Nancy and I have a word of encouragement that we often speak to one another when life is particularly daunting, "Every moment is a new beginning,

every day a new day." I suppose that this really is derived from the teachings of Jesus.

How is it that Jesus wants us to live?

"For this reason I say to you, do not be worried about your life, as to what you will eat or what you will drink; nor for your body, as to what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?

"Look at the birds of the air, that they do not sow, nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they? And who of you by being worried can add a single hour to his life? "And why are you worried about clothing? Observe how the lilies of the field grow; they do not toil nor do they spin, yet I say to you that not even Solomon in all his glory clothed himself like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the furnace, will He not much more clothe you? You of little faith!

"Do not worry then, saying, 'What will we eat?' or 'What will we drink?' or 'What will we wear for clothing?' For the Gentiles eagerly seek all these things; for your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

"So do not worry about tomorrow; for tomorrow will care for itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own" (Matthew 6:25-34).

And how is it that Jesus wants us to live every moment of every day?

At that time Jesus said, "I praise You, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that You have hidden these things from the wise and

I will often tell little Lucy, "If you just trust Grampa and be obedient, we are going to have a

great day, adventure, fun, and snacks included."

God is our heavenly Father, even more reliable and trustworthy than Grampy John. We are His children. To be His means to trust Him like children. Trusting Him means being willing to give Him our worries,

fears, regrets, anger, guilt, grief, pain, disappointment, resentment, and unforgiveness. We are to come to Him and lay our unmet expectations at His feet, often, maybe many times a day. 
