Friends in Christ,

With Trinity's mortgage now fully paid off, the congregation enters a new season of financial stability and opportunity. While eliminating nearly \$3 million in debt is a remarkable achievement, the long-term impact depends on thoughtful planning and faithful stewardship. It's not about paying off the mortgage; it's about expanding mission.

Planning is already underway for the 2026–2027 congregational budget. Without mortgage payments, Trinity expects to save \$171,468 over the course of the 2026–27 fiscal year, representing slightly more than 10% of the 2025–26 budget.

These funds will allow Trinity's council to address several pressing priorities that directly connect to our Core Values and faithful stewardship of our resources for the long haul:

- Caring for a building with years of deferred maintenance. Trinity's building is a tremendous community resource, and we place a high value on hospitality and welcome. A well-cared for building is a blessing for Stillwater for generations to come.
- Providing staff salaries and wages that better honor their faithful service after many years of only cost-of-living increases. This creates a sustainable model for staffing, encouraging staff retention and preventing the stress of sudden increases in staff pay after too many years of less-than-market value compensation.
- Expanding generosity and support for congregational ministries. What hasn't Trinity been able to fund that it can support now?
- Continuing to strengthen the operating reserve fund so it can eventually cover at least two months of average expenses and regulate cash flow throughout the year. This will also cover unexpected capital expenses.

Freed-up funds are already making a difference. Trinity has ordered a new dishwasher for the kitchen, along with a new water heater and water softener. The congregation is also repairing a recent HVAC system leak and installing hard-wired CO2 detectors. New hard-wired AEDs were installed in June. These projects support Trinity's core value of Radical Hospitality by ensuring the building remains safe, comfortable, and welcoming for everyone who enters.

Regular giving remains crucial as Trinity continues moving toward its goals and investing in ministry, mission, and a sustainable future. Together, Trinity looks forward to continuing to live into God's abundance.

Pastor Jen will lead a 4-week study on the book *Holy Spirit: Creative Power in Our Lives* by Dr. Lois Malcolm. All are welcome to discuss the Spirit's essential role in God's work in the world. Books will be ordered and interested participants can pick them up in the church office in early June. The study will meet in the Living Room at Trinity at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesdays June 24 and July 1, 8, & 15. No need to RSVP.

We're going on a journey!

Giving Summary

Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken” (Ecclesiastes 4:12)

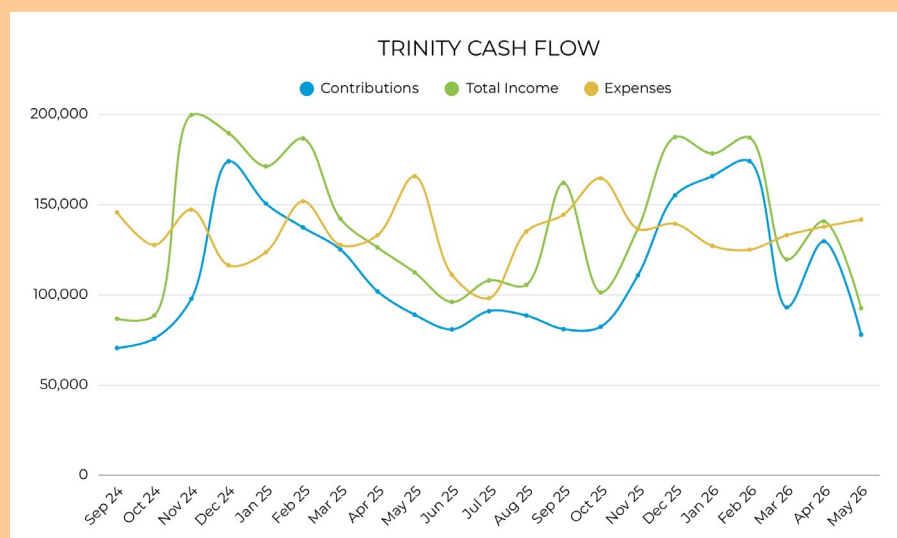
STRONGER TOGETHER. As we approach the 2026–2027 church budget with both gratitude and responsibility, recognizing that every dollar reflects our shared mission. While we celebrate being free from a mortgage payment –relieving us of a significant \$14,289 monthly (\$171,468 annually) obligation – we also face meaningful decisions about how best to steward these resources. There are many important needs competing for that same portion of the budget: fairly adjusting staff salaries after modest 2% increases since 2023, despite rising cost-of-living estimates (3.2% in 2023, 2.95% in 2024, 3.01% in 2025, and 3.8% projected for 2026), strengthening our financial foundation by building operating reserves to three months of expenses, and establishing a new building reserve fund for future needs.

At the same time, we remain deeply committed to continuing our mission and outreach efforts, ensuring that we serve both our congregation and the wider community. Balancing these priorities requires thoughtful, prudent budgeting and a spirit of unity. As we move forward, we invite and rely on the congregation’s continued generosity and partnership, knowing that it is only stronger together that we can faithfully respond to Christ’s call, care for our church family, and sustain the ministries that make a lasting difference.

As Scripture reminds us, *“Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken”* (Ecclesiastes 4:12). Indeed, we are stronger together—united in faith, purpose, and generosity—as we continue building the church Christ calls us to be.

MAY 2026 FYTD INCOME VS EXPENSE.

- FYTD Contributions were **\$1,055,250** (106% of Budget). 2024/25 YTD Giving was **\$1,022,409**.
 - Total Income – minus Missions and Anonymous Gift – was **\$1,274,842** (104% of Budget). 2024/25 Income was **\$1,399,181** (\$98,636/ERC).
 - Total Expenses – minus Missions – were **\$1,235,097** (100% of budget). 2024/25 Expenses were **\$1,239,110**.
 - Cash flow for May – **\$26,993.10** from Operating Reserves to cover payroll.
- OPERATING RESERVES: \$209,583.** FSB x3920: 1.500%



CASH FLOW. At a recent Finance Meeting, we discussed the impact on giving income to expenses. Below I include a graph that illustrates Trinity’s cashflow over the last 2 years:

STEWARDSHIP. In 2026, 266 pledges totaling \$1,012,998 has been pledged for the required \$1,300,000. \$545,193.83 (42%) has been given of the required \$1,300,000. Pledge and non-pledge giving is \$595,420 – approximately \$257,765 is annual giving from IRA, etc. and \$337,655 is from envelopes or online giving.

As always, a heartfelt thanks to each member of our congregation for your faithful stewardship, generosity, and commitment to Trinity’s mission. Your continued support enables us to care for one another, invest in our staff, strengthen our financial foundation, and extend Christ’s love to our community through meaningful outreach. As we move into this new budget year, we ask that you prayerfully continue your support so that, together, we can grow and serve in ways that honor God and reflect His purpose for our church.

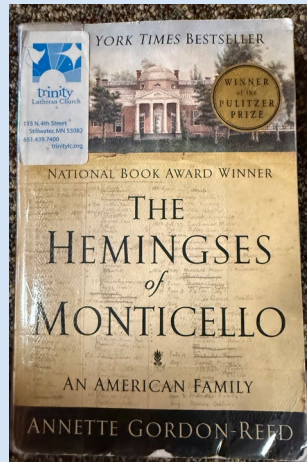

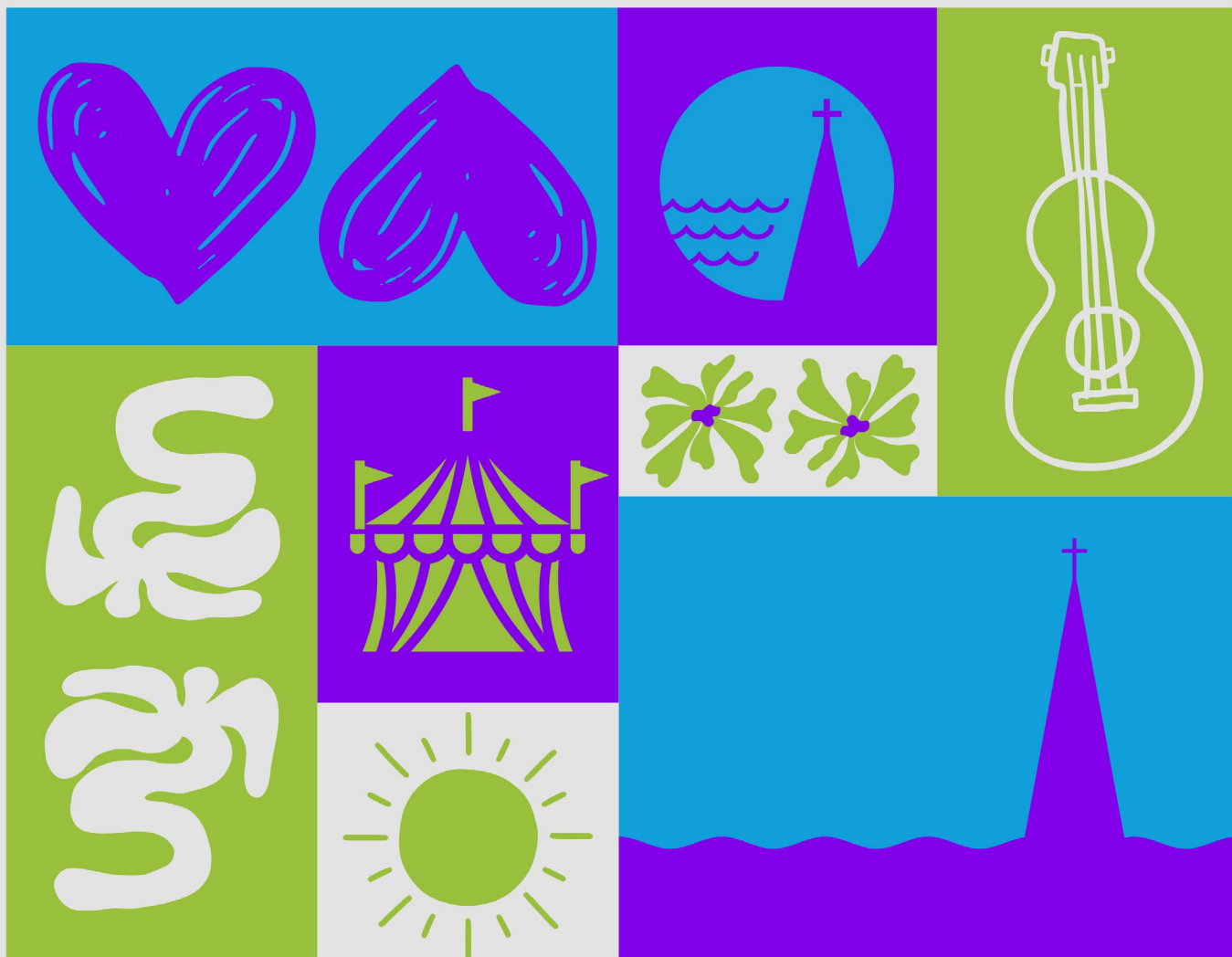

Our 250th Anniversary

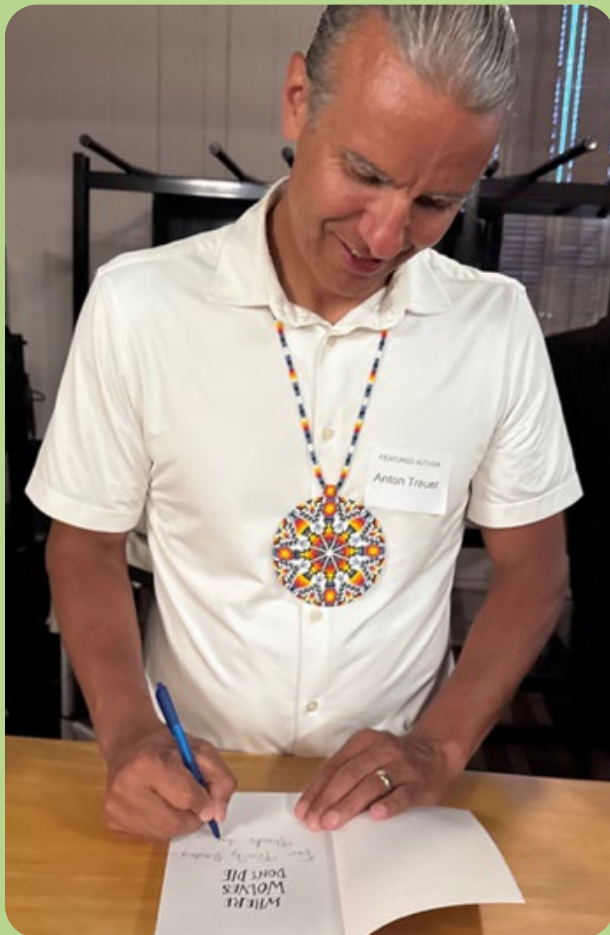

STIGMA GROWS IN SILENCE. HEALING BEGINS IN COMMUNITY.

NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) supports, educates, and advocates for community members who live with a mental illness as well as their friends and family members. NAMI is an organization run by volunteers and led by community input.

NAMI support groups provide ongoing support for families and friends of persons living with a mental illness. The support groups are facilitated by persons who have a family member with a mental illness and who have specialized training. There are a number of support groups in Washington County that meet on a regular basis. Drop ins are welcome at any meeting.

Ditch the Plastic This Summer

Summer cookouts and gatherings are in full swing. At your summer gatherings that involve food and drink, get the compostable disposable utensils and the paper cups and plates instead of the plastic ones. Better yet, mix it up and use the real thing! No waste and let the dishwasher take care of the rest.

Less Food Packaging

When shopping for summer cookouts and gatherings, pay attention to the packaging of the food you buy. Look for food that uses minimal packaging and paper packaging instead of plastic and styrofoam. And don't forget to bring your own bags to the store!

Join the Washington County Food Scraps Program-It's FREE to Join!

Summer cookouts mean food prep and non-eaten scraps. Remember the scraps can be composted. Go to washingtoncountymn.gov/2969/Food-Scraps-Collection and sign up for the food scraps program. The bags come to you for free (if you need a container, that's free too! Just go pick one up). All you need to do is put your food scraps in the bags and place the bag in your garbage each week. It's THAT easy!

Tiny Homes Update

- "Settled is a leadership team to equip churches across the nation to develop sustainably effective, deeply human solutions for those hardest to house" (<https://www.settled.org/people/team>).
- Trinity members first met with Settled in October of 2020.
- The congregation—along with a donation of \$10,000 from the Racial Justice Ministry Team—met the \$35,000 sponsorship introduced at Trinity Fest in 2021.
- TLC's Tiny Home #1 was placed at Prince of Peace in Roseville. Pastors Chris and Peter helped with the dedication in January of 2023.
- Trinity graciously sponsored two additional Tiny Homes: a standard-sized one (8x20, #2) in 2024 and a larger sized one (8x24, #3) in 2025. Construction of both units was completed at Woodland Hills Church in Maplewood.
- TLC's Tiny Home #2 is at the Church for the Open Door in Maple Grove. <https://www.settled.org/settlements/open-door>
- TLC's Tiny Home #3 will eventually be joined by five others at Heartwood Church in Oakdale and is designated for a person of color. <https://www.settled.org/settlements/heartwood>
- Trinity members have helped remodel the Settled Homestead in Hudson that was originally built in 1856. The Homestead will house local and national visitors learning about the development of Sacred Settlements to address housing insecurity. Three visits are already planned for this summer.

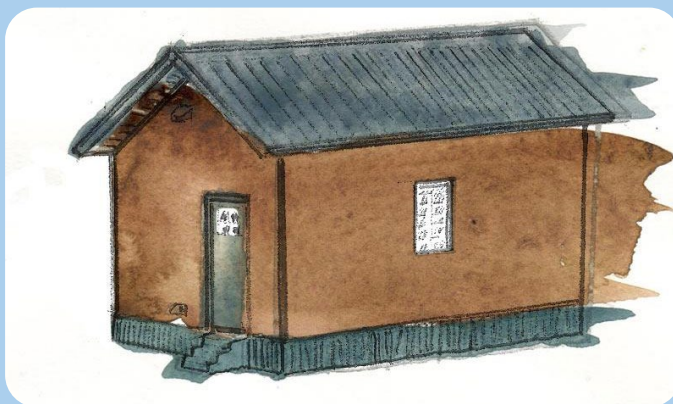

The Call Committee Update

Is pleased to share an update as we continue discerning God's guidance in calling our next Lead Pastor. We have been meeting weekly to build a strong foundation for the call process and to proceed thoughtfully. Our work has focused on studying and discussing the Ministry Site Profile (MSP), using it to identify the qualities, gifts, and leadership characteristics we seek in our next pastor. To encourage congregational participation, we launched an Open Nomination Process. Committee members also participated in a Synod Listening Session led by Bishop Patricia J. Lull, gaining valuable insights to guide our work. Looking ahead, our Synod representative, Krista Lind, will present candidate profiles to the committee. We will then begin reaching out to candidates and expect to schedule first-round virtual interviews shortly thereafter. We appreciate the continued prayers and support of the congregation and Church Council as we move forward in this important work.

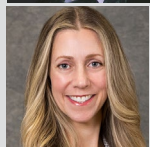

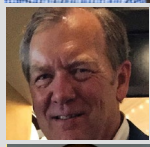

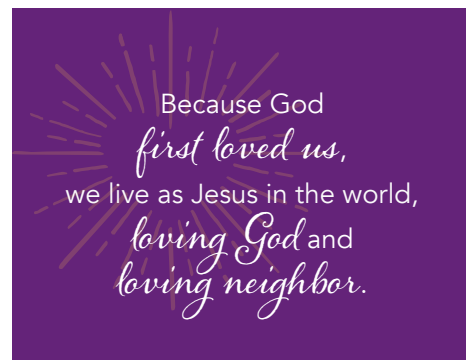
