The Paston's Perspective

North Mississippi jargon when I was a child. In fact, I had never come across the word until last week when it appeared in an article concerning the Palm Springs bombing. You may have seen the reports as well. A car bomber targeted a fertility clinic in Palm Springs to impose death and destroy the stored embryos. Some were injured in the explosion, and trauma was inflicted on the community; however, the terrorist failed in his ultimate goal, and many lives were spared. The subsequent investigation has led to the identification of twenty-five-yearold prime suspect who supposedly subscribed to a philosophy of pro-mortalism. But again, what is pro-mortalism? According to one source, "Pro-mortalism, at its most simple, is the belief that death is preferable to life." Such a worldview embraces the idea that the planet should not be populated by humanity, and that the only way to alleviate future suffering is through death. Even more so, pro-mortalism is often paired with its twin, antinatalism, a position that regards having children as a morally wrong practice. According to law enforcement officials, the prime suspect in the attack had expressed both pro-mortalistic and antinatilistic sentiments in a manifesto he had written, and those beliefs guided him in violent actions.

As I read more about pro-mortalism and antinatalism for myself, my heart sunk and my spirit grieved. What a bleak, barren view of our existence! Death is preferable to life? Causing the death of others is the only way to prevent human suffering? The rejection of children will help the world experience some type of utopic healing? Really? How dark! How tragic! And yet, I was reminded of Satan's manipulative tools work to blind the minds of unbelievers (2 Corinthians 4:4) so that they readily accept such vile and distorted thoughts. In fact, Jesus reminded us of the adversary's lethal strategy: "The thief does not come except to steal, and to kill, and to destroy" (John 10:10a NKJV). The devil himself is synonymous with death and the death culture of our society. He is the architect of philosophical systems like pro-mortalism and antinatalism. He desperately wants humans to discount the image of God within humanity-and thus, the value of life—so that they will steal, kill, and destroy.

But oh, what good news we have! For you see, Christ came to show us that there is a radical alternative to Satan's hopeless, terroristic ideology and experience. The Son of God triumphantly declared, "I have come that they may

**Pro-mortalism.** I admit that the term never appeared in our have life, and that they might have it more abundantly" (John 10:10b NKJV). The devil wishes humanity's death, but Jesus desires life! That shouldn't surprise any of us. After all, Jesus created the very life we know (Colossians 1:16; Hebrews 1:2-3), and He entered His creation through the Incarnation in order to bring us eternal, abundant life (John 3:16). We don't subscribe to the notion that life is meaningless; we know that God has given us purpose (Genesis 1:27; 1 Peter 2:9). We haven't given in to futility; we live in hope (1 Peter 1:3-6). We never see children as the problem; we celebrate them as the reward/fruit of the womb (Genesis 1:28; Psalm 127:3). We aren't troubled by nihilistic or pessimistic outlooks on the future; we are confident that there is eternal life that never ends with Christ in paradise (2 Corinthians 5:1; 2 Timothy 4:8). And I can go on and on! (I see some of you nodding in agreement with that last statement.) The point is this-Jesus Christ is life itself and changes our whole perspective.

> The gospel we proclaim must be one that helps people see life. Even our actions should be life-giving to others. I have always been challenged by Paul's words to the Corinthians that contrasted the first Man with the God-Man: "The first man Adam became a living being.' The last Adam became a life-giving spirit" (1 Corinthians 15:45 NKJV). Adam just existed; Jesus gave life. And there it is . . . the model for us. We ought not to be people just existing, but rather, we should be giving life to others. You say, "But there is one Jesus!" You are correct. I can't be someone else's Savior. Jesus already demonstrated that He alone is worthy to assume that role. Yet, if I am like Jesus, I will give life through my speech and works. So, let me ask you, "Do take life from others, or do you give life?" I'm not talking about the physical taking/giving of life alone. I am asking you if you take life emotionally/mentally/spiritually from people or if you give life emotionally/mentally/spiritually to people. Have you taken vitality away from your wife? Your kids? Your grandkids? Your friends? Your coworkers? Or do you determine to speak life into your relationships as you go about your daily schedule? My prayer has been that I would give life like my Jesus.

> This coming weekend, I am grateful for those who gave themselves to provide life for us. Specifically, I am thankful for those who died in military combat to secure my freedom. But I am most appreciative for the ONE Who died on the cross to grant me eternal life! Let's be people of gratitude, and let's also be life-giving spirits as we serve Him! See you Sunday!
