Every year on vacation our family breaks open a puzzle and pours the pieces onto the dining room table. Suddenly we're staring at a sea of shapes and colors that don't seem to make much sense. I'll pick up one piece—just one—and try to imagine where it might fit. Maybe it connects here, maybe there. Sometimes it takes trying dozens before finally finding one that clicks.

This season for the Vaughts has felt a lot like that. We hold one small piece of the story in our hands—today's joys, today's challenges, today's prayers—and we can't quite see yet how it all fits into the larger picture God is creating. It can feel confusing at times and even discouraging when we can't see His full design.

That's part of what makes Paul's letter to the Thessalonians so meaningful. They were a young church, full of faith and hope, but living in the tension of the "in-between." They had heard the Gospel, embraced Jesus, and were learning what it meant to follow Him—but life was hard.

They faced persecution, uncertainty, grief, and waiting. They were learning to live in the meantime—between what Christ had already accomplished and what He had yet to complete.

As we've journeyed through Paul's letter this fall, we've been reminded that God is still at work, even when we can't see the whole picture. We've been encouraged to keep loving one another, to stay faithful, to hold on to hope, to live lives worthy of the Gospel—not to earn God's approval, but because we already belong to Him.

What seems to have stuck with me most has been Paul's tone. It's deeply personal. You can feel his affection and confidence in what God is doing. He writes with the heart of a shepherd who knows that following Jesus means learning to trust that every piece—every joy, every hardship, every waiting season—has a place in God's grand design. We are a people learning to trust "in the meantime."

We pray for things that haven't yet happened. We hold on to promises we can't yet see. We wrestle with uncertainty and long for the day when the picture will finally be complete. But just as Paul encouraged the Thessalonians, we can rest assured that God is faithful. The pieces that feel random or disconnected are not wasted. The story He's writing is still unfolding, and one day we'll see how it all fits together-every act of love, every moment of faith and quiet prayer that no one else heard.

So when you find yourself wondering how today fits into the bigger picture, remember the puzzle piece you're holding. It may not look like much on its own, but it matters deeply. It's part of something beautiful in the hands of a faithful Father.

In the meantime, keep waiting. Keep trusting. Keep loving. And let's keep allowing our small pieces into His larger story, confident that one day we'll see the full picture and recognize His handiwork.




