

2026 Midyear Impact Report

Caring for Those Who Care for the World

Behind every number is a missionary, ministry leader, spouse, child, or family carrying both the privilege and the weight of serving others.

During the first six months of 2026, One Another Ministries documented **197 care encounters**. These included at least **448 counseling, pastoral care, spiritual direction, consulting, training, crisis care, and debriefing sessions**—representing approximately **571 hours of direct care**.

The people receiving care were connected to **34 different field countries**, in addition to those serving in global roles. They represented at least **24 nationalities** and more than **65 mission organizations, churches, and ministries**.

Care That Goes Beyond a Conversation

Some ministry workers come to OAM carrying anxiety, grief, trauma, burnout, or marital strain. One couple arrived carrying the combined weight of ministry exhaustion, family pressure, and strain in their marriage. During a residential stay at the White House, they found space to rest, speak honestly, address painful issues, and begin moving toward a healthier path forward.

For others, care happens from thousands of miles away. Through confidential video conversations, ministry workers can process trauma, navigate major transitions, and find steady support when stepping away from the field isn't possible. Whether residential or remote, OAM creates space for those who spend their lives caring for others to receive care themselves.

Details have been withheld to protect the confidentiality of those we serve.

Responsive Care—and the Opportunity to Act Earlier

Approximately 81% of documented care during the first half of the year was responsive. In other words, **most people contacted OAM after a significant need had already developed.** Trauma, anxiety, transition, grief, relational strain, and burnout appeared repeatedly in the records.

This confirms the importance of maintaining accessible crisis and counseling care. **It also highlights an opportunity: expanding proactive care through mentoring, spiritual direction, training, debriefing, and regular check-ins before a difficult season becomes a crisis.**

OAM does not charge ministry workers in crisis. Donors and ministry partners make counseling, video sessions, residential care, meals, travel, administration, and follow-up possible **without adding financial burden to those seeking help.**

Opportunities for A New Season of Ministry

OAM has operated from the White House Ministry Centre in The Cannock Chase, a designated UK Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, since 2014. **Recently, through an act of great generosity, Liberty University donated the White House to OAM.** By faith our board has accepted this gift. This is an amazing blessing, and we are humbled to be trusted to steward this place of peace and healing as the permanent center of our ministry in Europe for many, many years to come.

This gift is a significant opportunity for OAM's future, but it also brings new responsibilities. We are inviting donors and partners to help meet several specific needs:

- 1. Annual cost of operations — \$100,000 annually**
 - Ongoing costs to operate the ministry facility.
- 2. Capital improvements — \$107,000**
 - Repair leaking flat roofs — \$33,000
 - Replace damaged, inefficient windows and doors — \$74,000
- 3. Recreation and guest resources**
 - Hiking and mountain-biking equipment, rain gear, and an indoor recreation and exercise area will help guests make the most of the White House and its surroundings throughout the year.

There is still much work ahead—and we are grateful to be doing it together.
