Walking Through Holy Week Together

A family devotional for Palm Sunday through Resurrection Sunday



Holy Week is the most important week in history. During this week, we remember who Jesus is and what He accomplished through His death, burial, and resurrection. The events leading to the cross were not accidental. They were part of God's sovereign plan to redeem sinners. The book of Romans helps us understand the meaning of the cross, the resurrection, and the hope we now have in Christ.

This Week We Remember

Jesus Is Our Substitute

Jesus took our place, bearing the punishment for sin so that we might be forgiven.

Romans 5:8 (ESV)

But God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Jesus Is Our Propitiation

Through His death, Jesus satisfied God's righteous wrath and secured forgiveness for His people.

Romans 3:25 (ESV)

whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith.

Jesus Is Our Justification

Because of Christ, believers are declared righteous before God by grace through faith.

Romans 5:1 (ESV)

Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus Rose in Victory

The resurrection confirms that Jesus defeated sin and death.

Romans 6:9 (ESV)

We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him.

Jesus Is Lord

Jesus reigns as King and calls us to trust and follow Him.

Romans 10:9 (ESV)

because, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.

- Read the Scripture together.
- Read the devotional insight aloud.
- Use the Talk Together questions to guide conversation.
- Complete the Remember Christ activity.
- Use the Preschool Option to include younger children.
- Pray together before you finish.

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Palm Sunday - Jesus Enters Jerusalem

Matthew 21:1-11

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus is the promised King who came to establish a spiritual kingdom through His death and resurrection.

Zechariah 9:9(ESV)

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your king is coming to you; righteous and having salvation is he, humble and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

Read Together

This was not the first time Jesus had come to Jerusalem for Passover. It was the third time Jesus and His disciples had traveled to Jerusalem together.

By now, many people had heard about His teaching, His miracles, and the raising of Lazarus. Crowds gathered because they believed Jesus might be the King they had been waiting for.

As Jesus entered Jerusalem, the people welcomed Him like a king. They spread their cloaks on the road, waved palm branches, and shouted, 'Hosanna!'

But many misunderstood Jesus. They were expecting a political king, a military deliverer, and freedom from Roman rule. Instead, Jesus came to bring forgiveness of sin, peace with God, and a kingdom not of this world.

Jesus knew what awaited Him in Jerusalem, yet He still entered the city willingly. He came as the humble King who would give His life for sinners.

Talk Together

- Why were so many people excited to see Jesus?
- What kind of king were the crowds expecting?
- What kind of King is Jesus?
- Why did Jesus still go to Jerusalem knowing what would happen?

Remember Christ - The King We Praise

1. Have each family member cut out or draw a palm branch.
2. Write on it: 'I praise Jesus because...'
3. Encourage each family member to finish the sentence.
4. Place the palm branches somewhere visible in your home this week.
5. Each day when you walk by, say together: 'Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!' (Matthew 21:9)

Preschool Option - Parade for the King

1. Give preschoolers palm branches made from paper or gathered from outside.
2. Walk a simple path through your house together in a Palm Sunday parade.
3. Say together: 'Hosanna!' and 'Jesus is King!'

4. Explain: 'People welcomed Jesus as King. We praise Jesus too.'

Pray Together

Jesus, You are the humble King who came to save us. We praise You for who You are and what You have done. Help us follow You this week. Amen.

Monday - Jesus Clears the Temple

Matthew 21:12-17

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus is the holy and righteous King who came to purify true worship and remove false religion.

Romans 12:1 (ESV)

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.

Read Together

When Jesus entered Jerusalem, He went directly to the temple. What He saw deeply grieved Him. Matthew tells us that Jesus overturned the tables of the money changers, drove out those buying and selling, and spoke directly to those selling pigeons.

This matters because pigeons were the sacrifice allowed for the poorest people. The religious leaders were taking advantage of those with the least, insisting that approved sacrifices had to be purchased through the temple system.

Jesus said, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer, but you make it a den of robbers.' He was confronting false worship, religious corruption, and leaders who burdened God's people.

After the corruption was removed, the blind and the lame came to Jesus in the temple, and He healed them. Jesus removes false religion and welcomes the poor in spirit - those who come to Him in humility and need.

Talk Together

- Why was Jesus upset when He entered the temple?
- Why is it significant that pigeons were being sold?
- What does this show us about Jesus' heart for people?
- What does true worship look like?

Remember Christ - A House of Prayer

1. Choose a place in your home and set up a simple prayer space for the week. 2. You may include a Bible, your Palm Sunday branches, and a paper for prayer requests. 3. Read together: 'My house shall be called a house of prayer.' (Matthew 21:13) 4. Explain: 'Jesus cleansed the temple because He is worthy of true worship. This week, we set apart our home to worship Him.'

Preschool Option - Clean for Jesus

1. Give preschoolers a simple task like picking up toys, wiping a table, or straightening pillows.
2. Explain: 'Jesus cleaned the temple not because it was dirty, but because He is holy and people were making a mess of what was meant for worship.'
3. Say together: 'We worship Jesus.'

Pray Together

Jesus, You are holy and righteous. Cleanse our hearts and help us worship You in truth. Help our home be a place that honors You. Amen.

Tuesday - The Anointing at Bethany

Matthew 26:6-13

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus is the worthy Savior who came to give His life for sinners, and He is worthy of our wholehearted worship.

Romans 12:1 (ESV)

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship.

Read Together

As Passover approached, Jesus stayed in Bethany, just outside Jerusalem. While He was there, a woman came to Him with an expensive jar of perfume and poured it on His head.

This was a costly act of worship. The perfume was extremely valuable, yet she gave it to Jesus because He was worthy.

Some criticized her, but Jesus defended her and said, 'She has done a beautiful thing to me.'

Jesus then said, 'In pouring this ointment on my body, she has done it to prepare me for burial.' The woman likely did not fully understand all that was about to happen, yet in God's sovereign plan, her act of worship became part of Jesus' preparation for the cross.

Immediately after this scene in Matthew's account, Judas agreed to betray Jesus for money. One response to Jesus was costly worship. Another was personal gain.

Talk Together

- Why did the woman pour perfume on Jesus?
- Why were some people upset?
- What does this show us about true worship?
- What does this teach us about Jesus' worth?

Remember Christ - Costly Worship

1. Give each family member a small piece of paper and write: 'Jesus is worthy of...'
2. Encourage each person to finish the sentence.
3. Examples: my time, my obedience, my trust, my life.
4. Place these papers near your prayer space and thank Jesus for being worthy of all your worship.

Preschool Option - Good Smell Worship

1. Let preschoolers smell a safe lotion, scented sticker, or another gentle fragrance.
2. Explain: 'This reminds us of the perfume given to Jesus.'
3. Say together: 'Jesus is worthy.'

Pray Together

Jesus, You are worthy of our worship. Help us love You more than anything else. Teach us to worship You with our lives. Amen.

Wednesday - Judas Agrees to Betray Jesus

Matthew 26:14-16

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus willingly gave Himself according to God's sovereign plan to redeem sinners.

Romans 4:25 (ESV)

who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification.

Read Together

After Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and His cleansing of the temple, opposition against Him began to grow. The Pharisees and Sadducees were threatened by Jesus' authority, His teaching, and the crowds who followed Him.

The religious leaders began looking for a way to arrest Jesus quietly, away from the crowds.

Then one of the twelve, Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests and asked, 'What will you give me if I deliver him over to you?' Judas became a traitor and agreed to betray Jesus for thirty pieces of silver.

Judas had walked closely with Jesus. He heard Jesus teach, witnessed miracles, and saw His compassion. Yet his heart remained unchanged.

Earlier in Matthew's account, a woman honored Jesus with costly worship. Judas, by contrast, was willing to hand Jesus over for money. Yet Jesus was not forced into the cross by Judas. Jesus did not hang on the cross simply because Judas betrayed Him. Jesus hung on the cross because of our sin. God used even Judas' betrayal to accomplish His plan of redemption.

Talk Together

- Why were the religious leaders opposed to Jesus?
- Why is it surprising that Judas betrayed Jesus?
- Why did Jesus still go to the cross?
- What does this show us about God's plan?

Remember Christ - Jesus Gave Himself

1. Give each person a piece of paper and write: 'Jesus gave Himself for...'
2. Encourage each family member to finish the sentence.
3. Examples: my sin, my forgiveness, my salvation, me.
4. Place these papers near your prayer space and say together: 'Jesus willingly gave Himself for us.'

Preschool Option - Choose Jesus

1. Show preschoolers two objects: a coin and a simple paper cross.
2. Explain: 'Judas chose money. We choose Jesus.'
3. Let them hold the cross and say together: 'I choose Jesus.'

Pray Together

Jesus, thank You for willingly going to the cross for our sin. Guard our hearts and help us follow You with faith and worship. Amen.

Thursday - The Last Supper and the Passover Meal

Matthew 26:17-30

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus is the true Passover Lamb whose blood was shed to save His people from sin and death.

Romans 3:25 (ESV)

whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins.

Read Together

On the night before His crucifixion, Jesus gathered with His disciples to celebrate the Passover meal. Passover was the meal through which God's people remembered how the Lord delivered Israel from slavery in Egypt. The blood of the lamb marked the doorposts, and those under the blood were spared from judgment.

During this meal, Jesus took the bread and said, 'This is my body.' Then He took the cup and said, 'This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.'

Jesus was teaching His disciples that He is the true Passover Lamb. What had been a symbol for generations was being fulfilled in Christ.

Tonight, your family is invited to continue with the At-Home Passover Meal Guide in the back of this booklet. Use that guide to prepare the table, read Scripture, explain the meal elements, and remember Christ's sacrifice together.

Talk Together

- What was Passover originally celebrating?
- What did Jesus say the bread represented?
- What did Jesus say the cup represented?
- Why is Jesus called the Passover Lamb?

Remember Christ - Family Passover Meal

1. Turn to the Passover Meal Guide in the back of this booklet and walk through the meal together as a family.
2. Take your time. Read the Scriptures, explain the symbols, and help each family member see how the Passover points to Jesus.

Preschool Option - Taste and Remember

1. Let preschoolers taste the bread and juice with the family.
2. Say: 'Jesus gave His body for us.' and 'Jesus gave His blood for us.'
3. Repeat together: 'Jesus is our Savior.'

Pray Together

Jesus, thank You for being our Passover Lamb. Thank You for shedding Your blood for our sins. Help us remember Your sacrifice and trust in You. Amen.

Friday - The Crucifixion

Matthew 27:27-54

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus bore the wrath of God in the place of sinners, accomplishing redemption through His death on the cross.

Romans 5:9 (ESV)

Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God.

Read Together

After the Passover meal, Jesus was arrested, falsely accused, and sentenced to death. Though He was innocent, He was mocked, beaten, and led to the cross.

The soldiers placed a crown of thorns on His head and mocked Him as king. Jesus was nailed to the cross between two criminals.

As darkness covered the land, Jesus cried out, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' In this moment, the sinless Son of God was bearing the punishment for sin so that sinners could be forgiven.

When Jesus died, the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Through Jesus, access to God was opened.

Even the Roman centurion declared, 'Truly this was the Son of God!' Jesus willingly gave His life so that sinners could be reconciled to God.

Talk Together

- Why did Jesus die on the cross?
- What happened when Jesus died?
- What does the torn curtain mean?
- How does Jesus' death show God's love?

Remember Christ - The Weight of the Cross

1. Give each family member a small piece of paper and write or draw: 'Jesus died for...'
2. Examples: my sin, my forgiveness, my salvation, my new life.
3. Place the papers at your family prayer space.
4. Read together: 'But God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.' (Romans 5:8)

Preschool Option - The Cross

1. Help preschoolers make a simple cross from two craft sticks or two paper strips.
2. Explain: 'Jesus died on the cross because He loves us.'
3. Repeat together: 'Jesus died for me.'

Pray Together

Jesus, thank You for dying in our place. Thank You for bearing our sin and opening the way to God.
Help us never forget the cost of our salvation. Amen.

Saturday - Jesus in the Tomb

Matthew 27:57-66

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus truly died and was buried, accomplishing redemption and securing the victory that would be revealed in the resurrection.

Romans 6:10(ESV)

For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God.

Read Together

After Jesus died, Joseph of Arimathea asked Pilate for His body. Joseph wrapped Jesus' body in a clean linen cloth and placed Him in a new tomb cut out of rock.

A large stone was rolled in front of the entrance. The chief priests and Pharisees asked Pilate to secure the tomb, so the stone was sealed and guards were posted.

To everyone watching, it seemed final. The disciples were scattered and afraid. The women mourned. Hope appeared lost.

Yet even in the silence of Saturday, God was still working. The cross had accomplished salvation, and the resurrection was coming.

Saturday reminds us that sometimes God's greatest work happens when everything seems quiet and uncertain.

Talk Together

- How do you think the disciples felt on this day?
- Why did the leaders seal the tomb?
- Have you ever had a time when things felt uncertain?
- Why can we trust God even when we cannot see what He is doing?

Remember Christ - Waiting in Hope

1. Turn off distractions for a few minutes and sit quietly together.
2. Place a small stone near your prayer space.
3. Read together: 'Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes with the morning.' (Psalm 30:5)
4. Leave the stone in place until Easter morning.

Preschool Option - The Stone and the Tomb

1. Use a small cup or bowl as a tomb and a small stone as the covering.
2. Let preschoolers place the stone in front of the tomb.
3. Say together: 'We wait for Sunday.'

Pray Together

Jesus, even when we do not understand, we trust You. Help us remember that You are always working and that hope is never lost in You. Amen.

Sunday - The Resurrection

Matthew 28:1-10

Gospel Truth About Christ

Jesus rose from the dead, defeating sin and death, and securing eternal life for all who trust in Him.

Romans 4:25 (ESV)

who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification.

Read Together

Early on Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to visit the tomb. An angel of the Lord rolled back the stone and announced, 'He is not here, for he has risen, as he said.'

The tomb was empty. Jesus had risen from the dead just as He promised.

As the women hurried to tell the disciples, Jesus Himself met them, and they fell at His feet and worshiped Him.

Death had been defeated. Sin had been conquered. Jesus was alive.

Because Jesus lives, those who trust in Him have forgiveness, new life, and eternal hope.

Talk Together

- Why is the resurrection important?
- What does the empty tomb show us?
- What does Jesus being alive mean for us?
- Why did the women worship Jesus?

Remember Christ - The Stone Rolled Away

1. Return to the stone you placed at your prayer space on Saturday.
2. Read Matthew 28:6 together and remove the stone.
3. Say together: 'He is risen!' and 'He is risen indeed!'
4. Consider celebrating with a worship song, a special breakfast, or another family tradition.

Preschool Option - Roll the Stone Away

1. Have preschoolers roll the stone away from the cup or bowl used on Saturday.
2. Say together: 'Jesus is alive!'
3. Then celebrate together: 'He is risen! He is risen indeed!'

Pray Together

Jesus, thank You for rising from the dead. Thank You for defeating sin and death. Help us live with hope and joy because You are alive. Amen.

Jesus satisfied God's righteous wrath against sin.

How Parents Can Explain It

Jesus took the punishment our sin deserved.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Jesus took the punishment we deserved.

Scripture

Romans 3:25 (ESV) — whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood.

Righteousness

What It Means

Being perfectly right in God's sight.

How Parents Can Explain It

Jesus gives believers His righteousness.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Being in right standing with God.

Scripture

2 Corinthians 5:21 (ESV) — so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

Unrighteousness

What It Means

Being separated from God's perfect standard because of sin.

How Parents Can Explain It

Sin puts us in wrong standing with God.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Being in wrong standing with God.

Scripture

Romans 3:10 (ESV) — None is righteous, no, not one.

Big Words About a Big God

As families walk through Holy Week, you may encounter words that seem big or difficult. But children are capable of understanding big truths about God. Rather than shrinking God to small ideas, we invite our children to grow into the greatness of who God truly is.

Justification

What It Means

God declares sinners righteous because of Jesus.

How Parents Can Explain It

God forgives our sin and credits us with Jesus' righteousness.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

God makes us right with Him because of Jesus.

Scripture

Romans 5:1 (ESV) — Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Sanctification

What It Means

The process of God making believers more like Jesus.

How Parents Can Explain It

After we trust Jesus, God continues to change us.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

God is helping us grow to be more like Jesus.

Scripture

1 Thessalonians 4:3 (ESV) — For this is the will of God, your sanctification.

Propitiation

What It Means

Redemption

What It Means

Jesus paid the price to rescue us from sin.

How Parents Can Explain It

Jesus exchanged His perfect life for ours.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Trading something of lesser value for something more valuable.

Scripture

Ephesians 1:7 (ESV) — In him we have redemption through his blood.

Reconciliation

What It Means

God restores our relationship with Him.

How Parents Can Explain It

Through Jesus we are brought back to God.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Being brought back to God.

Scripture

2 Corinthians 5:18 (ESV) — Through Christ reconciled us to himself.

Grace

What It Means

Receiving something we do not deserve.

How Parents Can Explain It

God gives salvation and forgiveness freely.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Receiving something we don't deserve.

Scripture

Ephesians 2:8 (ESV) — For by grace you have been saved through faith.

Mercy

What It Means

Not receiving punishment we deserve.

How Parents Can Explain It

God withholds punishment because of Jesus.

Simple Way to Say It to Kids

Not receiving something we do deserve.

Scripture

Ephesians 2:4–5 (ESV) — But God, being rich in mercy.

Encouragement for Parents

Children grow into big truths. When we teach children words like justification, sanctification, and reconciliation, we are giving them tools to understand the greatness of God.

Rather than giving children a small view of God, we invite them into a lifelong journey of knowing Him more deeply.

God is big. His truth is deep. And children can grow into understanding both.

PREP-WORK

Prepare your table

- Candles lit on the table: Representing Jesus, who is the light of the World.
- Food on table: Unleavened bread, boiled egg, bitter herbs (horseradish), Charoseth (a sweet mixture of apples, cinnamon, grape-juice, and walnuts), salt water, parsley, and grape juice.



Seder Meal

EXPLAIN THE FEAST

Explain the Feast

- Read Exodus 12:14 - explain that this is a very special time for you and your family to remember Jesus

WHAT TO SAY"

- *"We celebratethis feast to help us remember that God rescued the Israelites from bondage in Egypt. On the night before He delivered them, God told them to kill a lamb and to cover the top of their doorway with its blood. Every Israelite family who did what God said was protected from the plague of death in their home." "Many years later, Jesus (God's son) came to*
- *earth in human form and died on the cross- as a fulfillment of the Old Testament sacrifice. He became the ultimate sacrificial lamb. We no longer have to kill a lamb like they did under the Old Covenant for forgiveness of sin. Jesus' blood was shed so that all who receive Him as their savior are saved from sin and eternal death. This sacrifice was all-sufficient, once for all."*



EXPLAIN THE FEAST

Read Isaiah 53: 3-12...

- *"Jesus was the lamb who was slain for all of our sins and by His stripes we are healed! Jesus lived the perfect life we couldn't live and died the death that we deserved. His payment of death allows us to have the opportunity to have a relationship with God. To do this we must believe that Jesus is who He said He is and did what He said He would do. Jesus offers us forgiveness from our sins when we confess Him as our Lord and Savior. To do this we must have a talk with Him about our sin, asking Him for forgiveness, and we must ask Him to be in charge of our lives. We must commit to Jesus we want to follow His way instead of our own way.*

The night before Christ died, He celebrated the Passover dinner with His disciples but during the meal Jesus made clear that He was the Lamb to be slain for the salvation of the world. Read John 3:16.



Lead the Meal

Leader Passes Out Elements of the Meal:

At this time, the head of table passes each food item (one by one) and explains what they represent.... (Eat as you go, or after everything is explained.)

Unleavened bread - (I made Gluten Free Matzo): Store bought Matzo can be used. We eat this to remind us that the Israelites didn't have time to wait for yeast bread to rise—rather they had to be ready to go when God said “GO.” At the Last Supper Jesus told us that the bread would represent His body that was broken for us. We eat it in remembrance of His body that was slain for us.

The Missing Lamb - When the Jews ate this meal they ate lamb to remember the lamb's blood that protected them during the passover. Jesus came as the lamb to be slain for our sins. The Lamb is missing from our plate because not only did Jesus die, but he raised from the dead and is alive.

Boiled Egg - (In Jewish tradition it is a roasted egg) the egg stands for renewal. The Israelites were going to start a new life and we have new life in Christ because of what He did on the cross for us.

Bitter herbs -We serve horseradish as a reminder of the bitterness of the slavery in Egypt. Jesus suffered greatly for us that we may be saved. Remind them that on the cross He was given the bitter vinegar on the sponge to drink.



Lead the Meal

Charoseth - This is a mixture of chopped apples, walnuts, grape-juice (or wine), cinnamon, and brown sugar. Symbolizes the mortar and bricks the Israelites used in making the bricks for the king of Egypt.

Karpas – We use parsley for this. These plants stay green all year and represent everlasting life because of Christ's resurrection.

Small bowl of salt water – Tears of the Israelites in bondage. Today can represent our tears for those who haven't accepted Christ as their personal savior. Dip the parsley into the salt water bowl and eat it. Grape juice or wine poured in glasses.

Grape juice – At the passover meal there were four cups. The cups were used to remember God's promises to bring the Israelites out of Egypt, to free them from slavery, to make them a new kingdom, and to accept them as His people. Jesus came to fulfill all of these promises.

At the Last Supper Jesus showed us that the passover was a picture of what He came to do for the world. When we eat a passover meal or take the Lord's Supper we should remember who He is, what He has done for us, and remember that He is coming back. Point to the empty chair at your table. This chair helps us to remember that Jesus is coming back and that we should be ready to welcome Him when the time comes.

He Is Risen

Because Jesus is alive, we live with hope.



Thank you for walking through Holy Week together as a family.

Keep reading Scripture together, praying together, worshiping together, and talking about Jesus together.

Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again.

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
