Mark Part 4: Between Two Advents

This Advent, we're turning to Mark 13—one of Jesus' most challenging and misunderstood teachings—to learn what it means to live faithfully “between two Advents.” Rather than giving His disciples a timeline, Jesus offers pastoral wisdom for staying awake, discerning, and steady in a world that often feels like it's shaking. In this chapter, He speaks both to the *near horizon* of the temple's destruction and the early church's trials, and to the *far horizon* of His future return and the renewal of all things.

Through disruption, tribulation, and cosmic upheaval, Jesus invites His followers to endure with courage rather than fear. Week by week, we'll see how He prepares His people for faithfulness—not by predicting dates, but by forming hearts that can stand firm. This series explores what we do when the things we've trusted begin to fall, how we remain discerning in a world full of noise, and where hope is found when life feels uncertain. Ultimately, Advent points us not only back to the manger but forward to the moment when Christ returns in glory. Until then, Jesus calls us to stay awake, live on mission, and hold fast to the hope that the kingdom remains even when everything else shakes.

Read the Scripture:

Individual: Read the passage from two or three different translations.

Group: Have two different group members read the passage using different Bible translations.

Speak the Scripture:

Individual: Recite the story aloud from memory (as best you can) or tell it to a friend or family member. The goal here is to get the essence of the passage in your heart.

Group: Have someone volunteer to recite the passage aloud in their own words, as best they can.

Understand the Scripture:

Individual or Group: Use the Discovery Questions to help ensure you understand the passage.

Dig Deeper into the Scripture:

Individual: Work through the Digging Deeper questions and pray about what God reveals to you through His word. Discuss with a Christian friend or family member if you choose.

Group: Work through the Digging Deeper questions as a group, celebrating the work God is already doing in each person's life, and encouraging each other to trust Him in the places that need growth.

Small Group Guidelines

This is a Safe Group

Confidentiality is key—what is said in the group stays in the group. Be aware of how you are affecting the environment with your words, actions, and non-verbal communication. This needs to be a place where people feel comfortable opening up and sharing.

No Crosstalk

Be considerate of others as they are sharing. No side conversations, phone time, texting etc.

Listen

Let's value one another by listening to what is being shared. Allow a pause after someone shares to allow them to finish and others to consider what was said. Eye contact and body posture play key roles in creating a positive or negative group environment.

No Rescuing or Fixing

We are not here to fix each other; Jesus does that part. Avoid the tendency to rescue when someone is struggling to get the words out or shares a struggle or conviction.

Use "I" Statements

It's easy to talk about the issues of others, or respond with "we," "us," or "the church," but for us to grow as disciples and build relationships, we want to use "I" statements.

Don't Over-Talk

We want to create time for all members of the group to participate in the discussion. Be careful not to always be the first responder or regularly give long responses.

Fight for Relationship

It's not if conflict or hurt feelings will happen, but when. We commit to fight for relationship with each other. Go to the person and share your struggle or seek wise advice if you are not sure how to handle the conflict.

Week

Background: This week Jesus turns the corner from warnings and tribulation to the most hope-saturated promise in all of Scripture: the return of the Son of Man. After describing the shaking of corrupt powers and the collapse of evil's influence, Jesus lifts our eyes to the horizon. The final word over history is not fear, chaos, or uncertainty — it's Jesus Himself.

Read: *Mark 13:24-27, Daniel 7:13-14*

Discovery Questions:

What do we learn about God in this passage?

What do we learn about what it means to be a follower of Christ in this passage?

What do you think the Holy Spirit might be teaching you personally through this passage?

Is there anything God is leading you to do after reading this passage?

Digging Deeper:

How do the images of Daniel 7 and Mark 13 together shape your understanding of what God is actually doing when the world is "shaken"? Do these images increase your fear or your hope? Why?

In Daniel, the Son of Man defeats the beasts. In Mark, He arrives in glory and gathers His people. How do these passages together help you understand the heart of Jesus' return?

How do these pictures of being gathered — not lost, not forgotten — speak into an area of your life where you feel scattered, anxious, or alone?

If Jesus is the Daniel 7 Son of Man — the One who already holds all authority — how should that shape the way you live in the “in-between” days?

End this time with a prayer.

Heavenly Father, these are difficult times to live in, but we can still live with confidence and hope. We can trust in the King who already reigns and who will come again on the clouds. Move in our hearts that we would want to join in your mission of making disciples and gathering people to your eternal kingdom, and may our hearts long for the day when we see the Son coming in power and in glory. In Jesus' name, Amen.
