Expectations, expectations.

In the days before Christmas, I was part of several conversations about expectations. Expectations for family and gatherings. Expectations for gift giving and using the proper recipe for cranberry sauce. Expectations of growing old with friends, kids finding their way, people being reasonable. And, of course, the expectation and anticipation of the Christ child.

Pastor Rich gave a beautiful sermon at the Celebrating Seniors event in December where he reminded us that the coming of the Christ child promises something brand new. And he asked if we might look to Christmas with the expectation that something new is coming.

And now here we are, Christmas behind us. Some of us have new sweaters or e-bikes, new poundage packed around our waistlines. We have feasted and "fested" and worshipped and sung all the carols. We might consider expectations fulfilled. Or not. But when the new year dawns, the expectations that sustain us in Advent seem to get packed away with the Christmas decorations.

But what if? What if we moved into this new year with the same level of anticipation as we do Christmas? When God came to dwell with us, the God-with-us-ness didn't end there. God continued to surprise us in Jesus Christ. Surprised us by upsetting the expectations of some and fulfilling expectations that others had long since abandoned. Jesus was so very human and so much more. He was courageous and adventurous and reached far past the rules and boundaries that gave people the illusion of safety and control. He surprised lepers and women and little girls and centurions and the demonpossessed and paralyzed and blind and poor and bleeding and broken. He surprised them by healing their bodies and restoring their lives and

relationships—often by upsetting long held expectations for decorum and belonging. What a surprise was Jesus.

The coming of the Christ child is a great festival of light and hope and expectation. But it is not the fulfillment. It is the *beginning* of the fulfillment of expectation. God's work is never "complete" as long as mammals draw breath and planets orbit and fish splash and creepy things crawl and humans struggle to remember who we are. God continues to show up and surprise us and fulfill expectations we didn't even know we had.

So let the visions of sugar plums keep dancing, keep your eyes on the night sky, keep lighting candles and singing songs and eating together. God is not done with us yet.

Thanks be to God for that!

FINANCIAL NOTES - NOVEMBER, 2024


At Trinity's Annual Meeting on November 17th, our congregation approved our budget for the fiscal year of September 2024-August 2025. The budget will continue our second of a three year plan that was designed going into the 23-24 fiscal year. Due to strong giving and good expense management, we were able to finish the 2024 fiscal year in an operating surplus. The approved 2024-2025 budget reflects an optimistic outlook for continuing the positive giving momentum we've built over the past year and also sets the expectation for expenses to stay relatively flat year over year.

As we go into the 2025 calendar year, reporting on our long term debt progress will continue to be reported on a quarterly basis. My role as the Treasurer, along with the Finance Team, will continue to review and monitor our budget progress and support the Parish Administrator and Council. Other projects for the Finance Team in the upcoming year will be to review and implement the constitution and bylaw updates related to the financial roles (also approved at Trinity's Annual Meeting), as well as the re-establishment of a committee to assist with oversight of the Trinity endowment funds.

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Financial Update

Greetings Trinity!

HAPPY NEW YEAR! As we journey into this new year, I wanted to express my gratitude for your support of Trinity's' ministries and missions in 2024. Anything accomplished through Trinity is largely due to your commitment to your faith and your support and generosity. Thank you for living generously!

STEWARDSHIP 2025. As of mid-December, we are still on track to meet our \$1,330,000 annual giving goal for the 2025 stewardship campaign. Currently, we have 158 pledges totaling \$676,174 - and 35% of those pledges increased from 2024 to 2025 = + \$32,000.

FINANCE. As of November 2024, we are 25% through the budget year. As of the end of November, the balance on the Line of Credit is \$45,000. Following is a snapshot of our current income and expenses:

- 2024/25 FYTD Contributions were \$244,155 (18.5% of 2025 budget). 2023/24 Contributions as a comparison were \$288,310.
- 2024/25 FYTD Total Income—including Rent/Fees—was \$380,961 (23% of 2025 budget). 2023/24 Income as a comparison was \$472,138.
- 2024/25 FYTD Expenses were \$407,230 (24.5% of 2025 budget). 2023/24 Expenses as a comparison were \$402,612.

MORTGAGE. As of November 2024, our Thrivent mortgage balance was \$1,881,233—a reduction of \$41,475 which includes regular mortgage payments and principal only payments.

Trinity to participate in Jan. 23 PIT Stop Event

What is the PIT Stop Event? In conjunction with a federally-mandated annual "Point In Time" count of unhoused individuals and families, a special community event is scheduled at First Presbyterian Church – this year it will be Jan. 23. This event provides a variety of opportunities for those who are experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity. In addition to a hot meal, visitors will be able to explore resources to help with housing, food, transportation, legal advice, mental health issues, vaccinations, winter clothing, hygiene kits, health insurance and much more. PIT Stop Events are held at Stillwater as well as Cottage Grove and Forest Lake at different times and places during the year.

How is Trinity involved with the PIT Stop Event? Trinity's Outreach Mission Team is supporting the event by contributing gas and food cards to be handed out, coordinating donations for winter clothing and menstrual hygiene items, as well as providing volunteers at the event.

Can I contribute to the PIT Stop Event? YES! Help is needed prior to Jan. 19:

- Cash to purchase food and gas gift cards or menstrual hygiene items (please make check payable to Trinity; memo: "PIT Stop." Place check in offering plate or mail to the Trinity church office. Trinity will purchase the cards and hygiene items and bring them to the event for distribution.)
- Winter clothing: Coats, hats, mittens, gloves, sweaters, socks (new or in good condition).
- Suitcases are also accepted (new or in good condition).
- Clothing and hygiene items can be placed in bins near the main entrance at Trinity (look for sign by elevator).
- NOTE: All donations will be accepted through Jan. 19, 2025.

Can I help with the PIT Stop Event? YES! Help is needed for the following:

- Volunteers are needed to collect, transport, display and distribute clothing and hygiene items at the event at First Presbyterian Church on Jan. 23.
- Volunteer callers are needed to make phone calls to collect data from homeless individuals for the PIT Count. Contact information and training will be provided.

LEARNING TOGETHER 101:

Days of LGBTQIA+ Remembrance

A common ritual in the month of January is a new calendar. The diversity of calendars in 2025 includes both paper and electronic versions. Some of us prefer one over the other, while others use both options, as we all hope to remember events of importance unique to us. We fill calendars with dates that matter to us. We often categorize dates, with some labeled required or practical dates, such as appointments and meetings, while other dates are celebratory like birthdays and holidays. Other dates are lighthearted and a more recent addition to calendars, such days to celebrate pets (National Cat Day—Oct. 29), specific foods (National Pickle Day—Nov. 14), or a beloved activity (National Picnic Day—April 23).

Some dates we choose to include under the category of *remembrance*, reminding us of an important event, person, or life experience. These may be personal to each of us, or they may be marked on the calendar as an opportunity for both individuals and communities to remember together a specific event, person or people, or concern in the world.

As I continue my learning as an ally of my LGBTQIA+ siblings, I am seeking opportunities to show support and solidarity for these beloved children of God on the days marked to remember their unique journey. Far too often I find myself learning about an LGBTQIA+ day of remembrance *after* it has taken place. In 2025, I am committing to learning in advance what days the LGBTQIA+ community is remembering, so I can show my support in whatever way deemed appropriate. One example of what this will look like in 2025 is Spirit Day on Oct. 16, a day to take a stand against bullying, especially bullying aimed against LGBTQIA+ youth. I can do that. I can wear purple as one action to show my support and care for my LGBTQIA+ siblings created in God's image. Will you join me? And if someone asks why we are wearing purple on Oct. 16, we can tell the story of remembering our LGBTQIA+ youth who are bullied. We can invite others, too, to join us in wearing purple, and thinking together what else we can do as Jesus followers, to love and live the way Jesus did.

In my quest to update my 2025 calendar with remembrance days linked to our LGBTQIA+ siblings, I discovered the GLAAD (Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation) LGBTQ Community calendar, which lists a variety of days and the various ways to support our LGBTQIA+ siblings. As we record and remember our varied life stories in our 2025 personal calendars, may we also choose to remember the life stories of our beloved LGBTQIA+ siblings, on the designated days of remembrance.
