

How does one even begin one's last Trivity Today article?

"...seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare...For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. When you search for me, you will find me..." Jeremiah 29:7; 11-13

That was the opening verse of the first Trinity Today article I ever wrote. We didn't yet know each other. It was the dawn of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation of the Church. And we were called into partnership to build a future together as the body of Christ.

I wrote:

Now, as we enter into this year, we will spend time not just celebrating the Reformation of the church but celebrating our own reformation as we reclaim our identity as Trinity and Lutheran and Church. A very particular body of Christ, called by the Spirit to be church for the sake of the world in this particular community, at this particular time. We celebrate our history, we live vibrantly our present, and we cast a broad vision for a bright future as God's people in the St. Croix Valley.

I don't share it as a particularly brilliant piece of writing, but as a reminder of where we began together and a celebration of what has been accomplished in faith, trust, prayer, hard work, and partnership.

God's call has been clear and persistent in our time together. We have learned so much about what it means to be the church, Jesus' living body. We have discovered new and creative ways to put meat on the bones of love for our neighbors in the Valley and beyond. We care for one another and form authentic, vulnerable relationships across generations. We are committed to learning and gather for worship – celebrating word and sacrament in faith and hope. Your generosity has continued to grow and stretch in stewardship, mission giving, outreach, and the comprehensive campaign.

All of this is evidence of a community that has grown in faith and trust that God is at work in and through us, calling us into the world.

In that you will find assurance for your future together.

Transitions in leadership can be anxious times. And they can be times to discover God's faithfulness anew. Trust God. Trust each other. When anxiousness stirs, seek assurance in community, prayer, worship, and transparent communication. Remember what you have done together, what you are capable of.

Pastors have always been a movable piece in the church. It's the congregation, an ever-changing and ever-enduring community of reconciliation, that moves through time together. And you have discovered that you are vibrant, engaging, compassionate, inclusive, faithful people who have learned to trust that God has a vision for Trinity.

Continue your partnership and care for one another. Worship often. Celebrate the breadth of ministry and passion that is alive at Trinity. Visit and pray for one another. Look for visitors and strangers in your midst and welcome them with conversation and vulnerability.

Take care of your marvelous staff. They are faith-filled professionals who take their work seriously and have grown together as a team. They serve with authenticity, transparency, faith, and courage. They care about you. They have been daily partners and friends, and I will miss them deeply.

Trust your council. They are smart, faithful, and committed to the well-being of this congregation in worship, faithformation, finance, and mission to the world. They will stand with you as steady partners in this time of transition. Look to them. They will serve you well.

Serving as your pastor has been the honor of a lifetime. You have treated me with warmth, trust, and encouragement. And you have done the same for my husband, Ted. It has been a true partnership for both of us. It's hard to imagine life in the Valley without you by our sides. We will keep an eye out at the grocery store and on the bike paths.

Personally, working alongside you has deepened my faith and trust in God. You have modeled courage and hope. I still can hardly believe that I got this opportunity to be part of your rebirth and flourishing. Know that you have loved your pastor and welcomed me generously into mission with you. Ted and I both give thanks for your willingness to open your congregation and your lives to us. We will treasure it always.

Your task now, friends, is to trust in God's faithfulness above all things. Love one another as Christ has loved you.

Know that God has plans for you, to give you a future with hope.

I trust in that with all my heart.

God Meets Us Wherever We Are

Christ is Risen, Friends! He is Risen, Indeed, Alleluia! Alleluia!

It was such a beautiful and amazing run to Holy Week and Easter, as well as such a blessing to spend it with so many of you. Thank you for your faith and your hearts and voices all joining in worship.

Pastor Chris reminded us that Jesus' disciples don't just follow the cultural norms of grief and expectation and walk to see if the Resurrection is true.

Nope. Peter runs. The disciples run in a direction they didn't know possible.

They run contrary to every ounce of "where they should be" or where they are "supposed to be" or pretend to be. Shame and embarrassment tossed to the wind.

They run in defiance to the finality of death.

That is the inspiration and promise of Easter.

God upended and disrupted all of the expectations. Christ reversed course to overcome the cruelty of the cross. God's love doesn't follow the assumed path but meets us where we are, not where we "should" be, or pretend to be.

God Meets us in YOUR and OUR journey with God

That has been one of the through-lines and values that I have heard and seen come to Easter-life throughout my time at Trinity. This church welcomes siblings at every stage and age into the Body of Christ "wherever we/they are in your journey with God."

Mostly because we know that there really is no quick, easy, smooth, straight-ahead line in life or in faith. There is no direct A + B = C trajectory of the spiritual journey. God meets us in different moments of vulnerability, growth and transformation, mountain-tops of wonder and valleys of shadow.

We don't believe that God waits for us to decide to trust or make a choice to believe, instead God promises to meet us where we are, just like Jesus, in our own flesh and being.

Not because of where we should be or pretend to be, but because God loves us. So many Scripture passages lift up this promise:

God's mercies begin afresh every morning, God's steadfast love endures forever (Lamentations 3:22-23)

We cannot flee from God's presence, even to the ends of the earth or the depths of the sea, God is there (Psalm 139:7-10)

In Christ, God chooses to love us wherever and whatever happens to us no matter what (Romans 8:38-39)

Fluid Sacraments, Confirmation, and Life Passages

I have talked with so many families and caregivers through different life passages that haven't gone exactly as they expected.

It never really does, honestly.

Things didn't go as they thought or maybe something shifted in seasons and

a young one might have "missed" baptism or first communion or confirmation. I have often talked to many couples about the fact there that is no perfect time for a wedding and never the right time for a funeral. But we trust that God meets us wherever we are. And we

meet our siblings in the Body of Christ in making meaning not out of what "should" be, but out of the gifts of the Spirit flowing through us right now.

We don't believe there is any set age or stage that is excluded from any of God's gifts of grace, but we all keep growing and gleaning from the Table and Font, and as a church we WANT to and GET to celebrate that God meets us right where we are. Right here and now, schedules and timetables tossed to the wind.

Moving Like A River of God's Love in Relationship

If you or a loved one has any interest in spiritual growth around any of our shared Sacramental life (Baptism/Confirmation and Communion), if you would like to join a learning group or if you would like to renew vows or even talk through a funeral plan that you have had, I would be honored to talk about any or all of it.

There are no straight lines in the life of faith, but the Good News is that God in Christ meets us right where we are, and we get to a be an Easter community that celebrates the power of hope and resurrection.

Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! Alleluia.

HAPPY SPRING! Like many of you, Spring is my favorite season! It is a time of transition and hope! Plants are already beginning to sprout in the garden (rhubarb and strawberries) and I can't wait to start planting seeds! Trinity, too, is in a time of transition and "living" hope. I have been here at Trinity for 2 years this May – and I am so grateful to Pastor Chris for her trust, inspiration and leadership these 2 years. So now she transitions to a blessed retirement! Well done, good and faithful servant! Trinity has recently welcomed new staff – Megan Gaul (Communications) and Dana Kruse (Youth Faith Formation) and we anticipate the arrival of our interim Pastor this summer, who will help "shepherd" us through this transition to a new pastor and a new season in the life of Trinity.

MARCH 2025 INCOME VS EXPENSE

- FYTD Giving through March was \$831,484 (107% of Budget). 2024 YTD Giving was \$810,549.
- Total Income minus Missions- was \$1,160,604. (120% of Budget/\$90 in ERC Funds). 2024 Income was \$1,076,531. (\$60K in Council Designated Funds).
- Total Expenses minus Missions were \$935,725 (97% of budget). 2024 Expenses were \$983,303 (audit/higher mortgage payment).

FACILITIES

Here at Trinity, weather permitting, the tuckpointing and structural repair of the 3rd Street Heritage Chapel exterior will begin (April 22). The project is scheduled to be completed by Mid-July. This project is the 2nd funded project from the Comprehensive Campaign. Also, there is still a bit of work to be done out at the drive-in as well which includes the replacement of the roof on the projection building which should begin in early May. 



No Mow May

You don't need to go a full month without mowing. Mowing every two or three weeks can increase flower blooms and provide food for hungry bees and pollinators. If you do mow, set your mower height at the highest setting during the month. You'll still have a tidy lawn and give those pollinators the food they need.

Bring Your Own Bags to the Store


Shop for Your Produce at Farmers Markets or join a CSA

SCREAMING, DREAMING AND SCHEMING FOR A BETTER WORLD

I was in a meeting the other day, when a woman slammed the table and declared, "I've seen how this story ends. Scream! Scream as loud as you can." A little context helps here. The meeting was about refugee housing and the woman slamming the table was Evgenia. Evgenia left Russia ten years ago amid Putin's ruthless rise to power...which, of course, put an end to many stories.

The meeting consisted of folks from Russia, Ukraine, Colorado, Afghanistan and Minnesota. We were huddled around a small table at Caribou Coffee and batted around a host of ideas. The meeting was a bit chaotic, but out of it was borne Refugee Housing Minnesota (RHMN). It was unanimous the immediate goal would be to help refugees and newcomers pay May and future rents; to provide a cushion so these recent arrivals could catch their breaths, continue their job searches, and establish roots—without having to panic over whether they had a roof over their heads. The

long-term goal would be to add other services, resources and support.

Some back history. The Trinity Missions Team has been working with the Minnesota Council of Churches' (MCC) Refugee Services team over the past several months to help raise funds to pay refugee rents; this to make up for the federal funding abruptly frozen in January. A request for donations went out and churches of all denominations, mosques, book clubs, organizations and people (including many of you) opened hearts and checkbooks. As a result, two months'-worth of rent were raised for 43 recently-arrived, yet stranded, refugee families

Funding cuts have continued to the point where most resettlement agencies—including the one we'd been working with—have been dismantled. RHMN's goal is to help fill that void by providing refugee rent support. Office

space has been rented, a fiscal sponsor secured, a website created and volunteers are already at work.

So, as Evgenia suggested, we should all continue to scream for what we believe in; rally, write, volunteer, vote, talk. Diane Butler Bass recently wrote, "You are part of the solution. Get to work and do something about injustice. Stand up to evil. Feed the hungry. Care for

the suffering. Don't beg for a miracle or a magic fix. Just do it."

One way to scream is with checkbooks and piggy banks. One cause you can support is RHMN. You can find out more about the goals of the group, meet the team and make a donation by visiting www.refugeehousingMN.org. All donations go directly toward housing and all are tax deductible. If you wish to donate visit https://www.refugeehousingmn.org/ donate.

For those wanting to be involved in other ways, there are volunteer opportunities for interpreters, drivers and befrienders. The most urgent needs are for pro-bono legal and accounting help.

June is Pride month-what does this mean? Learning Together 101

You can easily enough see how this kind of thing works by looking no further than your own body. Your body has many parts—limbs, organs, cells—but no matter how many parts you can name, you're still one body. It's exactly the same with Christ. By means of his one Spirit, we all said good-bye to our partial and piecemeal lives. We each used to independently call our own shots, but then we entered into a large and integrated life in which he has the final say in everything. (This is what we proclaimed in word and action when we were baptized.) Each of us is now a part of his resurrection body, refreshed and sustained at one fountain his Spirit—where we all come to drink. The old labels we once used to identify ourselves—labels like Jew or Greek, slave or free—are no longer useful. We need something larger, more comprehensive. 1 Cor. 12-13 The Message

Celebrating June as Pride month in the US began with ideas and actions over one hundred years ago! In 1923, 31-year-old Henry Gerber returned from Germany after three years of the US Army during World War I. While in Germany, Gerber witnessed an organized movement to secure civil rights for gay persons, and he hoped to begin a similar culture in the US upon returning. In December 1924, Gerber and six allies formed the Society for Human Rights, and began publishing

a newsletter, Friendship and Freedom. Unfortunately, the police arrested Gerber and his allies, jailed them for three days with no charges filed, destroyed Gerber's papers, and Gerber lost his job. Gerber persisted under a pen name, but his identity, work and advocacy was virtually erased.

Fast forward to June 28, 1969. The Stonewall Inn, Greenwich Village, New York, a friendly and inclusive meeting place for the LGBTQIA+ community was raided, followed by arrests and multiple days of protests and riots. This is not the first recorded story of protests calling attention to human rights for the gay community. Beginning in 1965, gay rights activists in Philadelphia had been holding protests for basic human rights, but these protests required men to wear business attire and women to wear skirts and blouses.

Following the Stonewall uprising, a public march to commemorate the event was planned for June 29, 1970. A suggested slogan for the march was 'Gay Power', but this was rejected because the gay community did not yet feel empowered. Rather, the community did feel pride in their identity, thus the term "gay pride" was chosen.

In 1999, the one-day Stonewall event grew to a month-long event and June was declared Pride month by President Bill Clinton. The experiences, support and advocacy of Army officer Henry Gerber seventy-six years earlier were beginning to take root. Celebrating the beauty and identity of all God's LGBTQIA+ children was named publicly as a value.

In 2025, the Trinity community continues its participation in celebrating Pride month. Two examples are the June 1st Pride worship services, and the June 21st Valley Wide Pride Festival, Hudson WI, where Trinity will host a booth. You are invited to publicly show your support by attending

these events, including being a part of the festival booth.

What else might you do?

In Corinthians, Paul invites us to enter into a larger and integrated life where Jesus has a say in everything, including releasing old labels of identity and understanding ourselves in a larger and more comprehensive way. Trinity publicly proclaims this comprehensive life by displaying a Pride flag, letting our LGBTQIA+ family, friends, neighbors, and community know we value ALL God's children as part of the Body of Christ.
