The Church As Jesus Intended “Our Resources”

September 20, 2026
Acts 4:32-35

Series Summary:

What happens when following Jesus becomes more than something we fit into our lives—and becomes what we build our lives around? In the opening chapters of Acts, we encounter ordinary people who held nothing back. They were united around one purpose, empowered by the Holy Spirit, radically generous with what they had, and willing to sacrifice for something bigger than themselves. They didn’t just believe in the mission of Jesus—they were **ALL IN**.

In this five-week series, **ALL IN**, we’ll discover what can happen when we follow their example and surrender our purpose, resources, and lives to God. Together, we’ll be challenged to ask: What could God do in us, through us, and through South Sub Church if we were **ALL IN**?

Ice Breaker Questions:

1. What is something you own that you would have a hard time sharing with someone else?
2. Who is one of the most generous people you know? What makes you describe them that way?
3. Which is easier for you—giving your time, abilities, or money? Which is hardest?
4. When have you experienced someone meeting a need in your life at just the right time?
5. What comes to mind when you hear the word generosity?

Objective Questions:

1. How does verse 32 describe the believers?
2. What two things does Luke say the believers were united in?
3. What attitude did the believers have toward their possessions?
4. What did they do with what they owned?
5. According to verse 33, what were the apostles doing?
6. What message were the apostles giving testimony about?
7. How does Luke describe the power with which the apostles testified?
8. What does verse 33 say was upon all the believers?



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9. According to verse 34, what was true about needy people among them?
10. What did people do with the money they received from selling land or houses?

Interpretive Questions:

1. What do you think it means that the believers were “united in heart and mind”? How did that unity affect the way they lived?
2. Verse 32 says, “They felt that what they owned was not their own.” What does this reveal about their understanding of ownership and stewardship?
3. What connection do you see between the church’s commitment to the mission of Jesus in verse 33 and their generosity toward one another in verses 34–35?
4. Why do you think Luke places the apostles’ powerful testimony about Jesus’ resurrection in the middle of this description of generosity?
5. What does this passage teach us about the difference between biblical generosity and simply giving away extra things we no longer need?

Application Questions:

1. If you genuinely believed that everything you have belongs to God, how might it change the way you use your money and possessions?
2. The early believers were willing to use what they had to meet the needs of others. What might God have entrusted to you that could be used to make a difference in someone else’s life?
3. Which is more challenging for you: giving generously when you see a need or trusting God enough to loosen your grip on what you have? Why?
4. What would it look like for our church to be increasingly “united in heart and mind” around the mission Jesus has given us?
5. What is one step toward greater generosity God may be asking you to take right now?
