CORRECTION AND WELCOME!

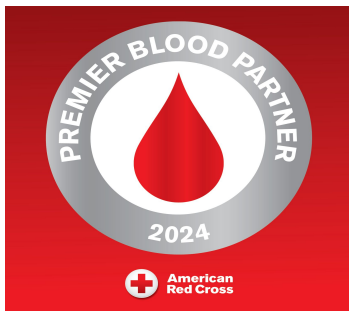

The Armor of God

In Ephesians 6:10-20 the author writes about being strong in our faith. We are told to “put on the whole armor of God” (v.11) in order to defend ourselves from enemies.

Instead of being military hardware, we are invited to wear some clothing that at first might have seemed to the Ephesians as a joke. Tie truth around your waist? Wear the gospel of peace as shoes? These things seem strange.

Maybe the author of the letter (we’re not sure who it really was) wanted to make a different kind of point. Perhaps they were trying to say something like “you know, there is a lot of fighting in our world, and there are a lot of dangerous and difficult forces out there. The way to tackle them all is not to try to fight them the way we’ve fought for years, but in a different way – Jesus’ way.”

In verses 14-17 the author lists some kinds of “armor” we can put on. What might that look like?

Using a marker, draw a huge outline of a person – make it as big as you can. One option is to take a piece of butcher paper, or

tape several small sheets together. Then, lie down on the paper, with your legs slightly apart and hands away from your body. Invite someone to draw a rough outline of your shape with a marker.

Illustrate some of the things in the Bible passage – you can write down words that describe the actions, or draw pictures, or cut out pictures from magazines and glue them on.

- A **belt** of truth. We use a belt to hold up our pants or skirt and for holding things together. Think about truth. When we are honest in what we think and say and believe, it holds together. Use your imagination to think of ways to express holding the world together.
- A **breastplate** of righteousness. This armor protects our heart and other organs from being pierced by arrows. Instead of hardening our heart out of fear the author suggests something else. How can we defend ourselves from other’s hurts?
- **Shoes** of peace. How can you share God’s peace in our world?

What images might you use? How can we counter the world’s hurt by telling others about God’s unconditional love and grace?

- A **shield** of faith. What do we carry out in front? What do others see first about us? Draw a large shield and add words or pictures that speak of our faith in God.
- A **helmet** of salvation. Salvation is that sense of knowing that God loves us, no matter what. What kind of hat would tell others that we know and love God? Draw it.
- A **sword** of God’s word. Instead of a sword that we can poke, stab, and hurt people with, we are invited to tell the message of God’s love. Draw some wonderful words of love and reassurance in a big balloon (like a cartoon) coming out of the mouth.

Sept. 4 is the Feast of Moses the Lawgiver

“Now go! I am sending you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt.”

—Exodus 3:10

Moses is a profoundly prominent character within the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Bible). He was born to a Hebrew family during the horrible years of harsh slavery in Egypt. Moses was rescued from a murderous death as an infant by Pharaoh's daughter, who found him in a basket in the Nile River and later adopted him. When Moses grew up, he embraced his Hebrew people; he once even killed an Egyptian for having abused a Hebrew. However, when he realized his crime had been observed, he fled to Midian, where he ultimately married into a Midianite family and settled down.

Many years later, Moses encountered an unusual fire-engulfed bush on Mount Horeb (also known as Mount Sinai). As he approached the remarkable shrub, he heard God's voice speak from the flames. God explained that he wanted Moses to lead the Hebrews away from their oppressive slavery in Egypt.

Although reluctant at first, Moses with the help of his brother Aaron began the process of rescuing the Israelites from their cruel lives. Initially, Pharaoh scorned the brothers and refused to release the Hebrew slaves. Over time, however, with the miraculous help of God, some terrifying plagues forced the Egyptian ruler to finally *order* the Hebrews to leave Egypt. More miracles abounded as Moses led the group toward its new homeland.

When the group arrived at Mount Sinai (Mount Horeb), Moses went back up the mountain, whereupon God presented to him the Ten Commandments.

Sadly, the Israelite people often doubted the power of God, and so Moses had to work

hard to keep his people focused and trusting. The Israelites lacked trust in God when it came time to take over the Promised Land. God punished them by forcing them to wander the desert for forty years.

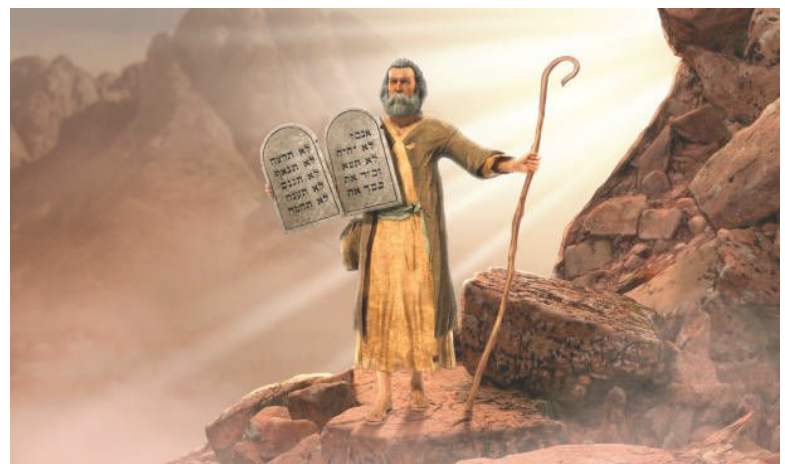
Moses continued to show the way during these forty long years, and finally, when the long banishment was about to end, God guided Moses to Mount Nebo in Moab, where he was able to view the longed-for Promised Land. Soon afterward, the great prophet-leader died in Moab, leaving Joshua to bring the people into their new homeland.

The memorial of St. Moses is Sept. 4. This great Old Testament saint offers plenty to ponder, contemplate, and study within the pages of scripture. Below are just nine passages. Consider spending a bit of time each day with St. Moses. Imagine yourself at each scene, think of how you might react if you were really there. If inspired, read the footnotes and jot down a few thoughts.

- Day 3) Exodus 7:1–24
- Day 4) Exodus 12:1–36
- Day 5) Exodus 14:10–22

Something for School

Crayons, pencils and pencil sharpeners, markers, writing pads or paper, coloring and picture books, erasers, scissors, glue sticks, and colored pencils.

September 29 – October 6:

Something for personal hygiene

Washcloths, toothbrush, combs, hair barrettes, pony tail ties, and headbands.

Please note - Bar soap and toothpaste are no longer permitted

October 6 – 13:

Something for boys

Dear Donors and supporters of Operation Christmas Child,

Here we are in mid-August already. It is time to start thinking about Operation Christmas Child and National Collection Week. We want to thank each and every one of you for your generous, unwavering support of the ministry. We have had the privilege of serving with you, many since 2012. Many of you have either donated shoeboxes or helped us with the Drop-Off Center at the Caro Church of the Nazarene. Together we have received and processed 15,808 shoe box gifts that have been distributed around the world. God helped us put together a team of volunteers from many different churches and groups. He molded us into a well-oiled machine of willing servants. God's good news of Jesus Christ has been shared with children and families around the world and we are grateful for the opportunity to serve him with you in this way. National Collection Week this year is November 18-25, 2024.

After much prayer and struggle, we have been led to the decision that it is time to step down as Drop-Off Center Coordinators for the Caro Drop-Off Center. Many factors have contributed to this decision. First is that our physical ability to work at the level necessary to do a good job as Drop-Off Coordinators is no longer there. The second factor in this decision is that we have come to realize we can no longer care for our large home and garden properly. We are in the process of downsizing and will soon move into a small apartment and sell our home of more than 56 years.

Now, for the good news. We are happy to announce the Caro Drop-Off Center will be replaced by a Drop-Off Center in Richville under the stewardship of Sara and Keith Knea. Keith is a Pastor at St. Michael's Lutheran Church and Sara is a teacher. At their previous congregation in Indiana, they were heavily involved in Operation Christmas Child, serving as Drop Off Center Coordinators, Central Drop Off Leaders, and Logistics. They are very well qualified to take the helm. The Drop Off Center in Richville will be located in the building adjacent to St. Michael's Lutheran School, 9444 W. Saginaw Rd. Richville, Michigan. Simply go to the OCC website and click on the tab "Drop-Off Center Locator" to find the address and times the drop-off center will be open. Contact information for Sara Knea is 920-285-9720 and her eMail is sjwknea@yahoo.com. We encourage you to keep packing your shoeboxes and support the Richville Drop-Off in the same way you have supported the Caro Drop-Off Center.

We thank and praise God for the 12 years the Caro Drop-Off Center was housed at the Caro Church of the Nazarene. We are eternally grateful to Pastor McNett and the congregation for being our gracious hosts for all of those years.


