Scriptures: 1 Peter 3: 1-7

Three Essential Questions

These are intended to be open-ended and encourage members to consider how they felt and what they, or the group, can do as a result of hearing the message.

1. What did you hear? What point in this message was most impactful for you?
2. What do you think? How did this message challenge, change, or affirm your thinking?
3. What will you do? How will you or your group put into practice what you've learned today?

Message Points/Extra Questions

1. Following Jesus means allowing Him to transform our character and relationships—not just saving us, but becoming Lord of every area of our lives. What does it mean to be a “godly” person?
2. When people experience you, what do you hope they see? What aspect of your character most needs to become more like Jesus?
3. Read 1 Peter 3:3–4. Peter isn't saying external appearance is wrong. His point is that external beauty fades, while what God is doing in our hearts lasts. He specifically points toward qualities like love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness, goodness, faithfulness, and self-control. Which of these qualities do you most want God to develop in you right now? Why?
4. The women Peter was addressing had legitimate reasons to fear what might happen because of their faith. Peter's challenge was to trust God enough to do what is right rather than allowing fear to determine their actions. What fear can make it difficult for you to live faithfully or do what you know is right? What would trusting God look like in that situation?
5. Peter tells husbands to treat their wives with honor and respect, especially in a culture where women were often treated as inferior. He then reminds believers that men and women are co-heirs of God's grace. Who is someone you may be tempted to dismiss, overlook, or take for granted? What would it look like to intentionally honor and respect that person?
