



A Glimpse of Humility in Action What does it look like?

- Being consumed with self (feelings, entitlement, etc.)
- Being prideful, rude, and making assumptions
- Holding grudges and refusing to forgive others

"It's amazing to me that the etymology of the word "humility" is "humus" — not the dip you buy from Trader Joe's, but literally "on the ground" or "earth." To be humble is to be rooted or grounded — to be deeply embedded within flesh and blood communities of people who know us well, including our limitations and blind spots, and who deeply love us just the same. There's something about this in-person, on-the-ground connection that keeps us keenly aware that we are but human, but also that to be human, bearing the image of the creator of the universe, is a glorious thing." - Katelyn Beaty
