THE YOUNG MAN WHO KILLED CHARLIE KIRK WAS SURELY PSYCHOTIC AND POSSIBLY DEMONIZED. Why else would someone commit such a cowardly crime? It was discouraging, but unsurprising, to learn that the assassin was deeply influenced by what he found on the internet. His social media involvement fueled his psychosis, and he became a killer.

This is unsurprising because we are seeing this dynamic widely in our society. Not that every young person using social media becomes deranged, but it certainly can lead to all

sorts of depression, self-harm, deceptions, anger, and simply a general sedentary waste of time.

In March of 2025, a Harris Poll surveyed more than 500 children ages 8 to 12 across the United States, who were assured that their answers would remain private. A majority reported having smartphones, and about half of the 10-to-12-year-olds said that most or all their friends use social media.

This digital technology has given kids access to virtual worlds, where they're allowed to roam far more freely than in the real one. About 75

percent of kids ages 9 to 12 regularly play the online game Roblox, where they can interact with friends and even strangers. But most of the children in the survey said they aren't allowed to be out in public at all without an adult. Fewer than half of the 8-and 9-year-olds have gone down a grocery-store aisle alone; more than a quarter aren't allowed to play unsupervised even in their own front yard.

An entire generation is learning to live in a fake world where they may not even know who they are meeting.

What is the solution?

Get off the internet. Live real life. Do real things. Talk to real people. Get your kids to do real things.

When my four kids were in middle school and then high school, we were at the beginning of the smart phone era. It was in Emily's freshman year that the public school distributed iPads to the entire class. It was an educational disaster. No one could really control what the students did with their technology. The weakest students were the most vulnerable to internet distractions. COVID and 2020 only made all the problems worse.

Now, parents and schools are inundated. No one knows what to do. Kids are not learning. I would like to share just a few practices that helped our

- 1. You get a phone when you are driving and not before. You keep it only if you can prove yourself trustworthy. After all, dad pays for the phone, so it's dad's phone. And if dad ever calls or texts, you had better answer. That is why you have the phone.
- 2. No phones or computers in the bedrooms ever. Kids will fight you on this. They will come up with reasons, so many reasons. There is no rule more important than this one!
 Dad: No phones in the bedroom.
 Junior: Aww. Dad! But I have to get up in the morning. I need the alarm!

Dad: Good point. Let me think about that.

Junior: Yes!

Dad, an hour later: Ok, I'll buy you an alarm clock. You pick it

out.

- 3. All the computers stay in one room of the house, the study. They are tools for learning. This actually makes for better family dynamics and keeps those machines from running the home. And put the TV in the basement or the trash. When I was a kid I read books, did puzzles, built electronics, and constructed model airplanes in my bedroom. They won't like this either, but it saved our family.
- 4. Dad checks all your technology regularly, whenever he wants.
- 5. Report any unwanted communication or porn that arrives.
- 6. Be sure that mom and dad know every person that you are communicating with on your phone or computer. We just want to know that these are real people.
- 7. No purchasing anything ever online without talking to dad first.

It is important to have discussions with your kids as early as possible about all these things. That way they know what to expect and know the reasons why. It is amazing how

much they can understand. With most kids, you can begin loosening restrictions as they get older, because once they are 18, you lose control entirely, unless you are still paying the bills.

Finally, get out and do stuff as a family. Weekly. When you do, have everyone leave their phones behind, except dad, just in case the car dies.



An Uplifting Summer Experience! Solomon Saugstad

Solomon Saugstad spent 5 weeks this summer with the Pursuit Program at UpLift Mountain. This 200-acre Christian camp is located near Westcliffe, Colorado and provides week long discipleship programs for teenagers. The camp's purpose is to encourage and equip Christians to follow Jesus. This is done in a variety of ways including mountain climbing, archery, woodworking, and obstacle courses along with daily Scripture study and chapel.

Solomon reports the Pursuit Program which was held for camp leaders during the weeks campers weren't present, helped him grow closer to God, and enhanced his understanding of a variety topics that were discussed. He led teenaged campers in mountain climbing and woodworking. He was also able to introduce some unchurched teens to the Bible and salvation.

Overall, Solomon learned the discipline side of being a Christian and to live with intentionality. This was fostered by living in a rustic cabin, cold mountain spring showers, and doing without phones or electronic devices. Solo time was spent studying The Word, reading books by C. S. Lewis and exploring nature.
