

PSALM 107
COMMUNITY GROUP QUESTIONS

1. Read Psalm 107. What did you find helpful or encouraging from this week's passage and message?
2. The passage highlights four "some..." groups (wanderers, prisoners, fools, and sailors at wit's end). Which group do you most identify with in your story with God, and why?
3. "God is redeeming all kinds of people." Where do you think you still have blind spots about who you believe God can save?
4. The repeated line in Psalm 107 is, "Then they cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress." How have you personally experienced this—what was your "cry," and what did God do?
5. We heard that God's steadfast love (hesed) is covenantal, undeserved, and unchanging. Which aspect of that definition is hardest for you to really believe, and how does that affect your walk with God?
6. The sermon emphasized knowing each other's stories of redemption. How well do people in this group know your story? Is there a part of your story you've rarely or never shared that you might be ready to talk about? (*Some of our community groups make a practice of having a different person share their story/testimony each time they gather. Would this be something to consider adding to your group's routine?*)
7. If we truly grasp what we've been saved from, we should be "the happiest, most joyful people." What most often robs you of that joy, and what helps you remember and recover it?
8. This Psalm repeatedly calls the redeemed to "thank the LORD" and "tell of his deeds in songs of joy." Very practically, what are one or two ways you can grow this week in expressing thanks—both privately and with others?
9. Spend some time praying together. Specifically for our own awareness of and expression of gratitude for what God has done in our lives, and for those whom God is calling to mind when considering the "some" groups and individuals around you who need to know Jesus.
