<u>Discussion & Reflection Questions</u> Brave Unknown - Week 5 - Pentecost 14C - 14th September 2025

Read: Luke 15:1-10

Now all the tax-collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to him. * And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, 'This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them.' * So he told them this parable: * 'Which one of you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? * When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders and rejoices. * And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbours, saying to them, "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost." * Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who need no repentance. * 'Or what woman having ten silver coins, if she loses one of them, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? * When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, "Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost." * Just so, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents.' hear listen!'

Discussion Questions

- 1. Read the balance of the rest of chapter 15 (Parable of the Prodigal Son)
- 2. Why do the Pharisees & scribes object to Jesus "welcoming sinners and eating with them"? How does this shape the meaning of the parable?
- 3. What are the similarities & differences between the story of the lost sheep & the lost coin?
- 4. Both stories end with communal celebration. What does this suggest about the role of the community of faith when someone "repents" or is restored?
- 5. What do you understand joy to mean in this context?
- 6. How do these stories help us understand repentance?
- 7. What does Jesus teach say about religious entitlement?
- 8. How does this passage relate to our theme "brave unknown"?
