



LIGHTING OF THE FIRST ADVENT CANDLE: THE CANDLE OF HOPE

Monday, December 2, 2024

Read: Acts 1:1-6

Reflect: In Christianity, Advent and pilgrimage are closely linked. Mary and Joseph journeyed their way to Bethlehem, ostensibly to be counted for the census, yet they were fulfilling prophecy as Mary gave birth to the long-hoped for Messiah in the City of David. Their journey became a holy pilgrimage. In today's Scripture,

Jesus told his disciples to wait to be baptized in the Holy Spirit, but the disciples still did not understand. They asked Jesus if this is when he would restore the kingdom to Israel. God's plan was so much bigger and more expansive than they could ever imagine! I wonder. As we walk through this life is our vision too small? Are we even on the right path? We busy ourselves striving for success by standards of little eternal value. As believers filled with the Holy Spirit, we are invited to participate in the restoration of God's eternal kingdom by walking in Jesus's way of humility, service, and sacrificial love. We live as hopeful pilgrims, journeying toward our holy homecoming, inviting others, and sharing Light along the way.

Prayer: Lord God, we thank you that you invite us to walk with you. You equip us for service and to do good works that you prepared for us in advance. We are journeying with you and to you, inviting others to join the pilgrimage. *You* are the Way.

Tuesday, December 3, 2024

Read: Psalm 121

Reflect: Psalm 121 is a *Psalm of Ascent*, sung by Hebrew pilgrims on their way to Jerusalem or Mount Zion. In September, a group from FPCA went on a 75-mile walking retreat---a pilgrimage---on the Camino de Santiago. As we walked, we went deep with one another, sharing stories of heartache and hope, talking of God and of faith, praying *to* God and listening for His voice. We were part of a stream of pilgrims from many nations all heading toward Santiago. There were echoes from ancient times, a faithful throng singing praises to God as they ascended the holy hill. We are part of thousands upon thousands of God's children "walking each other home." As we travel through this life, may we be conscious of God's presence that makes every day holy. May we take the time to share stories along the way and help each other see the hope Jesus gives us in the midst.

Wednesday, December 4, 2024

Read: Isaiah 30:20-21

Reflect: Imagine! The Teacher hidden no longer. His voice whispering guidance. Can you think of a time you heard or felt a holy nudge? A time you chose a path that made sense only because it was the way God spoke to you? Hold on to that memory. Pastor and author Arthur Boers wrote, "Surely God does not operate differently on the Camino than in the rest of life. But I learned to pay better attention to God-God's company, God's workings, and God's interventions" What a lovely way to live. This is abundant life, and it is open to us when we slow down and pay attention. Life seems to speed up this time of year, doesn't it? So many things we think we must do. What if we intentionally carve out time for stillness, to listen for God's voice to listen as he tells us, "This is the way, Walk in it."

Prayer: Lord God, this time of year our to-do lists lengthen and our preoccupations multiply. This is not your plan for us. We ask you to re-order our priorities and use the time you give us according to your will, the values of your Kingdom, as we wait expectantly for our King.

Thursday, December 5, 2024

Read: Hebrews 6:13-15

Reflect: Waiting is a common theme in Scripture, isn't it? In this passage, we are reminded that Abraham waited a long time for the fulfillment of God's promise but receive it he did. The Jews waited centuries for the long-awaited Messiah, and many did not recognize him when he arrived. During Advent, we remember that we are waiting still for our Messiah to come again. What promises has God given us? In one of the hostels along the Camino there was a sign based on Hebrews 6:15. Later that morning I saw a signpost with graffiti that said, "You already have it!" The words hit a deep chord

inside me. What promise has already been fulfilled? What am I searching for that I already have? And the answer? Jesus and his abiding, everlasting love. Immanuel, God with us. And if the God of all creation is with us and for us, we already have everything we need. As I meditated on that truth, my anxieties melted away, replaced by the Peace of Christ. I already have what I need. I need Jesus.

Prayer: Lord God, you are all we need. You are the Light in the darkness. The Truth in a sea of falsehood. The Way for us to follow. Thank you for abiding in us and us in you. We pause now to breathe in your Holy Spirit and exhale all that is not of you. Help us to walk in your Way.

Friday, December 6, 2024

Read: 2 Timothy 4:7-8

Reflect: On the middle day of our five-day hike, we geared up for a long walk. We were prepared for the 18 miles the guidebook stated. We started the day with hours of silent reflection. Ten miles listening to the songs of nature and to the whispers of the Holy Spirit. It was truly glorious. By mile 15 we realized we had not

3 more miles but 7 more to go! The trail was rocky and steep, and the afternoon grew hot. The morning's peace dissipated with the mist, and we may have (definitely) grumbled a bit. Late afternoon it dawned on me that the God who was with us during the morning's prayerful walk was with us still in the challenging climbs. Pilgrimage, the journey of life, has hard parts. God gives us the strength to persevere. By God's grace, we will run the race set before us, but not in our own strength. God gives strength to the weary and joy in the journey. What a glorious hope to hear those words, "well done, good and faithful servant."

Of the increase of his government and of peace, there will be no end, to establish it, and to uphold is with justice and righteousness from this time forth and forevermore. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this."


Read: Isaiah 11:1-2.

Reflect: During Advent, let's remember that Jesus is the embodiment of God's love and grace. Starting even before Thanksgiving, the "world" makes the holidays all about buying, doing, and buying even more. The message of Advent can be easily forgotten. The **Advent** season invites us to **reflect** on the profound significance of

the gift of God's Grace in Christ's

incarnation.

Romans 3:23-24 says, "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God being justified as a gift by His Grace through the redemption which is in Christ Jesus." During this time of spiritual introspection, let us prepare our hearts to welcome Christ anew into our lives. Wednesday, December 11, 2024

Read: Lamentations 3:22, John 3:16

Reflect: At Christmas, God's compassion for humanity is on display in a real and tangible way in order that we can grasp and be transformed by His love for us. God planned, prepared and paved the way for the appointed time when the babe in Bethlehem would be born. One of the Advent candles of Christmas represents love. How fitting to spend the days just before Christmas thinking of "the wonders of His love," as sung in *Joy to the World*. Jesus' birth is a huge proclamation of God's love found in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." As John 13:34 says, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Let us be transformed by God's LOVE and make it our aim to extend God's grace and love toward others, not only during the holiday season, but throughout the year.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, by the power of the Holy Spirit, live in me and guide me to do your will by offering others your unfailing mercy and compassion.

Thursday, December 12, 2024

Read: Isaiah 9:6

Reflect: We turn to Isaiah's prophesy about the coming Messiah during Advent and celebrate its fulfillment in the arrival of baby Jesus—a baby, yet a king. It is human to fall into doubt and unbelief and fall prey to fear and anxiety about the future, but when we remain vigilant to trust firmly in God, we have the assurance of the counsel of the Holy Spirit to find true peace through the Prince of Peace, the Lord Jesus Christ.



Him room." When we find that we default to worry or waver in unbelief, let's remember to make room for the Lord, no matter what our personal circumstances or chaos in the world around us may be. This doesn't mean we ignore fear, anxiety, and doubt, but we hold steady to God's Word in the midst of it. Through life's many storms we are buoyed by something greater – the birth of the incarnate Savior and the

promise of his return.

Friday, December 13, 2024

Read: Matthew 4:16, John1:5

Reflect: It is well known fact that depression increases during the holidays. We're bombarded with images that say we should be joyful, surrounded by the perfect family, buying lots of stuff and celebrating! We can easily find ourselves in a place of comparison with unrealistic ideals. It is easy to find ourselves in a place of spiritual or psychological darkness. For some, once the holiday celebrations stop and decorations come down, a time of "depression" can set in. The truth is that many of us experience depression in ways that are not life-threatening but are still difficult. Depression is a complex issue where there may be a biochemical component or a link to other medical or psychological concerns. It is always good to offer up our suffering to Christ, but when depression is deep or long-lasting we should seek help as needed and encourage others to do so. We can spend much time, energy, and money running away from our own experience of darkness—but if we are not afraid to look at it, it can help us draw closer to Christ. Without Christ, we are all prisoners of darkness. We cannot rescue ourselves from our own sins and our own alienation. We are people walking in darkness—and it is when we recognize this that we can truly rejoice that the Light has come.

Prayer: Lord, in all things I give thanks, including times of darkness which draw me closer to you. I pray that those suffering from depression may find you and experience Your Peace. In Jesus' precious name.

Monday, December 16, 2024

Read: Luke 3:7-9

Reflect: John the Baptist, the voice in the wilderness, (Lk. 3:3-6) is preparing the way for King Jesus. He calls people to turn away from rebellion and disobedience to welcome God's presence. But there needs to be fruit – a change in actions and behaviors in line with repentance. Otherwise, the axe and the fire await those with fruitless repentance.



Prayer: God thank you for this call to true repentance. Show me where I need to turn away from sin. Spirit, give me the fruit of real repentance. Change my life, my behaviors, and my motivations so they line up with King Jesus and His Kingdom. May Your Kingdom come, and Your will be done in my life as it is in Heaven. Amen

Read: Luke 3:10-14

Reflect: When conviction of the truth comes there needs to be a response. Here, three different sets of people repent, and John gives them three different actions to take tailored to each group. The fruit of repentance here is generosity and integrity. We don't have cloaks, and we are neither Jewish tax collectors nor Roman soldiers, but generosity and integrity we can practice.

Prayer: Lord, You are generous and trustworthy, I praise You. Your grace abounds and You keep Your Word. You know where I struggle to be generous and where I struggle to keep my word and do what is right in Your eyes. Show me those places now so I may confess and be forgiven (pause and confess). Forgive me. Help me to share with a cheerful heart with those in need. Help me to be truthful, trustworthy, and to have integrity in my words and deeds. By Your mercy and grace, Amen.



Read: Luke 3:15-20



Monday, December 23, 2024

Read: Micah 5:1-5

Reflect: We are so often constrained by physical limitations while here on earth. Our genetics also seem to determine so much of who we are. As written in Micah, Bethlehem Ephrathah was deemed too little to be among the clans of Judah. Bethlehem was an insignificant small town in the West Bank of the Jordan River near Jerusalem. Despite its small size and lack of importance, God prophesied great things to go forth from Bethlehem. "One will go forth to be a ruler in Israel and He will be great." Consider this, Mary was a teenager, David was a youth, Moses was eighty years old and had a stammer. Sarah was well beyond her childbearing years. God used what we may think of as impossible limitations. As we journey through this time of Advent, look with expectancy on how you may be used by God. No group or person is ignored and deemed unworthy. Too old? No worries. Just a teenager? Perfect! Jesus described a tiny mustard seed as being the beginning of great faith. Bethlehem was a small town, yet it produced a King and a Savior. It is revered in the beloved Christmas carol, O Little Town of Bethlehem. God chose a little town to bring His glory low.

Prayer: God help us to think beyond our boundaries here on earth. Enable us to encourage others to think beyond known possibilities. Help us not to "despise the day of small things."

Tuesday, December 24, 2024

Read: Luke 2:8-20

Reflect: There are times when I just want that big revelation from God, a declaration of purpose and plan just for me. Sometimes those declarations do not come when we are waiting, looking or sadly hoping for the Big Life to come. The shepherds were minding their sheep on a typical night, nothing seemed out of the ordinary. Suddenly, a star appeared, angels sang, and they were amazed. The unexpected can happen on the edges of an ordinary day. Putting the silverware away or cutting the grass may seem like the mundane things we do every day. Not much is expected from these actions. But it is in those times that God can reveal His presence and purpose. Cherish the everyday. God may speak when we least expect it. Christmas Eve is the intersection between the everyday and heaven. A quiet night of herding turned into a chorus of angels. The mundane and the holy. They are bound together on this night.

Read: Luke 1:46-55, Isaiah 43:19

I always love to see the news in print, feel the paper and smell the faint odor of newsprint. I have my favorite columnists and sections. The Good News edition that the prophets were waiting for was delivered last evening; in a stall, under a star, announced by angels, surrounded by jubilant shepherds and worshipped by magi. What a headline! Extra, extra, read all about it! Today is the day after Christmas. So much awaits our attention. Take the time to sit amongst the wrapping paper and ribbons still strewn on the floor. The returns can wait. Read The Good News column as written in Luke 2. Like Mary, take the time to treasure all of these things, pondering them in your heart. Good news of great joy is ours today.

Prayer: Help our lives not to be consumed with grievous headlines and worrisome news. So much of the news we hear or watch may not be worthy of our concern, yet it sits heavily on our hearts. "When anxiety was great within me, your consolations brought me joy". Thank you, God, for those words of comfort.
