The Lord's Supper at St. Paul

God's Word teaches the real presence of Christ's body and blood invisibly in, with, and under the bread and wine for the forgiveness of sins. We take seriously the spiritual care of those who commune at our altar. It is important that every partaker must be a baptized Christian and come with repentant faith. The Word of God states that no one offend against Christ and His Word by denying His true presence and its promise and seal of forgiveness. Because those who eat and drink our Lord's body and blood unworthily do so to their great harm (see 1 Cor. 11:27-29), and because Holy Communion is a confession of what is taught and believed at this altar (1 Cor. 11:26), any who are not yet instructed, in doubt, or who hold a confession (beliefs) differing from that of this congregation (that is, belong to another church body or denomination) and yet desire to receive the sacrament, should first speak with the pastor before communing. As a courtesy, guests from sister congregations of the LCMS or from congregations of the American Association of Lutheran Churches (AALC) are also asked to introduce themselves to the pastor before communing.

As We Gather



Entering the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem, the traditional site of the birth of Jesus, is one of the most memorable experiences for any Christian pilgrim visiting the Holy Land. First constructed at the commission of Roman Emperor Constantine the Great in AD 326, the church is on the oldest site continually used for worship by Christians anywhere in the world. Although the basilica initially had a grand arched entrance in its first

thousand years, it came into a period of disuse and neglect after the conquest of the Holy Land by the Islamic rulers of the Ottoman Empire in AD 1516. In an effort to prevent people from entering the church with horses and cattle, the Christians caring for the building at that time walled up the main entrance, leaving only a very small door. This opening has ever since been known as the "Door of Humility." It makes a most fitting way for those who come to worship at the site of the manger of the Christ Child to enter that sacred space. Where we worship here and now is also a sacred space. Although we may not have needed to bow down to enter the front door today, bringing an attitude of humility to our worship of our gracious Lord is truly fitting for us.

Summer Saint Celebration Sequence Johann Rist, hymn writer, and all "unsung" saints According to Christian tradition that goes back to the earliest days of the church, the proper day for remembering a saint was on the day that the person died—if that day was known. Selecting the date of a Christian's death as the day of remembrance was a celebration of their birth into the fullness of eternal life and a rejoicing at their heavenly homecoming. Among the multitude of Christians whose death and rebirth day was August 31 is Lutheran hymn writer Johann Rist, who died on this day in Wedel, Germany, in 1667. One of the most prolific Lutheran hymn writers of the seventeenth century, Pastor Rist authored more than 650 hymns during his lifetime. Included among his compositions are the classic Christmas chorale "Break Forth, O Beauteous Heavenly Light" (LSB 378) and stanzas of the Holy Week hymn "O Darkest Woe" (LSB 448). His texts for Holy Communion include "Lord Jesus Christ, Life-Giving Bread" (LSB 625) and "O Living Bread from Heaven" (LSB 642). Although he was named Poet Laureate of the Empire and was invited to serve in large and prestigious congregations, Pastor Rist remained in his small German village, serving as both pastor and physician to the townspeople. In a typically humble statement about his hymn writing, Johann Rist stated "The sweet cross has squeezed many hymns out of me." Around the world the treasure of sacred texts he left as his legacy continues to be a blessing.

Although there are many saintly people remembered by name on the church's list of feasts and festivals and roster of commemorations, there are countless men and women of faith whose names have been lost through the centuries. The text writers or the composers of many of the hymns we love to sing are unknown. We do not know who are the gifted craftsmen and women responsible for much of the beautiful Christ-honoring sacred art and architecture of ages gone by. Yet their work for the Lord certainly merits our respect and appreciation. One of the more recent hymns of the church helps us honor those saints who are not known by name. Written by American clergyman Carl Daw in the twentieth century, the text reminds us that the courts of heaven are filled with saints who may not have been recognized fully during their earthly lives but who joyfully find fulfillment and lasting joy in the presence of the risen Christ, the host of the eternal feast. Together we join in the three stanzas of "We Sing for All the Unsung Saints."

Hymn Introduction

Of the four uses of the word *summer* in the hymns of *Lutheran Service Book*, perhaps the most memorable is its usage as the first word of the second stanza of "Great Is Thy Faithfulness." Text writer Thomas Chisholm lists the seasons of the year as "summer and winter and springtime and harvest" as annual witnesses to and reminders of the faithfulness, mercy, and love of God. Written in 1923 by Chisholm, who was serving as pastor of a Methodist church in Kansas at the time, the hymn gained worldwide acclaim after being introduced to audiences first in Great Britain in 1954 and subsequently in the United States by singer George Beverly Shea, who was associated with the Billy Graham crusades. The hymn reflects the words of the psalmist as he exclaims to the Lord, "With my mouth I will make known Your faithfulness to all generations" (Psalm 89:1). In summer and in all seasons of the year, it is our joy to sing of the blessings we know as God's faithful people in Christ Jesus.
