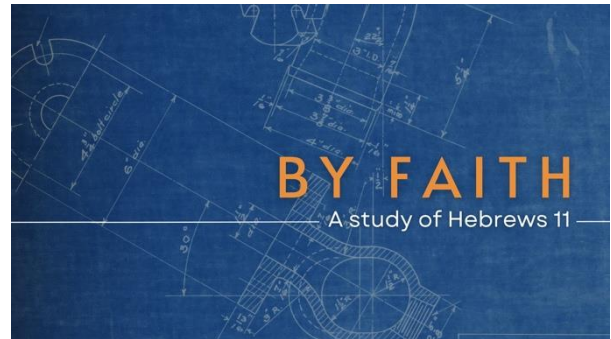


Discipleship Group SERIES QUESTIONS



By Faith - Hebrews 11

Message Series

Hebrews 11 is often called the “Hall of Fame of Faith.” It is a chapter filled with names and stories of people who trusted God in different seasons. But it is not meant to give us spiritual heroes to admire. It shows us what it looks like to live by faith in the real world. Hebrews was written to a weary, pressured church tempted to drift, shrink back, or settle. These examples are not given so we put people on a pedestal, but so we learn how to trust God when His promises feel distant and the present feels uncertain. We live in a world that trains us to trust what we can see, measure, manage, verify, and feel. Hebrews 11 calls us to something deeper. **Faith is not ignoring reality. It is learning to live beyond what we see by trusting what God has said.**

WEEK 5 Background

Faith is not only about trusting God for today—it is about believing His promises are bigger than our own lifetime. Abraham trusted God with Isaac, believing God could still fulfill His promise even when everything seemed at risk. Generations later, Joseph held onto that same confidence, believing God would one day bring His people into the land He promised. Hebrews 11 reminds us that faith lives for what lasts, trusting God with outcomes we may never personally see.

- What is God teaching the people in the passage?
- What is the Holy Spirit teaching you personally?
- What will you do with what God is teaching you?

- How does the idea of “legacy” shape the way we think about faith and obedience?
- Why is it difficult to trust God with things that matter deeply to us?
- In Genesis 22:1–2, what makes God’s command to Abraham so difficult and significant?
- Why do you think Joseph’s final request in Genesis 50:24–25 mattered so much to him? What did it reveal about his faith in God’s promises?
- Both Abraham and Joseph acted in light of a future they would not fully experience themselves. What common thread of faith do you see in both stories?

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
