1. The World Feels Angrier

- Personal observation: society seems more tense and reactive than in the past.
- Modern contributors: constant access to opinions (Facebook, media).
- Core truth: Christians don't have to live angry or afraid—because we live in God's kingdom.

2. You Already Live in a Kingdom

- Biblical identity:
 - o Colossians 1:13–14 God has rescued us from darkness and brought us into Christ's kingdom.
 - o Philippians 3:20 our citizenship is in heaven.
- Even in a democracy, believers live under the rule and protection of a King.

3. What It Means to Live Under the King

- Illustration: Sam the dog and the storm peace comes from trusting who is in charge, not from avoiding storms.
- God's love and care for His people:
 - o Like a parent who loves their children even when they fail.
 - o Unanswered prayers or hardships do not mean God's love has changed.

4. Earthly Leaders Will Always Fall Short

- Jeremiah 23 God rebukes unfaithful leaders.
- Earthly rulers disappoint because they are limited.
- Many people are angry and discouraged because they place their hope in political figures instead of in Christ.

5. God Has Always Been in Control

- Biblical observation: terrible kings ruled for decades with no elections, yet God remained sovereign.
- Messianic promise: a Righteous Branch, a true King fulfilled in Jesus.
- Christians live in a different kingdom that cannot be shaken by worldly politics.

6. Living With God in Charge

- Humorous story: the boy who wants to "yell instead of listen."
- Kingdom living means:
 - o Submitting to God's authority.
 - o Living according to His values rather than the world's.

7. How God's Reign Changes Your Life

- Priorities shift: time, purpose, and goals become aligned with God's will.
- Relationships shift: quicker forgiveness, deeper integrity, a life that reflects the King.
- Work shifts: your job becomes a mission field, not just a paycheck.
- Finances shift: generosity flows from recognizing God as the source of all blessings.

8. Your Identity as a Child of the King

- Baptismal identity: you belong to Jesus.
- Because Jesus is King:
 - o Fear doesn't rule you.
 - o Anger doesn't own you.
 - o Anxiety doesn't define you.
- Challenge: Choose one way this week to live as if Jesus truly is your King.

- 2. Read Colossians 1:9-13. What changes when you remember that you live in God's kingdom rather than merely an earthly nation?

- 4. Where have you mistaken God's silence or "no" for a lack of love?
- 5. Read Jeremiah 23:1-6. Do you ever place more hope in earthly leaders than in Christ? What effect does that have on your emotions?
- 6. How can knowing God is still in charge change the way you react to news, elections, or global events?
- 7. In what areas of your life do you struggle to submit to God's authority?
- 8. If you truly saw your job as a mission field, how might your behavior or attitude change?
- 9. Read Philippians 3:15-21. How could living with eternity in mind shape the way you spend your time this week?
- 10. What is one specific, practical way you can live as if Jesus is your King—starting today?
