Day 1

God Goes With You Into New Seasons

Read: Genesis 46:1–7

As Jacob prepared to move his entire family to Egypt, he stopped to worship God. This was a major transition filled with uncertainty, fear, and emotion.

Leaving home meant stepping into the unknown.

During the night, God spoke to Jacob and reassured him: “Do not be afraid... I will go with you.”

That promise matters because many seasons of life feel uncertain. New jobs, new responsibilities, changing relationships, unexpected transitions, aging, grief, or major decisions can all create anxiety about the future.

We often want God to show us the entire plan before we move forward.

But many times, God gives something even more important than detailed answers—His presence.

God did not explain every detail to Jacob. Instead, He promised to be with him.

That is often how faith works.

Following God does not always remove uncertainty, but it does mean we never walk alone.

Jacob’s decision to worship before moving forward is also important. Worship re-centers our hearts when life feels unstable. It reminds us that God remains faithful even when circumstances change.

The future may feel uncertain to us, but it is never uncertain to God.

Reflection Questions:

- What transition or uncertainty am I currently facing?
- How does God’s presence bring comfort during change?
- What would it look like to trust God one step at a time?

Prayer: Lord, help me trust You in seasons of transition and uncertainty. Thank You for promising to go with me wherever You lead. Give me peace and courage to follow You faithfully. Amen.

Day 2

God Cares About Ordinary Families

Read: Genesis 46:8–27

Genesis 46 includes a long list of names and family members as Jacob’s household entered Egypt. At first glance, lists like this can feel unimportant or easy to skip.

But these names matter to God.

Every person listed had a story, a life, and a place within God’s larger plan.

This passage reminds us that God works through ordinary people and ordinary families.

Many people assume their lives are too small or insignificant to matter spiritually. But throughout Scripture, God repeatedly works through families, relationships, and generations.

God is not only interested in dramatic public moments. He also cares deeply about everyday lives.

The names in Genesis 46 represent people with strengths, weaknesses, failures, and struggles. Yet God continued working through imperfect families to accomplish His purposes.

That truth is encouraging because most families are complicated.

No family is perfect. Every family carries some level of brokenness, tension, or pain. Yet God still works in and through imperfect people.

You may feel ordinary, unnoticed, or spiritually unimportant at times.

But God sees your life fully.

The God of Scripture is deeply personal. He knows names, stories, fears, and struggles—and He remains faithful across generations.

Reflection Questions:

- Have I underestimated the value of ordinary faithfulness?
- How have I seen God work through my family or relationships?
- What legacy of faith do I want to leave for others?

Prayer: Father, thank You that You see and value every person. Help me live faithfully in the ordinary parts of life and trust that You are still working through imperfect people and families. Amen.

Day 3

God Provides in Unexpected Ways

Read: Genesis 46:28–34

When Jacob's family arrived in Egypt, Joseph carefully prepared a place for them to live. God used Joseph's painful journey to eventually provide safety and provision for his entire family during the famine.

Years earlier, none of them could have imagined this outcome.

Often, God's provision comes through unexpected paths.

We usually imagine God working through easy circumstances and straightforward solutions. But many times, God provides through situations we would never choose ourselves.

Joseph's suffering eventually became part of God's provision for many people.

That does not mean suffering itself is good. But it does mean God is able to bring purpose and provision from painful places.

Many people can look back on difficult seasons and recognize that God was quietly guiding, protecting, or preparing them in ways they could not see at the time.

God's provision is not always immediate or obvious.

Sometimes His provision comes through people. Sometimes through wisdom, open doors, unexpected opportunities, or strength to endure difficult seasons.

Genesis 46 reminds us that God sees needs long before we do.

And He remains faithful even when we cannot yet understand His plan.

Reflection Questions:

- How have I experienced God's provision in unexpected ways?
- Where do I currently need to trust God's care?
- How might God be working behind the scenes in my life right now?

Prayer: God, thank You for faithfully providing for me. Help me trust You even when I cannot fully see what You are doing. Open my eyes to recognize Your provision and care in every season. Amen.

Day 4

Blessing Others Wherever You Are

Read: Genesis 47:1–10

One surprising moment in Genesis 47 happens when Jacob meets Pharaoh. Even though Pharaoh was one of the most powerful men in the world, Jacob blessed him.

This moment reminds us that God's people are called to bring blessing wherever they go.

Jacob entered Egypt as an aging shepherd dependent on Pharaoh's generosity. Yet spiritually, Jacob still carried something valuable to offer.

Many people underestimate the influence they can have because they focus only on status, wealth, position, or success.

But God often works powerfully through ordinary acts of encouragement, wisdom, kindness, prayer, and faithfulness.

You do not need worldly power to be a blessing.

Wherever God places us—our workplace, neighborhood, family, church, or friendships—we are called to reflect His presence.

Jacob's life had been messy and imperfect, yet God still used him.

That truth matters because many people disqualify themselves based on past failures or current limitations.

But God delights in using imperfect people to bring hope and blessing to others.

The question is not whether your life is flawless. The question is whether you are willing to let God work through you.

Reflection Questions:

- How can I bring encouragement or blessing to others today?
- Have I underestimated how God might use my life?
- Where has God placed me to influence others for good?

Prayer: Lord, help me become a source of encouragement and blessing wherever I go. Use my words, actions, and relationships to reflect Your love and faithfulness to others. Amen.

Day 5

Holding Loosely to Earthly Things

Read: Genesis 47:13–31

As the famine worsened, the people of Egypt gradually surrendered their money, livestock, land, and possessions in exchange for food.

This chapter highlights how fragile earthly security can be.

People naturally place trust in things that feel stable—money, possessions, careers, health, plans, or control. Yet difficult seasons often reveal how quickly those things can change.

Genesis 47 reminds us that only God remains fully dependable.

Jacob also recognized that his life on earth was temporary. Near the end of the chapter, he focused not merely on survival, but on God's promises and the future beyond his current circumstances.

Wisdom grows when we remember that this world is not our ultimate home.

That perspective changes how we live.

Instead of building our identity entirely around temporary things, we begin focusing more deeply on what lasts—faith, character, relationships, love, generosity, and obedience to God.

This does not mean earthly things are unimportant. But it does mean they were never meant to carry the weight of our ultimate security.

Only God can do that.

When our hope rests in Him, we are able to hold temporary things with open hands instead of fearful control.

Reflection Questions:

- What do I tend to rely on for security?
- How have difficult seasons revealed where my trust truly rests?
- What would it look like to hold earthly things more loosely?

Prayer: Father, help me place my ultimate trust in You instead of temporary things. Teach me to live with eternal perspective and open hands, trusting that You alone are faithful and secure. Amen.
