Rector Report for the St. Mark's Annual Meeting, January 25, 2026

They've never been caught, and it's now thirty-five years since two men dressed as Boston police officers walked in to the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum and walked out with 13 works of art, including "The Storm on the Sea of Galilee" or "The Storm" for short – one of Rembrandt's great masterpieces and his only known seascape. Isabella Stewart Gardner, known as "Mrs. Jack" was a devout Episcopalian and colorful figure in late 19th century Boston society, who purchased "The Storm" in 1898 for \$6,000. If it were to be brought to auction today, it is estimated that someone would pay up to \$250 million or perhaps more. Although it is the most famous missing painting in the world, the image itself is fortunately not lost and appears on the cover of the St. Mark's annual report for 2025. True to the Scripture verses in Matthew, Mark and Luke, Rembrandt depicts Jesus as calm and serene in the midst of pure chaos, crashing waves, and expressions of human anguish and terror. A master of light and dark, Rembrandt's storm combines charcoal-grey water and clouds with patches of blue sky with a monster-like wave thrusting against the bow. We can't take our eyes off the intense drama in the wet-looking depth and vibrancy of the oil paint. Beyond the art is the theme that hits us with its truth and relevance – a world that is chaotic, dangerous, out of control...with Jesus at the center. For Christians, this is our Gospel. In the storms of life, Jesus is with us, our guide, our bearing and our truth.

In today's Gospel reading from Matthew, the tableau for the entire Gospel is laid out. First, the background is named: John the Baptist has been shut up in jail by Herod who represents a system of corruption and injustice. Jesus meanwhile makes his home in a fishing village called Capernaum along the Sea of Galilee. He immediately recruits four followers and begins going from town to town, teaching and preaching about the kingdom of God. In the middle of this passage, he shouts out to two fishermen as they casting their net: "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Their response is immediate. Peter and Andrew drop their nets, jump out of their boats and go with Jesus. Jesus does not order or command them to follow him. What he says is, "do this, and this will happen." Like fish, they take the bait. For us who are either reading or listening to this, this is bait for us as well. The "follow me" that Jesus says to us doesn't mean that we should jump out of our boats and leave whatever nets we are casting - but it urges us to "read on" or "keep listening." The Gospel itself is a kind of net that captures our attention. Matthew, like a fisherman, wants to catch you and me because as Jesus says, "I will make you fish for people." Jesus is saying to Peter and Andrew and to us, that he will teach us how to fish - to change people's lives. Unlike fish caught for eating, the Gospel brings us to a new way of living. As a fish caught in a net is brought out of the water, a person caught in the Gospel comes up from the water of baptism into a new reality. Through the Gospel, Matthew has Jesus teaching us, making us into fishermen for people.

This community we call St. Mark's fishes for people. We are a net, and like a fishing net for all kinds of fish, we are net for all kinds of people, young and old, those who speak different languages, single, married, divorced, widowed, straight, gay, trans, those who have ADD, autism, bipolar or mental health challenges, bank accounts flush and bank accounts empty. From personal experience, I can say that fishing is hard work, both for actual fish and people. Fishing takes patience, perseverance, and commitment. We wait for things we can't see. Fishing for people, like fishing on the Sea of Galilee, takes a team, and all of us are invited to be part of the St. Mark's team. Today's churches deploy different kinds of nets. There are nets of entertainment, where people are drawn in with stages, lights, special effects, guitars and drums, and with messages of affirmation, self-improvement and success. There are also other kinds of nets that are made with barbs of guilt and shame, laced with threats of divine and eternal punishment. The St. Mark's net is neither of these, made of the material of the original call to fish for people for the kingdom of God. These threads are worship, service and learning that turn us into fishermen. We are a net of music and art, support groups, schools and advocacy for our community and its residents. The St. Mark's fishermen include a special team called the vestry. There are a group of twelve plus two additional helpers called wardens who steer the ship's financial and strategic direction. Today, seven new vestry members are beginning their three-year terms. They are: **Chip Bennett, Wilson Sanchez, Jamie Hommowun, Juanita Jimenez, Wyatt Steele, Peter Fellowes, Rita Colorito and Nola Gross.** Their pictures and bios are in the annual report. Please pray for them for wisdom and patience and all the needed skills of a fisherman. There are

also vestry members who are concluding their terms. Those are: **Cam Gowans, Ana Gutierrez, Tim Kocher, Marcy Troy, Maria Torres, Patti King and Kai Hill.** Pray for them and be sure to thank them. In fishing for the vestry team and any other team, whether it is the choir, altar ministry, outreach committee or office volunteers, there are four categories of responses: A good yes, a good no, a bad no and a bad yes. Let me explain. A good yes is a yes that is carefully considered and is made with a sense of right fit, timing, curiosity and a willingness to learn and take some risk. A good no is a no that is also carefully considered and made with a sense of not the right time, not the right fit with openness to other opportunities at another time. A bad no is a no that is made in haste without careful consideration or out of fear or apathy. And the fourth is a bad yes, which is saying yes to something isn't a good fit, that isn't well considered, done out of obligation and that will likely cause the person to feel resentful or guilty and therefore not engage in the work and commitment required. I feel confident that each of our incoming vestry members has given a "good yes."

On the annual meeting Sunday, we come out of our trenches and climb the mountain for a panoramic view of where we have been and where we are going. This is following the example of Jesus who will take us to a mountain for a panoramic view of the kingdom of God. From our cold but clear St. Mark's summit, we can see quite far. With my own eyes, I can see a fishing landscape going back to 2006. Some of you can see that too if not beyond. Here are some of the things I can see:

2006: A group of adults and youth travels from St. Mark's to San Marcos in El Nigromante, Mexico for the beginning of a lasting companion relationship.

2007: There are two thousand pumpkins on the front lawn. The St. Mark's Pumpkin Patch nets \$5,900 for DuPagePads.

2008: A Vision Statement reads, "Rooted in Baptism. Growing in Faith. Branching into the World." The St. Mark's Parents' Day Out program expands to 5 days a week.

2009: A celebration of the 100th anniversary of St. Mark's becoming a parish.

2010: In the depths of the Great Recession, "The Second 100 Years Campaign" secures \$795,000 in pledges with an additional \$600,000 in matching funds from the Bishop and Trustees of the Diocese of Chicago to pay down a significant portion of debt; the St. Mark's Preschool opens with nine students and three teachers.

2011: A 1 pm Sunday service in Spanish begins; PDO offers a summer session; Miguel Briones is ordained to the diaconate.

2012: St. Mark's becomes a dues-paying member of DuPage United; there is a celebration for Charles Snider and his 25th anniversary as organist and choirmaster.

2013: An art exhibit called Icons in Transformation brings 3,000 visitors to St. Mark's; ten youth and adults travel to Martin, Kentucky for the Appalachian Service Project (ASP).

2014: The year ends with the first balanced budget in ten years; the Rev. Clint Moore joins the preaching rotation.

2015: The Lifting Heat and Voice Campaign raises \$200,000 needed to complete the Walker Pipe Organ, purchase pianos and celebrate with a concert series of renowned organists.

2016: 400 people come through the St. Mark's library for "Ashes to Go" on Ash Wednesday.

2017: The Rev. Catherine Phillips renovates a room at St. Mark's for spiritual direction meetings; total St. Mark's operations exceed \$1 million with a balanced budget.

2018: Hundreds of mum plants appear on the front lawn; the sale raises \$3,000 for the Walk-in Ministry; The Columbarium is expanded with an additional 120 niches.

2019: A series of conversations and listening results in the launch of CREO DuPage with 24 students enrolled; a team of dentists and hygienists travels to El Nigromante, Mexico for a dental clinic that provides cleaning and exams to over 100 children and adults.

2020: The Covid pandemic shifts worship and community life to Zoom and online meetings; St. Mark's Preschool operates with outdoor classroom spaces; A Black Lives Matter sign is placed in front of the library windows facing Main Street; over 40 participants complete the Sacred Ground program, leading to an on-going St. Mark's Sacred Ground program.

2021: Hybrid worship begins with in-person and Zoom options; in-person attendance increases gradually; the rectory mortgage paid off.

2022: A windstorm topples the copper-clad spire; the vestry votes to rebuild; the vestry approves a Land Acknowledgement statement and prayers for reconciliation are added to the weekly prayers of the people.

2023: St. Mark's begins sponsoring Cub Scout Troop 158.

2024: A "rapid response" team of volunteers delivers coats, hats and mittens to asylum seekers passing through Glen Ellyn; Lehman Parlor is remodeled in memory of David Fletcher.

2025: The Grow & Renew Capital Campaign exceeds a "stretch" goal of \$850,000; the long-planned for narthex renovation goes to next step with a signed contract with architects; as storms swirl around us, St. Mark's recommits to being a space of sanctuary and respect with training and vigilance.

2026: The bank mortgage originating in 2002 is paid off on January 16.

This mountain view also offers us a moment to imagine what lies ahead in 2026 and beyond. The vestry has worked on identifying mending and expanding our net in these ways:

Re-affirm the Vision Statement for St. Mark's: Developed in 2009, the vision statement for St. Mark's is "Rooted in Baptism. Growing in Faith. Branching out into the World." We will make this claim more visible and related to what St. Mark's is today. The short summary of the vision statement is:

St. Mark's is a vibrant, growing, inclusive community rooted in our shared baptismal covenant and secure in the promise that baptism marks us as Christ's own forever. Respecting the dignity of all people, we welcome all, embrace differences, foster creativity, and nurture the unique gifts of each person. We join together in worship drawing on our ancient liturgical traditions enriched by newer expressions. We come together to learn and grow in our faith, welcoming questions, inviting dialogue, and forming the whole person in Christ. We joyfully carry our faith into the world, sharing Christ's love through our actions towards each other, our community, the Diocese of Chicago, and the world. We worship, learn, and serve, proclaiming our commitment to understand and follow Christ's challenging Gospel.

Strengthen our companion relationship with San Marcos in El Nigromante, Mexico: Beginning in 2006, a group of youth and adults made a yearly trip to Mexico to visit our companion church, San Marcos, in a small town called El Nigromante, in the Mexican state of Veracruz. These visits included overnight stays in the homes of residents of El Nigromante, conducting a Vacation Bible School for children in the town, hosting a community dinner and helping with various projects such as painting the church interior and roof. In December, 2019, the trip was a dental "mission" with two dentists and three hygienists who were able to provide dental care to over 100 adults and children. Because of the pandemic, the next trip did not take place until January, 2024. The question now

is how to continue and renew our relationship with San Marcos in 2026 – with another dental mission trip, or something else.

Establish a ten-year plan for the St. Mark's Buildings and Grounds: St. Mark's has a large facility composed of group of connected structures built between the 1920s and 2000s; a rectory; two parking lots, a columbarium garden and series of lawns and gardens. Establishing a ten-year plan for maintenance and upgrades is a priority for 2026, including:

- Narthex renovation (per Grow and Renew Capital Campaign)
- Interior painting of all spaces
- Replacing tables and chairs in Mahon Hall and classrooms
- Replacing the sound system in the sanctuary
- Maintaining parking lots and signs
- Replacing light bulbs as needed for efficiency
- Improving lighting in the Mahon Hall basement
- Replacing carpet in the sanctuary and Mahon Hall hallway

Strengthen multi-cultural connections in the St. Mark's community: From its inception, the 1 pm Sunday worship service in Spanish was meant not to create a separate “Spanish church” but to be part of one church, one St. Mark's, a St. Mark's that has services in both English and Spanish. It was a bold experiment that has changed St. Mark's over the past 14 years. Nearly one-third of St. Mark's households speak Spanish. This healthy blend of English and Spanish under one mission and vision is unique, not just for Episcopal churches but for churches in general. However, the appearance and reality of separation between two cultures exists. Most people who attend the 1 pm service are Hispanic. There some Spanish-speakers attending the 8:30 and 10:30 am Sunday services. Currently there are services and events that are intentionally bilingual, including: Christmas Eve 8 pm; bilingual Advent Lessons and Carols; Ash Wednesday bilingual service; Maundy Thursday and Good Friday bilingual worship; bilingual confirmation services; the summer outdoor worship service at Lake Ellyn; the Cinco de Mayo fundraiser (last held in May, 2023); pumpkin unloading has been a time when the community comes together. There are opportunities to experiment with ways to build more connections and community between Anglos and Hispanics: additional combined Sunday worship services, with the time of the service at 11 am, keeping the 8:30 am service at its regular time, such as the first Sunday in October, followed by pumpkin unloading and the first Sunday of Lent; potluck dinners with both Anglo and Hispanic dishes; recitals with Anglo and Hispanic youth; intro to Spanish classes with participation from Hispanic members; ESL classes with participation from Anglo members.

Other areas of our net to work on include expanding our **youth programming** by offering Youth Nights every Wednesday, more participation in the ASP trip and other service projects. We also have an opportunity to restart a children's choir and create stronger bonds with our **PDO, Preschool and Sunday School** programs.

Standing at this summit today with all of you, I give thanks to God for God's faithfulness and to all of you as together we answer the call to be “made into fishers for people” with its challenges, risks, failures, successes, joys and wonder, with Jesus in the midst of us through calm and storms. This annual report offers an in-depth look at the comprehensive “net” of our community and the work of casting, mending and pulling it that never ends. It is truly inspiring to see the treasures of time, talent and money that are invested in this community. The weave of our net is strong as we have now paid off our 20+ year bank loan and have a plan in place to be completely debt free and pay off our obligation to the Bishop and Trustees of the Diocese of Chicago by 2030.

This coming February will mark 20 years since Cecilia and I arrived at St. Mark's along with our three children Lydia, Frances and Geo. I can't imagine the journey without them and I am continually thankful for their love and unconditional support. As we take in the view of 20 years, I am humbled and grateful for the work we have done and the myriad blessings God has bestowed on us. Like Peter and Andrew, James and John, Martha and Mary, we are called to be made into fishers for people, and we can expect that our being made and remade will continue without end. Yours in Christ,

Senior Warden's Report for Annual Meeting

As I reflect on 2025, I am deeply grateful for the faithfulness, generosity, and resilience of the people of St. Mark's. It has been a joy to work with George Smith, Josh O'Shea, and the Vestry team! This year has been marked by both careful stewardship and a growing sense of what God is calling us to do as we come together. One of the most encouraging trends this year has been the Vestry's intentional movement from short-term, moment-to-moment management toward longer-range, mission-driven planning.

The Vestry's work this year was shaped by prayerful listening and intentional focus. We began the year mindful of the extraordinary energy and commitment required by the capital campaign, and we end the year encouraged by the fruits of that labor.

Thanks to the leadership of the campaign committee and the considerable generosity of parishioners, we surpassed our stretch goal and laid a strong foundation for the next phase of improvements to our building—particularly the redevelopment of the narthex. Important work remains ahead as we refine designs, manage costs, and prepare for construction.

Finance & Stewardship

Financially, 2025 required attentiveness and flexibility. Early in the year we benefited from strong pledge income, followed by the more familiar rhythms of seasonal fluctuation. The Finance Committee, Treasurer, Internal Audit Team, and Vestry worked collaboratively to keep a clear view of both short-term realities and long-term health. I am especially thankful for the thoughtful evolution of our financial reporting toward a more forward-looking model, and for the internal audit undertaken this summer as part of our commitment to transparency and good governance.

Vestry Focus Issues

The Vestry Retreat early in the year helped ground our work spiritually and relationally. Through shared prayer, reflection, and practical tools for understanding how we work together, we identified strategic focus areas that will guide our efforts beyond a single year or vestry term. These areas—including children's & youth ministry, member engagement, mental & spiritual health, accessibility, welcome & hospitality, social justice, buildings & grounds, capital campaign, giving, financial planning, and music ministry—reflect a shared desire to strengthen the heart of parish life and to invite others more fully into it.

Welcome

Much of our discussion this year centered on welcome. We considered how we greet newcomers, how we support families and children, and how we communicate who we are as a church. From Holy Week and Easter hospitality to renewed energy around children's ministry and high school outreach, the Vestry has been asking not only what we do, but why we do it. These conversations are ongoing and I am greatly encouraged by the creativity and care with which they are unfolding.

Building Community

We are also mindful that we do not exist in isolation. Diocesan strategic planning conversations, changing cultural realities, and concerns within our wider community continue to shape our community. In moments of uncertainty, St. Mark's has been committed to calm preparation, compassion, and justice—making our church a place of safety, welcome, and faithfulness for all who enter our doors.

Giving Thanks

The work of the Vestry would not be possible without the steady leadership of our Rector, Fr. George. His pastoral presence, vision, and deep love for this parish are evident in countless ways. I am grateful as well for my fellow Vestry members, whose time, wisdom, humor, and prayerful engagement make this work both meaningful and joyful. Serving alongside such dedicated people has been a gift.

Looking Ahead

As we look toward 2026, we do so with trust that God is at work among us—sometimes quietly, sometimes boldly—always faithfully. As we work through the development of our children's ministry, the implementation of the internal audit recommendations, the capital campaign distributions and effectuation, expansion of support for our staff and church & community members, addressing the issues in our community thank you for your prayers, your generosity, and your participation in the life of St. Mark's. It is an honor to serve this parish as Senior Warden.

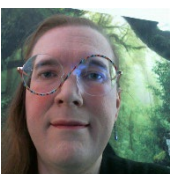

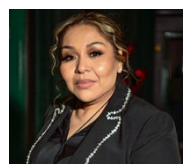

St. Mark's Endowment Fund

In November 2017, the Vestry of St. Mark's voted to establish the Endowment Fund of St. Mark's Episcopal Church ("Trust") to "benefit St. Mark's for so long as it operates as an Episcopal church for the benefit of Glen Ellyn and its surrounding communities." The Trust is intended to exist in perpetuity and there is an expectation that the Trust will grow over time through parishioners' donations. Under the Trust Instrument, three Trustees are appointed by the Vestry to fill staggered three-year terms. The Trustees appointed by the Vestry for 2022 were Chip Johnson, Leo Lanzillo and Karen Hill and Jim Treleven.

The Trust documents establish a perpetual trust fund and allow the addition of "designated purpose funds" (including those heretofore made to St. Mark's). The assets of all designated purpose funds and other Trust assets shall be commingled and invested by the Trustees. Combining our various investment accounts in this way allows the Trustees to achieve better investment results and simplifies management and record keeping. The Trustees have selected the Common Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, commonly known as the "Diocesan Foundation" to hold the Trust funds. Founded in 1952, the Diocesan Foundation is a collective investment vehicle currently serving more than 35 parish and group investors. More information is available on the diocesan website <https://episcopalchicago.org/for-clergy-and-parish-leaders/budget-and-management/diocesan-foundation-common-fund/>.

St. Mark's established four fund accounts with the Diocesan Foundation. The General Endowment Fund is a perpetual trust account. The Lewis Trust Fund, the Carey Music Fund, and the Augusta Pahnke and Mary Peck Fund are designated purpose funds.

The annual distributable amount for the General Endowment Fund is 4% to 5% of the fund balance at the end of the prior year. Those and can be used for: (1) "the purchase, construction, installation, and repair of its capital improvements, (2) outreach and missionary projects and (3) special one-time projects (and not for usual and ordinary expenses and maintenance of St. Mark's)." In 2025, we deposited \$10,000 of Columbarium funds into this endowment fund.

The Carey Music Fund distributes 90% of its annual income to the St. Mark's Treasurer with the designated purpose of providing regular tuning, servicing, and maintenance of St. Mark's Episcopal Church's pianos (including replacement as necessary) and the Walker Organ.

The distributable amount of the Pahnke/Peck Fund is also 90% of income received during the year. The amount can be used for musical education, training and professional education of the Director of Music and other musicians at St. Mark's.

We normally request/receive these \$ in the following year, however we did not request in 2025 for the 2024 distributions. In 2Q, 2026, we will receive \$ for both 2024 & 2025 from the Carey, Pahnke/Peck and General fund. The quarterly distributable amount of the Lewis Trust Fund is the income received during the year, but not capital gains. The applicable income is paid quarterly to the St. Mark's Treasurer directly by the Diocesan Foundation and can be used only for "the purchase, construction and installation of its capital improvements (and not for usual and ordinary expenses and maintenance of the Church)."

The chart below shows the summary of the church's investment accounts. Any questions about the endowment fund should be addressed to the Trustees.

2025 Giving Campaign

The 2025 Annual Giving Campaign concluded with strong results, reflecting the continued generosity and commitment of our parish community. A total of 96% of pledged contributions were collected, amounting to \$599,512. Parishioners gave faithfully throughout the year, and in close collaboration with the Finance Committee and Vestry, regular pledge reminders were sent to support the fulfillment of commitments. As a result, most pledged dollars were fully realized, and many households participated in pledging for the first time. For those who did not fulfill their pledge in 2025 there is still time to do so, bringing us closer to reaching 100%. In addition to pledged giving, open plate donations totaled \$91,985, further strengthening the parish's financial position for the year. These unrestricted gifts demonstrate the ongoing willingness of parishioners and visitors alike to support the mission and ministries of the church beyond formal pledge commitments.

Looking ahead, the campaign for the 2026 budget has secured \$660,000 in pledge commitments from 272 households. This achievement was made possible through the collaborative efforts of dedicated vestry members and giving campaign volunteers. Grow and Renew: Capital Campaign

The Grow and Renew Campaign kicked off in October of 2024 and concluded in May 2025, with pledges received from 199 households totaling \$863,300 to be realized by the end of 2027. This exceeded our goal of \$675,000 and our challenge goal of \$850,000. The Grow and Renew Campaign's three goals include:

- Growing our Ministries: Retiring our bank loan (\$323,000 balloon payment due in July 2026), to free up \$68,000 annually that can be devoted to our programs and ministries instead of to mortgage payments
- Expanding our Welcome: Renovating our Narthex to make it more welcoming to all, by installing a lift to create access to the office and library level and updating lighting, flooring, and ceilings in the narthex and hallway (architect's preliminary estimate: \$236,000)
- Strengthening our Building: Designating initial capital funding for expensive upcoming maintenance projects including extensive masonry repair and replacement of our boilers.

A estos acontecimientos, San Marcos junto con nuestro rector a tomado muy en serio lo que esto significa a nuestros hermanos que sufren estas medidas antinmigrantes por lo que se avocó a apoyar a nuestra comunidad que está siendo afectada, para ello a llevado a cabo talleres de información como Conoce tus Derechos, Clínicas Legales para familias que necesitan protegerse y prepararse en caso de ser afectados o enfrentan la detención por parte de las autoridades migratorias o un caso de deportación, así como consultas con abogados de emigración como medida de precaución y prevención a esta ola de acontecimientos. San Marcos nuestro Rector y otros miembros del clero así como algunos hermanos laicos de nuestra congregación los cuales están trabajando arduamente en mantener información actualizada colaborando con nuestra Obispa Paula Clark y el comité Santuario de nuestra Diócesis Episcopal de Chicago y así con otras institución del condado de DuPage para mantenerse alerta, bien informado y colaborando con cada una de estas instituciones.

Todas estas medidas no han evitado que miembros de nuestra congregación hispana sean afectadas, actualmente conocemos de por lo menos un miembro de cuatro familias están ahora en centros de detención de ICE. San Marcos está muy de cerca apoyando pastoral y con diferentes recursos.

La comunidad de San Marcos está muy agradecida por la respuesta inmediata a los hermanos en desgracia. Un agradecimiento especial a la Sra. Kim Reed y muchos otros que han respondido al llamado de solidaridad mostrando empatía y amor en las diferentes formas en las que se les ha invitado a participar y apoyar esta causa. Actualmente San Marcos cuenta con un grupo de voluntarios que patrullan cada domingo los alrededores de la iglesia durante la misa de la 1:00 pm y otras celebraciones significantes como la celebración de la Virgen de Guadalupe, las Posadas y otras actividades. Este apoyo se ve reflejado en la muy buena asistencia en cada una de estas celebraciones a pesar de miedo y la preocupación por la que están pasando las familias.

Por otra parte les compartimos un reporte las actividades, Celebraciones y Eventos que se han llevado a cabo:

Celebración del día de los tres Reyes Magos con la tradicional rosca de Reyes, juguetes de regalo para los niños y juegos que integraron a las familias, el apoyo y la participación en estas actividades fue muy significativa.

Además de un rosario, las Apariciones de la Virgen y de la una litúrgica (misa) con música de Mariachi, las Mañanitas a la Virgen y un convivio.

Durante el año 2025 la imagen de la Virgen visito a más de 25 familias en sus hogares en el cual invitaron a familiares y amigos para orar un rosario, este año fue muy significativo para las familias ya que pudieron sentir la presencia pastoral de San Marcos.

Report on Latinx Ministries

St. Mark's Church as a multicultural congregation is facing many challenges, especially the members of the 1:00 p.m. Spanish Mass. The policies and actions of the current administration seek to detain, separate and deport people who do not have legal status in this country. These policies have created a lot of fear and concern for many families across the country and of course for families who are members of our community.

In response to these events, St. Mark's has taken very seriously what this means to our brothers and sisters who suffer these anti-immigrant measures, so we are committed to supporting our community that is being affected. We have offered information workshops, such as Know Your Rights, and Legal Clinics for families who need to protect themselves. Our clergy and lay members are working hard to maintain updated information, collaborating with our Bishop Paula Clark and the Sanctuary committee of our Episcopal Diocese of Chicago and with other institutions in DuPage County to stay alert, well informed and collaborate with each of these institutions.

All of these measures have not prevented members of our Hispanic congregation from being affected. We currently know of at least four families who have members who are now in ICE detention centers. St. Mark's is supporting the families with pastoral care and financial resources.

The community of St. Mark's is very grateful for the immediate response to those in distress. Special thanks to Kim Reed and many others who have answered the call for solidarity by showing empathy and love in the different ways in which they have been invited to participate and support this cause. Currently St. Mark's has a group of volunteers who patrol the surroundings of the church every Sunday during the 1:00 pm mass and other significant celebrations such as the celebration of the Virgin of Guadalupe, the Posadas and other activities. This support is reflected in the very good attendance at each of these celebrations despite the fear and concern that families are going through.

Here are some of the activities, celebrations and events that have been carried out:

- Celebration of the day of the Three Kings with the traditional rosca de Reyes, gift toys for children and games that integrated families, the support and participation in these activities was very significant.
- Meditation on the Stations of the Cross as a devotional and penitential act in which we spiritually unite ourselves to the sufferings of Christ, participating in the liturgical acts proper to the season (Holy Week).
- The interest in formation is a very well marked element in the church of San Marco, proof of this is the great effort made by all the people involved in the formation programs for First Communion and for Confirmation, these programs not only involve children or young people who are preparing to receive these sacraments, they also involve formation for their parents, as a result of this common effort on May 4, 2025 we had the celebration of First Communions, it should be noted that St. Mark's Church hosted the confirmations of April 26, 2025, opening the doors to other churches.
- The great initiative of our music director has managed to continue making our services at 1:00 p.m. more dynamic and participatory, opening space for all those who want to be part of the “Coro de Alabanzas”.
- This year the “Kermes” and the pumpkin festival could not be carried out for the safety of our brothers and sisters of the 1:00 pm mass.
- On December 11th we celebrated the Virgin of Guadalupe with a Festival program in which we had a procession from the corner of Roosevelt Rd down Main St. in which we had the support and participation of more than 10 Anglo brother and sisters. In addition to a rosary, the Apparitions of the Virgin and a liturgical (mass) with Mariachi music, the Mañanitas to the Virgin and a convivio.
- During the 2025 the image of the Virgin visited more than 25 families in their homes in which they invited family and friends to pray a rosary, this year was very significant for families as they could feel the pastoral presence of St. Mark.
- Posadas, piñatas and pastorelas are celebrations that unite the past with the present and motivate us to continue building the future together.

Thank you to the leaders of the “Misa en Español” for all their work and dedication so that all these events could take place.

Youth Ministry Report 2025

Youth from 6th grade through 12 grade participate at St. Mark's by attending our twice-monthly Youth Night, participating in our Confirmation program, helping with Children's ministry, by serving as acolytes, readers, and ushers, and through participation in the Appalachian Service Project (ASP). During Fall 2025, attendance ranged from 7 - 18 young people.

In Fall 2025, we began partnering with the youth programs at First Congregational Church of Glen Ellyn (FCCGE) and First United Methodist Church of Glen Ellyn (FUMGE) and formed *"The Collective"*—*Glen Ellyn churches coming together to give 6th-12th graders a place to grow through faith, friendship, and fun.* During the fall, we gathered at the Congregational Church for a Halloween Party, at the Methodist Church for Sleep Out Saturday and at St. Mark's for a Friendsgiving Celebration. We also offered 2 Saturday night gatherings for Christmas fun and reflection—one for junior high kids at St. Mark's and one for senior highers at FCCGE.

Youth Nights were well attended and finished strong in the first half 2025. We had an overnight at the church in January, did a car wash, learned important lessons about how to integrate our faith into daily life and grew in friendship and connection with each other. The summer was slow for youth nights, but we kicked off again in the fall with lessons focused on Jesus' teaching. We participated in the refugee simulation and partnered with other local youth groups to do some combined events together. We are thankful for the volunteers who make youth nights possible and for our great kids who show up full of energy and wisdom.

A big shout out goes to our team of volunteers: Mary Kay Mutz, Molly Solway, Emily Sexauer, and Cass Echeverria who have given their Wednesday evenings to Youth Night! David Profitt, Youth Minister, continues to plan and lead activities and discussions. Rector George Smith is a frequent supporter and Joyce Fletcher, Ministry Associate, organizes the space, food, and communication.

Of course, the most important element of St. Mark's Youth Ministries are the students themselves who choose to make time to participate in Confirmation, Wednesday Youth Nights, acolyting, ushering, assisting in Sunday School and in the life of the congregation. Junior and senior High kids are choosing to be part of the St Mark's community and that says something about their values and priorities!

So, what are we doing with the opportunity that this environment of connection affords us? Our goal is to listen to the kids and to hear from them what they need. Then we attempt to discern what we can offer to help them grow in community and in faith. We want kids to connect to God and each other—to find ways to have their faith be an encouragement in their daily lives. Often kids are the best teachers, sharing their successes, challenges and life experiences to encourage each other. That kind of faith community is unique. Conversations that may not happen on the sports field, at school or during extracurricular events are happening at St Mark's.

We value being a safe space for everyone. By fostering kids' curiosity and wondering and by welcoming the students' challenges and questions, we hope to create an environment that weaves faith into their lives. We pray that whether they are participating in extracurriculars, competing on the sports field, or learning and interacting at school they can access the values and guidance of their faith. As they do that, they can know that they have adults who care in their corner, cheering them on.

It is a privilege to watch young adults prioritize faith and community. Over 30 young people from our three services were confirmed in April and at least 15-20 will be confirmed in April 2026. Students going through confirmation attend classes, serve the St. Mark's community, and examine their faith.

Additionally, 18 St. Mark's youth and volunteers participated in the Appalachian Service Project last summer, travelling to Kentucky to help local residents repair their homes. Summer 2026 will offer another opportunity for involvement with ASP. Anyone who has completed 8th grade is invited to join the group travelling to Appalachia from June 7 - June 13, 2026.

We are all deeply indebted to the people of our community who choose to walk alongside these kids. We also are thankful to the parents of our young people who support and encourage their faith aspirations, and nurture and guide the students in powerful transformative ways. St Mark's has the honor of partnering with parents to help students live out their faith and we are grateful. Thank you to everyone who has volunteered, prayed, served, welcomed and been there for our students. And thank you to our students for being the awesome, vibrant, intelligent, empathic and kind people that you are—you are a gift to your community.

St. Mark's Forum 2025 (formerly Adult Formation)

St. Mark's Forum (formerly Adult Formation) is open on a drop-in basis to anyone interested in increasing their knowledge and getting to know other church members. We meet each Sunday at 9:30 a.m., which allows participants at both the 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services to attend. No registration or commitment is required. Our current attendance is approximately 20 participants. We recently rebranded to "St. Mark's Forum," reflecting our desire for all ages (including youth) to participate and for all to feel welcome to attend when a topic appeals to them.

Each season a committee gathers to brainstorm topics for the upcoming semester. Around 10 or 15 people attend these brainstorming sessions and offer many ideas to further our learning and discussion. In the Spring of 2025, we addressed a number of topics, ranging from Peacemaking Themes in the OT, Spirituality, Compassion, God as Mother, Getting to know the St. Mark's Walker Organ and more.

During the summer, we read the Gospel reading for each Sunday and discussed the themes contained in each reading.

In Fall 2025, we again had an impressive line-up of presenters on topics such as War and Peace in the Bible, Hinduism, AI, Spiritual Direction, Iconography, Refugees and Immigrants, and the Episcopal Church—both the Chicago Diocese and the National Church.

St. Mark's Forum is again offering an illuminating series for Spring 2026. We hope each St. Mark's parishioner will consider attending. For more information contact

Music Ministry

Beginning in September 2025, our children's music ministry was integrated into morning Sunday school led by Ms. Gina. This is an obvious choice because Gina, in addition to being our Children's Ministry Director, is also a musical theater director. The children learn one song each month before singing it in church on the final Sunday of the month. One strength of this model is that our children consistently share music in the 10:30 am service without limitations based on attendance at a weekday rehearsal. We are continuing with this model in 2026 even as we discern additional ways to engage our young people in music ministry.

The Coro de Alabanza, which encompasses all our Spanish language music ministry, continues as a strong and committed ensemble. It is a joy to see this ensemble grow in its musical ability and continue to expand the musical repertory of the mass. A particular achievement of the ensemble was mastering the very challenging *López Misa Santa Cecilia* for Easter 2025.

The St Mark's Singers, in addition to its weekly Sunday morning music, continues to offer regular evening services. The outstanding project this past year was the performance of the Charles Wood *St Mark Passion*. It is the largest and most demanding musical project the choir has completed under my direction, and it was a deeply meaningful devotional contribution to the observance of Holy Week. I am grateful to my choral assistants, Becca Fitzpatrick and Bethany Brewer, whose leadership, particularly in sectional rehearsals, has been of great benefit to the choir. Finally, I want to express my gratitude to some of the extraordinary professional musicians in our congregation that contributed throughout this last year, Tanya Carey, Patti King, and Emily Steele.

St. Mark's Visual Arts Group

St. Mark's showcases the work of artists from our church and the broader community each year, seeking pieces that enrich and elevate our Worship. The relationship between congregation and artist is mutually generous, recognizing the presence of God in our lives and in our expressive gifts. Some works align with spiritual art, while others reference the spiritual through celebrations of nature and personal experience.

2025 Highlights

- Spring: Chicago-based artist Marcia Whitney-Schenck presented *The Cloud of Witnesses*, a watercolor and fluid acrylic series that blends contemporary expression with Christian themes. The body of work portrays spiritually inspired individuals in a modern context.
- Summer: Cecilia Smith offered an exhibit featuring framed descriptions of the sanctuary's stained-glass windows.

• Fall: St. Mark's parishioner Dan Lobraco exhibited *Landscapes and Musings*, a collection of watercolor works inspired by travel and invented landscapes. His travel pieces are created *en plein air*, a practice he finds deeply fulfilling and contemplative, allowing him to connect with a location through attentive detail.

Reception and engagement

Marcia and Dan's shows attracted strong attendance, with artist receptions and Q&A discussions that deepened visitors' understanding of the works. These connections enrich the experiences of both artists and viewers.

Church responsibilities and ongoing exhibitions

From Advent through Lent, the Visual Arts Group installs and de-installs the Advent and Christmas wreaths and Stations of the Cross in the church. We also rotate additional pieces as needed—such as Ludmilla Pavlovsk's blue cross painting and Richard Rush's lion—and we provide bilingual descriptions (English and Spanish) for the Stations during Lent.

We plan spring, summer, and fall shows again and welcome new members and nominations for contributing artists. There are many ways to participate—installing and de-installing works, publicizing events, assisting with receptions, and working directly with artists. Outreach

Outreach in the local community and beyond continues to be an important focus for St. Mark's with many members participating in regular and one-time outreach activities throughout the year.

The following annual fundraising events or collections are supported by the Outreach Committee and detailed elsewhere in this report: Appalachian Service Project, Back to School Collection, Meals to Go, Community Meal, Mum Sale, Pumpkin Patch, ReVive Christmas baskets and Walk-in-Ministry.

Jazz Night was held in February and raised \$6,000 to benefit Glen Ellyn Youth and Family Counselling Services. Thanks to Geneva Jazz Ensemble for once again providing great music and to GEYFCS Board members and St. Mark's volunteers for helping make this a successful fundraiser for an important local cause.

St. Mark's members support the **Glen House Food Pantry** throughout the year with food and financial donations and especially on food drive Sunday in June. Glen House also benefits from the annual Mum Sale. Several members also volunteer at Glen House.

In addition to supporting annual fundraising and collection drives, The Outreach Committee also supports non-profits through an **Annual Grant Program**. In 2025 we revised our strategy and adjusted the eligibility to focus on non-profits with operating budgets of less than \$1M and serving DuPage and Glen Ellyn residents. We also decided to award larger grants to less organizations in order to hopefully have a bigger impact. We had nine applications and we gave grants totaling \$7,550 to the following organizations:

GEYFCS was not funded as they benefitted from the Jazz Night. The Glen Ellyn Food Pantry and Walk-in Ministry were not funded as they benefitted from the Mum Sale.

In 2025 members of St. Mark's volunteered at **Northern Illinois Food Bank** on six occasions to sort and pack food for local food pantries. Due to the popularity of this opportunity, we will be scheduling monthly volunteer shifts in 2026.

Glen Ellyn/Wheaton CROP Walk - 11 members of St Mark's walked in the CROP walk in May and raised \$1,715 to support hunger relief around the world and locally.

Pumpkin Patch Fundraiser

Every October since 2007, St Marks has conducted a fundraiser to sell pumpkins to the community to benefit DuPagePads, which is dedicated to ending and preventing homelessness in our county. Each year we have unloaded approximately 2,500 bulk pumpkins, not to mention many boxes of mini- and softball-

sized white and orange pumpkins and numerous types of other gourds. The community came out in droves to purchase pumpkins from the St. Mark's Pumpkin Patch with total sales over these past 19 years of over \$400,000 and total donations to DuPagePads exceeding \$140,000.

We owe a debt of gratitude to Philip Adler, whose leadership and hard work have been instrumental in making the St. Mark's Pumpkin Patch a Glen Ellyn institution. I came on board to succeed Phil in running the patch this year and want to thank him personally for his guidance and support in continuing this fundraiser.

Next year will mark the 20th year of running this fundraiser – we look forward to promoting and celebrating this milestone for the Pumpkin Patch this coming fall.

Walk-In-Ministry

In 1994, the Glen Ellyn Ministerial Association initiated this coordinated effort to meet certain types of emergency needs of people and families living in Glen Ellyn and/or members of the partner churches. St Mark's has been part of the ministry since the beginning.

WiM operates Monday through Thursday, 10 am-noon, from an office provided at First United Methodist Church, convenient to First UM's main building entrance on Forest Avenue (immediately south of Duane Street - very near St Mark's). The ministry offers financial assistance to help people facing utility cutoffs, eviction, auto repairs and insurance, and costs for medical prescriptions, with procedures to ensure correct payments and proper records for clients. Food certificates and gas vouchers are also provided, and assistance in reaching other community resources.

The need for money increases every year. St Mark's assigns the earnings from the mum sale to Walk-In. The need for volunteers continues, and St Mark's presently has none. The work is scheduled to staff the 2-hour office hours those 4 weekday mornings. You learn by joining an experienced volunteer during some office hours. Volunteers typically work in pairs.

St Mark's also needs a representative who can attend and participate in the board meetings, about every other month.

Pollinator Garden: Some background on our garden: The Green Team took responsibility for the large garden at the northwest corner of the church property, at Main and Hillside, in Spring 2017, and has continued to tend it since then. The garden had been overgrown with lots of undesirables that were choking out the plants that provide food for butterflies, bees, birds, and other creatures, so the goal in 2017 was to identify what was growing there and remove anything that was hindering the beneficial plants. It was rewarding to see how many lovely perennials emerged once the turf grass and thistles were removed. Our big addition in May 2018 was a Fruit Guild – a permaculture garden (all edible perennials) centered around a Redhaven peach tree. Let us know if you are interested in participating in garden maintenance. All ages welcome.

SCARCE's Pumpkin Smash program to collect for composting: For the tenth year, we arranged for a 20-foot container to put the leftover pumpkins from the Pumpkin Patch and to be a site for the community to bring their pumpkins for composting on the first Saturday of November. Jan Langford again provided great signage to direct the community to the container in the Hillside parking lot. Between the cleanup of our own Pumpkin Patch and the 50 or so drive ups and walk ups from the community to bring pumpkins, we collected 2.52 tons of pumpkins and kept them out of landfill! We had help from Cub Scout Pack 42 who helped unload pumpkins from community members' cars and led some very enthusiastic smashing of pumpkins with other kids who brought their pumpkins from home. The contents of the container were taken to a commercial composting site instead of being put into

landfill. Keeping food/yard waste out of landfill means a reduction in methane gas production as well as capturing the nutrients and water contained in the plant materials for use in compost.

Companion Relationship with San Marcos in Nigromante, Mexico for 2025

St. Mark's continues a 20-year companion relationship with San Marcos in Nigromante, Mexico. Our first trip was in June of 2006. We still find ourselves in a challenging position with the Diocese of Southeast Mexico, specifically, with Julio Martin, who, because of unacceptable behavior, is no longer recognized as the bishop of the Diocese of Southeast Mexico by the Anglican Communion, the Board of Directors of the Mexican church, the Mexican government, the National Episcopal Church, and the Diocese of Chicago, but he remains in position and refuses to leave.

We continue to stay in touch with Padre Senobio and the leaders of San Marcos and pray that this situation will be resolved. We have received permission from our Diocese to send money to companion parishes and resume visits to those parishes. We are weighing those options.

History: Beginning in June of 2006, St. Mark's sent parishioners to Mexico each year, which included a dental mission trip in December 2019. Then came the 2020 Pandemic, and our visits were put on hold for a few years. In January 2024, we were able to return with the same dental team, and we hope to go back for a third dental trip when the time is right.

Throughout this companion relationship, fundraising, support, and prayers from St. Mark's have been a critical to this companion relationship. Please continue to remember the people of San Marcos and the Diocese of Southeast Mexico and keep them in your prayers, especially Padre Senobio and his family. Padre Senobio recently lost his wife, Cecilia Lopez Cruz, que en paz descanse.

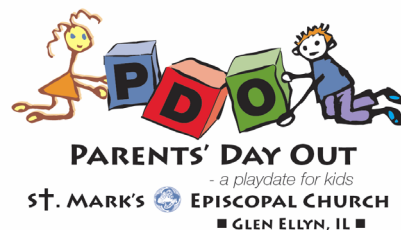

Parents' Day Out Ministry

St. Mark's Parents' Day Out (PDO) offers care for children ages 2 to 4. PDO has had a strong community following since it began in the late 1980's. Both the school year and summer care programs include fine and large motor skill activities, arts and crafts, songs and stories, as well as plenty of play time. Families register for one or two days per week during the school year, Monday through Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

There are 66 children currently enrolled in the program for the 2025-2026 school year. PDO also maintains a substitute list.

School Year Calendar and Summer Session: PDO follows the Glen Ellyn D41 public school system calendar during the school year and offers a summer program on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays in June and July.

PDO's Gifts: PDO donates \$600 monthly to the parish's general operating fund. An additional \$10,000 was donated in 2025. The PDO Board is in discussions with the Preschool about improving the playground area off of the lower parking lot.

Staff: We said goodbye to Director Kathy O'Rourke and teachers Melody Mordini and Carrie Pihl in 2025. While Melody is officially "retired," she has been a godsend, willing to fill in for teachers who have been absent or when PDO has needed an extra hand! We are also very grateful for the leadership of our new director, Katie Anderson, and for our new as well as continuing staff members. They are all wonderful and dedicated to the children, their families, and the program: Norma Cid, Ofelia Bustamente, Jocelyn Briones, Maria Torres, and Elidia Casiano. *Tinee Flores was with us for the fall, but she had to leave because she and her husband are moving.

St. Mark's Preschool

The 2025/26 school year marks St. Mark's Preschool's 15th as a part of the St. Mark's community. The Preschool is influenced by the Reggio Emilia project approach to teaching, which features child-directed learning. We continue to approach learning with the whole child in mind, first and foremost. The Preschool has grown from offering one class of nine children with two teachers its first year, to the current offerings of 3-day and 4-day classes, a STEAM program, Kindergarten Enrichment, and an Extended Day Play program. We also offer a morning summer camp program in June. Throughout the year, our eight-member staff serve 60-70 families.



The Preschool is DCFS certified and is a member of The National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES) and the North American Reggio Emilia Alliance (NAREA). We follow the Glen Ellyn D-41 and D-89 calendars.

Preschool payroll and expenses, including a monthly payment to the church for operating expenses, are covered by tuition payments. In addition to tuition, donations and fundraisers have netted \$14,730 in 2025. A successful fundraiser was held this fall to support our operating expenses and plans for future improvements. We have also received generous donations from the preschool and church communities to support our scholarship fund.

With the help of a supportive Preschool Board, the preschool has returned to pre-pandemic numbers and is consistently enjoying full enrollment each school year.

Alongside the church and PDO, the preschool will make improvements to the “Gus” playground with a goal of completion by fall of 2026.

We are blessed with the families and alumni that contribute to and participate in our preschool community. Partnerships with the parents and the community are a cornerstone of our philosophy. We are grateful the students and staff can explore their own community and be provoked and inspired by their surroundings.

Many thanks to Father George for his enduring support of the preschool and its programming and the Preschool Board members: Janet Constien (Chair), Diane Hessinger (Vice-Chair), Jill Martelli (Secretary), Berny Labis (treasurer), and Jessica Reynolds (events/fundraising) for volunteering their time and talent to the Preschool, helping to ensure future success and growth.

Buildings and Grounds

The Building and Grounds Committee’s mission is to maintain the facilities at St. Mark’s Episcopal Church in a clean, safe, and welcoming way for worship, fellowship, outreach programs, and preschool functions. The facility is used consistently during the week for worship, church functions, groups, meetings and community involvement.

The committee ensures that all building systems and functions are clean, operational, maintained and inspected. This includes coordinating with a number of agencies to ensure the building and grounds meet current code and regulations.

St. Mark’s has been blessed in 2025; despite all the activity and use the facility has seen during the year, no major service or maintenance issues arose. (knock on wood!). In addition, most of the service contracts we have in force have remained active without any or minimal cost increases. Lawn maintenance, fire and elevator system inspection services and snow plowing are a few examples of these services.

The year has required what can be explained as normal expected issues that required attention, such as door repair, plumbing issues, electrical issues and the like. Fortunately, many of these issues were able to be addressed internally and repaired without outside services or costs. As a result, the B&G budget has remained consistent and within budget expectations. In line with that, it is also encouraging to see the building and grounds fund grow because of the Capital Campaign commitment.

While always being able to react, the committee also attempts to be proactive in preventative maintenance to avoid any unexpected issues. The vines that had been growing and clinging to the exterior of the church have for the most part been removed and treated to hopefully limit their return. It is an issue that is constantly monitored as the vines are a major cause of gutter damage and deterioration of the exterior.

The rectory also falls under the care of the B&G committee and remains in very good condition. The driveway was replaced this past year. We expect a couple of appliances in need of replacement in the near future.

Finally, we always try to identify needs around the facility for improvement. An example is the recently installed large screen (100”) TV installed in Mahon Hall for meeting and group entertainment use! We look forward to the beginning of the Narthex renovation as defined by the Capital Campaign. Steps are currently being taken to secure the general contractor and begin the bid process. We hope to find a solution for improved lighting in the basement. That area is used consistently by the preschool, youth groups and other functions. Mahon Hall is in need of some

updating. We hope for a plan to have the hall repainted, and perhaps some new tables, chairs and coverings. The sound system in the church is targeted for updating.

Sacred Ground

Sacred Ground was busy almost every month of 2025 with a planned trip, a gathering, an activity or a lecture, all with the purpose of learning, helping, and following our Episcopal commitment to others

Sacred Ground started off the year with a Church-wide MLK Day of Service on January 19th.

There were several field trips throughout the year: In February, the field trip was to the Illinois Holocaust Museum in Skokie; in May we went to the DuSable Museum in Hyde Park; and October we saw the Gichigamiin Indigenous Nation Museum in Evanston.

In March we sponsored a Lenten Series of 2 documentaries. Volunteers provided soup and bread, and we concluded with a discussion about the video we had seen. It was very successful, having between 25 to 35 people attending each of the four sessions.

Later in March, we hosted Rachel Zola's original one-woman show, "Late, A Love Story" co-sponsored by Sacred Ground, and One Community, and Pizza & Social Justice.

In June, St. Mark's collaborated with other churches in the community to participate in the Juneteenth event at Peoples Community Church. Many members of St. Marks attended the presentation.

In August and September, Sacred Ground showed 2 films, the latter of which was in cooperation with Northern Illinois United Methodist Conference and co-sponsored with Pizza and Social Justice.

At the Sacred Ground Meeting of September, Kirk Burger gave a talk about the McKee Cultural Center and in October, Exodus World Services set up a simulated refugee experience. At November meeting, Sara Dady, an Immigration Lawyer, spoke about refugees.

To be noted: members of St. Mark's volunteered at every Spanish service looking for ICE agents so they can alert the assembly, and we continue to do so in 2026. This also took place during each of the Posadas leading up to Christmas Eve service.

CREO DuPage 2025

CREO DuPage is a local nonprofit organization that began as a ministry of St. Mark's Episcopal Church. The word CREO means "I believe." CREO DuPage provides resources and mentorship to local high school students from Spanish-speaking families who believe they can accomplish what might seem impossible: graduate with a college degree that leads to a rewarding career.



Several St. Mark's members volunteer as mentors, and many current and former CREO students and their families are also members of the church. CREO is fortunate to use St. Mark's space for monthly workshops and events.

In 2025, CREO expanded to serve 48 high school students with academic coaches, and 13 graduates joined 38 other graduates studying at regional, public, and private colleges and universities.

CREO successfully raised over \$96,000 in 2025 from corporate, family, and community foundations, as well as other funds from generous individuals. This includes ongoing support from the Episcopal Charities of Chicago, which gave \$19,000 in 2025 and pledged \$19,000 in 2026. Varios miembros de St. Mark's sirven como voluntarios y muchos estudiantes y familias actuales y anteriores de CREO también son miembros de la iglesia. CREO tiene la suerte de utilizar el espacio de St. Mark's para talleres y eventos mensuales.

En 2025, CREO emparejó a 48 estudiantes con tutores académicos, y 13 graduados de la preparatoria se unieron a otros 38 graduados que están estudiando en universidades regionales, públicas y privadas.

CREO exitosamente recaudó más de 96.000 dólares en 2025, fondos que vienen de corporaciones, familias, y fundaciones de la comunidad y también de personas individuales que han donado generosamente. Esta cantidad también incluye el apoyo de Episcopal Charities of Chicago, que donó 19.000 dólares en 2025 y se comprometió a donar otros 19.000 dólares en 2026. CREO también recibió fondos de las subvenciones para pequeñas organizaciones sin fines de lucro del condado de DuPage y de la Fundación DuPage.

Minutes from January 26, 2025 Annual Meeting

Meeting Date: Jan. 26, 2025

Meeting Location: Mahon Hall (w. Zoom)

Meeting called to order: 12:07pm

This was the 128th Annual Meeting of St. Mark's, chaired by Fr. George and Andrew Dorn, the outgoing Senior Warden. Approximately 125 members attended either in person or on Zoom. The hospitality committee organized a tasty lunch for those attending in person. Throughout the meeting, breaks were taken to allow for the excitement of the annual cake auction, ably led by Andrew Dorn and Karen Hill. This effort, always awaited with great anticipation by the entire congregation, successfully raised over \$8,000. This will be put towards a new stove for Mahon Hall kitchen as well as new carpeting between the sanctuary and Mahon Hall. Those present were grateful to David Dornblaser, who purchased the first cake and generously made it available to all who wished to partake as part of their lunch.

The meeting opened with a prayer for St. Mark's and for the Grow & Renew Capital Campaign. This was followed by the appointment of Liam Dunch as Clerk for the meeting.

Time was given for review of the minutes of the 2024 Annual Meeting, which incorporate the 2024 Annual Report. Jane Moore moved that the minutes be approved as published, this was seconded by Emily Sapsauer and the minutes were so approved.

Fr. George announced the appointment of Patti King as Senior Warden and Josh O'Shea as Junior Warden. Both accepted these appointments. Kai Hill accepted appointment as the Youth Representative to the vestry.

Andrew gave thanks for the service of the outgoing vestry members (Karen Hill & Chip Johnson), Diocesan Representative (Jim Grotelueschen) and Youth Representative (Isabelle Friebe).

Fr. George offered a vote of thanks to the hospitality committee for the delicious lunch.

The year-end financial report was presented by the Treasurer, who offered thanks to Asst. Treasurer Scott Eichenauer and the finance committee for their ongoing support. The parish ended the year with a small surplus. Income was slightly above budget and expenses a little below budget. Our asset totals also increased during the year due to investments and interest. The preschool and Parents Day Out programs are also in good financial shape. A big thanks is owed to Berny Labis for assisting the preschool with their 2024 accounts and 2025 budget. There were no questions from the floor on the 2024 financial report.

The 2025 budget was presented. Fr. George noted that the number of households pledging is up for 2025, but that we still need a little more to meet our 2025 budgeted amount. Every pledge is important, no matter the size. He reminded those present that setting up an auto-pledge is very easy through the church's website. The 2025 budget shows increased expenses from 2024, mainly due to rising insurance costs and the commitment to start repayments to the diocese towards our loan balance with them. The budget also incorporates a cost-of-living salary increase for staff. There were no questions from the floor on the 2025 budget.

Andrew presented his Senior Warden's report, referencing the information included in the agenda packet. It has been an honor for him to serve, and he expressed his deep appreciation for Fr. George, Patti King (Junior Warden) and all the vestry members. He is happy to be leaving his role with St. Mark's in a great position to continue to grow and thrive. Particular note was made of the 36 baptisms the church has hosted in 2024. Andrew also gave

special thanks to the team involved with the Grow & Renew capital campaign, which is closing in on attaining our 'stretch goal.'

Fr. George thanked Andrew and offered a gift on behalf of the congregation in recognition of his outstanding service as Senior Warden.

The meeting was opened to questions from the floor; there were none. It was noted that our next major event will be the capital campaign wrap-up celebration on March 2nd.

Everyone was thanked for their attendance at the meeting.

It is our hope that this gathering here today, on this sacred ground, will mark a commitment to continuing dialogue and connection across cultures, leading to ongoing recognition of the truthful history of our community and country. It is our sincere desire to continue to learn about these ancestral homelands and to honor all Indigenous peoples who called and call this land home.

This Land Acknowledgement was developed by participants of Sacred Ground of St. Mark's, Glen Ellyn, in collaboration with Joseph Standing Bear of Midwest SOARRING Foundation, and utilized the Downers Grove Public Library Land Acknowledgement as a framework.

This Land Acknowledgment was approved by the St. Mark's Vestry on August 31, 2022 and took place on the front lawn of St. Mark's on Sunday, September 18, 2022.
