
Temple

Biblically speaking, a temple is a place where God's realm intersects with ours and where God comes down to dwell with His people. The temple theme permeates the bible because God desires our worship. God always intended to walk in our midst and for us to bow to Him. This is what temple is about. Throughout the scripture human priests are responsible to serve God in the temple by guarding its holiness and expanding its influence.

The garden of Eden was the first temple. The garden was where mankind lived and where God walked and talked with them- the garden was temple. God intended His garden temple to fill the entire earth so that heaven and earth would serve as God's abode.

But sin...

The tabernacle of Moses and the temples of Israel serve as types to foreshadow the eternal cosmic temple of Revelation 21. Each detail of the temple's construction, location, and system served to paint a picture of that glorious future temple. This ultimate temple destination required a supernatural redemption, procured by Jesus, our Great High Priest. Therefore, Jesus' people today, are living stones being made into God's temple throughout the earth.



Glory

Holy

The world is calling us to join the crowd, get in on the fun, and be like everyone else. The world hates God.

Holy - "Set apart to a special purpose." God is set apart to Himself and His own purposes. Throughout the bible certain people, places, and objects are set apart to God and to His service.

God demands that His people be holy but we still sin. What are we to do?

This week the reading plan shows us that God is holy. The Bible calls God "the Holy One" over 50 times and calls the Spirit of God "the Holy Spirit" over 90 times. Out of God's holiness He creates a holy nation for Himself. However, Israel fails to be holy. God cannot be without a holy people, so he sends Jesus who is the perfection of holiness. Jesus is therefore able to make His followers holy. The biblical story concludes with God and His people holy forever.



Mountain

Reading Reflections

Day 1: What do you think about the Garden of Eden and the mountain of God inhabiting the same space?

Day 2 – What was the significance of taking Isaac up on a mountain for the sacrifice? Why was it important that God specify the mountain for the sacrifice?

Day 3- Moses saw God's glory, heard God's voice, and received God's written Word on Mount Sinai. How does this passage inform your walk with and knowledge of Jesus?

Day 4 – Spiritual warfare is a reality for the believer. In the account of Elijah, the wicked king, wayward people, and prophets of Baal, the confrontation takes place on Mount Carmel, Baal's Mountain. Elijah was the mouthpiece of God. How can God's people today go into the hardest, most demonic places, confront spiritual forces of darkness and see the kingdom spread?

Day 5 - What aspects of Jesus ministry take place on a mountain? What does the mountain signify to Jesus? How does that inform our lives? Day 6 – When Jesus is transfigured, He is on a mountain with 3 of his disciples. Moses and Elijah show up and as a result Peter wants to make tents and stay on top of the mountain. The imagery tells us that Peter intuitively understands this to be a special place. Heroes of the faith have arrived on this mountain. He wants to stay so that the trio doesn't break up. Then God speaks and tells them that Jesus is the beloved Son, the one with whom He is pleased and to listen to Him. Now alone with Jesus they descend the mountain.

Was God's intent that the disciples leave a place of special intimacy with Him when they descend the mountain? How can the disciples be close to God if they come down from the mountain?

Day 7 – In Revelation 21 John is carried to a high mountain from which he watched the mountain city Jerusalem coming down from heaven to earth. When you imagine this scene how do you feel? In Revelation 21:22 Jesus is the temple in the new city and in 22:5 the Lord is the replacement to the sun, moon, and stars. If mountains were places of worship, revelation, safety, glory, and relationship with God throughout the scripture, what or who will be our mountain in eternity?

Tree

Trees are referenced throughout scripture, from the first book to the last. Besides "God" and "man", trees are the most referenced living thing in all of the Bible. Trees are also the longest living organism on earth. Tress multiply. Trees bear fruit.

Trees are way more important than we realize. Trees are in the first chapter and the last chapter of the bible and all in the middle. Trees are beautiful metaphors of the follower of Jesus and thus play a vital part in the revealing of God's message from the beginning to the end of scripture. Yet, we tend to ignore them due to our familiarity with them. In God's Word trees provide nourishment and shade as well as a place of cursing and death. At the end of this week, we should see God's Word and God's world differently because every tree is reminding us about Jesus, Savior and judge.

What Jesus has accomplished, and the fruitfulness of the believer's life is communicated all over the world and throughout the bible with a tree.



Identity

Man was created in the image of God and therefore without any negative identity issues. The world rebelled and sin shattered man's identity. As in the account of the Tower of Babel where men were trying to construct a city and tower to their own name, the world today is trying to construct human identity in its own image with freedom from God as the foundation. While our culture lifts high a banner of self-identity, the Bible teaches us that identity is restored only in Christ. Jesus said, "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." Jesus is our identity. Individual significance is found in Him alone.

This section will help us follow the thread of identity as God designed it through the bible. We will see that God's revelation of Himself to man restores broken identity. We will see how God mercifully and miraculously reshapes our broken identity to be as He created us to be. Ultimately, we will see that Jesus not only restores our identity, but that Jesus is our identity.



Bread





Worship

From Genesis to Revelation worship is a dominant theme, because the one true God of scripture is worthy of all praise, honor, service, and glory! The English word worship comes from the words "worth" and "ship" (the suffix "ship" means a state of being). The meaning of worship therefore means that something deserves praise and honor because of its state of being. Simply put, worship is the believer's response to our almighty and gracious God. In Leviticus, chapters one through seven, we read of the sacrificial system the Lord gave Moses for the Israelites. God's people worshiped through sacrifice. As we put our faith in Jesus Christ who became the sacrifice for our sins, we worship with a sacrificial life that reflects our awe and gratitude. That is what Paul is speaking of in Romans 12:1 when he writes "by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service (worship)". In your daily reading this week, reflect on the many ways we can respond to our Creator and Redeemer in worship. In Matthew 15:8 Jesus quotes an Old Testament passage which says, "this people honors me with their lips but their heart is far from me." This week we want to study and practice worship that flows out of our heart.



Covenant

No Covenant - no salvation. A covenant is an agreement made between two parties that was binding to the point of death. The Hebrew word for covenant meant "to cut" because the covenant was enacted by the killing of an animal by cutting it into two parts. Old Testament covenants were unique in that God alone made the covenant with man. Man's responsibility was merely to believe God and live in light of God's covenant. The covenants that God made with humanity point us to Jesus. While each of the covenants were given in a specific, historical context, (the Adamic, the Noahic, Abrahamic, Mosaic, and Davidic Covenants) we see that Jesus brings about their ultimate fulfillment. He is the "last Adam" (1 Corinthians 15:45), the prophesied descendant of Abraham (Matthew 1:17), the fulfillment of the Law of Moses (Matthew 5:17-18) who will be a blessing to the nations (Genesis 12:2-3), and the Son of David who will reign as King of Kings (Revelation 19:16). We are going to be in awe this week as we discover how Jesus fulfills all the covenants.



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God with Us

Man was created to live in the presence of God. Nearness, closeness, satisfaction, love, presence of God; this is our purpose. But Isaiah 59:2 tells us that, "Your iniquities have separated you from your God, and your sins have hidden His face from you so that He does not hear." God is so offended by sin that in Genesis 3 He expels his two image bearers from His presence for only one transgression. It is ironic then that men sin seeking the fulfillment and peace that can only be found in God's presence. This produces a vicious cycle. Men sin because they seek satisfaction, but their sin keeps them from the satisfying presence of God. Jesus is Immanuel, God with us. Jesus alone is God's solution to this problem.



- 6. What do you need to do this week to be in the presence of God?


Creation

In six days, by the power of His Word, God created everything out of nothing. He created man in His image. Creation is witness to His infinite wisdom, goodness, power, sovereignty, glory and Trinity. Sin marred God's creation.

The story of Creation sets the stage for the revelation of His redemptive plan.

As you read these passages this week, you will see much about the character of God and what it means to be in Christ with the sure hope of the New Creation.
