Thomas: Doubting but Believing in God

#### Mark 3:13-19 NIV – Thomas, Disciple of Jesus

<sup>13</sup> Jesus went up on a mountainside and called to him those he wanted, and they came to him. 14 He appointed twelve that they might be with him and that he might send them out to preach <sup>15</sup> and to have authority to drive out demons. 16 These are the twelve he appointed: Simon (to whom he gave the name Peter), <sup>17</sup> James son of Zebedee and his brother John (to them he gave the nickname "sons of thunder"), <sup>18</sup> Andrew, Philip, Bartholomew, Matthew, Thomas, James son of Alphaeus, Thaddaeus, Simon the Zealot <sup>19</sup> and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him.

"Thomas, nicknamed the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let's go, too—and die with Jesus."




#### John 20:24-29 NLT

<sup>24</sup>One of the twelve disciples, Thomas (nicknamed the Twin), was not with the others when Jesus came. <sup>25</sup> They told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he replied, "I won't believe it unless I see the nail wounds in his hands, put my fingers into them, and place my hand into the wound in his side."

<sup>26</sup> Eight days later the disciples were together again, and this time Thomas was with them. The doors were locked; but suddenly, as before, Jesus was standing among them. "Peace be with you," he said. <sup>27</sup> Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here, and look at my hands. Put your hand into the wound in my side. Don't be faithless any longer. Believe!"





# LESSONS FROM THOMAS

## What can we learn from Thomas's story?

- We are just like Thomas; we are his twin!
- Faith (covenant trust) doesn't go against evidence and reason, but it does require us to go beyond it!
- Doubt is normal and part of the discipleship process;
   it's an opportunity for deepening our faith in God.
- Stay with the church, bring your questions and doubts, and Jesus will reveal himself to you in time.
- Thomas was both a saint *and* a sinner.
