- Lesson: life is fragile live with eternity in mind

3. Jesus on Legacy (John 12:24)

- Kernel of wheat metaphor
- Jesus' greatest impact came through His death & resurrection
- True legacy: faith that multiplies in others

4. David's Charge to Solomon (1 Kings 2:1–3)

- "Be strong, act like a man, and obey the Lord"
- Biblical manhood defined by faith and obedience, not worldly standards
- Parents (and mentors) must speak faith into the next generation

5. Ways to Leave a Spiritual Legacy

- Tell your faith stories (don't keep silent like the farmer's testimony)
- Write it down (letters of faith, like confirmation letters from parents)
- Use finances for eternal impact (Robert Morris story of blessing a family)
- Use your talents (Ruth the Sunday school teacher's lifelong influence)

6. The Focus: Only Jesus

- Casting Crowns' reminder: it's not about being remembered, but pointing to Christ
- Quote: "Our fear should not be of failure, but of succeeding at what doesn't matter."
- Call to action: live a life that points others to eternal hope in Christ

- 4. If your life ended today, what would people say about your faith? s
- 5. Why do you think we so often hesitate to tell others our personal faith stories?
- 6. Read 1st Kings 2:3-4. King David told Solomon that to "be a man" meant to trust and obey God. How does that challenge today's cultural definitions of success or manhood/womanhood?
- 7. What practical step could you take this week to pass on your faith (e.g., writing a letter, sharing a story, intentional generosity)?
- 8. How does the idea of "Only Jesus" change the way you think about leaving a legacy?
