Extravagant Credibility & Love for Others | Matthew 5:33–48

Part 1: Oaths & Integrity (Matthew 5:33–37)

1. Jesus says our "yes" should mean yes and our "no" should mean no. Where in your daily life do you find it hardest to be consistently honest and trustworthy?

↳ What makes integrity feel costly in those situations?

2. The religious leaders of Jesus' day had created clever loopholes to avoid keeping their promises. In what ways do we do the same thing today — even with good intentions?

↳ How does this kind of dishonesty, even on a small scale, damage our relationships and witness?

Part 2: Retaliation & Generosity (Matthew 5:38–42)

3. The "eye for an eye" principle was originally meant to limit revenge, not encourage it. When you've been wronged, what is your natural instinct — and how does Jesus' call to respond with "extravagant goodness" challenge that?

↳ Can you think of a time when someone responded to an offense with unexpected grace? What effect did it have?

4. Jesus gives three concrete examples: turning the cheek, giving more than asked, and going the extra mile. Which of these feels most impossible to you right now, and why?

↳ What would it look like practically to apply that principle in a current relationship or situation?

Part 3: Enemy Love (Matthew 5:43–48)

5. The sermon asks a pointed question: "Who is your enemy?" Take a moment to sit with that. Who in your life — or in the broader world — do you find it genuinely hard to love or even wish well?

↳ The sermon says loving our enemies requires "proximity and attentiveness." What would that look like for you?

6. Jesus closes by calling us to be "perfect as your Father in heaven is perfect" — a wholeness rooted in how God loves even the unjust. How does reflecting on the way God has loved you when you were His "enemy" (Romans 5:10) change how you feel about loving those who have hurt you?

↳ What is one specific step you could take this week to pray for or extend kindness toward someone you find difficult to love?
