



### When Jesus Loves You

The story from Mark 10:17-31 begins with promise. Mark introduces the rich young ruler as a first-rate, pious seeker who has enough honesty to admit that he needs something more than he has been able to get. Although he is called "young" and "rich," he is incomplete and he seeks to satisfy the hunger he cannot name. He comes to Jesus to ask what he is lacking, what he must do to be whole.

"Jesus, looking at him, loved him," records Mark. We expect that Jesus will give him what he wants. It is our hope that Jesus loves him - and us - just as we are.

Jesus says to the young man that if he wants treasure in heaven he must liquidate his assets here on earth, give the proceeds to charity, and follow him. Is it loving to ask this young man to do the most difficult thing imaginable? "Jesus loves me this I know, for the Bible tells me so." These words are not so warm and confirming as we think. Only Mark records the words, Jesus "loved him." Matthew and Luke seem to have found them as awkward as we do.

The rich young ruler can't believe it. He walks away sorrowful. He asks a simple question and gets an answer that threatens him to the core. He came looking for help, a little

something more, and Jesus asks for nothing less than conversion a complete change of direction.

Jesus' instruction also comes as a great surprise to the disciples. They know the rabbinic taching that wealth, though it demands good stewardship, is a sign of God's blessing and makes easier the virtuous life that God wants. Jesus simply says, "How hard it is to enter the kingdom of God!" (Mark 10:24). The disciples and we are amazed, bewildered, and troubled by his words (as they often are in Mark).

Perhaps sensing their bewilderment and ours, Jesus offers a short explanation of his teaching on riches. "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God," says Jesus (Mark 10:25). The eye of the needle is a city gate. Some say that a camel could pass through, but only with difficulty.

The disciples' question, "Then who can be saved?" (Mark 10:26) is a burning, personal question; an anxious inquiry. Perhaps they want Jesus to see that this time he has gone too far. If Jesus really loves this rich man, and the disciples, and us, won't he be less judgmental, more appreciative of where we are coming from, more accepting of who we are?


Jesus answers: "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible (Mark 10:27)." Mark introduces us to the big picture he is trying to paint in his Gospel. His is, from beginning to end, the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. He isn't writing a first-century self-help book. He isn't interested in the selfactualization of the rich man. The context of this story is the larger story of the good news of Jesus Christ. All of our claims to self-sufficiency and radical independence are put aside in the death of Jesus for the sin of the world.

Jesus Christ loves the rich man, he loves the disciples, and he loves us. He is on the way to the cross for all of us. He will perform with his life what we cannot do for ourselves. For we all walk away at the demand of righteousness, at the call to covenant faithfulness.

The good news of liberation and salvation is, while we turn away, God turns toward us. God loves us as we are, but too much to leave us as we are. In the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God comes among us and does the impossible.

One of the most hopeful moments in our common life as God's people is the Lord's table. At this table rich young men and women, accomplished leaders and Captains of industry, little children and those of humble means all arrive with nothing. We all come with empty hands to receive from the Lord what we do not have to give ourselves: the body and blood of Christ. Here we can be hopeful that God had done what is impossible for us. Here we are all the grateful humble recipients of what only God can give. Here we can be sure that Jesus, looking upon us, loves us.
