Episode #2 (Season #2)

"I Saw You"

This second episode introduces us to two apostles, Nathanael and Philip in their pre-disciple days. The first is Nathanael, represented as an ambitious and conscientious architect who suffers a catastrophic professional setback. Philip is represented as a disciple of John the Baptizer sent by John to follow Jesus.

Philip Emerges from the Bashan

Bashan is an area of land East of the Jordan River, and it's the location of the Kingdom of Og in the Old Testament and is situated now in modern-day Syria. It's described as a fertile area, producing strong bulls and oaks, among other things. At the time of Israel's entrance into the Promised Land, Og came out against them, but was utterly routed.



Prophecy Against Gog and Magog


When Matthew collects wood from the ravine, which turns out to be wet, the disciples quote Ezekiel 39:9-10. In this prophecy, the inhabitants of Israel would not need to cut wood because they would make their fires out of the weapons of their enemy – Magog, and Gog, Magog's leader.

Spoiler alert – in this war between Magog and Israel, Magog loses because it's God who's doing the fighting for Israel. This war is still in the future, in the End Times. The Bible describes a time when the people of Israel have returned to the land of Israel and the surrounding countries unite against them.

Philip the Tetrarch

As they're approaching Caesarea Philippi, Philip jokes about the city being named after him. Then he explains its true origin – that it was instead named in honor of "Philip the Tetrarch, brother of Herod Antipas" and says this was a family that "does not take kindly" to his former rabbi, John the Baptist.

He's referring to the very tense relationship with Herodias, Herod, and Herodias's daughter on one side



and John the Baptist on the other. Herod had gone against the Torah in marrying his sister-in-law (who was also his niece) while his brother, Philip, was still living and John publicly called him out on it. Because of this, Herod, Herodias, and her daughter all held a grudge against John, resulting in him being beheaded.
