

REFLECTIONS from the lead pastor

At our May Strategic Planning Committee meeting, chairman Scott Myers reminded the team that the church's by-laws require that the strategic planning committee do a periodic review of our Vision, Mission, and Values Statements. At the meeting, committee members reviewed, discussed, and affirmed all three of these and offered the suggestion that church leadership explore creative ways to keep these in front of the congregation. In response to their wishes, I thought that using my monthly newsletter article might provide such an opportunity. As I review them now, I am hopeful that they will sound familiar to you.

The vision of Marvin Methodist Church is "Growing" disciples to share the love and hope of Christ." If you read the church's 24/25 Annual Report that was sent to church members homes in May, then you will recognize these words that were prominently displayed throughout the document: "Grow," "Love," and "Hope" were notated in large capital letters along with our strategic pillars of Discipleship, Worship, People, Stewardship, and Service.

The Mission of Marvin Methodist Church is "to call people into a life-altering relationship with Christ, equip them for ministry and send them out into Christian service, all while loving God and loving others." These words are located throughout our campus on signage and large displays in our atrium and on the wall by the Welcome Center. You undoubtedly have seen the words "Call, Equip, Send" displayed along with the large metal Marvin logo with the words "Love God, Love Others." These are our attempts to keep the mission before us.

As for the Marvin Values, these have been documented as the "The Marvin Way" and are probably the least communicated of the three statements (unless you frequent the hall between the Fair Gymnasium and the kitchen.) Each of the nine value "words" are displayed there with a corresponding Marvin photograph and appropriate Scripture text. To save you a walk down the hallway, here they are with a short description and corresponding Scripture text:



What is the Eternal Flame Fund?

The Eternal Flame Fund is supported by gifts from the congregation for projects at Marvin Church not covered by the annual operating budget. This fund is supported in part by the annual Eternal Flame Fund Dinner. Gifts to the Eternal Flame Fund may be made at any point during the year and may be made in honor or memory of loved ones or friends.

One hundred percent of your Eternal Flame Fund gift is restricted for the care and maintenance of the church and campus, and these projects are determined by the Church Properties Committee.

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Sanctuary Organ Update

Marvin's Organ Committee has learned that delivery of our new Letourneau pipe organ will be delayed until after Easter of 2026. Several issues have affected the timely delivery of our organ, as well as the two ordered ahead of ours at the Brigham Young University Concert Hall in Provo, Utah, and the St. Charles Avenue Presbyterian Church in New Orleans, Louisiana. These issues include the death of the former owner and President of Letourneau Organs, a mandatory shutdown of all non-essential Canadian businesses during the COVID pandemic, numerous supply chain issues with critical organ components that were outsourced due to the pandemic, and personnel changes in the workforce of skilled cabinet makers and pipe makers at Letourneau.

While the delay is frustrating, there is some advantage to the timing. Vacating the Sanctuary during the organ installation for a few weeks after Easter or during the early summer months will be more convenient for the life of the church than doing so during Lent. Also, a more relaxed installation schedule will allow Jonathan more time to become familiar with the specifics of the new instrument before playing it. Fortunately, we also have strong financial safeguards in a strong, flexible contract with Letourneau, largely due to the hard work of Mary Ann Cozby and Kevin Ferrier.

We continue to monitor the financial strength of Letourneau and it remains solid. All further contractual installment payments will be paid on a "trust but verify" basis involving personal visits to the Letourneau factory in Quebec at critical milestones. A new proposed amendment to the purchase agreement with specific delivery details is being prepared by Letourneau for our review and comments. We believe Marvin's level of satisfaction with the new organ will be similar to that of the faculty and students of Brigham Young University, who are thrilled with their new Letourneau. Dr. Neil Harmon, who serves on the organ faculty at BYU, is very happy with the sound of the instrument, and says the craftsmanship is "great" and that Letourneau did a remarkable job with voicing the organ.

We are thankful to the members of Marvin for their continued support of this important addition to our beautiful, historic Sanctuary, and are excited to experience this masterpiece of musical innovation.

Dear Marvin Family and Friends,

Please know how much we love you.

A lesson I've learned over the last few months is that every single day is a gift from God. I had moments of despair when I wondered if I would ever do the things I love again, but I clung to hope, realizing that each day is precious, no matter what it holds. I've learned to be grateful for everything, even the bad things, as they make the good things even better. I learned that people (you) are there for us, even when we cannot see you. That in the end, God is always there, going before us, walking with us, and carrying us when we feel we cannot go on.

Jonathan and I spend our days thankful for my very life, which was spared three times, and my miraculous recovery, which began on Easter Sunday morning! The Lord heard the prayers of His people and the supplication of the faithful as they celebrated His glorious Resurrection! We are grateful for you and pray that the Lord will bless you and keep you, make His face shine upon you, and give you peace.


DOWNTOWN TYLER **IMPROVEMENT PROJECT**


