INTERIM PASTOR JEN HACKBARTH

Thank you.

Thank you for the warm welcome I've received since I began at Trinity on July 1. I've enjoyed getting to know your wonderful staff and leadership and to meet many of you in worship, both in the Trinity building and in your cars at the Drive-In! What an honor it is to walk with Trinity in this time of change.

The coming months may bring anxiety and unsteadiness, yet they will also bring opportunity and excitement. Together we will take time to reflect on Trinity's life and mission as you seek to connect with a pastoral leader who will accompany you in your next steps in mission. Thank you for your patience, honesty and prayers as we move forward in Christ.

My son graduated from high school in 2024. His senior year was full of lasts—the last concert, the last game, the last first day of school. I felt like an open nerve, my protective covering gone and my emotions exposed to the elements. I liked having my son tucked into his bed at night and at the dinner table for meals. There is comfort in keeping things the same.

Transitions always begin with an ending. There is death before there is life; you can't get to the resurrection without going through the cross. Jesus says in Mark chapter 8, "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it." In her book How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going, Susan Beaumont translates this verse as "We lose ourselves in order to find ourselves."

Transition is spiritual work. Opening ourselves up to the Spirit's movement is risky, and we often resist the Spirit or introduce change when the Spirit asks us to sit still. We get caught in our own egos and forget to listen to the Spirit's guidance.



I like to think of the Spirit as a cool breeze on a hot day, and at times it brings relief. Yet the Spirit's movement may also feel like a death, prying open our hands when we've gripped something too tightly, upsetting our balance and leaving us disoriented and untethered. At times the Spirit leads us to tenderness and vulnerability, leaving us perplexed and in a daze. Only then may we lose ourselves in order to find ourselves.

The apostle Paul writes in Romans 6, "We were buried with Christ through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life."

We are called in baptism to a cruciform life, dying each day to our old selves and rising with Christ. Life is full of "little deaths," including the deaths of our egos, our expectations, and our need to be in charge, impress others, and

stay comfortable. When we're focused on surviving, what are we missing?

There is peace in letting go. When we dropped my son at his dorm for his freshman year of college almost a year ago, there was a sense of unmooring in our household as we shifted into another stage of life. There was a lot of unknowing. It was also a year of promise and excitement as new opportunities presented themselves. In my good moments. I was curious about what was next and found delight in the changes; in my difficult moments, I remembered it's human to struggle with letting go and sensed the presence of the Spirit with me.

When my son returned home for the summer after his freshman year, I was surprised how much our daily patterns had changed over the past year. We'd all grown and embraced new identities.

During the laying on of hands in the baptism service, we thank God for the gifts of baptism. We pray for sustenance through the gifts of the Holy Spirit (Isaiah 11:2): the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence, both now and forever. Nowhere in baptism do we pray for survival, sameness, or comfort. Instead, we welcome wisdom, might, fear, and joy in the Spirit's presence. Transitions will happen, but the gifts of the Holy Spirit are with us.

Pulled Out of The Ditch

When I was growing up, I had a terrible time driving in the snow. Like really bad. I am not sure if it was the roads, old tires, or a mix of distracted driving even before I had my own cell phone.

We lived pretty far out of town on winding roads through the countryside and commuting back and forth for work or school or activities, I probably went into the ditch at least once a winter. Possibly more. I am not even sure how many times.

Thankfully, I often wasn't going very fast and the snow piles on the side of the road served as a fairly soft landing. I would be stuck just enough with a low-clearance vehicle for my wheels to helplessly spin. I really should have had a truck.

But undoubtedly, on almost every single occasion, after a little while I would see the lights of a tractor and a farmer appearing out of nowhere, coming down a long driveway, who would effortlessly pull me out of the ditch.

It was always a bit embarrassing getting pulled out, but also seemed like a way of being in the frozen north, the cab of the tractor warm and letting out steam through the cracked window.

While I did not like country roads in the winter, I did love living in a community that had the tractor warmed up to pull neighbors out of the ditch.

The Merciful Samaritan and the Samaritan God

If there was ever a story for our times, maybe a story for all time, for me it would be the Parable of the Neighborly Samaritan and representing Jesus' extra-mile-love.

When the Samaritan acts as a neighbor to the man left for dead on the side of

the road, he makes it look so easy. Like a farmer with a tractor.

He kneels down. He bandages wounds. He pours out oil and wine—costly acts of healing. He lifts the man onto his own animal and walks beside him. He pays for his care and even leaves a blank check for follow-up costs.

He does all of this not for a friend, not for someone from his community—but for a stranger. Possibly even someone who wouldn't have stopped for him.

And we're left wondering: What made it so easy for him to do good? Why didn't he hesitate? Why didn't he ask if it was worth it? Jesus doesn't say.

Perhaps the Samaritan had known what it felt like to be left behind, discarded, unseen. Maybe his own wounds had opened him to

compassion.

Or maybe it wasn't easy at all—but he had practiced mercy long enough that it had become a kind of muscle memory.

No matter the case, that's the kind of church that I crave. That's the community I want to cultivate. That's the sort of society that God dreams, where eternity meets us in the ditch.

As we move through these short days of summer, I wonder what makes it easy for you to serve? What makes us generous and willing to have the tractor cab warmed up and ready to go when we see someone in trouble?

I also wonder how we will respond and pull together, rather than pull apart, in the cutting of so many civic programs for health care, humanitarian assistance, refugee resettlement, and care for God's creation.

Jesus shows us in the merciful Samaritan that we want to live in a world where it's normal to stop. Where it's expected to care. Where structures of compassion keep people from ending up in the ditch to begin with.

Where it's easy to do good.

Where the tractor is warm and where God never leaves anyone in the ditch.

We had a joyful welcome for Pastor Jen Hackbarth on July 1! After our staff meeting, we gathered for a potluck lunch, which was not only a fun break but also sparked some great conversations. The staff has even decided to plan on a monthly staff potluck lunch! Already, Pastor Jen has brought a calming presence to this time of change. She is listening, observing, and showing a real gift for guiding us through this transition with care and wisdom. As we move forward together, let us remain united in prayer and open to the ways God is moving in and through Trinity. The best is yet to come!

MAY 2025 INCOME VS. EXPENSE

- FYTD General Contributions through June were 1,103,611 (99% of Budget). 2024 YTD Giving was \$1,108,333.
- FYTD Total Income through May minus Missions- was \$1,496,069 (108.5% of Budget/\$90 in ERC Funds). 2024 Income was \$1,431,413. (\$60K in Council Designated Funds)

As of 7/1/25, the Thrivent mortgage balance was **\$1,696,124.83**. An additional check from the Comprehensive Campaign to principle in June was \$21,017.87.

FACILITIES

The 3rd Street Heritage Chapel Exterior project is nearly complete. Advanced Masonry and Construction is currently working on some fabrication modifications to the east side doors' existing step railings. The railings will then be sand blasted, painted and reinstalled. The new chimney cap is being fabricated and Advanced Masonry is working on a date for a crane truck to lift the cap in place.

SECURITY TASK FORCE

This team was initiated by the Congregational Council to develop a security plan to ensure all individuals' access to the building is controlled. As requested by the Congregational Council, a Safety and Security Policy & Procedure Manual has been drafted and will be presented to the Council for approval at the August Council Meeting. Also, in August, pending approval by the Congregational Council, a video doorbell system will be installed to the 4th Street doors so that we can monitor access to the church building during regular office hours.

WEBSITE UPDATE

We are currently diligently working on the revised Trinity website. Pending any unforeseen challenges, we do plan to launch it in July. Stay tuned.


Indoor: 8:30 a.m. at Trinity Outdoor: 10 a.m. at our Drive-in location in Houlton, WI

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
Flathead Lake, Montana Adventure!

We need to keep in mind that inconvenience is not an excuse for not taking care of our environment. Yes, sometimes being sustainable and earth friendly takes some effort, but there is no Planet B. Let's all work together to keep it cleaner than we found it for the next generation.

Summer is a great time for plant based meals

As we move into the dog days of Summer, shift your grilling and meals from meat towards plant based alternatives. It's not only healthy for you, but it tastes

great! An example of a super easy and delicious alternative to burgers is the Portobello Mushroom Burger (https://oohlalaitsvegan.com/grilled-portobellomushroom-burger/). The mushroom caps are available at our local grocery stores.

- Place them in a bowl and marinate for 15 minutes in balsamic dressing (feel free to add other spices that you like!)
- You can grill, oven or stovetop cook.
- Cook each side for 5-8 minutes (depending on your source and the heat). You'll know they are done when you push on the stem stump and it's tender.
- Serve with the same ingredients you put on a meat burger.

To find great veggies and fruits for your plant based summer eating, visit a local farmer's market. We have a great one right here in Stillwater! Saturday Mornings! Located at 3rd & Pine Street, Riverview Parking Lot of the Stillwater Veterans Memorial, across from the Historic Courthouse.

Join the Washington County Food Scraps Program-It's FREE to Join!

As you eat more veggies and fruits, you'll have more food scraps. Put them to good use and compost them! Go to www.washingtoncountymn.gov/2969/Food-Scraps-Collection and sign up. The bags come to you for free (if you need a

container, that's free too! Just go pick one up). All you need to do is put your food scraps in the bags and place the bag in your garbage each week. It's THAT easy!

Ditch bottled water and use a reusable water bottle

Switching to a reusable water bottle (https://projectcleanwater.org/5-reasons-to-opt-for-reusable-water-bottles/) significantly reduces plastic waste, saves money and is healthier for you because of reduced exposure to chemicals and encourages more frequent hydration. You probably already have a reusable bottle in your home, but if not, now is the perfect time to get one that reflects your personal style and makes a statement about reducing waste and being healthy.



Hospice Kits

Throughout August, Trinity members can contribute to our hospice kit collection. These vital supplies will be assembled into comforting kits during TrinityFest, and then distributed to hospice patients in the Arusha, Tanzania area, as needed from Selian Hospice. Look for the collection baskets in the narthex or by the coffee at the Drive-In to make your meaningful gift.

One hospice kit includes:

- 1 regular size bath towel (approx. 52" long, new or gently used)
- 1 washcloth (new or gently used, NOT microfiber)
- 1 bath-size bar unscented soap in original package
 - (such as Dove Unscented for Sensitive Skin)
- 1 toothbrush, in original, individual packaging
- 1 pick-style comb
- 1 nail clipper, larger size preferred
- 6 band-aids, rubber-banded together
- 1 jar or tube of pure petroleum jelly, such as Vaseline (approx. 4 oz., lid taped)
- 1 pair heavy-duty household gloves (kitchen type, size medium)
- Pillowcase to protect these supplies while transporting.













When Your Ankle Bone suffers, Does it cause Your Knee Bone to Suffer too? Learning Together 101

Having grandkiddos offers moments to recall childhood memories, including the various songs and games woven into one's story, realizing how I often had little or no context for the words or activity. Shifting from kiddo to grandma creates opportunities for a different kind of curiosity about these childhood songs and games-especially before I introduce them to my grandkids.

I recently wondered about the game Operation. Do you remember this game? Participants choose a card, follow the instructions as they assume either the role of Doctor or Specialist, and use a tweezers to carefully remove a plastic object to correct a fictional and sometimes humorous malady (ex: spare ribs or water on the knee) of the patient, nicknamed Cavity Sam. Sam's outlined body rests inside the cardboard game box and has metal trim around openings where the "operation" will occur. The purpose of the game is learning eye-hand coordination and taking turns.

One game malady is titled the "ankle bone connected to the knee bone". This is the only instance where the game's participant does not remove a part from the body but rather connects parts of the body-the ankle to the knee-with a rubber band. I wondered about the origin of this specific connecting activity and learned it comes from an old spiritual song, Dem Bones! Do you know this song?

Toe bone connected to the foot bone Foot bone connected to the heel bone Heel bone connected to the ankle bone Ankle bone connected to the leg bone Leg bone connected to the knee bone



Knee bone connected to the thigh bone Thigh bone connected to the hip bone Hip bone connected to the back bone Back bone connected to the shoulder bone Shoulder bone connected to the neck bone Neck bone connected to the head bone Hear the word of the Lord.

Our body's parts are all connected! Yay! But wait-What? "Hear the word of the Lord"? I don't remember hearing those lyrics when I was young! I thought this song was a science lesson regarding how a body is connected! And now I've learned the lyrics come from a Biblical story that includes "hear the word of the Lord"?

The lyrics for Dem Bones was inspired by Ezekiel 37:1-14. The prophet Ezekiel comes upon a valley of dry bones, and God instructs Ezekiel to tell the people, "I will put my Spirit in you and you will live... and you will know that you have heard my word." God, through Ezekiel, gives a promise of restoration where all will live and be connected.

These promised connections are not made with rubber bands. Rather, the connecting occurs because God's spirit is present in God's people and God's words matter. Restoration is given, even when one's bones feel dried up from the world at hand. I had no idea when I played Operation with family and friends that the game had connections to a Bible story!

As often happens, God's word impacts us in different ways, depending on our current life experiences. Learning about God's promise through Ezekiel, the imagery of the human bones and body being connected, and the connection to the Operation game is timely for me. At the July Pride Justice Team meeting, the team reflected on the Bible verse,

If one part [of the body] suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part [of the body] is honored, every part rejoices. I Corinthians 12:26



For the Pride Justice team, which is committed to advocacy and ally ship with and for our LGBTQIA+ siblings, stories of suffering are a frequent part of our meetings, ministry, and actions. The team seeks to respond to the knowledge that the Body of Christ has many members-ankle, leg, knee, hip, shoulder and more. All different. All created in God's image. All vital to the Body. All recipients of God's love, grace, spirit, and restoration. Connected not by rubber bands, but by God as Creator, and as neighbors. If someone's bones are dry in the St Croix Valley, especially someone who is part of the LGBTQIA+ community, how can I, you, and we be an advocate and ally for human and spiritual restoration?

The intention of the game Operation is two-fold: to teach eye-hand coordination and to teach how to take turns. When my eyes see injustice for my LGBTQIA+neighbor, how is my hand — and its coordinating actions — responding? How am I applying the value of taking turns? Micah 6:8 provides direction. "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

As of July 11, 2025, there are 598 Anti-LGBTQIA+ bills in the U.S. (ACLU.org) What does justice and mercy look like in our neighborhoods, communities, and at Trinity, for our LGBTQIA+ siblings?

Awareness, Relationships, Commitment

Trinity's Racial Justice Ministry Team (RJMT) fosters awareness, relationships, and commitment to learn about the history, culture, and contributions of our BIPOC neighbors. Here's a look at our recent activities and what's coming up:

Recent Activities



Juneteenth, a federal holiday since 2021, commemorates June 19, 1865. On that day, Union General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, announcing that all enslaved people were free—more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation.

Celebrated since 1866 as the oldest African American holiday, Juneteenth is marked by parades, festivals, food, live music, and educational events, reflecting on the end of slavery and the ongoing struggle for racial equality. In June, some RJMT members attended celebrations in St. Paul's Rondo neighborhood. Perhaps we can organize a celebration in Stillwater next year!





Giants: Art from the Dean Collection of Swizz Beatz and Alicia Keys

Over two dozen Trinity members and friends, led by MIA docents Sara Wagner and Sheila-Marie Untiedt, recently explored the groundbreaking "Giants" exhibition. This first major showcase of the Dean Collection, owned by renowned

musicians Swizz Beatz and Alicia Keys, features nearly 100 significant works by Black diasporia artists.

The exhibition powerfully illuminates the renown and impact of legendary and canon-expanding artists. Preeminent figures like Barkley L. Hendricks, Esther Mahlangu, and Gordon Parks push artistic boundaries, while contemporary artists such as Hank Willis Thomas and Qualeasha Wood use diverse materials to celebrate Blackness and critique society. Works by Deana Lawson, Mickalene Thomas, Amy Sherald, and Titus Kaphar further challenge perceptions and command attention through striking monumentality, embodying the exhibition's "giant" ethos and the Deans' philosophy: "By the artist, for the artist, with the people.

Dakota People -Sacred Sites Tours

Explore Minnesota history from a Native (Dakota) perspective on a Sacred Sites Tour, led by Pastors Jim

Bear Jacobs (Mohican) and Kelly Sherman Conroy (Oglala Lakota). These tours offer a unique opportunity to learn through storytelling, reflection, and experiencing sites vital to the Dakota People.

The tours visit three significant sites located around Bdote (where the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers meet), an area central to Dakota creation stories and rich with historic and contemporary significance. Sites include:

- Fort Snelling State Park
- Dakota Internment Camp (following the Dakota-U.S. War in 1862)
- Pilot Knob Hill (a traditional burial ground)

While 2025 tours are currently full, more tours will be held in 2026. The RJMT will keep you informed of upcoming

Doctrine of Discovery and the ELCA's Statement of Repudiation. Mark your calendars! On October 12, at 10 AM, Brenda Blackhawk (Ho-Chunk) will speak at Trinity's Adult Forum. She'll discuss the Doctrine of Discovery, a legal and religious concept from the 15th century that justified Christian colonial conquest and advanced the idea of European cultural and religious superiority. This doctrine was incorporated into U.S. law, profoundly impacting Indigenous populations by facilitating land dispossession and exploitation.

Brenda will also highlight the ELCA's Statement of Repudiation of this Doctrine, adopted in 2016. This statement affirms the ELCA's commitment to eliminating the Doctrine from its programs, choosing instead to practice accompaniment with Native peoples, fostering partnerships that mutually enrich Indigenous communities. A 2021 follow-up declaration further confessed the ELCA's devaluation and invisibility of Indigenous people in American society.

Her talk will also cover ongoing efforts to identify tangible ways for congregations to support this stated repudiation.

In Minnesota, as of the 2022 census, the population of 5.7 million is predominantly White at 79.7%. Black or African Americans comprise the largest minority racial group at 6.7%, with the Native population making up 0.9% of the total.
