FROM DAVID'S DESK

Hi all. After more than 50 years we are heading back to the moon, folks! How exciting! Tracking the progress of the Artemis II mission reminds me of how extraordinary the achievements of the Apollo missions were and indeed the Gemini series before that.

At least one or two launch windows for the four astronauts scheduled to be aboard Artemis II have come and gone. Recent pre-launch tests showed up a number of issues that meant delays in launching – in fact I believe they are rolling back to the rocket assembly building – all is not right with Artemis II.

Disappointing, but necessary. The mission, the crew is too important to launch without being honest about what needs attention.

And that's the journey of Lent right there – all is not right with us and our journey is too important without being honest about what needs attention. The Psalmist, in Psalm 51 (a Psalm closely associated with Ash Wednesday) is confronted by some God-

centred honesty that all is not right – far, far from it. When we look at life from God's angle – when we roll back to the assembly area, the source of our very being, we see (as did the Psalmist) both brokenness and beauty. We see the need for repair and the promise of renewal. A necessary return to the workshop so that what is not right within us can be worked on by the God who made us and knows exactly what will bring joy, contentment, and fullness of life.

Let's see this Lenten season as an opportunity to let the One who knows us fully do the quiet work of repair, restoration, recalibration so that we can continue our journey of faith with integrity, honesty, and renewed perspective.

Our three-week Lenten study will provide some space (no pun intended – well maybe just a little) to explore these themes — to look a little closer at our lives, to listen for God's perspective, and to prepare for the journey ahead. We will start these studies during the week of Lent 3. There will be a day session and an evening session, starting on Tuesday 10 March at 10am in the Minister's office. The Langfords have generously offered to again host the evening session on a Wednesday night, starting 11 March.

As we journey through Lent, we hear Jesus' invitation in Matthew 11:28-30 to take a step back, recognise the reality of life and receive repair and restoration, "*Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest... for my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.*"

May God's peace go with you and before you. **Rev. David.**

STRESS MANAGEMENT

I heard about a young lady leading a stress management workshop while holding a glass of water as she walked around. Everyone knew she was going to ask the ultimate question, “half empty or half full?” She fooled them all “How heavy is this glass of water?” she inquired with a smile. Answers called out ranged from 300 to 500 grams.

She replied, “The absolute weight doesn’t matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that’s not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I’ll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you’ll have to call an ambulance.

In each case it’s the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes.” She continued, “and that’s the way it is with stress. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won’t be able to carry on.”

“As with the glass of water, you have to put it down for a while and rest before holding it again. When we’re refreshed, we can carry on with the burden – holding stress longer and better each time practised. So, as early in the evening as you can, put all your burdens down. Don’t carry them through into the night.”

Two centuries ago, Joseph Scriven understood this and wrote TIS Hymn 590.

1. What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and grief to bear,
What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer:
O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear,
All because we do not carry everything to God in prayer.
2. Have we trials and temptations, is there trouble anywhere?
We should never be discouraged: take it to the Lord in prayer.
Can we find a friend so faithful who will all our sorrows share?
Jesus knows our every weakness: take it to the Lord in prayer.
3. Are we weak and heavy-laden, cumbered with a load of care?
Jesus is our only refuge: take it to the Lord in prayer.
Do your friends despise, forsake you? Take it to the Lord in prayer;
In his arms he’ll take and shield you, you will find a solace there.

He prepares refreshment and renewal in the midst of my activity,

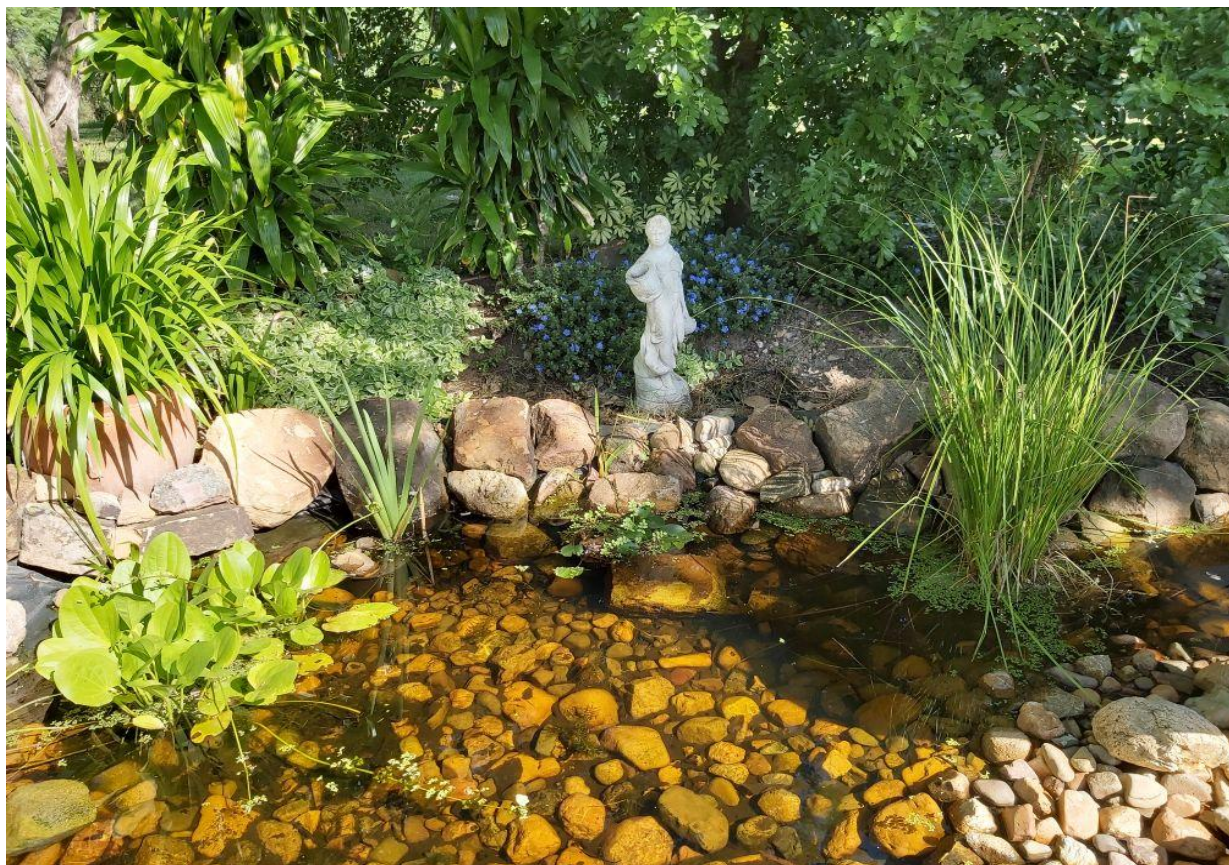
By anointing my mind with His oils of tranquillity.

CHURCH COUNCIL Retreat Day Thursday 12 February 2026

Listening, Discerning, Responding

Earlier this month, our Church Council gathered for a Retreat Day shaped by prayer, reflection and honest conversation. We met not simply to manage church life, but to listen together for God's messages in this season.

We began by looking back with gratitude — remembering moments of growth, grace and meaningful connection, while also acknowledging areas of tiredness and challenge. There was a deep sense of thanksgiving for the many ways Christ is already at work among us.

As we reflected on the present, we named many strengths within our congregation: our welcoming spirit, strong volunteer culture, outreach focus, pastoral care, thoughtful theology, love of the arts, and vibrant music and preaching. We also spoke honestly about challenges, including our ageing demographic, leadership succession, finances, transport needs, and maintaining our buildings and spaces.

Looking ahead to 2028, there is a shared hope for sustainable growth — particularly welcoming younger people and new leaders — while nurturing the strong sense of community and worship that already sustains us.

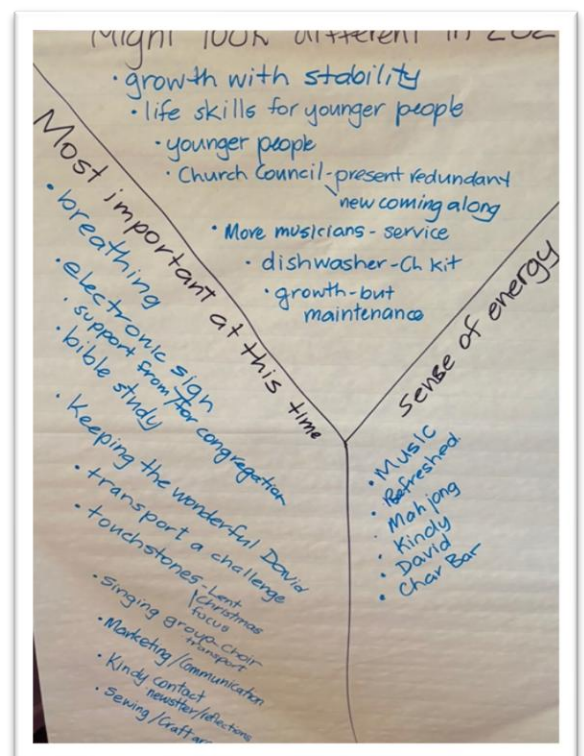
Through prayerful discernment, several priorities for 2026 began to emerge, including outreach, strengthening congregational life, deepening Bible study, enhancing communication, supporting music and special services, and addressing practical needs such as signage and transport. These priorities will guide Council's focus in the year ahead.

We also recommitted ourselves to safe and healthy ministry practices, reflected on preparations for Lent and continued planning for ArtBurst in August — a joyful celebration of creativity and community connection.

The day closed with a simple prayer: that we might have courage to release what is finished, clarity to follow what is beginning, and trust that Christ goes before us into 2026.

Please continue to hold your Church Council in prayer as we seek to serve faithfully in the year ahead.

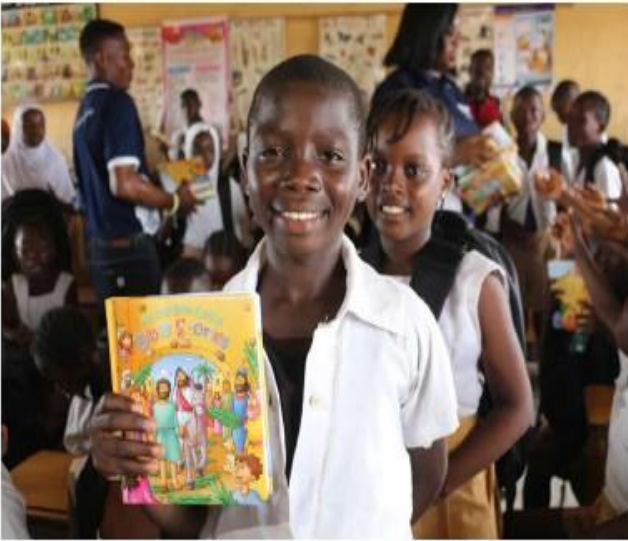

Overview

Bible Society Australia is partnering with Bible Society Nigeria (BSN) to support internally displaced people and slum residents affected by violence and poverty. This project supplies relief materials, Bible-based Trauma Healing sessions, Bibles and school supplies. It aims to meet basic needs, promote emotional and spiritual healing, and offer hope amid adversity.

The Need

There is a great need in Nigeria among internally displaced people and those living in slum areas, comprising women, men, teenagers, and children who have endured trauma from Boko Haram insurgency, communal clashes, natural disasters, and other conflicts. These populations, from diverse backgrounds, religions and cultures, live in overcrowded camps and slums with inadequate access to food, clean water, shelter, and healthcare. Many are vulnerable to disease due to poor sanitation and are burdened by psychological trauma, making recovery and reintegration difficult. Economically, they struggle to rebuild their lives, requiring skills training and emotional support to recover from trauma.

Urgent relief and long-term support, including emotional healing and skills development, are vital for their survival and dignity. Addressing these needs is essential to help them rebuild their lives and foster hope for a peaceful future.

REFRESHED: A POTTED HISTORY AS WE MOVE FORWARD

During the devastating 2011 Queensland floods, which significantly impacted Brisbane and surrounding suburbs, **Kenmore Uniting Church** served as a local collection centre for the community. As floodwaters affected homes and displaced families across the western suburbs, the church opened its doors to provide practical assistance, hospitality, and pastoral care.

Rev Heather den Houting, who was Minister at the time, provided spiritual leadership and pastoral support during this significant crisis, guiding the congregation as it responded to the urgent needs of the community.

Rev David Nix, alongside volunteers coordinated the distribution of food, clothing, and essential supplies, while the church facilities became a gathering place for information sharing, support, and prayer.

Through the leadership of our minister and the involvement of dedicated members, the relief effort demonstrated the strength of local faith-based support and the resilience of the Kenmore community.

Members of our congregation then formed a management committee to oversee the development of a store that recycled, saw fair trade as important and operated ethically. The committee members were Jean MacNicol, Caroline Graham, Marleine Perry, Beverley Woodcroft and Heather den Houting.

The outcome, **Refreshed**: Lifestyle Store, opened fifteen years ago.

The shop would operate on the north-side verandah of the church, with the church being open to the public during shop hours. The shop operated in this space for ten years. This was until the dreaded COVID and social distancing. Refreshed then expanded into the church, forming a circuit to ensure COVID restrictions were adhered to.

This expansion to the shop has also increased the workload of Friday volunteers as the church is readied for weekend worship.

There has been a gross income of over \$230,000 in the near fifteen years since the shop opened. 50% of the shop's income is donated to mission projects supported by our congregation.



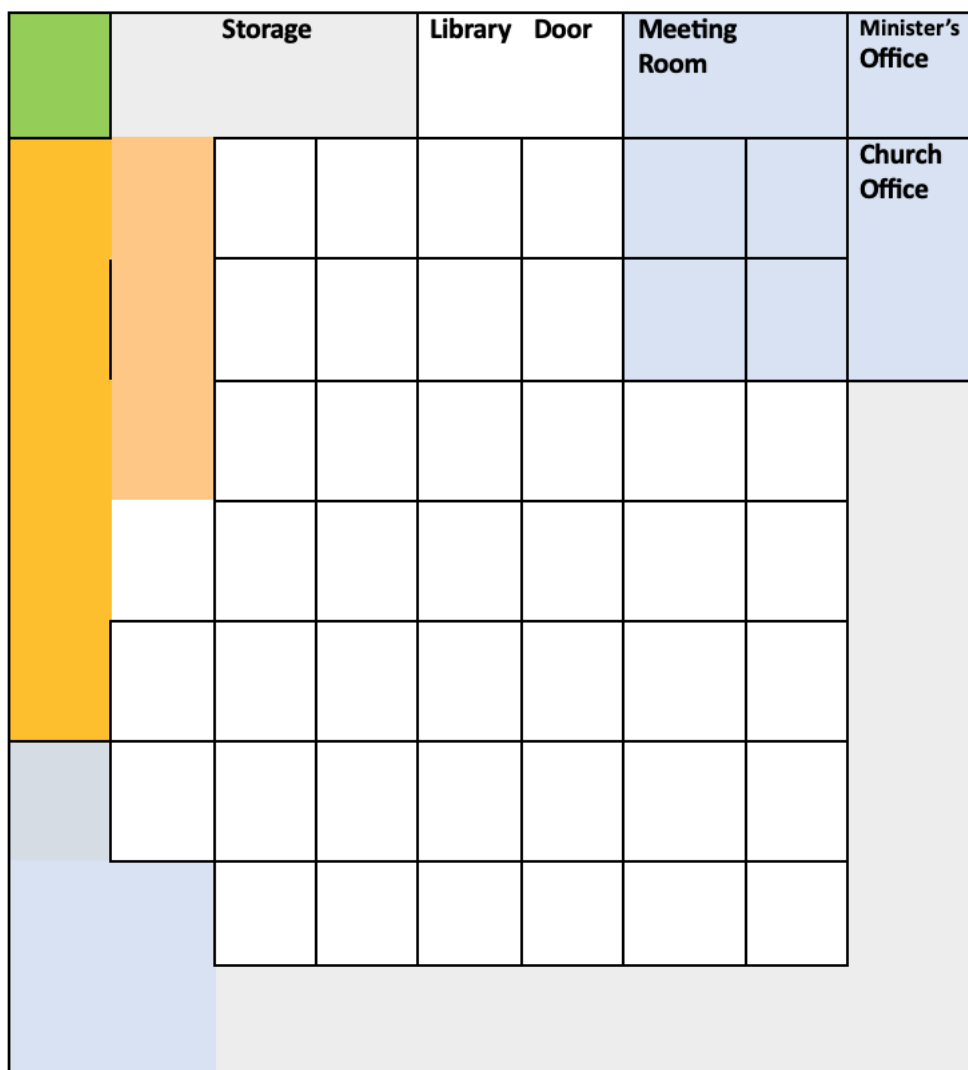
The success of this fundraising can be seen through the information that is updated on the pinboard at the back of the church. Over \$115,000 in funds donated. This means that over \$115,000 has also been added to the church coffers. Money that is sorely needed to support our church finances.

Why the potted history? Speaking with many volunteers their biggest concern is space. They would like to have more dedicated space to assist with stock display, sorting, and pricing. These concerns were taken to Church Council and discussions with Jenny took place.

Church Council agreed that space was required. No major structuring will be needed and curtains currently in use will be moved to create the new space. Doing this will result in a reduction of two pews. We will also remove the trip hazard left by previous removal.

Church Council also discussed Safe Church requirements for volunteers and the workload that is currently carried by Jenny, as Refreshed Shop Coordinator.

REFRESHED NEWS – FEBRUARY

We opened again on Monday 2 February after a seven week break.

A small group of volunteers worked tirelessly in the week before we opened to sort through the mountains of donations received over the Christmas break and to make the shop “customer ready”. A major problem was the huge quantity of books – dozens and dozens of boxes - donated.

Second Harvest Book Shop (Kenmore Anglican Church), who we usually give our surplus books to, was already in a pickle as it had a backlog of books to be sorted due to the lengthy absence, due to illness, of their librarian/manager. They would have taken them, but I knew they were struggling, so I contacted the conveners of several street libraries in the area. Three ladies came and sorted through and took quite a lot, but it hardly made a dent in our pile.

Finally, Lifeline said they would take everything we had left, so my son brought his ute up and was able to deliver most to their Taringa store, thankfully the day before Iain Davidson’s Funeral, as we were storing them on the western verandah. After my week-long stress about the books, I reflected on the positive aspects of the situation.

Because of the books, I met a lot of lovely people and made new contacts and friends for Refreshed. I found out from Susan Thomas (Second Harvest) about the Mission of Seafarers (located at the Port of Brisbane). They always welcome donations of large (1,000 & + pieces) jigsaw puzzles, board games, and also books. Over 10,000 seamen pass through Brisbane yearly. This Mission provides welfare, pastoral and spiritual support + other services to sailors who often spend lonely months at sea. They will have someone collect from us if we have suitable items to give them. What an interesting and worthwhile outreach service! I had never heard of this mission. Look up their website for more information.

There were also some very old, and apparently/maybe valuable books amongst the donations. If you know anything about rare books, or know someone who does, please let me know.



Brenda has been busy (when is Brenda not busy?) making Mango Chutney with mangos from our church mango tree. She gifted several bottles to Refreshed and they sold out. And then she made us some more. I was going to take a photo, but ... there was just one lonely bottle left! Thank you, Brenda, for your delicious and very popular donation.

Our little Cherished Bears have proven to be very lucrative for Refreshed, despite our fairly modest pricing. Through Marketplace advertising we had a gentleman (an avid collector) contact us and he came in and bought \$550 worth of bears one Friday recently. Apart from ArtBurst/PlantBurst days, I think that must be a record income for the shop in a single day, and certainly from a single sale.

Finally, welcome back to all our wonderful volunteers who are, undoubtedly, the heart, soul and backbone of Refreshed! We are pleased to welcome two new volunteers, Zoe and Nicole, and also Simon (husband of Noriko) this month. Noriko is still overseas and Simon has been “filling in” for her and did a great job of tidying and organising shelves to cope with new donations. I am hoping we can convince Simon to continue volunteering with us after Noriko returns. Of course, we can’t wait to welcome Noriko back too.

February has been a very pleasing start to 2026.

OUTBACK CHAPPIE CAME TO THANK REFRESHED



Refreshed and friends had a delightful guest on Tuesday 24th in the person of Outback Chappie, Pastor Jennie Feldmeier, from Burke & Wills Remote Area, paid us a visit after receiving \$1,000 from Refreshed funds just before Christmas. She was on the phone within a couple of days to say thank you and arranged to visit when she was in town for a Frontier Services retreat. She had known Dona in Roma and stayed with her and they came to see how the little shop worked and then had lunch with those dozen of us who were privileged to be able to come.

Jennie's area is about the size of Victoria and she has no set route for visiting, but criss-crosses that enormous territory wherever she is called to help. She had a wealth of stories to share with us about her call to outback ministry and the kinds of ways she ends up spending her time, whether it's helping someone clean up the sodden, smelly mess from flood waters through their home, to helping paint a dilapidated church in the Gulf area for a group trying to turn it into a vibrant community centre, or just making sandwiches for first responders after days battling floods or fire.

After lunch, she told us stories about the people she meets. One old lady was renowned for complaining and grumbling but when it was found that she had Parkinson's and really couldn't stay in her isolated homestead on her own, Jenny

fronted up once or twice a week for several weeks to take her back home and help her go through the piles of mementos and implements and amazing items stored in and around her house. (Jennie says outback people never throw anything away in case it's useful when roads are blocked or goods are in short supply). Bit by bit the lady shared the stories that came out of the chaos and jumble and together they packed up what could be brought to town with her when she moved and set aside what others would take away. Jennie said no wonder she was cranky – she had married but couldn't have children, her husband had died some years before, she had battled on her own with nobody to talk to and now she was ill with Parkinson's. The hospital moved her into town because she couldn't manage. But Jennie was there to do what had to be done in small steps.

Jennie says she is very aware of the prayers of those who support her. She felt she should visit one well-known family, very wealthy and influential in the area, with historic ties to their property, the wife talented and the husband with a reputation for being a hard man and not one to cross. A mutual friend organised a visit through a member of the family at short notice and Jennie drove there with great trepidation. After she crossed the cattle grid into the property, she stopped, completely daunted by the prospect of the meeting. Then she said she became aware of the prayers of so many people telling her to keep going, so she went in

and left a few hours later, with bookings for three baptisms, a Christmas service and a wedding this year and a realisation that wherever she goes, God has already been there before her.

Jennie says her role is not to teach or preach, but to be the hands and

feet of Jesus and to listen or do whatever is required. She calls it a ministry of presence. How appropriate that it was our Refreshed shop that enabled us the opportunity to make this contact and find someone who understands how needed a ministry of presence can be. After all, this is just what our volunteers do every day they come in. Yes, Refreshed has raised extraordinary funds for the church and the wonderful projects, but even more importantly, *Refreshed says our church is open. Come and buy or come and chat, or sit and weep, you are welcome.*

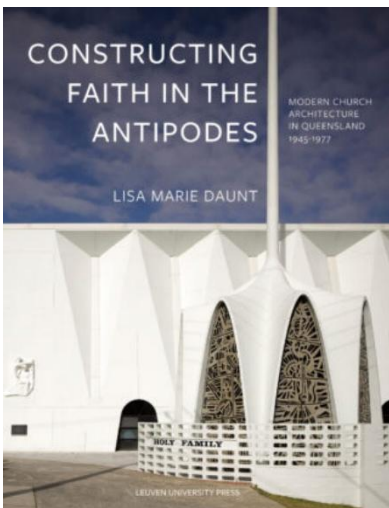
WE ARE COMMUNITY
