

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There Is Power in Your Mouth. I'll never forget the morning she walked up to us at the National Peanut Festival. We'd just started a new ministry reaching out to carnival workers, meeting their needs and sharing Christ. But right off the bat, we hit a wall. Nearly half those workers were Hispanic, and not a one of us spoke a lick of Spanish. Well, we did the only thing we knew to do: we prayed. We asked the Lord to send somebody who could speak their language and share His love the way we couldn't. We trusted He would, but we had no idea He would answer as quickly as He did.

Isaiah 65:24 says, "Before they call I will answer; while they are yet speaking I will hear."

The very next morning, while we were cleaning up, the answer showed up. This sweet lady walked onto the festival grounds with no earthly idea we were even there. She'd had a dream the night before about ministering to those workers. In that dream she heard, "You go." So she came. By God's hand, she walked right up to us. She came back the next day, Bible in hand. She started sharing the gospel with the very workers we couldn't talk to. As she spoke, men gathered round. Their faces softened- eyes fixed on her. The Spirit was moving.

Later on, I asked what she'd been saying to them. Before she could explain, I told her how amazed I was at the way she held their attention. She smiled and said something I'll carry with me the rest of my days: "There is power in your mouth." She wasn't talking about being smooth or clever; she meant the gospel itself.

Romans 1:16 says, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes.."

Pastor J.D. Greear put it this way: "The Great Commission is not a calling for some; it is a mandate for all." We don't have to wait around for some special sign from heaven. The sign has already been given."

Matthew 28:19 says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations.."

The question isn't whether we're called. It's how we're going to respond. Watching that woman obey the Spirit reminded me what it really means to live surrendered, available, and willing to go wherever He leads. This mission isn't just for preachers or overseas missionaries. It's for regular folks like you and me. So, here's the question I've had to wrestle with, and maybe you need to ask it too: Am I walking in a way worthy of the calling I've already received?

A Prayer: Lord, thank You for calling ordinary people to carry Your extraordinary message. Make me attentive to Your Spirit and willing to go wherever You send me. Give me courage to speak, compassion to love, and faith to obey. Use my life and my mouth for Your glory. Amen.

I LOVE the Advent season! One of my favorite traditions at this time of year is decorating the Jesse tree. "There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit." (Isaiah 11:1) Each night as we approach the birth of Christ, we read a passage of scripture starting from creation to the birth of Jesus, connecting the Old Testament to the New Testament, telling of God's plan from the beginning of time to redeem His people by sending a Savior, Christ the Lord.

John tells us that Jesus was with God in the beginning, and all things were created through Him. "Helpplease.... muuguzi." As I looked up from counting the few vials of vaccinations I had left, I met the pleading eyes of a mother holding her fussy newborn baby. I was 23 years old and working as a nurse in Tanzania. Part of my job was to conduct weekly bush clinics – offering vaccinations and education to moms and babies. These were very long days. An hour-long flight on a small plane into the bush, a full day of clinics and educational classes, and then an hour flight back home. It was the end of the day, and I was tired and hungry and ready to go home.

There are only a handful of times that I can say I audibly heard the voice of God.. and this was one of them. Here was "the least of these" standing right in front of me, sick and in need of help. Of course, I snapped out of my self-pitying funk and quickly got this mama and baby the care they needed. I also learned a valuable lesson that reshaped my outlook on servanthood. That same woman came to several clinics after that day, not because she needed medical help, but to hear the Bible story and teaching that were presented at the beginning of each clinic. Honestly, I don't know if she accepted Christ. Our lives intersected very briefly, but I learned that small, seemingly insignificant mercies open up a door to share the much bigger, eternally significant story of Jesus' redemption.

Meeting a person's basic needs – food, clothing, and medicine - prepares the way to share the deeper message of salvation. A few years after I returned to the states, I read the book, "Kisses from Katie" by Katie J. Davis, which details the 18-year-old's overwhelming call to leave behind her college plans and her familiar life in Tennessee and serve as a missionary in Uganda – ultimately providing education, food, and care for hundreds of vulnerable children. Katie says, "I have learned that I will not change the world; Jesus will do that. I can, however, change the world for one person. And if one person sees the love of Christ in me, it is worth every minute." This truth is always at the forefront of my mind - in every situation the Lord puts me in and for every person He puts in front of me.

A Prayer: Lord, help me to be obedient, even when I don't feel like it. Help me not make excuses or resist your leading. Help me be the light and love of Jesus.

Part of fulfilling the great commission is being aware of the evangelistic opportunities around us. I have heard of countless Christians who pray for opportunities to share the gospel within their workplaces, while neglecting the opportunities already in front of them. The reality is that every co-worker, friend, and family member is an open door for the gospel to be shared. We are God's plan to reach our friends.

My wife and I experienced this with her co-workers on Long Island. Over the years, she had developed friendships with her female co-workers, which over time began to open doors to sharing the gospel with them. Though each one had a different story and religious background, they all had questions for Leah regarding her faith in Jesus. Her witness for Jesus was found as she read the Bible on her breaks, shared her personal testimony, and asked her co-workers about their beliefs, which contributed to many spiritual conversations. Sharing the gospel was not a one-way conversation to force someone to convert to Christianity. It was a friendly conversation in love, encouraging and challenging her friends to consider where they would spend eternity.

There were a few times when my wife called me asking for advice on how to continue spiritual conversations, or answer questions about Christianity that enveloped their minds. Leah and I realized that each spiritual conversation we had with her friends was planting seeds that the Spirit was sowing in their hearts. At one point, one of her friends came to church and gave her life to Jesus, which was a huge blessing! We recognized that sharing the gospel was not about forcing a spiritual conversation to happen, but gospel conversations naturally arose in the progression of friendship and showing love to them.

Jesus modeled this for us as He said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." **John 13:35**

The evidence of a true disciple is love. Love breaks down doors. Love is one of the greatest forces to break down walls for the unsaved to welcome the gospel of salvation. Something God has taught me is to always be prayerfully aware of the opportunities He has put in front of me. To be prayerfully aware is to have a constant communication with the Lord as I go about my day. Asking Him who He would want me to share my faith with next, and to provide the strength to do it. God has placed each of us in the jobs and schools we are in to share the Gospel with others, invite them to church, and advance the great commission for His Glory.

You know my genuine enthusiasm at a Bible study. But how would I react, I wonder, if You pointed to a basin of water and asked me to wash the calloused feet of a bent and wrinkled old woman, day after day, month after month, in a room where nobody saw, and nobody knew."

We are thankful that God has placed it on our hearts to care for and serve others. We have found out that it has helped us as much as the person being served.

"From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked." **Luke 12:48**

Over the years—through marriage, parenting, and building businesses—we have learned a lesson that continues to reshape our lives: nothing we have is truly ours. Every resource, opportunity, and blessing belongs to God. We are simply stewards. And stewardship requires open hands. When we hold tightly to what God has placed in our lives, our grip becomes a barrier—there's no room for Him to give, and no freedom for us to release. But when we live open-handed, God creates a rhythm in us: a rhythm of receiving and a rhythm of giving.

Luke 12:48 became foundational for us. We take those words personally. God has been generous to us, and we want our lives to reflect that same generosity. In our early years, giving was not easy. Money was tight. Business was uncertain. We were building dreams with more prayers than profit, and **generosity often felt impractical**. But even then, God was teaching us: trust Me first, not last.

So, we tithed when it was uncomfortable. We helped others when it didn't make sense on paper. We sowed when it felt safer to store. And time after time, God met us there. Not always with immediate financial increase, but always with peace, unity, and provision that only He could orchestrate. As God grew our businesses, He grew our hearts right alongside them. We prayed that success would never make us inward-focused or tight-fisted. We have been the couple in need, and we have been the couple God used to meet someone else's need—both positions marked us deeply. The more we gave, the more clearly we saw God at work.

Sometimes in finances, sometimes in relationships and sometimes in opportunities we could never have created ourselves. Giving changed our question from "How can we get more?" to "How can God use what we already have?"

We don't give to be noticed. We don't give to achieve anything. We give because we have been given everything—forgiveness, grace, family, calling, and provision. God has trusted us with influence, with resources, and with people. Our responsibility isn't to guard them, but to release them back to Him. Generosity is not about wealth; it's about willingness. It's the practice that keeps our hearts soft and our hands open. It's the reminder that God—not us—is the Provider.

If we could encourage anyone who is afraid to step into generosity, we would simply say: Start somewhere. Trust grows through action. We have never once regretted giving. Only the moments we hesitated.

A Prayer: Father, thank You for every blessing You have entrusted to us. Keep our hearts soft and our hands open. Teach us to give cheerfully, sacrificially, and joyfully. In the late spring of 2025, our daughter was trying to end a toxic relationship and find housing for herself and her four children, while being heavily pregnant with her fifth. She had a divine encounter with a pastor at a local church, and he spent weeks trying to assist her. He eventually led her in a prayer of salvation.

We learned of her situation shortly before she gave birth, and we felt led to offer to help her, despite our relationship with her historically being strained. We could not afford to pay for weekly lodging at her extended stay hotel. Getting her and the children set up in a house or apartment quickly was not possible, and a long-term women's shelter was not available. We made the decision to finish a portion of our basement for her and the kids, but quite honestly, we briefly wrestled with that decision, based on her history of not always making good choices. After praying about it, we chose to believe that her salvation was genuine and that God wanted us to help her. **Galatians 6:10** says, "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us work for the good of all, especially for those who belong to the household of faith."

We began work on finishing the basement, believing that a safe place for her children would best help her get on her feet. Steve's home repair/remodeling business suddenly began experiencing an unusual slump, which allowed him to build out the basement in about three days. That slump was a blessing in that regard, but it also brought fears about how long the reduced income would last and how it could affect our ability to stay afloat in the coming months. We asked how we were going to feed six extra people when groceries for two were expensive already. On top of those concerns, it seemed like there were other new challenges and surprises every day, including many expenses and issues associated with our daughter's personal obligations. We leaned on God's promise to supply everything we would need (Philippians 4:13), which has always been a great comfort to us in past times of uncertainty.

We shared our concerns with friends here at WestHills and were absolutely blown away by the quick response and overwhelming generosity of the church as a whole. It was humbling to be on the receiving end of physical gifts and funds, as it was a reversal of roles for us. However, a great burden was lifted and borne by our brothers and sisters in Christ, exemplifying *Galatians 6:2*, which says, "Carry one another's burdens; in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." Most of all, the prayers and encouragement were what got us through. This entire situation served to embolden our faith that the Lord God will provide, especially in ways that we might not imagine (Ephesians 3:20).

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" Have you ever been uncomfortable, at a loss for words, or downright scared to talk to someone about the Good news of Jesus? The disciples apparently were because they were hiding behind locked doors. "Delight yourself in the LORD, and He will give you the desires of your heart." **Psalm 37:4**.

This was a verse Lee shared on the night in 1995 when we were commissioned as career missionaries to Botswana. After 25+ years in Southern Africa, it was time. After a lot of prayer and counsel, we made a decision. Tim says it was the hardest decision we've ever made while, at the same time, the easiest decision we've ever made.

Hard - because we would be leaving a part of the world deeply planted in our hearts, people and cultures we love dearly, the continent our children call "home." African wildlife. Amazing weather. Dear friends.

Easy - because God made it so clear to us. Life was changing for Lee's mom and dad (now 92 and 101). It was time for us to be nearby for their twilight years. We are so thankful God made it clear because we sure would have loved to stay in Africa!

This is not the first time God has asked us to move. Tim had always called Johannesburg our "Ninevah". Do you remember when God asked told Jonah to go to Ninevah? "But Jonah ran away from the LORD and headed for Tarshish" (Jonah 1:1-3). In 2009, God told us to move to Johannesburg. We went...in obedience, but with heavy hearts. Then God gave us ten beautiful years in that big and bustling African city.

After spending our first two years of marriage living in the Atlanta area in the 80s, we knew we never wanted to live inside the perimeter of Atlanta. But now it seemed it was time to pull up our African roots and transplant to ITP (Inside the Perimeter).

One of our kids recently wrote us a note acknowledging the sacrifices we've made in moving to Atlanta. But as we have walked in obedience, God has opened door after door of blessing. He has allowed Tim to do his Africa mission job from Atlanta. He dropped a most fulfilling ministry job in Lee's lap for this season. He has given us a home on a hidden gem of a lake, ITP! And there is great joy in serving Lee's parents, especially as we lived far from them for 35 years.

We have found Psalm 37:4 to be true. As we walk closely with Jesus, He plants His desires in our hearts, then brings them to fruition. We excitedly followed Him to Africa – first in 1987 –where He gave us a life we never could have dreamed of. And He has now brought us full circle, granting gifts all along the way.

1 Chronicles 29:12-14: "Wealth and honor come from You; You are the ruler of all things. In Your hands are strength and power to exalt and give strength to all. Now, our God, we give You thanks, and praise Your glorious name. But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to give as generously as this? Everything comes from You, and we have given You only what comes from Your hand."

Our family has been on the receiving end of giving more times than we can count. Once, as a Single car family, our engine blew up. We literally received everything we needed to repair the engine: funds from another believer that randomly showed up in the mail, a call about a cherry picker that was ready for pick up at an auto-parts store, and even friends to help with installation. The Lord also provided every single dollar of the fees associated with adoption, and even frequent flier miles to get us to China. It was incredibly humbling. Receiving such extravagant gifts bolstered our faith in the Lord as provider. Our God is able to provide abundantly more than we can think or imagine. Because of experiencing these mercies, when we are tempted to worry, a natural response has become, "God provided before, I know He will provide again."

Early in our marriage, WestHills facilitated Crown Ministry financial Bible studies as well as Dave Ramsey classes. We attended them and learned how to Biblically think about money: It's all God's, and we are simply stewards of it. In light of this training, when we sold two houses in 2019 and were building a home, we were faced with the decision: should we tithe off the profit made from these sales?

We began praying about what the 'right' answer was. Some experts claimed that these funds didn't count as profit because they were put directly back into another home. During that time, in our Bible study, we read the story of Ananias and Sapphira. Acts 5:4 states, "And after it was sold, wasn't the money at your disposal?" While we understood that this is a historical account, we also knew that God desired that we hold everything with an open hand. We knew we must tithe off the sale of our homes. We are not rich by the world's standards. Budgets felt tight, and we were afraid that by giving this money we would be stretched too thin. We began to pray over our new mortgage payment amount specifically. We even had friends come alongside us and pray over this number. Closing day came, and the paperwork announced our new payment: it was within \$30 of the number we had prayed over. We felt seen by the Lord as he provided so specifically for us once again. Not to mention, sharing with our friends that God answered all of our prayers brought great joy to us all!

A Prayer: God, you are our provider. You are completely sovereign and use everything, including money, to teach us to trust You and to show us Your power. While money and giving are personal, they help us to remember that our spending reveals where our hearts lie. Reveal to us those places that we need to see.

So, helping this person was a no-brainer. We had furniture in our basement that wasn't being used. We helped her move into her new apartment. To see the look on her face was payment enough. It is a good feeling when you know God is using you.

Humility- The Key to Serving, Sharing, and Giving

Philippians Do nothing from rivalry or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. 4 Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. 5 Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, 6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but made himself nothing, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. 8 And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. 9 Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, 10 so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

This is one of my favorite NT passages because it is so foundational for a fruitful Christian life. It encompasses service, sharing, and giving in a profound way because it is the essence of the life of Jesus. The road to glory is named humility.

Paul gives us several imperatives that are not simply good things to do, or virtues, but are actually "the mind of Christ Jesus," and at the core of that mindset is humility. So, he gives us 2 things not to do and 2 things we need to do.

When I live out of my "conceit" or desire for recognition, I may serve or give to others, but not because I really think they are more significant than I am. In fact, when I do this, I am actually looking out for my own interests and not theirs because I'm doing it for recognition. It's a constant battle to count others as more significant than myself and make their interests more important than my own. But if we truly want to serve, share, and give as Jesus did, we need to think as He did. 2 examples from Jesus' life display this perfectly. In *Mark 10:43*, He says, "whoever would be great among you must be your servant..." If there was ever someone who deserved to be served, it was Jesus. But in *John 13:12-15*, we see Jesus in complete humility serving His disciples by washing their feet as a slave would do in their culture. "If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example- that you also should do just as I have done to you."

Paul tells us how we can actually do this: *Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus...* In other words, when we think like Jesus, we act like Jesus, and counting others as more significant than ourselves is really doable.

A Prayer: Father, help me be like Jesus, Help me to embrace the role of a servant. Help me humble myself before the Lord, knowing it is by grace not merit that I am saved. Amen.

As we started talking, I heard the Holy Spirit whisper into my spirit. "This is the guy." A few years ago, if I had heard this indistinct yet pervading Consciousness, I would have ignored it...brushed it off... disregarded any inclination my inner man had towards spiritual things in the middle of Tractor Supply. That was the old Daniel. But the new Daniel had learned a few things in the last several years.

Do we wait to see what we have left over at the end of the year and give from that, or do we give God the first portion and trust him to provide the rest? Nowhere in the Bible are we promised wealth or that we will be financially blessed. What it does promise us is that if we seek after him, he will draw near to us (James 4:8).

In the crusades, before going off to battle, warriors would sometimes get baptized, but they would hold their swords out of the water. In doing so, they were saying I give my body to God, but I'm going to hold my sword for myself. Today, we often do that with the things He has given us. I'll get baptized, but I'm going to hold my wallet out and still use that for me. God doesn't want some of us; he wants our whole life and complete devotion.

My challenge to the church is to give your first and your best because we are called to be like Christ, who gave His first and best for us in His Son. Giving is an act of worship and a recognition that it is all His anyway; he has just entrusted us with these things for a while. When we reach the end of ourselves—when our plans crumble, our strength fades, and our resources run dry—God steps in with sufficiency. His grace is not just enough; it is abundant, sustaining us in every trial.

Paul didn't just accept his weakness; he delighted in it. That sounds counterintuitive, but it makes sense when we realize that weakness draws us closer to Christ. It teaches dependence, humility, and trust. In hardships and difficulties, we discover that true strength is not self-reliance but Christ-reliance.

Through the trials that my wife and I have faced. We can both attest to God's power in our weakest times and how others saw Him through us just by surrendering and not allowing the enemy to overtake us.

When we lead worship, God uses the most imperfect moments to reveal His goodness. A wrong note, a missed lyric, or even a weary heart at times... He takes it all and turns it into praise when we offer it to Him. Some Sundays feel like a celebration, others feel like a battle. But every Sunday is a chance to show our church that Jesus is worthy, even when life is heavy!

One of the greatest joys we've experienced is seeing God move in ways we never orchestrated. We've watched people respond during songs we didn't plan to do until the Lord places it on our hearts mid-service. We've had to step out of the way and let God do what only He can do.

Serving through worship has taught us to trust Him deeper. We get to lift our eyes higher than the stress, the schedule, and our own weaknesses and remind our church family to do the same. And eventually, He did. A few years after I first heard the Lord say, "Go," He spoke the same call to Chris. That was our confirmation. We sold almost everything we owned, packed what little we had left, and moved to the Dominican Republic. It was a sacrifice, but somehow it felt like an easy yes because it was exactly what we were both called to do.

We spent 3.5 years serving disadvantaged teen boys, sharing the gospel with them through weekly Bible studies, relationships, and daily presence. We watched God move in miraculous ways—doors opening that we could never have pushed open ourselves. We saw hardened hearts soften. We saw young men begin to believe that God had a purpose for them. And we saw what happens when you take your own plans off the table and serve with open hands, letting God write the story.

It wasn't always easy. There were days we missed home, days we felt stretched, days we questioned if we were making a difference. But every time doubt tried to settle in, we remembered our yes. We remembered that God had called us there, and obedience always brings a peace that circumstances can't shake. Looking back, it was worth every sacrifice.

That season taught me that when God calls, He equips. When He speaks, He sustains. And when we trust Him with every unknown, He leads us exactly where we're meant to be. Obedience becomes easier when I trust that God's plans will always lead me where my own understanding never could.

A Prayer: Lord, help me trust Your voice even when I can't see the full path. Give me the courage to say yes to Your calling and faith to wait for Your timing. Teach me to hold my plans loosely and follow You with open hands. Amen.

Even now, I want the zeal I had when I was young. Whatever situation you find yourself in with the Holy Spirit calling you to MOVE, be willing, and He will make you able. That is our prayer for 2026.

We can use the example of **Philippians 2:3-8** as our example, the example of Christ.

"Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross."

A Prayer: Lord, lead us to the hurting. Help us to be available and willing participants of loving, serving, and sharing with others. Give us your zeal for those in need.

Our takeaway from this experience is that not everyone God puts in our path is always going to be humble, grateful, cooperative, and appreciative of our help.
