Dear Friends in Christ,

When I was in my 20s, I developed an intense fear of flying. I can't identify the exact moment this fear began, but a combination of experiences with turbulence and a harrowing flight through a snowstorm didn't help. I also wonder if it coincided with growing up, as I no longer felt invincible and worried about my family, which included my new husband. Whatever the reasons, this new fear made flying miserable. I started dreading flights days ahead of time and was exhausted when I reached my destination. I loved traveling, but it started to feel like a burden rather than a joy.

I dealt with a fear of flying for years. Learning about the mechanics of flying helped a bit, as did traveling with people who could comfort me during flights. Yet what finally helped me was deciding that the fear didn't serve me. The fear wasn't keeping me safe or helping anyone. It was making my life smaller and draining me for no good reason. I learned to feel the fear and let it go. I still have scary moments on flights, but I've come a long way.

This year's Advent theme is "What Do You Fear?" Our stories as people of God are shaped by our ancestors in the faith who stood up to their fears. Jacob wrestled with an angel of God until he was given a blessing. Moses led his people through the Red Sea to freedom despite his insecurities. Esther approached a volatile king to save her people. The psalmist wrote,

"The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?"

There is much to fear in today's world. As we enter into the season advent, we are reminded that God chose to arrive as a vulnerable newborn baby in a humble setting. God could have arrived in a palace, surrounded by walls and security, yet God's power is not found in safety. God's power is present in solidarity, in uniting with those experiencing suffering and oppression. This is where we find hope.

How easy it would be to give in to cynicism during these days. Cynicism tells us that the world is dangerous, to trust no one, and that cynics are smarter than people who are optimistic. It insists that a pessimistic view of the world keeps us safe.

Yet there is nothing safe about advent. Jesus arrived to a displaced family and his birth was soon followed by death threats. Throughout his life, Jesus' security did not come from lack of danger, but from his trust in God. Jesus knew fear, but he approached the world with an open heart.

The subtitle of our advent theme is "insisting on hope." To live means to deal with fear, but fear doesn't serve us or God's purposes. It doesn't keep us safe. To hope means to believe that the world can still change, that goodness still exists and that God's kingdom is among us. We can feel the fear, yet trust in God.

Psychologist Jamil Zaki says, "Cynicism is a self-fulfilling prophecy. When you give up on possibility, those possibilities go away, and this is part of why I think it's so important to hold on to hope. To me, hope is not naïve or pie in the sky, it's practical. It's what keeps us energized and keeps us fighting for a future that most of us want by allowing us to see it more clearly."

During advent, we wait in two ways: for the Christ child to be born, and for Jesus' return to redeem all of creation. We live in the in-between, when the promises of Christ sustain us. We rely on God's vision for the future to guide us, and we bring this future into our lives today through our faithful actions as the body of Christ.

What fears aren't serving you today? How is the false promise of safety keeping you stuck? How are the promises of God's future opening your life today?

Advent is Home and the Holy Work of Housing One Another

This week, with a steady flow of key Trinity stakeholders and partners, I had the immense joy of touring the new Emergency Housing Services Building.

It's beautiful and bright, modern and open, so much more than gleaming countertops and tile flowers.

Tucked into the corner of the Washington County Gov. Center Campus, it is a statement of faith and imagination, of God's discernment turned to action.



From way back to the early days of Trinity's Warming Space in 2019 and listening to the stark reality that there was no place for our neighbors to go. There were no beds for single folks who lost a job, or lost insurance, other than a rest stop or parking lot.

We felt convicted with many faith communities to shift our language and understanding from a "problem to be solved" and "shelter" to an opportunity to express our values and seeing the inherent Belovedness of our neighbors.

A shift toward the powerful promise of Advent:

God makes a home among us. God makes home here, Emmanuel, Jesus with us. In the flesh. In the manger.

Not in perfection or stability, but right in the middle of human vulnerability, in a borrowed room, among people who were themselves far from secure.

In Jesus, God chooses to be housed in the fullness of our humanity: our emergencies and fears, our fragile hopes, our deep longing for belonging.

Home is everything. It's both basic and expansive. Where we are is where God is. Which isn't the structure or a building. It's

who we are as community. It's the blessings that we share. It's the abundance of God's purpose for us. It's the relationships that bind us together. It's protection and sanctuary and sabbath. Home is where we experience hope.

That is why the opening of Washington County's new Emergency Housing Services Building feels so connected to the heart of Advent. It is, quite literally, a place where neighbors experiencing instability can find home for a time. A warm, dignified space designed to honor their wholeness even in a season of disruption. It's a proven model (with 24/7 support from Stepping Stone) that works, that restores, that rebuilds, that renews.

As the temperatures drop and the nights lengthen, this season invites us to remember that the Holy One is already present wherever hospitality is offered, wherever dignity is protected, wherever people gather to create belonging for someone who has been pushed to the margins.

I am so grateful to have seen those first seeds come to fruition. In all the hard organizing work (Rev. Jenny Mason, HSAT, MICAH, Heading Home collaborative) that has been done to build this infrastructure in our backyard and all those who will continue to be blessed by finding home.



Advent hope is not passive; it asks us to stay awake, to face our fears, to keep watch, to look for light, to plant seeds in the dark, and participate in God's ongoing arrival.

May we continue to give thanks for home, for finding it together in God's love for us in Jesus and for sharing it with ALL.

"Fear and Light" — A Community Invitation

For Trinity's intergenerational Christmas program this year, we invite you to pause and reflect on the quiet beauty of that familiar carol line from O Little Town of Bethlehem: "Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting Light."

Everlasting light sometimes flickers. Sometimes it blazes. God's light often illuminates the valleys of shadow in our lives: grief, loneliness, worry, uncertainty. Jesus' birth in Bethlehem reminds us that God's light does not wait for perfect conditions. It shines into our fear, bringing warmth, courage, and hope right where we are.

Implications of the Gospel Infancy Stories

During the Christmas season we are introduced to the baby Jesus through stories told in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. While we have no drawings or historical descriptions of Jesus and know relatively little about his family, we can imagine, from these stories, what he may have looked like, along with other notable attributes.

Infancy Stories Summarized

Matthew begins with a genealogy for Jesus from Abraham to King David to Jesus. His birth is announced to Joseph in a dream by "an angel of the Lord." It's also in Matthew that the

Magi "from the east" – likely Babylon or Persia – visit the baby Jesus and present him with gifts. Subsequently, we learn about the holy family's flight to Egypt to escape King Herod, moving to Nazareth only after Herod's death, where Joseph works as a carpenter.

Luke traces Jesus' genealogy from Jacob through David to Jesus. His birth is announced by the angel, Gabriel, who visits Mary with the news. Luke also describes Joseph and Mary's journey to Bethlehem,

a small rural town, for a census. There Jesus is born and laid in a "manger," a feeding trough for animals – as other rooms weren't available. Here we meet the shepherds who are the first to visit Jesus and share this good news with others. Eight days later, Jesus is presented at the Temple in Jerusalem, consistent with Jewish law and tradition.

The Jesus that Emerges

So how might we imagine Jesus, in light of these stories? How do we as Christians hear, read, and interpret these stories? Following are some points to consider. First, Jesus was a member of a devout Jewish family – a religious minority. His father was a carpenter and his first "bed" was a feeding trough, suggesting a poor, working class family. His ethnicity was likely in line with the Jewish people of 1st-century Judea, dark skin, dark short curly hair, and Semitic features. Interestingly, the earliest depictions of Jesus, found in catacomb paintings in Rome (2nd–3rd centuries CE), show him with dark skin, short dark hair, without a beard, and in a youthful Greco-Roman style—an image probably influenced more by cultural assimilation than historical accuracy.

Jesus and his family were also refugees to Egypt for some years, where they fled the murderous Herod, not unlike many of today's refugees seeking asylum in our country today. The first witnesses to Jesus' birth were foreigners - the Magi – and the socially marginalized – the shepherds. In Jesus' society, shepherding constituted one of the lowest social, political and economic roles. They were considered untrustworthy, and their work – according to some interpretations of Torah - made them continually unclean. It seems, then, that the historical Jesus, himself, came from the margins of society - poor, refugee, religious minority, without political power. Moreover, the "good news" of Jesus was shared with and witnessed first by a community with little status, the shepherds; and those with no status at all, the foreign Magi. From the outset, God Incarnate was born of and for those on society's edges, not those in positions of privilege and power.

Implications for Us

The Christmas stories emphasize details that we can't afford to miss. Jesus being born into poverty, being announced to the socially outcast, and his parents becoming violence-fleeing refugees for the wellbeing of their child. There is an entire foundation here on which to build a framework for Christians who are working toward social justice today. The stories

suggest the need for us as Church to prioritize the poor, the insignificant, forgotten, and the marginalized. These are the people who gathered at this lowly manger and dared to believe that the baby who lay there, this good news, belonged to them. The gospels' birth-narratives about Jesus are centered on them. People are of infinite value in these stories; especially people and communities who are marginalized by society. Indeed, as Jesus grows up,

he lives into this promise, to gather the outcast, the socially marginalized, those labeled and treated as less than by the privileged and powerful. And he calls for a society that does this, too.

Sadly, the Church has often missed out on building relationships and community with people pushed to the fringes of our larger society. And in some cases, we who carry the name of Jesus are the very ones who have driven these folks to society's fringes.

But the Christmas stories invite us again to something new. Another world is possible if we choose it. They hold wonderful encouragement for those of us seeking to enable Jesus' call to love and justice to speak through our lives.


God is already at work in the margins of our society. The question for those of us who wield some measure of power is whether we will participate in this socially transformative and holy work. So, wherever you are, keep choosing love, compassion, action, reparation, and justice.

This is what these Christmas stories are saying to me this year. What are they saying to you? Merry Christmas!



In 1897, the Stillwater Public Library became a free, public lending institution, following its 1859 launch as a subscription-based lending library. 
