INTERIM PASTOR JEN HACKBARTH

When I begin a new interim position, I often get asked questions about why I choose to serve in this type of ministry as well as what it involves. Here's a little peek into my history and my role as an interim pastor.

My very first experience as a pastor was in an interim role. After my husband Tim and I araduated from Luther Seminary in St. Paul in 2003, we moved to Dawson, MN for Tim's first call as pastor at Providence Lutheran Church. I was still waiting for my first call to a congregation, so the SW MN Synod arranged for me to fill in at a three-point parish in the nearby town of Clarkfield. Each Sunday I drove 60 miles roundtrip to lead worship at each congregation (the 8am worship service had an average attendance of 5 people!). I served there only a few months, but I still remember the warmth of the people and the sadness I felt when I ended my time with them. It was my first introduction to the joys and challenges of interim ministry.

I went on to serve two settled calls with a short interim position between them. In 2022, as I wrapped up 13 years as a solo pastor at Christ the King in White Bear Lake, I felt drawn to return to interim ministry. I had heard there was a lot of transition in the synod--many pastors were retiring or moving to new positions after two years of walking with congregations through the pandemic. Interim pastors were needed, and I decided it was time to follow the Spirit's call for me to help congregations dealing with changes in leadership.

Since 2022, I've served as an interim pastor at five congregations. My goals are to help congregations address challenges, discover their emerging identities and to prepare the way for new leadership. While it can feel tempting to rush through transition, when congregations embrace the interim time, it has lasting benefits. I followed a wonderful interim pastor at one of my calls, and she and the congregation laid a foundation during the interim time that positively impacted my years of ministry with them. I hope and pray to do the same for congregations I serve and the pastors that follow me.

Interim work is fascinating and fast-paced. I work hard to bond quickly with a congregation and staff and "start with the end," trying to take advantage of this short opportunity. My favorite part of interim ministry is getting to know different congregations and witnessing the work of the larger church. Each congregation has a unique personality and history, yet they all experience similar joys and concerns, no matter the context. Most of all, I've seen each congregation earnestly seek to faithfully share the gospel. Each congregation matters!

I work closely with the St. Paul Area Synod during my interim work. Each month, I write a report for the synod updating them about the transition process. The synod also hosts a monthly gathering of St. Paul interim pastors that includes worship, learning and sharing. This is in addition to many phone calls, emails and conversations over coffee between synod staff and me. The transition process is a joint effort between the interim pastor, the synod and congregational leadership.

I tell people that I will consider moving on from interim ministry once the goodbyes get too difficult. Interim pastors give pieces of our hearts to each congregation we serve. Completing my work with a congregation fills me with mixed emotions. I grieve leaving people I've connected with, and I grieve that I won't be with them as they embrace their new future. Yet I also rejoice in their steps forward in Christ with new leadership. It's gratifying to know I've been a small part of helping a congregation move forward with hope in a challenging time.

Transition Team Update

As September begins, the Trinity council is working to form the Transition Team, a group of Trinity members who will listen and learn about the congregation. Their work will take anywhere from 6-9 months and will directly impact the formation of the Ministry Site Profile, a document about Trinity that will be shared with the Synod and potential pastoral candidates once the Call Committee is formed (this will happen after the Transition Team's work is completed). Look for more information about ways to participate from the council very soon.

New Presiding Bishop Yehiel Curry and Trinity's "Skills, Interests, and Ways to Serve"



It was such a blessing to be "in the room where it happened" – electing the first African descent Presiding Bishop of the ELCA. Bishop Curry's gifts for leadership and mission could not be a better fit for the needs of the church right now. He shined through all of the questions, often quoting a scripture passage that informed his own story.

But one of the most compelling elements for me that he embodies and names is how anyone could get caught up in God's grace in our church and find their way to the highest levels of our organization. You can read more of his story in Living Lutheran online, but Bishop Curry didn't expect to be a pastor or bishop, he wasn't part of any traditional pipeline, and he didn't think he was good enough. He started out as someone seeking after God's love in Jesus, in the pews with his family, discerning what was next in his faith. He was restless and wrestling, joining a church that wasn't

quite "official" in the ELCA yet or ready for him but aspiring to be.

I love that in the tradition of a priesthood of all believers/baptized, Bishop Curry reflects the Pentecost promise of the Holy Spirit uplifting quite literally EVERYONE. All of God's people – diverse, equitable, and inclusive. Jesus finds a place for you. And you. And you too.

Bishop Curry also named the progress and investment that our dear ELCA has made to make his election possible. Mission support and mission imagination has allowed new churches to form and the denomination to shift to support demographic changes in our country. Under Presiding Bishop Eaton's leadership, the church has also worked hard to build collaborative connections, youth engagement, BIPOC, and LGBTQIA2+ language. We are not done yet, but good investments have been made to listen to the cries of historically underrepresented siblings and the voice of the Spirit.

Gifted Abundance in Community and New Survey

While a little different in calling and context, Trinity mirrors much of the work at the very top of the ELCA, seeking to journey with the whole priesthood of God through this season of transition and preparing for the arrival of our next lead pastor. It will certainly be someone who is in the pews like Bishop Curry with a wrestling passion for the Gospel for all of God's people.

As we begin a new program season this Fall 2025, to assist the staff and Ministry Teams and the picture of the congregational life at Trinity, we are inviting you to take time and pray for who we are as a community—for who God is calling us to become. This moment offers a unique opportunity not only to support one another but also to step into leadership, service, and spiritual growth in new ways.

Later this month, we will be sharing a brief survey of "Skills, Interests, and

Ways to Serve"—available in both paper and electronic formats—to help all of us identify where we feel called to contribute and how we might best use our gifts in the life of the church.

When each of us finds ways to connect and serve, we all do better. The whole world does better.

As we are always inviting and adding more seats at Jesus' table, we also want to provide places for folks to stretch their wings, lift their prayers, and offer their presence, playfulness, and peacefulness in community.

This is not about filling holes or checking boxes—it's about building the Body of Christ, both new and renewing. Because God first loved us, we serve.

By identifying where your gifts align with Trinity's needs, we are collectively equipping and shaping the future God is calling each of us to for the sake of the life of the whole world.

We hope you'll take time to reflect, pray, and respond with joy and intention when the survey becomes available. In this sacred in-between space, you are needed. And God is already at work among us.

One of Bishop Curry's and other leaders in the church have been clear that everyone isn't called to be a pastor or a deacon (thanks be to God!), but everyone is called to find their place with Jesus in this holy priesthood.

May we like Bishop Curry, find that place at Trinity and continue to play our part in God's flourishing.

GREETINGS TRINITY!

WE ARE A GRATEFUL PEOPLE! Last fall, you may remember our stewardship theme was "We Are A Generous People." And you responded and were certainly generous! With the end of our fiscal year (8/31/25) fast approaching, we remain on track to meet our fiscal year budget and have maintained a \$0 balance on our line of credit since January 2025. The Stewardship Team recently met to discuss this year's theme. As we reflected on last year's theme – we decided we would build on the theme. "We Are..." Such an interesting prompt! I invite you to fill in the blank. Who do you say, __?" The Stewardship Team unanimously agreed our theme this year would be "We Are A Grateful People." We are grateful for the extraordinary generosity that sustains our ministries, for the dedicated volunteers who give their time and talents, and for the spirit of community that fills this church with love and purpose. We are grateful for each other. This year, as we embrace our theme, we invite you to reflect on what gratitude means in your life. How does it show up in your service, your giving? How does it deepen your faith? Together, let's celebrate the many ways we live out our gratitude - not just in words, but in action. We are a grateful people - and because of that, we are a hopeful people, a joyful people, a faithful people. Together, let us move into the coming year with hearts full of gratitude and purpose.

JULY 2025 INCOME VS. EXPENSE.

- FYTD General Contributions through July were \$1,194,631 (98% of Budget). 2024 YTD Giving was \$1,181,644.
- FYTD Total Income through July minus Missions- was \$1,604,079 (106% of Budget/\$90 in ERC Funds). 2024 Income was \$1,521,619 (\$60K in Council Designated Funds).
- FYTD Expenses through July minus Missions were \$1,439,510 (95% of budget). 2024 Expenses were \$1,519,130.
- As of 8/1/25, the FSB Line of Credit balance was \$0.

JULY 2025 STEWARDSHIP UPDATE.

- Total Pledged: \$1,032,125.
- Total Pledge Given: \$710,592.03.
- 69% has been given of the pledged amount.
- Total Contributed (all): \$756,241.69

JULY 2025 COMPREHENSIVE CAMPAIGN UPDATE.

- Total Pledged: \$1,853,458.
- Total Contributed (pledge): \$1,632,350.
- Percent Complete (pledge): 88%.
- Total Contributed (all): \$1,706,395.

MORTGAGE

As of 8/1/25 the Thrivent mortgage balance was **\$1,685,293**. The additional check from the Comprehensive Campaign to principle in July was **\$4,810**. In August, we will make a substantial additional check to principle with the large, non-pledge gift we received in July.

SECURITY TASK FORCE

This team was initiated by the Church Council to develop a security plan to ensure all individuals' access to the building is controlled. With the recent approval from the Church Council, a video doorbell system will be installed to the 4th Street doors so that we can monitor access to the church building during regular office hours. Plans are also currently underway for the Library to move to the Nursery room across from the River Room. We hope this project will be completed by the end of September.



Say All the Words, Say Them Out Loud-Learning Together 101

On July 15, 2025, for the first time in my life I saw a full, complete, double rainbow in the sky! A sign of God's amazing, humbling, breath-taking, beautiful imagination at work! An opportunity to yet again be amazed-and humbled-by what God the Creator unexpectedly brings to light when least expected!



I wondered if a different word existed for a double rainbow? What I discovered was there are twelve different kinds of single arc rainbows, plus double rainbows, twinned rainbows, and rainbows in space! Different rainbows depend on how much of a certain color is visible and the reflection in the water droplets. I was amazed! I specifically learned that in a double rainbow, the colors of the second rainbow are reversed, with red inside and blue outside. I never knew that God created so many different kinds of rainbows!

I hope the next time you see a rainbow, you look closely to see what God is up to in that unique and colorful creation!

Likewise, when you see a rainbow flag such as the one hanging on Trinity's building exterior, what do you notice?

At first glance, it may look like the other rainbow flags displayed as part of the Pride community since 1978, when creator Gilbert Baker designed the first rainbow flag to represent the LGBTQ community. Baker said,

"I thought of flags in a new light. I discovered the depth of their power, their transcendent, transformational quality. I thought of the emotional connection they hold."

A simple rectangle of colorful fabrics sewn together became a symbol of September 2025 • Trinity Today the "rainbow of humanity" and has changed people's lives ever since. LGBTQ people could now see themselves both as individuals and as part of the community through this flag.

Thanks to the effects of bright sunshine, Trinity's exterior Pride flag had become a little less bright. It was time for a new flag. If you look closely, you will notice it looks a bit different than the previous Progressive Pride rainbow flag, The new flag includes a purple circle within a yellow triangle. No, the new colors do not represent the MN Vikings!

At the June 1st Pride worship services, Pr. Peter called us in the sermon to "say all the words, say the words out loud". Pr. Peter was referring to all the words-and the people- included in the LGBTQIA+ community. A new flag design is an opportunity for Trinity to say-or in this case display-more of the LGBTQIA+ words.

Since 1978, additional letters have been added to LGBTQ, thus representing a more diverse understanding of people within this community. One addition is Intersex, represented by the "I", and on the Pride flag represented by yellow and purple.

As Pr. Peter also shared, there is "discomfort in not knowing". To help in our journey as lifelong learners, a brief explanation of Intersex follows:

Intersex is an umbrella term for people who are born with one or more traits in their chromosomes, genitals, hormones, or reproductive organs that don't fit the typical male or female patterns. Some of their traits might not match the sex they were assigned at birth or may combine traditionally understood male and female traits.

While intersex traits are often noticed at birth, the differences aren't always obvious then. People might discover they have intersex traits at puberty or in adulthood, sometimes as a result of medical testing for infertility. In rare instances, such differences are found in autopsies, after people have died. WebMD

It is estimated 1 out of 100 Americans are intersex, or 1.7 %, the same percentage as people born having red hair or an identical twin.

The 2021 Intersex-Inclusive Pride flag, now displayed at Trinity, is the most up-to-date flag. The yellow and purple colors are gender neutral, and the unbroken circle symbolizes completeness and the right of intersex



people to be recognized as whole and valid as they are. This new Inclusive-Intersex flag reflects what Gilbert Baker stated in 1978: flags have power, they are transcendent and transformational, and they create an emotional connection.



Those same words -transcendent, transformational, power, and emotional connections-capture the experience of seeing a rainbow and then learning there is so much more to rainbows than imagined! I invite you to look closely the next time you see a rainbow and look for differences you may not have previously noticed. And to also be open to this same wonder regarding the diversity of God's children. God is a transformational artist, both on the Earth and in the Sky!

A Review of the 2025 Churchwide Assembly from the Viewpoint of Racial Justice

The 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly (CWA) opened July 28 at the Phoenix Convention Center. The CWA is the primary decision-making body of the church, and meets every three years. The assembly convened under the theme "For the Life of the World," and took several noteworthy actions in the form of elected leaders, approved memorials (statements of action), and conducted other business relevant to the work of racial justice and equity.

Especially noteworthy was the election of ELCA leaders. For the first time in church history, the CWA elected an African-American presiding bishop, Yehiel Curry; and an African American secretary of the ELCA, Lucille "CeCe" Mills – this by the Whitest denomination in America. Both Curry and Mills participated in the ELCA's Theological Education for Emerging Ministries (TEEM) program, which prepares individuals for ordain ministry in the ELCA, with a focus on emerging ministry contexts such as ethnic-specific, multicultural, and urban and rural settings.

When speaking at the CWA about his vision for the future of the ELCA, Curry said, "When we're talking about casting a vision, I think people want to be part of a vision because they want to share in the process. But they typically will also share in the burdens as well. So, part of my vision is [about] those things we've lifted up as a church that we said we need to do, we're going to do, and find a way to bring more people to the table so that we might embody that work instead of it just being a written document."

The CWA also focused on and advanced several initiatives to engage the church in supporting Indigenous communities. For example:

On Day 2 of the CWA, the assembly was invited by the American Indian and Alaska Native Lutheran Association to wear red to bring awareness to missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.



The session continued with an update by the ELCA Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery Task Force, The task force was formed to implement a comprehensive and churchwide repudiation of the doctrine, which allowed European, and later American, nations to claim lands occupied by Indigenous or other non-European, non-Christian people as federal property.

Manuel Retamoza And Amy Odgren, co-chairs of the task force, presented the group's findings. They spoke about the church's Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women movement efforts and highlighted the ELCA's Truth & Healing Movement, led by Vance Blackfox, ELCA director for Indigenous ministries and tribal relations, as well as the truth-seeking and truth-telling initiatives revolving around Indian boarding schools.

"Ask your pastor, your deacon, your synod bishop, what is being done to address the ELCA's commitment to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery," Retamoza said, encouraging participants to visit elca.org/indigenous for resources.

Finally on Day 2 of the CWA, a memorial was approved on the *Indian Boarding School Remembrance*: Calls for the church to observe the National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools annually, develop educational programs and materials surrounding the history and ELCA's complicity with Indian boarding schools, and provide ongoing recognition and support for the continued work to locate all known records regarding the ELCA predecessor churches' involvement with Indian boarding and day schools, among other actions.

The National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools is observed on September 30th in both the United States and Canada. It is a day dedicated to acknowledging and remembering the horrific history and ongoing impacts of Indian Boarding Schools on Indigenous communities.

A brief background: Between the late 1800s and the 1960s, the US government and various churches, including Lutheran churches, operated a system of Indian boarding schools aimed at forcibly assimilating Native American children into Euro-American culture.

Minnesota had sixteen boarding schools, which drew children from all eleven of Minnesota's Indian reservations.¹

Children were forcibly removed from their homes, sometimes sent hundreds or thousands of miles away, and forbidden to speak their native languages or practice their cultural traditions. The boarding schools were often overcrowded, understaffed, and underfunded, leading to widespread disease, abuse, neglect, and even death. This policy, often summarized by the phrase "Kill the Indian, Save the Man," inflicted immense trauma on individuals, families, and entire Indigenous communities, a trauma that continues to impact generations today.

The primary purposes of the National Day of Remembrance:

- To honor the victims and survivors of these schools and acknowledge the intergenerational trauma they continue to experience.
- To raise public awareness about the history of the boarding school system and its devastating consequences, which have often been left out of standard history lessons.
- To support healing and reconciliation efforts for individuals, families, and communities impacted by the boarding school era.
- To advocate for policies and actions that address the ongoing needs of survivors and descendants, including truth-seeking and healing initiatives.

By participating in the Day of Remembrance, individuals and communities, including the Trinity community, can contribute to a more just future and play a role in the ongoing healing process for Indigenous communities affected by the Indian boarding school system.

In the week before September 30, the Racial Justice Ministry Team will be hanging a display to remember and honor the sacred lives of children who were taken to Indian boarding schools. The Team will also provide educational materials and suggestions for how Trinity members can get involved. During our worship on September 28, we will seek to confess our role in the tragic and sinful history of Indian boarding schools so that we can journey towards healing and reconciliation.




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Grand Opening: "The River Connects Us" Exhibit Opening!
