Books

Crouch, Amy. *My Tech-Wise Life: Growing Up and Making Choices in a World of Devices*. Grand Rapids: Baker Books, 2020.

Provides a perspective on how a young-person implemented self-control measures to ensure technology did not run her life.

Crouch, Andy. *The Tech-Wise Family: Everyday Steps for Putting Technology in its Proper Place*. Grand Rapids: Baker Books, 2017.

Provides 10 practical rules to shape how your family engages with technology. Great resource for parents as they decide how their home should be structured/operate.

Haidt, Jonathan. *The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness*. New York: Penguin, **March 2024**.

Focus on adverse mental and emotional impacts of technology (esp. smartphones and videogames) on our children.

McCracken, Brett. *The Wisdom Pyramid: Feeding your Soul in a Post-Truth World*. Wheaton, Illinois: Crossway Books, 2021.

Provides a model (styled on the food pyramid) for ingesting sources of wisdom, with the Bible being the base (largest input) and internet/technology/social media being the apex (smallest input).

Phillips, Whitney and Ryan Milner. *Share Better and Stress Less: A Guide to Thinking Ecologically about Social Media*. Somerville, Massachusetts: MiTeenPress, 2023.

Aimed at teens (and even pre-teens), provides a practical guide to living in a social-media-infused society so that we don't further pollute [the 'ecological' angle] our environment with bad information.

Reinke, Tony. *God, Technology, and the Christian Life*. Wheaton, IL: Crossway, 2022.

A guide to the theology of technology and how to view technology from a Christian perspective. Emphasis on not rejecting technology (Amish approach) or idolizing technology (Elon Musk approach), but recognizing God's use of technology in the world.

Twenge, Jean. *iGen: Why Today's Super-Connected Kids are Growing Up Less Rebellious, More Tolerant, Less Happy – And Completely Unprepared for Adulthood*. New York: Atria, 2018.

[Have not read this...yet.--ed.] Cited by many other sources as influential work on the impact of tech and social media on childhood mental/emotional development. Purported paints a grim picture and ties things to the mass adoption of smartphones.
