 KINGS 18, AMOS 5, JONAH

WRAP-UP

What was Jonah's primary sin? How was that reflective of Israel as a whole? Of you? Write a brief prayer of response.

Look back over your notes from the week. What primary things is God confronting in His people in these passages from the prophets?

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 115:1-11 - Summarize the Psalm's message in fifteen words or less. What else strikes you about the Psalm?

MESSAGE NOTES

DEUTERONOMY 28 AND 30

OVERVIEW

Read Deuteronomy 28:1-11, when God first made the covenant with His people. What promises did God make to His people in these verses? What do we learn about God from this?

Read Deuteronomy 28:58-68. What promises did God make to His people in these verses? What do we learn about God from this?

Read Deuteronomy 30:15-20. What do we learn about God in these verses?

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *Exile Biblical Theme* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

2 CHRONICLES 34:1-3, 14-33

List the key events in these passages. What strikes you?

Summarize the message of these verses in ten words or less. What do you sense God most wants to say to you through this passage today? What is your response?

REFLECT

How “tender” is your heart towards God today (verse 27), and why? Write a brief prayer about that.

2 KINGS 24:1-20

What are the key events of this chapter, and why did they occur?

What do we learn about God from this, and what questions do you have?

REFLECT

Imagine being there when verses 10-17 occurred. What do you think it would have been like?

LISTEN

Listen to the “Song of the Week” from yesterday’s *Life at Hope* email.

2 KINGS 25:1-30

List the key events of this chapter. What strikes you about them?

What do you imagine the people were thinking about God when the temple was burned and the city destroyed? Write a brief prayer that one of them might have prayed at the time.

DIG DEEPER

Read 2 Chronicles 36:17-23, another account of the destruction of Jerusalem. How does it end on a note of hope, and what questions do you have?

DEUTERONOMY, 2 CHRONICLES, AND 2 KINGS

WRAP-UP

Look back over your notes from the week. What do you sense God most wants to say to you through these passages this week?

Where do we see God's grace or good news in these events? Write a brief prayer about that. Share a key thought from today with someone at Hope to encourage them.

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 137:1-9 - What are the feelings of the Psalmist here? What is meaningful to you about that, and what questions do you have?

MESSAGE NOTES

JEREMIAH 31:31-34

OVERVIEW

This week, we'll look at glimpses in the Old Testament of the new covenant God promises to make with His people. Read the passage above. List below the things God says He will do in this new covenant.

What do these promises teach us about God's heart? Write a brief prayer of praise.

DIG DEEPER

Read Hebrews 8:6-13. How does the writer of Hebrews add to our understanding of these verses? What else strikes you from this passage?

JEREMIAH 32:36-41

How would you summarize the promises God makes to His people in these verses?

What do we learn about God in these verses? Which is most meaningful to you today, and what questions do you have?

PRACTICE

Write a prayer for someone who is “outside the faith but inside your reach,” asking God to do these things in their heart, for His glory and their eternal joy!

EZEKIEL 36:22-38

What is the primary problem God addresses in verses 22-23? How would you expect God to address that problem?

In verses 24-29, how does God say He will address that problem? What strikes you about that?

DIG DEEPER

Read Romans 8:1-11. How does this passage relate to today's passage in Ezekiel? What else strikes you?

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's *Life at Hope* email.

EZEKIEL 37:15-28

What promises does God make in verses 15-23 about the divided kingdom of Ephraim (the northern kingdom of Israel) and Judah (the southern kingdom)? What feelings and desires are stirred in you as you read?

What promises does God add in verses 24-28? Which of these promises is most meaningful to you, and why?

DIG DEEPER

Read Revelation 21:1-4. How do these verses echo or fulfill the passage in Ezekiel 37 from today? Write a brief prayer of response.

JEREMIAH AND EZEKIEL

WRAP-UP

Look back over your notes from the week. What do you sense God most wants to say to you through these passages this week?

Where do you see the grace of God, His undeserved kindness, in these passages? Share it with someone from Hope to encourage them.

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 111:1-10 - How does this Psalm connect with our theme for the week? What else strikes you?

MESSAGE NOTES

GOD PROMISES A SERVANT KING

ISAIAH 52:13-53:12

OVERVIEW

Read the whole passage. Write some of the key points below.

What questions come as you read this passage? Put a star by the most important ones.

REFLECT

What feelings arise as you read this passage? Write a brief prayer of response.

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *The Messiah Biblical Theme* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

ISAIAH 52:13-53:3

This is considered one of the “Servant Songs” of Isaiah that points to the coming Messiah (the “servant”). How is the Messiah pictured in these verses?

How will people respond to Him? Who do you know that has responded this way? Write a brief prayer for them below.

DIG DEEPER

Read John 12:37-43. How do these verses relate to our passage for today? What else strikes you from this passage?

ISAIAH 53:4-8

List the things these verses say the Messiah will have done for us. Which of these is most striking to you?

Make the list again, this time using the first person, “me/my” instead of “us/our.” Then write a brief prayer of response.

DIG DEEPER

Read Acts 8:26-38. How does this event shed light on this passage in Isaiah? What else strikes you from this?

LISTEN

Listen to the “Song of the Week” from yesterday’s *Life at Hope* email.

ISAIAH 53:9-12

List the things in these verses that Isaiah says will happen to the Messiah. Which is most striking to you, and why?

List the things that Isaiah says the Messiah will accomplish for us ... including you! Which is particularly meaningful to you today? Write a brief prayer about that.

DIG DEEPER

Read 1 Peter 2:22-25. What themes from this passage appear in Isaiah 53? What else is striking to you?

ISAIAH 52:13-53:12

WRAP-UP

Look back over your notes from the week. What do you sense is one thing God most wants to say to you through this passage this week?

What do we learn about God from this chapter? Write a prayer of praise, then share that insight with someone from Hope.

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 2:1-12 - This Psalm is applied to Jesus, the Messiah, in Acts 4:25-28. What does it say about the “Anointed One”? What else strikes you?

MESSAGE NOTES

DANIEL 1

OVERVIEW

Read the entire passage slowly. Write down the key events and questions you have.

What do we learn about Daniel in this chapter? What can we learn from him about living in a “pagan” land?

REFLECT

In what ways is your life the same as those who don't know Jesus? How is it different? Ask God if there's a step He would have you take here, and write any thoughts that come.

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *Book of Daniel Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

DANIEL 2

What qualities do we see in Daniel in this chapter? In which of these would you most like to see growth in your own life?

What do we learn about God in this chapter? Put a star by the insights that are most meaningful to you. What questions do you have?

REFLECT

Write your own prayer of praise, as Daniel did, including some of the things you love most about Him and thanks for some of the things He's done for you.

DANIEL 3-4

List the changes we see in Nebuchadnezzar over chapters 2:46-4:37. What strikes you, and what questions do you have?

What do we learn about God in these chapters? (I know we ask this a lot, but it's the most important question to keep before us!)

REFLECT

What is something you are earnestly asking God to do right now? Read Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego's words in 3:16-18. How might these shape your prayer?

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's *Life at Hope* email.

DANIEL 5

List the key events of this chapter. Where have we seen events like this before? What does this teach us?

What do we learn about God in this chapter? Which do you most need to hear today, and why? Share it with someone from Hope.

REFLECT

How were Nebuchadnezzar and Belshazzar similar? How were they different? Do you have anyone in your life or in your culture who is like Belshazzar? Pray for them, that God would save them!

DANIEL 6

WRAP-UP

What qualities do we see in Daniel in this chapter? Again, what can we learn from him about how to live in a pagan land?

How would you characterize Daniel's relationship with King Darius in this chapter? With the satraps? What does this teach us?

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 31:12-24 - How do we see the themes in Daniel in this Psalm? What else strikes you?

MESSAGE NOTES

GOD BRINGS THE FAITHFUL HOME, BUT...

EZRA 1:1-11

OVERVIEW

List the things God did in this passage. What do we learn about God from this?

In which ways was this return from exile similar to the Exodus from slavery in Egypt? In which ways was it different?

DIG DEEPER

The passage references Jeremiah's prophecy of the return from exile. Read Jeremiah 29:10-14. List the "I will..." promises of God in these verses. What do we learn about God from this?

CHALLENGE

Today or sometime this week, watch the Bible Project video titled *Books of Ezra and Nehemiah Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

EZRA 3:8-13 AND 6:13-22

What were the different reactions to the laying of the foundation of the temple, and why? What strikes you about that, and what questions do you have?

What are the key events of Ezra 6:13-22, and how did the people respond? What does this teach us about God and life with Him? How have you been experiencing that lately?

DIG DEEPER

Read Exodus 13:3-10 about how they celebrated the Passover. Having that background, what must have made this Passover celebration in Ezra 6 so special?

NEHEMIAH 1:1-11

What does Nehemiah learn, and what is his response? Why does he respond that way?

How would you summarize the main themes of Nehemiah's prayer in this chapter? Which lines are most meaningful to you, and why?

REFLECT

Why do you think Nehemiah confesses the sins of his people, not just his own? What "sins of your people" might you confess to the Lord?

LISTEN

Listen to the "Song of the Week" from yesterday's *Life at Hope* email.

NEHEMIAH 8:1-18

This chapter takes place after the wall was completed (in 6:15). What is happening in verses 1-12, and how do the people respond?

What do verses 13-18 tell us about the people of Israel? About a life of obedience to God?

DIG DEEPER

Read Leviticus 23:39-44. What was the purpose of the Feast of Booths, and what was its tone? What does this teach us about God?

NEHEMIAH 9:26-38

WRAP-UP

What strikes you about what the Levites say about God in this part of the prayer? About the people of Israel? How can you relate?

How does the prayer end in verses 36-38? How does the book of Nehemiah end in 13:23-30? What strikes you about this, and what questions do you have?

PSALM OF THE WEEK

Psalm 13:1-6 - How might the themes of this Psalm relate to being in exile and then returning? What other thoughts come?

MESSAGE NOTES

APRIL 20-26

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Share a time someone gave you bad advice. What happened?
- What are the reasons you think people drift from God?
- Read 1 Kings 11:1-13. What do we learn about God from this passage, and what questions do you have?
- Read 1 Kings 12:25-30. How do these events relate to Exodus 32:1-5, and what do we learn from this?
- What do people outside the faith point to as the source of the good things in their lives? What, other than the true God, are you tempted to point to?
- Whose counsel are you listening to most frequently these days? What would you say is the overall impact of that counsel in your life? Is there something God would call you to here?
- Consider watching together the Bible Project video titled *Books of 1 and 2 Kings Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.

APRIL 27-MAY 3

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Have you ever been intimidated to be in someone's presence? Who was it, and why?
- Read Isaiah 6:1-13. What do you think it will be like to be in God's presence, and why? Has your view of that changed at all over the time you've followed Jesus?
- Which is harder for you: believing you need God's grace desperately, or believing He offers it? Why?
- What would have been encouraging to Isaiah about his call? What would have been scary? How can you relate when you think of God's call for you to share the gospel?
- Read Jeremiah's call in Jeremiah 1:4-10. What would have been encouraging about Jeremiah's call? What would have been scary?
- Read Jeremiah 2:11-13. What is God confronting here, and how do we see this temptation today?

MAY 4-10

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Would you say you enjoy or avoid confrontation? Why?
- Read Amos 5:6-27. How would you summarize the things God is confronting in Israel? What does God say will be the consequences of those sins?
- What does God think of their religious ceremonies, and why? What do we learn from this?
- Imagine someone said to you, “I’m good with God. I mean, I go to church regularly, give offerings, and more.” What might you say to them, based in part on these verses?
- Read Jonah 1:1-3. Why do you think he fled? How are you doing at following God’s command to share the gospel with others? Why is that?
- Read Jonah 3. What do we learn about God from this? How might it help you in your sharing of the gospel?

MAY 11-17

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Talk about a time you were punished (by parents, teachers, courts, etc.). Did you think you deserved it? Why or why not?
- Consider watching together the Bible Project video titled *Exile: Exile Biblical Theme* by scanning the QR code on page 4. What was helpful about that, and what questions do you have?
- Read Deuteronomy 30:15-20. What do we learn about God in these verses? What else strikes you?
- Read 2 Kings 24:1-4 and 25:8-12. What do these teach us about God? What is most meaningful to you, and what questions do you have?
- Imagine being there when 2 Kings 25:8-12 occurred. What do you think it would have been like?
- What do you sense God most wants to say to you through these passages this week?

MAY 18-24

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- What is something you've done recently solely out of a sense of duty or obligation? Or: Talk about a time you or someone else in your life broke a promise.
- Read Jeremiah 31:31-34. What do these promises teach us about God's heart? What is most meaningful to you today, and what questions do you have?
- Read Ezekiel 36:22-38. List together (on a white board, if possible) the things God promises to do in these verses.
- What are the primary ways you've seen God transform your heart?
- What are some ways you still want to see Him transform your heart?
- What is one thing you sense God wanting to say to you through this week's passages?

MAY 25-31

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- What is the most physical pain you've experienced? (Give the person with the worst story a cookie!)
- Consider watching together the Bible Project video titled *The Messiah Biblical Theme* by scanning the QR code on page 4.
- Read Isaiah 52:13-53:12. List together (on a white board, if possible) the things the Messiah is prophesied to do for us. (If there's no white board, just call them out.)
- Which of these is most meaningful to you, and why?
- What questions does this passage raise for you?
- Spend some time praying for those outside the faith but inside your reach, asking that God would help them come to know Jesus as their Messiah, and that He would use you to share the good news of the gospel with them.

JUNE 1-7

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- What types of opposition have you faced for being a follower of Jesus?
- Consider watching together the Bible Project video titled *Book of Daniel Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.
- Read Daniel 1:1-8; Daniel 3:8-18; Daniel 6:4-11. What do we learn from Daniel and his friends about living in a land that doesn't honor God?
- What do we learn about God from these passages (and the overall story of Daniel)?
- What do you sense is one thing God wants to say to you through this discussion this week? Is there a step you sense Him calling you to take?
- What are ways that following Jesus is challenging for you in our culture today? Close by praying for each other.

JUNE 8-14

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Have you ever been away from home for a long time? If so, what (other than loved ones) were you most looking forward to about home?
- Consider watching together the Bible Project video titled *Books of Ezra and Nehemiah Summary* by scanning the QR code on page 4.
- Read Ezra 1:1-4 and 6:13-22. What do you imagine it was like for them to return to the land and rebuild the temple?
- Read Exodus 13:3-10 about how they celebrated the Passover. With this background, what must have made this Passover celebration in Ezra 6 so special?
- What has God delivered you out of in your own life?
- What does the return from exile teach us about God? How does this relate to our lives today?

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
