

Day 1- "When Grace Feels Wrong"

Jonah 4:1-2

Jonah 4:2 (NLT) "I knew that you are a merciful and compassionate God..."

Jonah is furious.

Not because God failed—but because God was faithful to His character.

Everything Jonah says about God is true: gracious, compassionate, slow to anger, filled with unfailing love. But Jonah does not celebrate these truths—he resents them.

Why? Because those qualities were extended to people he did not believe deserved them.

This exposes something deep: Jonah is not struggling with God's character—he is struggling with how God applies it.

We often love grace when it's directed toward us. We struggle with it when it's given to others—especially those we think are undeserving.

But grace, by definition, is always undeserved.

Jonah wanted justice for Nineveh and mercy for himself. God offers mercy to both.

This moment confronts us with a hard question:

Do we want God to be gracious—or do we want Him to be selective?

Prayer: Lord, align my heart with Yours. Help me celebrate Your grace—even when it's extended to others. Amen.

Live It Out: Think of someone you struggle to extend grace to. Pray for them intentionally today.

Day 2- "God Engages the Heart"

Jonah 4:3-4

Jonah 4:4 (NLT) "The Lord replied, 'Is it right for you to be angry about this?'"

Jonah's frustration escalates—he says it would be better for him to die than to live.

And God responds—not with correction, but with a question.

"Is it right for you to be angry?"

God is not dismissing Jonah—He is inviting him to reflect.

This is how God often works. He does not always confront us with statements—He invites us into examination.

Questions create space for honesty. They reveal what is underneath our reactions.

Jonah's anger is not just about Nineveh—it is about control, expectation, and misunderstanding God's heart.

God doesn't shut him down. He leans in.

God is not intimidated by our emotions—but He is interested in shaping them.

Prayer: God, search my heart. Help me understand what is driving my reactions and align them with Your truth. Amen.

Live It Out: When you feel frustrated today, pause and ask: "What is really going on in my heart right now?"

Day 3- "God's Unexpected Kindness"

Jonah 4:5-6

Jonah 4:6 (NLT) "And the Lord God arranged for a leafy plant to grow there..."

Jonah sits outside the city, watching—still hoping for destruction.

God responds by providing a plant that grows quickly and gives Jonah shade. The text says Jonah was “very grateful” for the plant.

This is the first time Jonah is described as happy.

God provides comfort—even to a prophet whose heart is misaligned.

This reveals something beautiful: God’s kindness is not limited to when we are right.

He cares about Jonah’s physical discomfort, even while addressing his spiritual condition.

God’s provision is not just functional—it is relational. He is engaging Jonah’s heart through experience.

But this moment also exposes something: Jonah rejoices over a plant more than he grieves over a city.

God is about to use that contrast.

Prayer: Lord, thank You for Your kindness—even when I don’t deserve it. Help me not take Your provision for granted. Amen.

Live It Out: Notice one small provision from God today—and thank Him specifically for it.

Day 4-“What We Really Care About”

Jonah 4:7–9

Jonah 4:8 (NLT) “The sun beat down on Jonah’s head until he grew faint...”

God appoints a worm to destroy the plant, and then sends a scorching wind. The comfort Jonah enjoyed disappears quickly.

Jonah’s response is immediate—he becomes angry again and says he would rather die.

God asks again, “Is it right for you to be angry because the plant died?”

Jonah responds, “Yes... even angry enough to die!”

This is revealing.

Jonah is deeply emotionally invested—not in people, not in repentance, not in God’s mercy—but in his own comfort.

The plant becomes a mirror.

God is exposing Jonah’s priorities by removing what he has attached himself to.

Discomfort has a way of revealing what we truly value.

What we react strongly to often points to what we love deeply.

Prayer: God, reveal what I am holding too tightly. Help me care more about what matters to You than my own comfort. Amen.

Live It Out: Pay attention to what frustrates you today. Ask: What does this reveal about what I value?

Day 5-“The Heart of God”

Jonah 4:10–11

Jonah 4:11 (NLT) “But Nineveh has more than 120,000 people...”

God brings everything to a point.

“You feel sorry about the plant... though you did nothing to put it there.”

Jonah cared deeply about something he did not create, sustain, or truly invest in.

Then God contrasts it:

“Shouldn’t I feel sorry for such a great city?”

Nineveh has over 120,000 people—“who live in spiritual darkness”—and even animals. God’s compassion extends broadly, deeply, and personally.

This is the heart of the book.

God is inviting Jonah—and us—to see people the way He does.

The book ends with a question, not an answer.

Because the real response is not Jonah’s—it’s ours.

Will we share God’s heart?

Will we care about what He cares about?

Or will we remain more attached to our comfort than to His compassion?

Prayer: Lord, give me Your heart for people. Expand my compassion and align my priorities with Yours. Amen.

Live It Out: Take one intentional step toward someone you might normally overlook. See them the way God does.
