

SERMON OUTLINE NOTES

I. WE HAVE BEEN CALLED TO ENDURE UNJUST SUFFERING LIKE CHRIST (1 PETER 2:18-21)

- A. Unjust suffering is part of the Christian life (1 Peter 2:18-20; 3:14, 17; 4:19)
- B. We find favor with God when we endure while being mindful of God (1 Peter 2:19)
- C. Christ suffered unjustly, leaving us an example to follow (1 Peter 2:21)
 - 1. Jesus left a pattern for us to follow (Matthew 16:24-25)
 - 2. The focus of Jesus' pattern is not the circumstances, but his response (**Hebrews 12:1-3; Isaiah 53:7**)

II. CHRIST. OUR EXAMPLE (1 PETER 2:22-24)

- A. Peter probably has Jesus' crucifixion in mind (1 Peter 2:22-24; Mark 15:29-32)
 - 1. Jesus did not respond in kind, but was silent (Isaiah 53:7)
 - 2. One of the purposes for the cross is that we live to righteousness (1 Peter 2:24: Romans 6:13)
- B. The righteous life is exhibited in Jesus who is our example of how to endure unjust suffering (1 Peter 2:22-23)
 - 1. Jesus was sinless (1 Peter 2:22; 1 John 3:5; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
 - 2. Jesus showed us how to respond (1 Peter 2:23; Hebrews 12:3)
- C. We need Jesus' example because there is a deeply rooted justification for getting even, to return evil for evil, and to hold on to bitter grudges (1 Peter 3:8-9; Ephesians 4:31)

III. IN COMMUNION, WE REMEMBER JESUS WHO BORE OUR SINS (1 PETER 2:24)

1 PETER 2:21-24

To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps.

- ²² "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth."
- ²³ When they hurled their insults at him, he did not retaliate; when he suffered, he made no threats. Instead, he entrusted himself to him who judges justly. ²⁴ "He himself bore our sins" in his body on the cross, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; "by his wounds you have been healed."
